Dear Chief Maracle:

I am responding to your letter of January 16, 1995 regarding provincial permit fees on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

The issue in question was an entrance permit to Lot 1-2, Concession 1 on Highway 2. Although the cheque, which you enclosed with your application, has already been cashed, I have instructed my staff to issue an equivalent rebate in the amount of \$190.00. That cheque should be in your hands within the next month.

In a more general sense, my ministry will not be charging a fee for future entrance, sign or building permits on provincial highways which cross the existing Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory. Application of the same policy to lands which are under dispute would be premature, hence we will await the outcome of negotiations before deciding on those situations.

We would, however, ask that you continue to contact Helen Lott of the Kingston District Office when you plan to construct a building or entrance, or erect a sign. Our principal concern is safety, both to the Mohawks and to the travelling public. We appreciate the excellent co-operation that has existed in the past and that spirit of co-operation has resulted in mutually acceptable solutions.

Thank you for bringing this matter to my attention.

As you are aware, Council for the Township of Tyendinaga considered the closing of a portion of Brock Street, Government Plan, Village of Shannonville, at the public meeting held pursuant to s.300 of the Municipal Act at the Township offices on March 20, 1995. Council for the Township of Tyendinaga, of course, had the authority to close Brock Street or any portion of Brock Street pursuant to the provisions of s.297(1)(c) of the Municipal Act. In view of the fact that you attended as part of a delegation at the meeting of March 20, Council has instructed me to advise both yourself and Mr. Woodstock, that Council does not intend to proceed any further with the by-law to close Brock Street or any portion of Brock Street.

 $GEORGE\ THE\ THIRD$  by the Grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith and so forth.

Know ye that Whereas the Attachment and Fidelity of the Chief Warriors and People of the Six Nations to us and Our Government, have been made manifest on divers occasions by their spirited and zealous exertions and by the bravery of their conduct; And We being desirous of shewing Our aprobation of the same, and in recompense of the losses they may have sustained of providing a convenient Tract of Land under Our protection for a safe and comfortable retreat for them and their posterity Have, of Our special Grace, certain knowledge and mere motion, Given and by these presents Do give and grant unto the Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six nations and their heirs for ever all that District or Territory of Land being parcel of a certain District lately purchased by Us of the Mississauga Nation lying and being limited and bounded as follows (that is to say) the Tract will then be bounded in front by the Bay of Quinte between the mouths of the River Shannon and Bowen's Creek about Twelve Miles Westerly by a Line running, North Sixteen Degrees West from the West side of the Mouth of the River Shannon, and Easterly by a Line running North Sixteen Degrees West from the Mouth of Bowen's Creek and Northerly by a Line running East Sixteen Degrees North and West Sixteen Degrees, South at the distance of about Thirteen Miles back from the Bay of Quinte, measured on the Western Boundary aforesaid, to the North East Angle of the Township of Thurlow. To Have and to Hold the said District or Territory of Land of us Our Heirs and Successors to them the Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations and to and for the sole use and behoof of them and their Heirs for ever freely and clearly of and from all and all manner of Rents, Fines or Services whatsoever to be rendered by them the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and people of the said Six Nations to us or our successors for the same and of and from all conditions, stipulations and agreements whatever except as herinafter by us expressed and declared. Giving and granting and by these presents confirming to the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations, and their Heirs, the full and entire possession, Use benefit and advantage of the said District or Territory of Land to be held and enjoyed by them in the most free and ample manner and according to the several Customs and usages by them the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations. Provided always, and be it understood to be the true intent and meaning of these Presents; that for the purpose of assuring the said Lands as aforesaid to the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the Six Nations and their Heirs and of securing to them the free and undisturbed possession and enjoyment of the same

