RE: ILLEGAL CONNECTIONS TO (SANITARY) SEWER SYSTEM
 (SUMP PUMPS, EAVES AND BASEMENT/FOUNDATION DRAINS)

The Ministry of the Environment feels that illegal connections to the sewer system has resulted in exceedingly high flows through the sewage system and advises that this adds significantly to the costs of operating the sewage system, which all ratepayers are paying for.

To verify, and correct this problem, Deseronto Town Council applied for, and received, Ministry of Environment Lifelines' funding and the Proctor and Redfern Group was authorized to conduct a house to house inspection to determine whether sump pumps, eavestroughs and foundation drains were illegally connected into the Towns' sanitary sewer system.

The inspection was conducted last fall and a summary of the results is as follows:

No. of Dwellings Visited	628
No. of Dwellings Inspected	561 (90% of total visited)
-possible illegal sump pump connections	203 (36% of dwellings inspected)
-possible illegal eavestrough connections	33 (6% of dwellings inspected)
No. of dwellings not inspected	67 (10% of total visited)
-resident not home	62 (9.9%)
-resident refused entry	5 (0.1%)

NOTE:

In accordance with Town of Deseronto By-law # 13-88 IT IS ILLEGAL TO HOOK SUMP PUMPS, EAVESTROUGHES AND FOUNDATION DRAINS INTO THE TOWN'S SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM and every person who contravenes the by-law is guilty of an offence and on summary conviction is liable to a fine of not more then \$500.00 per day for every day the offence occurs.

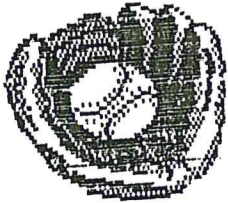
ALL HOMEOWNERS are advised TO PERMANENTLY DISCONNECT THEIR ILLEGAL HOOKUP PRIOR TO APRIL 20TH, 1991 and to contact the Plumbing Inspector once the illegal hookup is corrected. Random inspections by the Plumbing Inspector will commence after April 20th, on a continuing basis.

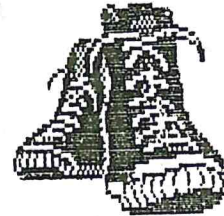

NATIVE-SPECIFIC EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PROGRAM

Extensive research and consultation with First Nations and their day care workers, during the last 15 months, has been completed. The new Native Early Childhood Education Diploma has been submitted to the Ontario Ministry of Colleges and Universities for approval. The course will be offered in September 1991 at Cambrian college (Sudbury) pending approval by the Province.

The new diploma, the first of its kind in Canada, will meet all of the existing provincial competencies for Early Childhood Education, plus a new one, "Demonstrate Native specific knowledge and skills". The program is made up of 27 courses which integrate Native culture throughout the four semesters. Areas of concentration include day care; Native family, community and culture; communication and field work.

The Native Early Childhood Education program will be offered on a full time basis and in distance education (parttime) for those currently employed in a Native child care setting. The fulltime option will accept 30 students while the distance education stream can accommodate 60 students. The distance education option has been specifically designed for: (a) those day care workers who have partial ECE qualifications; (b) day care workers who require their full diploma but cannot leave their employment; and (c) ECE graduates and others who want to pursue a certificate in Native-specific ECE studies. Applications are available from First Nation education counsellors, INAC and College registration offices.

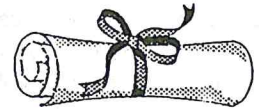

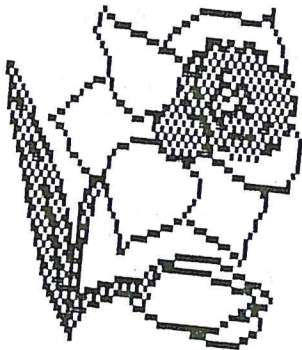

THE DIET/CANCER CONNECTION

Can Your Diet Prevent Cancer?

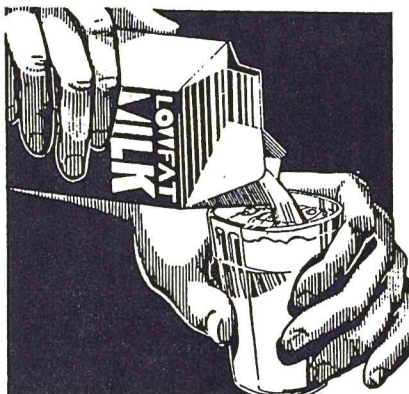
Can fiber prevent colon cancer? Can carrots prevent lung cancer? The fact is, while there is no evidence that any single food or lifestyle habit can *prevent* cancer altogether, some experts believe you can *reduce your risk* for developing many types of cancer by a combination of lifestyle changes (quitting smoking, for example) and eating a nutritionally sound diet. In fact, improving your diet may reduce your cancer risk by as much as 35%. The key dietary changes that may be linked with reduced cancer risk are: less total fats, more fiber, and more fresh fruits and vegetables, particularly those rich in Vitamin A, beta-carotene and Vitamin C.

Fats

Limit your intake of dietary fats to no more than 30% of your total daily calories. (Fats have 9 calories per gram.) No more than 10% of your "fat calories" should come from the saturated variety. Saturated fats are primarily found in foods of animal origin, although two vegetable "oils"—coconut and palm—are also highly saturated. Saturated fats are those fats that remain solid at room temperature.

