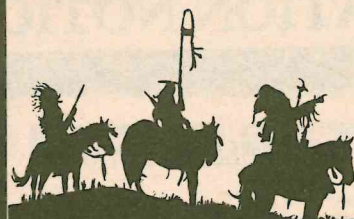

## DO YOU USE FIREARMS?

### What does the new *Firearms Act* mean for you?

1. As always safety comes first. The firearms safety course and test, and the rules for storage, display and transportation which are part of the current law, are now part of the *Firearms Act*.

2. Everyone will need a **firearms licence** in order to register firearms. (Your FAC is considered a licence.)

There are 2 types of licences (valid for 5 years):

- possession (for the firearms you now own) OR
- possession and acquisition (to possess and to obtain firearms).

3. **Registration** of all firearms begins December 1, 1998. All firearms must be registered by January 1, 2003. You register your firearms only once. You may do so at one bulk price (one price for any number of firearms you register all at the same time).

4. **Fees** for licences and registration rise on a sliding scale. It's cheaper in the first twelve months.

Possession licence	\$10	December 1998 - November 1999
Possession and acquisition licence (non-restricted rifles and shotguns)	\$60	from December 1998 onwards
Registration (bulk)	\$10	December 1998 - November 1999

5. You can get licence and registration **application forms** at the post office or by calling toll-free, 1-800-731-4000.

6. Some parts of the *Firearms Act* and licensing regulations have been adapted for Aboriginal firearms users who take part in the traditional hunting practices of their community.

REPORT FROM COUNCIL by Wm. J. Brant

I was away from the Territory for three days this month to attend a workshop held in Toronto called Creating Our Own Solutions. This workshop wasn't what I had anticipated but it was informative and gave us a format structured for solving disputes.

The number of meetings that band Councillors are expected to attend are numerous making it very difficult for councillors with full time employment. I do not see the number of meetings being reduced until the Council gets away from the day to day administration and puts in place a system where authority and responsibility is delegated to the employees, with all the necessary checks and balances in place to give accountability.

I feel that the problems and concerns of our people come first and that is why I established an office to deal with you on a one to one basis. It is my belief that once we can deal effectively with local problems and concerns we can then concentrate on national issues.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Band Council (MBQBC) has received approval from the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs (INAC) to enter into an agreement with a lending agency to build 15 homes where INAC would act as the guarantor. This housing would consist of 12 regular units and one four-plex. Some of these units will be rented on a geared to income basis with a subsidy from Central Housing and Mortgage Company (CMHC). Comments have been made as to the viability of the MBQBC building homes, versus having them built by contract builders. To get a true picture of what method is best in terms of cost, timeliness and quality of workmanship the MBQBC will be contracting an equal number of units so that a suitable comparison can be made. The work will commence this fall.

A plebiscite will be held on March 17, 1999 to determine whether the electorate is in favour of increasing the number of band councillors from 4 to 6.

The research on the harvesting of fish that started earlier this year is now near completion and the results should be forthcoming in the near future.

I will be away from my office on December 2, 9 and 16th on Council business. I apologize for any inconvenience this may cause you. If I may be of service please call my office at 967-9861, leave a message and I will return your call or arrange to meet with you if so desired.

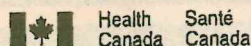

#### Parents and Caregivers of Very Young Children -- Soft Vinyl (PVC) Teethers and Soft Vinyl (PVC) Rattles

##### Why is Health Canada issuing this Health Advisory?

Health Canada is issuing this Health Advisory as a precautionary measure because there are scientific indications of a potential health risk for very young children (who weigh less than eight kilograms) who have high oral contact (three hours or more a day, on a daily basis) with soft vinyl products. Because soft vinyl teethingers and soft vinyl rattles are designed for sucking and mouthing, Health Canada is advising parents and caregivers to dispose of these items.

##### What is the health concern posed by these products?

This Health Advisory is being issued as a precautionary measure only. Animal studies indicate that damage to the liver or kidneys is possible if there is considerable oral exposure (three hours or more a day on a daily basis) to the plasticizer used in vinyl called di-isobutyl phthalate (DINP) over a prolonged period of time.

##### Which products are affected?

The products affected are those made from PVC (polyvinyl chloride), designed for very young children, that may be put into children's mouths and sucked or chewed for three hours or more a day, on a daily basis. "Plasticizers" are added to the PVC to make the products softer and more flexible. It is one of these plasticizers, DINP, which is causing concern.

