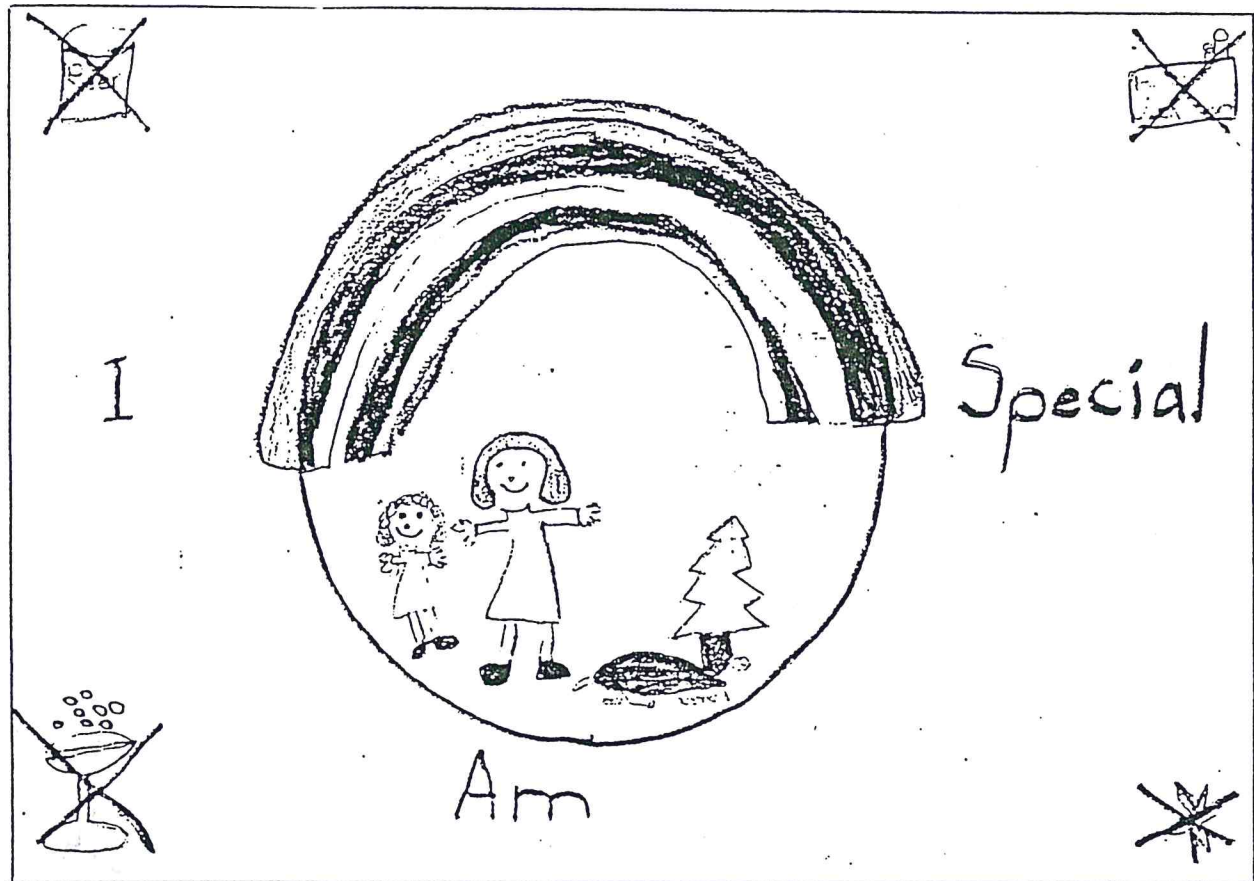

COMMUNITY SUPPORT WORKER

MOHAWKS OF THE BAY OF QUINTE FAMILY & CHILDREN'S SERVICES

JOB DESCRIPTION

This is a permanent half time professional position dedicated to the implementation of support services to the Tyendinaga Mohawk community. There are two (2) major areas of responsibility.

- i) the provision of community support services: and
- ii) the provision of some case-specific support services

Lines of Authority

The prevention Worker will be directly responsible to the Child Welfare Co-ordinator as part of the Social Services Staff reporting to Council through the Office Manager.

Duties:

More specifically, the Community Support worker will:

- Plan, design and conduct information workshops for parents and other community members on issues related to the physical, mental and emotional development and needs of children.
- Encourage parents to attend the various educational workshops by means of community advertising and direct contacts
- Plan and organize clinics for youth to share information on child and adolescent abuse and prevention
- In co-operation with Quinte Mohawk school and Tyendinaga Daycare, plan and conduct age appropriate prevention workshops on sexual abuse and family violence
- Develop and maintain a resource lending library with books, articles and videos on topics in the area of family life and coping for access by parents children and other family service providers
- May work with children and parents being supervised by the CAS worker in Tyendinaga Territory
- May provide child management counselling to parents in community on an individual case basis

Duties Continued:

- May recruit and develop homes in the community that will be able to offer temporary residential care for children who are unable to live in the parental home
- Prepare community newsletter on a regular basis for program to share and gather information on child and family welfare and community need for service
- organize and facilitate self-help and support groups for new mothers and teens to address issues of interest on a preventive basis
- Prepare monthly reports on programs offered as required
- Perform other such duties as the Council may request from time to time

- Demonstrated ability to write clear, concise reports and to address public meetings
- Working knowledge of the Indian Act and the government of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council

HAVE YOU EVER THOUGHT OF BECOMING A NURSE?