It is Our Royal Will and Pleasure that no Transfer, Alienation, Conveyance, Sale, Gift, Exchange, Lease, Property, or Possession shall at any time be had, made, or given of the said District or Territory of any part or parcel thereof by any of the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and people of the said Six Nations to any other Nation or Body of People, Person or persons whatsoever other than among themselves the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations but that any such Transfer, Alienation, Conveyance, Sale, Gift, Exchange, Lease or Possession shall be null and void and of no effect whatever. And that no Person or Persons shall possess or occupy the said District or Territory, or any part or parcel thereof by or under any pretence whatever under pain of our severe displeasure. And that in case any Person or Persons other than the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations shall under pretence of any such Title as aforesaid, presume to possess or occupy the said District or Territory or any part or parcel thereof that it shall and may be lawful for Us, our Heirs and Successors at any time hereafter to enter upon the Lands so occupied and possessed by any other Person or Persons other than the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations and them the said Intruders thereof and therefrom wholly to dispossess and evict and to resume the same to Ourselves, Our Heirs and Successors.

Warriors, Women and and People of the said Six Nations should be inclined to dispose of and Surrender their Use and Interest in the said District or Territory, the same shall be perchased only for Us in our name at some Public Meeting or Assembly of the Chiefs, Warriors and People of the said Six Nations to be held for that purpose by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Person Administering Our Government in Our Province of Upper Canada.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Our said Province to be hereunto affixed; Witness His Excellency John Graves Simcoe, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Colonel Commanding Our Forces in Our said Province, Given at Our Government House at Navy Hall this First Day of April in the Year of Our Lord One Thousand, Seven Hundred and Ninety Three in the Thirty Third Year of Our Reign.



### THREE SISTERS INTERNSHIP PROGRAM IN THE FIELD OF MUSEUM EDUCATION

The Iroquois Indian Museum was established in 1980 to honor Iroquois creativity in the visual and performing arts. Located just 45 minutes west of Albany in a small town of Howes Cave, NY, the museum offers a supportive environment for learning and sharing ideas.



Selected interns will serve as cultural ambassadors-- introducing non-native museum visitors to Iroquois ways through a large collection of contemporary Iroquois art, interactive children's exhibits, and a 45 acre nature park. Under the guidance of native and non-native museum staff, interns will develop effective programming, communication and public speaking skills. Interns will also have the opportunity to further develop an area of special interest through selective use of the museums ethnographic collection, library, archival materials and time spent with guest artists.

Up to \$5,000 is available to support interns during the summer and fall seasons.

Any Iroquois individual at least 21 years of age may apply. Applicants must be responsible and willing to work with the public. Craft skills, sense of humor and patience are a plus.

### The Workplace

### Self-Esteem and Success

Self-esteem is the foundation of job success. It gives you the courage to experiment with new concepts and ideas, and strengthens commitment to your goals. Lack of self-esteem leaves you uninvolved, unresponsive, and closed to experience and growth.

Self-esteem at work comes from . . .

- Feeling In control over events, especially those directly affecting you.
- Accomplishing your goals and objectives.
- Feeling valuable and important to the organization's success.
- · Performing your Job In accordance with your values.

A sense of personal power enables us to gain self-esteem from these four sources. Everyone has the right to be treated with respect and courtesy and appreciation, regardless of job description, salary, or title. Sometimes we forget this and allow our superiors to take advantage of us. Workers who habitually accept tasks they dislike or resent, who allow themselves to be verbally abused or manipulated, or who live with a chronic fear of being fired have given too much of their personal power away. They feel powerless and resentful and their work suffers as a result.

When you're proud of your work, others will be, too. Modest self-pride and dedication to quality reflect high self-esteem and encourage others to recognize and appreciate your efforts.

### Relationships

# You & Others

It has been said that "we betray ourselves by the lovers we choose." Our choice of mates is directly influenced by our self-esteem: we choose partners who treat us as well – or as badly – as we think we deserve. The battered woman tolerates an abusive mate because he reflects and reinforces her low opinion of herself. She finds a man who loves her and treats her well to be weak or simply unattractive. The cuckolded husband unconsciously chooses women who will be unfaithful because he doesn't believe fidelity is possible.