##### What about pacifiers and feeding bottle nipples? Are they included in this Health Advisory?

No. Based on testing to date, Health Canada has found that none of the pacifiers and feeding bottle nipples tested include DINP. Health Canada will continue to monitor these products.

##### What about soft vinyl toys?

Parents and caregivers should also watch their children's use of other small, soft vinyl toys that are often placed in cribs or playpens and remove these products if they observe that their children chew or suck on them for a prolonged period (three hours or more a day, on a daily basis).

##### Is there a way to identify the specific products that may be harmful?

Soft vinyl products containing DINP cannot be distinguished from other soft plastics by appearance, touch or smell.

##### What should I do now?

Soft vinyl products designed for sucking and chewing (soft teethingers, soft rattles) should be removed from the child's environment and disposed of. Parents and caregivers are advised to watch their children's use of other small, soft vinyl toys often placed in cribs or playpens and to remove these products if your very young child sucks or chews on them for prolonged periods of time each day.

##### Are there safe replacements for these products?

While there are many soft vinyl products on the market, Health Canada has tested a large number of the high oral contact products, such as soft teethingers and soft rattles. A list of some products which do not include DINP and are therefore considered safe, can be found on the Health Canada Web site ([www.hc-sc.gc.ca/advisory](http://www.hc-sc.gc.ca/advisory)). Parents and caregivers can call our toll free number listed below, where operators will check the list for particular products.

##### What about the risk for older children?

Generally older children are not at risk because of their body weight (over eight kilograms) and the fact that they do not suck or chew on toys as frequently and for as prolonged periods as those who are very young.

##### Who manufactures these products and what are they doing about this problem?

There are a wide range of manufacturers, importers and distributors of these products. Health Canada has issued a list of all the soft teethingers and soft rattles tested to date in their laboratory facilities which do not include DINP and are therefore considered safe. This list is available on the Health Canada Web site or by contacting Health Canada through the toll-free number listed below. Health Canada has asked manufacturers of small, soft vinyl toys to find a safe substitute for vinyl containing DINP over the next six months.

##### What about my pets?

If you have any concerns, you should remove the products from your pet's environment and dispose of them.

##### Have other countries taken action on this problem?

Until recently the nature of the health risk posed by the exposure of young children to DINP in soft vinyl children's products was not known. For over a year, Health Canada has been working with international health agencies to evaluate the risk from these products. To date, a few countries in Europe have announced intentions to restrict the use of DINP in these products. Health Canada is also monitoring what is happening in countries where no action has been taken to date, such as the U.S. and some other European countries.

#### Tsubouchi warns consumers against Scratch and Win tickets

TORONTO -- Consumer and Commercial Relations Minister David Tsubouchi is warning Ontario residents to read the fine print before calling to collect their winnings on "scratch and win" game cards they may receive in the mail or find delivered to their homes.

"We receive a lot of calls from people wondering whether such offers are legitimate," the Minister said. "We always tell consumers that if they have truly won a prize, it should not cost them anything to collect it."

The ministry recently received calls from Ottawa-area consumers about a scratch and win promotion. Callers report they receive "winning" cards but must call a 1-900 telephone number - for which there is a charge -- to claim their prize. In the past, such promotions have swept across the entire province in stages.

Whenever consumers are contacted at home with a prize offer, the ministry says they should consider these factors:

- If you call a 1-900 number, there will be a charge. In scratch and win promotions, the cost of the call almost always far exceeds the cost of the so-called prize.
- If an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is.
- Report any prize offer that seems misleading to your local police or Industry Canada at 1-800-348-5358.
- Never give credit or banking information over the phone unless you have placed the call yourself and checked the reputation of the company.

Earlier in 1998, many Ontario residents received "scratch-and-win" cards in the mail. Virtually every card appeared to be a winner and people are directed to call a 1-900 "Winner's Hotline" for prize claim instructions. Much smaller type revealed that the call would cost \$19.99.

Ministry experts warn that, now that inclement weather is approaching, door-to-door scams are on the decline, but consumers must be more watchful to ward off unethical promotions by mail and telephone.

#### Cinefest Picton improves sound at the Regent Theatre

First the Regent Theatre recently purchased newer and more comfortable seats. Now, with a \$2,000 donation from Cinefest Picton, the theatre will be installing improved sound equipment to make every film a more pleasurable experience for the theatre audience. Funds from Cinefest Picton will go towards the purchase of a gigantic movie theatre speaker and a special new movie sound amplifier.

