

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

JULY 1991

From coast to coast, projects undertaken jointly by Indian people and the federal government are proving that partnerships really work. By working together on initiatives identified by Indian communities as priorities, we are achieving progress on the Native Agenda. Practical actions are leading to improved conditions, the fulfilment of obligations and the creation of a new relationship between government and native people. They reflect modern Canadian realities and native aspirations. It takes cooperation between federal and Indian governments to succeed in addressing the fundamental concerns of First Nations. With native and nonnative Canadians working together, it is being done.

What follows is a list of achievements in the month of July:

- July 3 The British Columbia Comprehensive Claims Task Force submitted its report containing significant recommendations on how First Nations, the province of B.C. and the federal government can begin land claims negotiations. The Task Force recommended a B.C. Treaty Commission be set up to ensure the negotiation process is local, fair, efficient, impartial, effective and clear.
- July 13 A Final Agreement initialled by the Gwich'in is expected to be ratified in September and will lead to the settlement of their comprehensive land claim. As part of a comprehensive claim settlement of the Gwich'in of the Mackenzie Delta, the federal government will provide them with ownership of 600 square miles of federal land in the Peel River Basin of the Yukon
- July 15 Harry S. LaForme was appointed the Chief Commissioner of the new Indian Specific Claims Commissionbeing established under the federal government Specific Claims initiative.

British Columbia

 The Musqueam Band had its comprehensive land claim, a portion of the Lower Mainland of B.C., accepted for negotiation by the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND).

Alberta

- july Through the Green Plan, construction of a \$1.9 million new water treatment plant will begin soon on the Kehewin Indian Reserve.
- Duncan's Band is proceeding with the

design of a water and sewer system that will alleviate unsafe conditions.

 The Alexander Band is initiating a program of water line replacements and a feasibility, pre-design study to replace its existing water supply.

Saskatchewan

- July 5 The specific land claim of the Kawacatoose Indian Band in Quinton has been accepted for negotiation by the federal government.
- July 19 A land claim settlement was signed by the Island Lake (Ministikwan) Indian Band and the governments of Canada and Saskatchewan resolving a claim dating back to 1914.

Manitoba

- July 10 Accelerated through Green Plan funding, a \$1.6 million water distribution system was announced for the Birdtail Sioux First Nation which will provide piped water to 92 households and increase the band's fire protection capability.
- July 18 Funding in the amount of \$4.3 million has been announced for a water distribution and sewer system for the Hollow Water Band.
- July 19 A summer employment program for native students on reserve was announced, enabling Manitoba bands to employ approximately 249 students from 60 reserves in community-related projects.
- The first of its kind in Canada, the Dakota
 Ojibway Child and Family Services
 Agency signed a formula funding
 agreement with DIAND that increased
 the total annual budget to \$2 million, up
 \$304,000.
- July 23 A \$4.3 million, five-year health services agreement signed between the Peguis First Nation and Health and Welfare Canada gives the band control over all health services including, nursing services and drug and alcohol counselling.

Yukon

- July 11 The Dease River Band Council-run school, Mount Pendleton Elementary, was officially opened with local students, parents and visitors attending.
- July 26 Band members and construction equipment will be employed to construct a water intake and treatment system for the Liard Indian

Reserve #3. The \$730,000 project will ensure a potable water supply and protect the community river bank from further erosion.

Northwest Territories

- June 28 DIAND implemented a \$475,000 funding program for the support of the Tribal Councils in the five Dene regions of the NWT -- Gwich'in, Sahtu, Deh Cho, North Slave and South Slave.
- July 5 An essential step towards the settlement of the Tungavik Federation of Nunavut (TFN) land claim in the eastern Arctic occurred in a boundary agreement reached between the TFN and the federal government.
- July 25 Over \$2.8 million in Community Economic Development Organization (CEDO) funding has been allocated to the NWT towards developing and promoting aboriginal community development.

Ontario

- July 4 An agreement was reached between the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte First Nation and the federal government whereby lands held under the 1835 Turton Penn lease agreement will gradually be returned to Indian control. Negotiations with lease holders will begin soon.
- July 15 In a ceremony at the Washagamis Bay First Nation, Chief Alfred Sinclair signed a five year Alternative Funding Arrangement (AFA) agreement with the federal government.

Quebec

 July - Extensive consultations with band councils on the current housing policy review, aimed at improving living conditions on Indian reserves occurred in Ouebec.

Atlantic

- July Funding in the amount of \$5.5 million will be provided over the next three years towards the expansion of the Big Cove Indian Band's main school. The additions include new classrooms, a larger library and a multipurpose room.
- July 9 to 11 At the annual Atlantic All Chiefs Conference in Charlottetown, DIAND committed \$100,000 to Atlantic native political and educational leaders, enabling them to plan and develop future education policy and programs.

Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program (R.R.A.P.)

Furpose

The purpose of the R.R.A.F. program is to assist low-income homeowners who are unable to carry out housing renovations, to bring the house up to standards. This program is in conjunction with Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (C.M.H.C.).