Others will treat us like we treat ourselves, or, as well as we let them. Even when they start out treating us differently, our pattern of responses soon teaches them what kind of treatment we expect. Showing little reaction to compliments and praise, but strong reaction to criticism, clearly indicates that we're more interested in criticism than praise and encourages others to respond accordingly.

### Test Yourself

### **HOW TO RECOGNIZE AND TREAT SCABIES**

#### What is scabies?:

Scabies is a common, highly contagious skin disease caused by an almost invisible organism, the "itch mite". Viewed under a low powered microscope, the scabies mite is white in colour, translucent, oval and flattened in appearance. The female is longer than the male.

#### Some historical notes on scabies:

Scabies infestations have afflicted mankind for thousands of years. Mention of the "itch" was recorded by the ancient Greeks and Romans. It was believed at one time that social disturbances such as war and economic crises created an atmosphere in which these diseases could thrive. After World War II, the incidence of scabies declined for no specific reason and remained that way for 15 years. In recent years, scabies has been making a significant comeback. No one knows with any certainty why. It seems the mites come and go in unexplained cycles.

### How does one get scables?:

Scabies are most often transmitted by close personal contact with an infected person. As it is highly contagious, it can spread quite fast among children, family members, roommates, etc. A simple act of shaking hands or dancing can make you a victim of scabies.

Exchanging clothing, sharing a bed or towels is also a means of spreading scabies.

The scables mites does not jump from one person to another and does not survive very long on linens or clothing.

If your doctor tells you that you have scabies, do not be embarrassed. Virtually anyone can get scabies - a professional, a blue collar worker, a college student, teenager or infant. Regardless if you live in the city or country, you can be exposed to the mite anytime.

Although scabies is most often seen in young people, those under 30, its presence has also been recorded in people over 70.

### What happens when you get scabies?:

The mating of the male and female mite occurs on the surface of the host's skin. Then, the impregnated female using her tiny jaws and two pairs of forelegs, burrows into the uppermost layer of skin, but seldom enough to enter the living tissue. She will stay in this layer of skin for the rest of her life which may last 30 days, extending her burrow 0.05mm to 5mm per day. She lays 2 to 3 eggs daily.

In a few day these eggs hatch, producing an immature adult mite which resembles the parent. It takes approximately 14 to 17 days from the period of fertilization to produce an adult mite. This new mite mates, burrows into the skin and the cycle begins again. The male mite dies after mating; the female dies after her egg-laying is completed.

The female mite lay 40 to 50 eggs during her lifetime, but less than 10% of those eggs produce adult mites.


#### How do you know if you have scabies?:

The initial signs with scabies is itching. It becomes more persistent and intense during the night, possibly caused by the increased heat of nightclothes and bedding. The itching may become so severe that you might be awakened by it. It's also common to cause bleeding from this scratching activity. A bloodied sheet, pajamas or underwear are signs which suggest scabies.

The only sure way to find out if you have scabies is to see your doctor. He/She will identify precisely the cause of any rash you may have.

There are no unusual changes when you first contact scabies.

The symptoms (mentioned above) are the result of an infestation that may have taken place 4 to 6 weeks before. It's only after the female mite has burrowed into the skin and laid her eggs, thus increasing the mite population, that symptoms begin to appear.



In addition to itching, watch for scabies skin lesions - wavy, threadlike, very small, slightly elevated, greyish-white burrows most frequently found between the fingers, on the elbows, hands and wrists. Other common sites of infestation are the stomach, thighs, genital areas and buttocks. In the female, the breast nipple may by infested. Scabies are rarely found above the neck, except in infants.

#### How to treat scabies:

Because scabies is so contagious, it's important for anyone who may have come in contact with an infested person to be examined and treated. Remember most recent contacts may not develop symptoms for 6 weeks.