Fred Brown, the Regent's Movie Co-ordinator, said "There will be a 100% improvement in the quality of the movie sound with the new equipment and new seats. The old sound system was just not up to modern standards. It didn't help that sound bounced off the old hard seats and made it difficult for people in the audience to hear things clearly". With the new upholstered seats, better speakers and improved amplification, audiences will be treated to movies that sound the way they should. Plans are to have the sound system installed by December 18 when the Regent features the new animated film Prince of Egypt from Steven Spielberg's Dreamworks studio.

Cinefest Picton is a volunteer-run non-profit group that screens films every second Monday at the Regent Theatre through the fall, winter and spring as well as during the summer. The group is dedicated to adding to the choice of films available at the Regent Theatre and contributing any profits to make the Regent a more comfortable location for movie audiences.

Cinefest Picton is now in its third year. Films include recent international releases from the Toronto International Film Festival, art films, movies from smaller production houses and other films that appeal to smaller audiences and might otherwise bypass Picton and Prince Edward County.

Upcoming movies at Cinefest Picton the powerful American film, **Buffalo 66**, on December 7. The first movie in the New Year will be **Contempt** on January 4, a film by the esteemed French director Jean-Luc Godard and starring a young Brigitte Bardot and Jack Palance. The lineup for the winter and spring will be announced shortly and through sponsors Mr. Larry's Video, Books on the Bay and Picton Home Hardware/ Decorating. Admission is \$5 for seniors, students and members and \$7 for others.

# Road Safety Tips

## Drinking and driving: How you can help reduce the risk

ONTARIO — Every 45 minutes in Ontario, a driver is involved in an alcohol-related crash.

Drinking and driving is the largest single criminal cause of death and injury in Canada. The government and many community-based groups are doing their best to save more lives when it comes to the problem of drinking and driving.

But the real key is you, as an individual.

If you have been drinking or intend to drink, don't drive.

Don't ride with someone who has been drinking.

Don't let anyone you know drink and drive.

Let others know that drinking and driving is socially unacceptable and a crime.

Having a party? Don't forget that, as the host, you can be held responsible for the safety and behavior of your guests until they are sober, not just until they leave the party.

Don't plan physical activities like swimming, skiing, snowmobiling or skating when you serve alcohol. People are more prone to accidents when they've been drinking.

Stop serving alcohol a few hours before the party is over. Also make available alcohol-free drinks, as well as food. Find out how guests are getting home and, if needed, arrange for taxis, a designated driver or overnight stays.

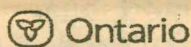

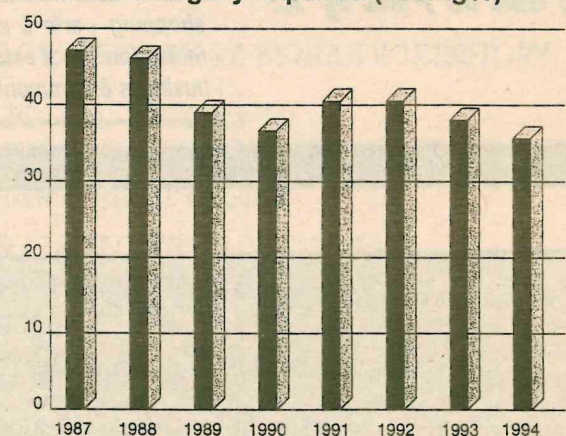

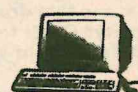

## What Is Dating Violence?

Dating Violence is the physical, emotional and/or verbal abuse of one partner by the other partner in a current or former dating relationship. Abusive behavior is any act carried out by one partner aimed at hurting or controlling the other. Dating violence happens in male/female relationships as well as in lesbian and gay relationships ( Two Spirited People).

A violent relationship means more than being hit by the person who claims to love or care about you. Violence is about power and control. When someone uses abuse and violence against you, it is always part of a larger pattern to try and control you.

Regardless of the abuser's age, it is against the law for anyone to:

- Hurt you
- Try to hurt you
- Force you to have sex
- Threaten you with weapons
- Harass you on the telephone or through the mail
- Stalk you
- Destroy things that belong to you

### Warning Signs

The following is a list of signs common to abusive and battering personalities. Though this list may not predict with absolute certainty, it is a good place to start.