Eliqibility

You are eligible for R.R.A.P. if:

- your household income is below the established "income ceilings" which vary by household size
- you own the home and live in it; and
- your home requires major repairs, such as structural, electrical, plumbing, heating, fire safety.

Financial Assistance

The loan amount you receive depends on the actual cost of repairs, which is verified by cost estimates. Depending on household income and size, you may receive a "forgiveable" grant up to \$5,000.00. If the repairs come over the "forgiveable" grant, the cost over-run has to be approved by the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, other outside sources, i.e. bank, etc., or homeowner provides proof that over-run will be covered by his/her own funds. The forgiveable amount is earned by continued ownership and occupancy of the house for at least five (5) years.

Further Information

- 1. Work completed before approval of R.R.A.P. application is \underline{not} eligible under the program.
- 2. The R.R.A.P. is granted one time only per house.
- Further financial assistance may be available for disabled people in order to improve accessibility and livability of the home.
- 4. R.R.A.F. is also available for landlords or rental property.

Procedure

- 1. Submit name and information to Building Inspector at the Administration Office.
- 2. Set up an appointment with the Building Inspector.
- Building Inspector writes up specification report (renovations to be completed).
- 4. Homeowner secures two (2) complete estimates and submits the estimates to the Inspector. Lowest estimate receives consideration.
- R.R.A.P. application is given to TMC for approval.
- 6. If estimate is \$5,000.00 or under, the application is sent to C.M.H.C. for approval. If estimate is above \$5,000.00, application requires approval of cost over-run by Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, other outside sources, i.e. bank, etc., or homeowner submits proof that the over-run will be covered with his/her own funds. Once verification of over-run is received, application is sent to C.M.H.C. in Kingston for approval.

CARE & MAINTENANCE OF A SEWAGE SYSTEM

<u>Warning:</u> Under no circumstances should a homeowner enter a septic tank. Noxious gases which are heavier than air remain in the tank after the top is removed, and have caused death both to the original victim and to those who attempt to rescue him from the tank.

A septic tank and tile bed should, with proper care and maintenance, provide many years of service. There are, however, some things which you, the homeowner should be aware of that will help the system to function properly. These are:

- Do not allow roof drains to discharge to the septic tank or surface waters to drain towards the area of the leaching bed.
- Water usage in the home should be kept to a minimum. If automatic washers and dishwashers are used make sure full loads are washed each time. Excessive use of water (such as doing numerous washings in one day) could flush solids from tank to the leaching bed.
- 3. Moderate use of household drain solvents, cleaners, disinfectants, etc., should not interfere with the operation of the sewage disposal system, however, indiscriminate use may cause problems.
- 4. There should be no need to use "starters", "bacterial feeds" or "cleaners".
- 5. The septic tank should be inspected at least once every two years and the tank pumped out when necessary —every three or four years is suggested. Failure to pump-out a septic tank when required may result in sludge or scum being carried over to the leaching bed resulting in soil clogging and complete failure of the system.
- 6. Vehicular traffic (including snowmobiles) should not be allowed over the leaching bed.
- 7. The area over a leaching bed should have a good cover of grass but shrubs or trees should not be planted over the area. Good ventilation and adequate sunlight should be maintained in the area of the tile bed.



Who's hungry in Belleville?

Task force will explore the issue

How many people in Belleville are going to bed hungry at night?

That's the question the Task Force on Hunger is trying to answer over the next several months.

Michelle Leering of Hastings and Prince Edward Legal Services says the task force is an offshoot of the Community Development Council and includes representatives from municipal government, local food banks, the Ministry of Community and Social Services, the handicapped and several other groups.

"We're conducting two surveys. One is directed at people considered at risk and another for professionals and people who may be in contact with people who are at risk," says Leering.

The task force first met June 21 and now trainees with Skills Quinte are delivering the survey questionnaires to low-income neighborhoods in the city. Leering stresses the forms guarantee anonymity and are only being used to get an indication of how many people there are in the city who face some form of hunger.

"We want to find out if the services available now like the Salvation Army and Gleaners Food Bank are meeting the need or if there is a need for more services to be set up," says Leering.

The surveys will also be handed out at both the Salvation Army and Gleaners Food Bank centres as well as through local welfare and family benefits offices.

Leering says anyone interested in completing a surveys who doesn't receive one at home can pick one up at the local health unit office on North Park Street, the Hastings and Prince Edward Legal Services office or the Community Development

Council at 240 William St.

One of the task force's first discoveries was that the price to fill a "food basket" in Belleville is 12 per cent higher than the national average.

"We used the Ministry of Agriculture model and followed it rigidly. That discovery was surprising and a little disappointing," says Leering.

The task force has also set out a working definition of what it means to be hungry. Leering says it includes anyone who is unhealthy as a result of a lack of food.

"It's not just physical, but social and psychological well-being of the hungry individual that we're concerned with," she says.

The task force hopes to have the results of both surveys within the next two months and will meet again July 19. Leering says she expects the committee to have recommendations based on the survey's findings by December or early January.