Fiber

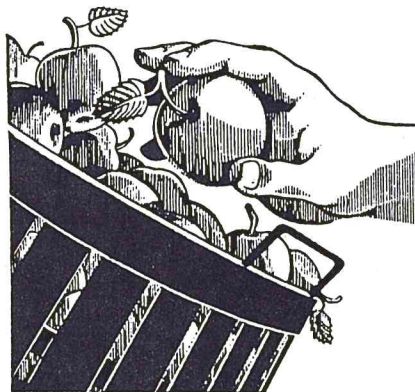
Dietary fiber can be either water-soluble or water-insoluble. Water-soluble fiber includes the fiber found in beans, oats and many fruits, while water-insoluble fiber includes the kind found in wheat bran and many

vegetables. To reduce your risk, balance your diet to include both forms of fiber. The National Cancer Institute recommends a daily intake of 20-30 grams of fiber per day. Excessive fiber intake can cause painful intestinal gas, diarrhea, bloating, and can interfere with the body's absorption of essential nutrients.

Fruits and Vegetables

Besides being excellent sources of dietary fiber, fresh fruits and vegetables contain many of the vitamins associated with possible reduced cancer risk. Vitamin A, or its chemical "precursor" beta-carotene, may help protect against many cancers, and is found in orange vegetables like squash and carrots and dark-green leafy vegetables like spinach. Vitamin C may be found to interfere with the formation of some cancer-causing chemicals and is found in citrus fruits, tomatoes, strawberries, potatoes and dark-green leafy vegetables as well. Vegetables in the cabbage family—broccoli, cauliflower, brussel sprouts—may also contain cancer-interfering chemicals.

The Best Advice

Besides eating less fats and more dietary fiber, fresh fruits, and vegetables, the best advice is to eat a *variety* of foods that are fresh and/or as close to their "natural" state as possible.



REDEFINING THE "ANNUAL" PHYSICAL

The Trend Toward Periodic Health Evaluations

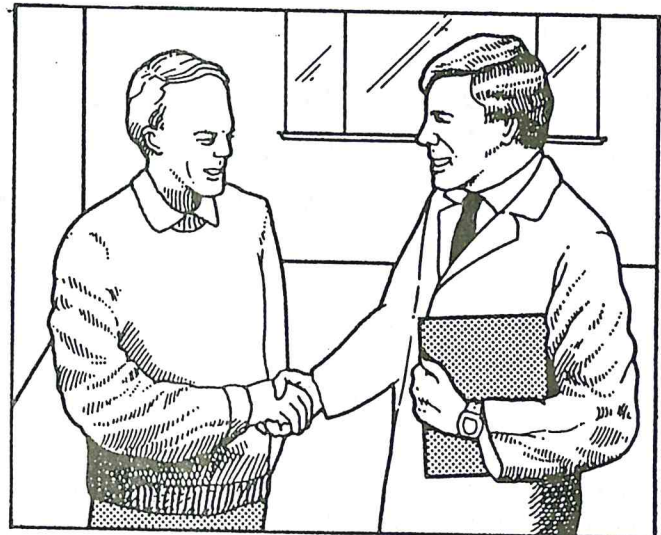
Many physicians still believe the annual physical is a necessary part of preventive healthcare. But, many professional groups—the National Academy of Sciences, the American Medical Association, the Canadian Task Force on the Periodic Health Exam, and the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, among others—disagree. These groups feel that routine annual physicals for healthy adults are largely unnecessary. Instead, they recommend periodic health exams and age and risk-related tests designed to screen for specific medical conditions.

Routine Exam Schedule

How often you should see your doctor for a periodic physical exam depends on your age, physical condition, and personal or family medical history. Infants and toddlers should be examined as often as recommended by their pediatrician. Children aged 2–20 should have a physical every year or two. For healthy adults, the AMA recommends routine exams every 5 years from age 21–40, and every 1–3 years after age 40.


Specific Tests Schedule

The purpose of testing healthy people for specific medical conditions is to detect *common* diseases that are treatable when discovered early. Some serious conditions that are easily detected through periodic testing are cervical, bowel, breast, and testicular cancer, and hypertension. The chart below tells you which tests are recommended for these conditions and how often the tests should be performed.



Periodic office visits can help renew your doctor-patient relationship.

Visiting Your Doctor

When you do visit your doctor, use the opportunity to maintain and renew your doctor-patient relationship. These visits can also be a time for asking questions or advice about minor medical complaints or emotional difficulties. So, while annual physicals may soon be a thing of the past, visiting with your doctor is always a good idea.

LESLIE DONALD CLAUS, 1909-1991, ("Les", as he was known by his many friends) was an outstanding citizen of the Quinte area.

He was a unique individual, a "modern Indian hero". A native of the Tyendinaga Territory, Les devoted a lifetime to improving the opportunities of the Tyendinaga Mohawks and relating their concerns to the non-native community.

A teacher on the territory for many years, he taught and counselled hundreds of elementary school pupils. The first native counsellor attached to The Hastings County Board of Education, he worked with young Mohawks attending secondary school in Belleville.

Les loved his family, his community and his friends.

Now his friends would like to honour his memory by creating the LESLIE CLAUS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND. Because Les loved the arts (from painting to ploughing) and believed in the value of education, the annual interest from the fund will be used to provide a scholarship to a First Nations student from the Quinte area. The first scholarship will be awarded following the end of the current school year and contributions would be appreciated before June 30, 1991.