If you believe you are experiencing a scabies infestation, see your doctor immediately.

The treatment is easy and effective. Often the scabies are gone after 24 hours, although the itch may last for 2 or 3 weeks.

The most widely and recommended non-prescription treatment for scabies is Kwellada. It has been proven to be virtually 100% effective in treating lice, their nits and scabies. It's available in a form of cream. Iotion and shampoo. For the scabies treatment you would use either the cream or the lotion.

### How to use Kwellada Cream or Lotion:

Kwellada Cream or Lotion should be applied to cool, dry skin only.

- Apply a thin layer of Kwellada cream or lotion to entire body area below the neck and gently massage into skin. If crusts are present, a warm bath before hand will help soften or remove crusts. If a warm bath is used, allow skin to dry and cool before applying cream or lotion.
- 2. Put on freshly-laundered or dry-cleaned clothing.
- 3. After 8 to 12 hours take a bath or shower, washing thoroughly all areas of application.
- 4. Put on freshly laundered or dry-cleaned clothing.

NOTE: One application is usually successful, but the procedure may be repeated once only 4 to 7 days after the first application.

#### Can you scabies again?:

Yes. There is no permanent prevention against them. With a second infestation, the symptoms show up much faster. You would probably begin to itch within a few hours. Make sure to see your doctor for a proper diagnosis.

These steps will help avoid another case of scabies:

- 1. Put all clothes which have come in direct contact with the skin (underwear, trousers, shirts, socks, etc.) through a hot cycle in the washing machine.
- 2. Do the same to towels and linens.
- Be sure no members of the family use the same towels or linen, etc. until these items have been put through a hot wash cycle.

It's not necessary to treat overcoats, winter jackets or hats.

In addition, good personal hygiene is essential. Wash your hands often, bathe or shower daily, wear clean clothes and do not exchange clothes with others. Sleep in a clean bed.

Alertness to and awareness of scabies is the best way to contain it and finally to eradicate it.

A PESEARCH PROS

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council has agreed to participate in a study to investigate memory problems in the aged. The project is being conducted by Dr. Andrew Hackett from Queens University in Kingston.

A study done in another Native Community in Northern Manitoba suggests that there is a lower number of certain types of memory problems than in Non Native communities.

The research shall consist of interviewing those Band members who are of Native heritage and are over the age of 65. They would participate by answering a questionnaire with an interviewer from the Thayendanega Health Centre Staff. This will take about 45 minutes and could be done in your home.

If these findings support the previous research, it could have a significant importance to the future treatment and prevention of memory problems.

All information which will be obtained is confidential and will only be used for data within this study. Your voluntary participation will be greatly appreciated.

- \* Edmonton addictions counsellor Maggie Hodgson for Health Services;
- \* Red Crow College president Marie Smallface Marule of Lethbridge for Education;
- \* Alfred J. Scow of Vancouver for Law and Justice, the first Aboriginal appointed as a justice in B.C.;
- \* Regina-based Anglican clergyman and educator Dr. Ahab Spence for Education;
- \* Manitoba band leader Chief Louis Stevenson for Community Development;
- \* and this year's special youth recipient, Sharla Tiakohatèhkwen Howard of Kanesatake, Quebec.

The gala awards ceremony will be televised by the CBC as a national network special, <u>Thursday</u>, <u>April 6, 1995 at 9:00 p.m.</u> The television production is a Canadian Native Arts Foundation/Canadian Broadcasting Corporation Co-production.

"The Awards, in their second year, are part of a continuing goal to increase understanding and promote partnerships between the Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal worlds, and to generate great pride and role models for Aboriginal youth," said John Kim Bell.

The National Aboriginal Achievement Awards are sponsored by the CIBC, Indian and Northern Affairs Canada, CBC, Canada Post, Air Canada and thirteen federal departments and agencies, and the Province of British Columbia.
