To: All Chiefs

Dear Chiefs;

I am writing to you regarding the on-going plight of the Innu of Davis.

As you may know, in 1967 the Innu were settled on an island off the coast of Labrador. As part of its campaign to encourage settlement, the government of Newfoundland promised that houses would be built and community and social infrastructures would be established. Unfortunately, what followed was two decades of social disintegration, culminating in Davis Inlet's most recent tragedy - the attempted suicide of six of its children. Despite recent public attention and support for their issues, the people of Davis Inlet continue to be locked into a jurisdictional nightmare. Federal and provincial officials continue to banter on the question of government responsibility. Consequently, there has been little progress in addressing the very urgent issues faced by the people of Davis Inlet.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO ASSIST THE INNU PEOPLE OF DAVIS INLET


As part of its support for the community, the Assembly of First Nations has set up an Innu Trust Fund. We are currently accepting financial donations from the general public. Monetary contributions can be forwarded to the Innu Trust Fund, c/o Assembly of First Nations, 55 Murray Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1N 5M3.

In addition, we encourage all First Nations communities to send letters of support for the people of Davis Inlet. Letters should be addressed to local MPs, MPPs, the Minister of Health and Welfare and the Minister of Indian Affairs. Support letters should call for immediate action by the federal government to establish comprehensive programs to address the social and health needs of the community. Programs must be adequately funded and must be administered and controlled by the people of Davis Inlet. Furthermore, letters should support the efforts of First Nations communities, like Davis Inlet, who are calling for the recognition of the inherent right to self-government.

Subject: Aboriginal Languages Day - March 31

MARCH 31 IS ABORIGINAL LANGUAGES DAY

It is a day to celebrate our languages as the vehicle for maintaining and transmitting our identity, our culture, our relationship with the land and all of Creation.

It is a day to preserve and promote the use of our languages among our people. Following is a list of suggested activities:

Traditional ceremonies in all office buildings, public buildings and schools in your community - including all staff and First Nations citizens.

Press conferences and press releases (sample enclosed) highlighting the language situation in your community.

A traditional feast with story-telling (in the language) by the Elders.

Challenge speakers of the language in your community to: (a) begin to teach a non-speaker; and (b) develop words to describe modern inventions - i.e. computer, microwave oven, VCR, etc. Make the language useful in today's world and make learning the language fun.

Messages to off-reserve schools attended by students of your community encouraging activities to recognize Aboriginal Languages Day.

Notify all business associates (consultants, lawyers, suppliers, etc.) that March 31 is Aboriginal Languages Day.

The Assembly of First Nations is currently conducting a campaign to raise awareness of language issues among Aboriginal communities. The campaign has wide support among Elders, educators and spiritual leaders. Besides a local initiative, a national Elders Gathering and a national language conference will be held in 1993.


The Chiefs Committee on Education, the Aboriginal Language Steering Committee and the Literacy Working Group have provided the basis of the message to be utilized in the "**Aboriginal Languages Campaign, A Guide for Community Activities**", it is up to each individual First Nation community to make the campaign successful.

The letter writing guide includes messages to your Member of Parliament and members of the provincial legislature (particularly Aboriginal representatives) recommending that the respective assemblies recognize and declare support for Aboriginal Languages Day - March 31 and raise awareness of language issues for the **protection, promotion and revival of Aboriginal languages**.

Let's work together to ensure the protection, retention and revival of all aboriginal languages.



HEPATITIS B

Hepatitis B is a disease caused by a virus which attacks the liver. Symptoms and signs in infected people range from very minor through to a flu-like illness to jaundice. About 10 per cent of infected individuals become carriers who may pass on the disease. Carriers frequently show no symptoms and may therefore infect others unknowingly. Ten per cent of adults and 90 per cent of infected infants may develop chronic hepatitis which may progress to cirrhosis and cancer of the liver. About one per cent of acute cases of Hepatitis B succumb quickly and die. In Canada, the disease is most commonly transmitted through sexual contact and injection drug use, and potentially through occupational exposure to blood and body fluids.

The occurrence of Hepatitis B is worldwide and considered endemic. This means there is a constant presence of the disease within a given geographic area. In Africa and Asia, Hepatitis B virus infection is particularly widespread among infants and children.

In Canada, Hepatitis B is endemic. The occurrence of the disease is highest among injection drug users and male homosexuals.

Accurate information on the occurrence of Hepatitis B in Canada is limited. In 1990, there were 3,021 cases reported and in 1989, 41 deaths. The Department of National Health and Welfare is promoting a surveillance system that will collect more accurate disease incidence data. The Department has also worked with the provinces and territories to standardize case definitions for the reporting of Hepatitis B infection.


POLYCYSTIC KIDNEY DISEASE

What is polycystic kidney disease?

Polycystic means "many fluid-filled sacs" or "cysts". Polycystic kidney disease (PKD) is a disease which causes cysts to form in the kidneys.

What are kidneys?

Your kidneys are the master chemists of the body. Normally,

you have two kidneys, one on either side of your spine under your lower ribs. They are pink in colour and

shaped like kidney beans. Each kidney is about the size of your clenched fist.

Are there different types of PKD?

Yes, there are two types.

Adult PKD, called "autosomal dominant PKD", is the most common inherited disease of the kidneys.


There is also a very rare type of PKD called "autosomal recessive PKD" which affects infants and young children. A child can have Infant PKD only when both parents are silent carriers of the gene; in this case, each child has a 25% chance of having the disease.

What is PKD in adults?