#### Jealousy

- Is suspicious about everybody with whom you speak
- Wants to be with you constantly
- Tries to turn you against your parents

#### Controlling Behaviors

- Tries to decide what you do and with whom you spend time
- Gives orders and expects you to follow them
- Hides controlling behavior behind pretending to be concerned about your safety

#### Quick Involvement

- Pressures you to go steady right away
- Claims love at first sight

#### Unfair Expectations

- Expects you to put up with quickly changing moods
- Expects you to be available all of the time
- Expects you to forgive and forget immediately

#### Isolation

- Discourages you from spending time with your friends
- Puts down everyone you know including your family and friends

### Blames Others for Problems and Feelings

- If there are problems at school or at work it is always someone else's fault
- Blames you for everything that goes wrong in the relationship

### Overly Sensitive

- Is easily insulted
- Sees everything as personal attacks
- Blows things out of proportion

### Force Used in Sex

- Asks you to do things you do not want to do
- Uses sulking or anger to manipulate you into "giving in."

### Verbal Abuse

- Puts you down in front of other friends
- Makes you feel stupid

### Threats of Violence

- Breaks or strikes objects near you in order to frighten you

### Force Used During an Argument

- Yells and curses during an argument in order to scare you into agreeing.

If, after going through this list, you hear yourself saying,

"That's exactly what my partner does" then you have reason to be concerned

### Possible Effects of Dating Violence on the Victim include:

### Why it's hard to "just break-up"

1. **Love:** Abusers are not always hurtful. Many abusers have a likable and loving side that makes their victims think that the abuse would stop. Many victims think they can change the abuser's behavior.
2. **Fear:** Many times a date/partner will threaten to hurt him or herself if the other decides to leave. Many times the abuser will threaten to hurt the victim if she/he decides to leave. Abusers often threaten that the violence will get worse if the partner decides to leave.
3. **Doubt:** It's not always easy to admit that the relationship you are in is abusive. If your date is popular at school (athletics, academics, etc.) you may be concerned about losing social status with your peers.
4. **Embarrassment:** Teens who ask for help (especially from parents) may perceive themselves to be failures. Some teenagers believe that their parents will react violently if they are aware of the abuse.

### Develop a Safety Plan

#### Deciding Whether or Not to go on a Date

- Know about the person who ask you out before you say "yes"
- Review the "Warning Signs" to see if this person fits into any of the categories
- Do any of your good friends warn you about going out with this person?
- Are your friends afraid for your safety if you go out with this person?
- Do you have gut feelings of concern when you think about saying "yes" to this person?

#### Going on the Date

- Until you get to know your date better, double-date with trusted friends or hang out in a group
- Plan to go on your dates in public places
- If for any reason you become uncomfortable while on a date, make your concerns know immediately
- Do not allow yourself to be pressured by your date. Trust your ability to decide what's going on between the two of you.
- Have money with you in case you need to use the telephone and know where they are located.
- Be aware of the location of the telephones and exit doors

### Leaving an Abusive Relationship

- End the relationship over the phone where the abuser can not hurt you
- If possible, don't walk to school alone. You are safer when you are with other people
- Lock the doors and windows in your house. When you are alone, do not let your abuser in, no matter what the abuser says.
- Call the police and get some help if the abuser is hurting you or if you are in danger
- Take your abuser seriously when the abuser threatens to kill you or someone close to you. Abusers have not limits to what they will do, regardless of the consequences.

### UPDATE FROM THE THAYENDANEGA HEALTH CENTRE:

As of Dec. 1, 1998, First Canadian Health will be the new administrator for the Non-Insured Health Benefit program, taking over from Liberty Health.

It has been brought to our attention that certain Dentists, in the area, have advised their clients they are no longer willing to process Dent 29 Claim Forms for payment to First Canadian Health. It will be the responsibility of the patient to submit these forms directly for reimbursement of eligible coverage. Become familiar with these forms to ensure all relevant areas are completed, checking the form for: - 1) the Dentist's Identifier No.; 2) patient signature; 3) complete and correct personal data; 4) "For Claim" and "Pay Client/Guardian" boxes are indicated with "✓", prior to submission.

### MEDICAL SERVICES BRANCH - ONTARIO REGION

#### POLICY REGARDING REMUNERATION FOR MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION BY LAND FOR FIRST NATION AND INUIT CLIENTS

Effective November 30, 1998 the rate of remuneration for land travel to regular medical appointments approved by Medical Services Branch, Ontario Region will change as follows:

1. all travel for medical purposes requires prior-authorization by the designated Medical Services Branch office;
2. the mileage reimbursement rate for the use of private vehicles in providing medical transportation will be reduced to 9.5 cents per kilometre to a maximum of the equivalent adult bus fare;

In certain circumstances, an alternate means of travel may be required due to the client's special medical condition. In this regard, pre-authorization on a case by case basis will be considered to provide reimbursement for the full journey at the rate of twenty (20) cents per kilometre;

3. clients who require treatment, consultation, or follow up appointments at the nearest medical facility and who do not have mobility or medical restrictions, will be transported by bus onward from their home location;

Should the client wish to drive him/herself to the appointment, the mileage reimbursement rate stated in #2 above will apply;

4. it is expected that Tribal Councils, Health Authorities, Agencies and First Nations will operate medical transportation inside a contribution agreement at a comparable level of cost-efficiency.