NATIONAL NATIVE ACCESS PROGRAM TO NURSING

WHO SHOULD TAKE THE PROGRAM?

The program is intended for individuals of aboriginal ancestry from across Canada who wish to become a nurse through a degree program.

WHAT IS INVOLVED IN THE PROGRAM?

The nine-week program is designed to orient students to the profession of nursing and to the intensity of a university program. Upon successful completion, the program negotiates access for the student to a degree nursing program at one of the participating universities.

Students are exposed to classes in nursing: in natural sciences,

eg: chemistry
anatomy
social sciences eg., psychology
sociology

Study and learning skills are also taught. As well, Native culture and traditional health beliefs and practices are examined. Classroom, Laboratory, and library facilities are utilized during the course of study.

WHY SHOULD I ENTER THE NATIONAL NATIVE ACCESS PROGRAM TO NURSING?

The aim of the program is to increase Native participation in the health care field so as to be more influential in improving the status of health for Native people. This course secures access to a degree nursing program and furthers educational and career opportunities.

WHEN DOES THE PROGRAM TAKE PLACE? AND WHERE?

The nine-week Access Program is held annually in May and June and is held in the city of Saskatoon at the University of Saskatchewan's College of Nursing. Accommodations are available on campus.

NATIONAL ADDICTIONS AWARENESS WEEK

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those who helped make National Addictions Awareness Week 1990 a fantastic success.

The week's activities started at the Elder's Lodge Monday morning with approximately fifteen participants who joined us for a morning of educational fun, coffee and cake. This was followed by the distribution of one hundred and fifty information packages. Special thanks to Verna Alkenbrack and Brenda Whiteye who braved the cold to approach stopping motorists at the corner of York Road and Highway #49.

On Tuesday, a program consisting of guest speaker Glenys Thompson and the video "Getting Serious" was presented in the different assemblies at Moria and Quinte Secondary Schools. The hazards of drinking and driving were observed by an estimated one thousand (1000) students.

A similar program, adapted to the different age groups, was presented at Daycare and Quinte Mohawk School on Wednesday and Thursday. There were two hundred and eighty students involved in lectures, videos, quizzes and a bingo-type game called "VITAL". This game was developed by myself using symbols, logos and pictures of articles vital for a healthier lifestyle.

Prior to N.A.A.W., a poster contest was advertised at Quinte Mohawk School. We had one hundred and twenty-eight entries. Friday morning, Andrew Maracle Sr., Helen Spencer, Cst. G. Wm. Maracle, Dave Brant, Ken Claus, Linda Maracle, Lillian Maracle, Val Maracle and Paul Green were invited to select thirteen of these, which, funding permitting, will be consolidated for a calendar for the year of 1992.

Judging was done on a point system based on originality, neatness, creativity and content. We certainly appreciate the effort the students put into these posters. They were all worthy of the certificate which will be given when we return the posters to these individuals.

There was a great deal of talent displayed in these posters and the judges remarked on the difficult time they had in registering the scores. Winners of the contest were as follows:

There were approximately seventy people who joined us for this delicious meal prepared by the Native Womens Association. All were invited to stay for the non-alcoholic dance that completed the week's activities. Twenty-seven people danced the hours away to the music supplied by Carl Maracle.

Other helping hands included the Mohawk Recreation Committee, AIAI, Bank Council, Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police, School Committee, Social Service Staff, Patti General, Leslie Hill and the Women's Circle.

Please accept my apologies if I have forgotten to mention anyone who helped make this week happen.

The community involvement demonstrated - November 19th to the 23rd - is a definite indication we are all striving for a more positive attitude for Tyendinaga Territory.

Canadians Changing Attitudes

Canadians say they are willing to allow 1/5 of the country to go into the control of First Nations in order to settle outstanding land claims. This was one of the results of an Angus Reid Poll commissioned by the Federal government during the last week of the Oka Crisis.

Two-thirds of Canadians support the idea of reserving a block of parliamentary seats to represent natives. While 58 per cent support giving Native leaders "a say, perhaps a vote" at first minister's conferences

where native issues are discussed.

A majority believe First Nations should be constitutionally recognized as founding peoples (73 per cent) or a distinct society (56 per cent).

The Reid survey notes more English-Canadians support recognitions of Natives as a distinct society than support the same for Quebec. The survey polled 1,735 Canadian adults between Sept 19-27 and is considered accurate within 2.56 percentage points, plus or minus.

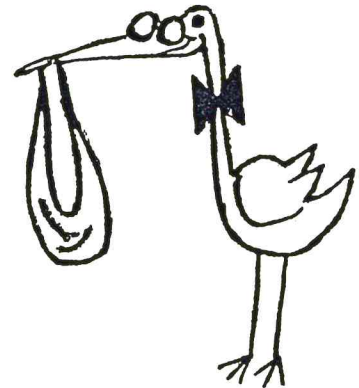

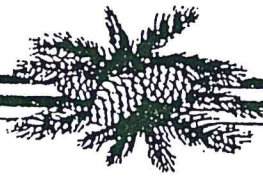