In adult PKD the gene for the disease is "dominant". This means that if you have the gene, then you will have the disease. If either your mother or father has autosomal dominant PKD, then you, your sisters and brothers

each have a 50% chance of inheriting PKD.

If the gene for PKD is not passed on to you then you will not inherit the disease nor will you pass it on to your children.



How does PKD affect the kidneys?

Polycystic kidneys become very large, have a bumpy surface and contain many cysts. Pressure from the expanding cysts slowly damages the normal kidney tissue eventually causing kidney failure.

Who is affected by PKD?

PKD seems to strike people all over the world regardless of race, sex, religion or social class. In Canada, about 27,000 people suffer from the illness.

How do you get PKD?

PKD is an inherited disease. This means that it is passed from parents to children. Every person has 23 different pairs of "chromosomes", one set coming from each parent. The chromosomes are messengers which carry information in the form of genes. If you inherit the gene for PKD then you will either have the disease or you will be a silent carrier (where you don't have the disease but you may pass on the gene). This will depend on the type of PKD gene passed on to you.

What are the symptoms of adult PKD?

Adult PKD progresses very slowly. Early in the disease there are often no symptoms at all. The only way to know if you are affected by PKD is to be tested for cysts in your kidneys. There are a number of other symptoms which you might watch for:

- High blood pressure;
- Recurrent bladder or kidney infections;
- Severe and recurrent headache;
- Blood in the urine;
- Side, back, or stomach pain;
- Water retention ("edema");
- Kidney stones.

People with PKD might also have cysts in the liver, pancreas, and other organs.

As well, about 15% to 40% have swellings in the walls of blood vessels in the brain (called aneurysms).

What are the chances that your kidneys will fail?

Kidney failure occurs when you are left with less than 15% of total kidney function. Only one in six people with PKD will develop kidney failure. Many are not affected at all until later in life.

Effective immediately, the Canadian Native Arts Foundation's (CNAF) deadlines for accepting applications has been changed. The new deadlines dates are **March 31** and **September 30** each year.

The CNAF is a nationally registered charitable organization that provides financial assistance for native (status and non-status), Metis and Inuit people undertaking education or training in the arts, including the performing, visual, literary, crafted and communication arts. Since 1988, CNAF has awarded \$1.5 million to approximately 450 individuals and initiatives.

All applications must be postmarked by midnight on or before the deadline date to be eligible for consideration. If you choose to send your application by courier, it must be shipped on or before the deadline date in order to be eligible.







A Question of Justice: He Who Looks Upside Down

"He Who Looks Upside Down," a half-hour drama premiering Monday, 22 March at 7:30 p.m., unites Canadian filmmaker Duke Redbird and TVO's Youth Programming in examining how native leaders are attempting to take back responsibility for the administration of justice in their own communities.

Filmed near Algonquin Park, "He Who Looks Upside Down" provides insight into the native concept of law and justice, which is based on restitution and reconciliation. A number of Ontario communities have already set up elders' courts or councils, in which the accused and victim are brought face to face. These councils, which have met with a great deal of success, are designed to restore faith and harmony in the community. The accused acknowledges wrongdoing and demonstrates his or her willingness to make restitution to the victim and the rest of the community: the accused usually performs community service for a period under the guidance of an elder or mentor.

In "He Who Looks Upside Down," Jerry Jidimo (Kennetch Charlette), a young native man convicted of threatening to set fire to a store, must perform 200 hours of community service under the supervision of store owner and elder Eli MacKay, played by Winston Wuttune. Jidimo must transform a young wild husky into a sled dog. He quickly learns what happens when the husky refuses to pull his weight, leaving the work to the other dogs. Through this experience, Jidimo realizes not only how his own actions have disrupted his community, but how each community member must pull his or her weight in order to maintain peace and harmony.

Redbird, who wrote and directed an all-native cast, focuses on the native point of view and how community leaders and elders are going back to their cultural, traditional, and spiritual roots to regain control of their own lives.

"He Who Looks Upside Down" is part of TVO's award-winning *A Question of Justice*, a nine-part series created to raise awareness of the Canadian legal system and of individual rights and responsibilities within that system.

We need you. Please plan to attend next Monday.



On February 28, 1993, Lennox and Addington Interval House celebrates a full year of service to the community and surrounding area. On the first anniversary of the shelter opening, the house is taking the opportunity to inform the community of some of its activities past, present and future.

Interval House has provided shelter, support, advocacy, information, and 24-hour counselling to 84 women and 108 children since it opened. More than 50% of the children staying at Interval House in the past year have been under the age of 5. There is also a 24-hour crisis line at 354-1010 or 1-800-667-1010 for confidential counselling and support to any women in the community experiencing violence in their lives. In the past year this line has received over 200 calls requesting information or support.

The donations of goods, volunteer time, and money offered by members of the community has been a constant source of support and inspiration, over the past year. Through these donations Interval House has provided women with clothing and articles to start up their homes. Close to 1000 volunteer hours have been donated in the house to enhance the quality of service provided.

Also, L&A Interval House would like to take this opportunity to announce that \$2,379.10 was raised for the Christmas Fund in December after an appeal was made to the community. A special thank you to the many community members, businesses and volunteers that donated time, gifts and money for this cause. With your support, the Christmas season was made a little brighter for the women and children that had stayed at the Interval House in the past year. The shelter has now set up a Special Needs Fund to collect donations that will help women and children throughout the year.

Upcoming projects include a resource booklet that all women can use and a support group for residents and ex-residents.