*Down from the Shimmering Sky: Masks of the Northwest Coast**Opportunity of a lifetime to experience the power of two centuries of Mask Making*  
*Awe-Inspiring First Nations Ceremonial Masks Exhibition Opens at McMichael in December*

KLEINBURG, ON November 2, 1998 -- Enter a world in which spirit, art and history are united. Beginning December 5, 1998, eastern Canada will have a rare opportunity to experience *Down from the Shimmering Sky: Masks of the Northwest Coast*, presented by Scotiabank Group and on view at the McMichael Canadian Art Collection until February 28, 1999.

One of the largest and most ambitious exhibitions ever organized by the Vancouver Art Gallery, this profoundly moving exhibition will leave you transformed. It features more than 150 ceremonial masks created by this country's First Nations people over the past two centuries and brought together from collections around the world. The oldest masks, collected during Captain Cook's early expeditions, will be seen in Canada for the first time in more than 200 years. They represent examples of mask making from 11 different Nations of the Northwest Coast, from the Tlingit in northern Alaska to the Makah on the northern coast of Washington.

Among the 22 contemporary artists whose works are featured are: Robertson Davidson, Richard Hunt, Henry Speck, Beau Dick, Tim Paul, Glenn Tallio and Freda Diesing. The majority of the contemporary masks selected for the exhibition were created for ceremonial use.

From the silent gaze of a weathered 18<sup>th</sup>-century Male Ancestor mask created by an unknown artist of the Nuu-Chah-nulth nation to that of a vibrantly painted mask of an 'Namgis ancestor, created in 1998 by Kwakwaka'wakw artist Joe Wilson, the masks in this exhibition speak volumes. As Robert Joseph, a Kwakwaka'wakw chief, writer, and one of the exhibition's three co-curators, observed about the omnipresent masks of his youth: "They had a life of their own." A manifestation of powerful ancestral spirits, ceremonial masks are used to make the supernatural world visible.

"In a world of endless change and complexity, the mask has offered a continuum for native people to acknowledge our connection to the universe," Robert Joseph explains. "Through masks we affirm celestial places that honour the moon and stars. Through masks we conquer our fear of the oceans deep. Through masks we interact with the spirit world, our final destination."

Robert Joseph collaborated on this exceptional project with fellow curators Peter Macnair, who was Curator of Anthropology at the Royal British Columbia Museum in Victoria for 30 years, and Bruce Grenville, the Senior Curator of the Vancouver Art Gallery. Rather than structuring the exhibition chronologically, they structured it thematically, according to the four dimensions of the cosmos as perceived by the First Nations of the Northwest Coast (Sky World, Mortal World, Undersea World, Spirit World), plus the human face mask. The result is extraordinary. Rather than moving back through chronological time, you simply enter a timeless dimension in which spirit becomes one with history.

Robert Joseph expresses that spiritual connection, in the context of his experiences as a ceremonial mask dancer:

*The Forest has many voices and, sometimes, there is a deafening silence; such was the moment behind the dance curtain. As a masked dancer among the Kwakwaka'waka, I have been in that moment countless times. It is a moment when all the world is somewhere else. I am totally and completely alone. My universe is the mold of the mask over my face. I am the mask. I am the bird. I am the animal. I am the fish. I am the spirit. I visualize my dance. I ponder every move. I transcend into the being of the mask...Suddenly the deafening silence explodes into cacophony - birds sing, animals growl, ferns whistle in the wind. Everyone has a voice. Four times the sounds and silence collide, then the great dance begins.*

The McMichael is proud to showcase *Down from the Shimmering Sky: Masks of the Northwest Coast*. Presented by Scotiabank Group, the exhibition has been organized and circulated by the Vancouver Art Gallery with support from The Canada Council for the Arts. Program support has been provided by Air Canada.

*Down from the Shimmering Sky: Masks of the Northwest Coast* runs from December 5, 1998 to February 28, 1999 and is included with gallery admission; Adults \$7, Students \$4, Seniors \$5, Families \$15. sugar, coffee or tea.

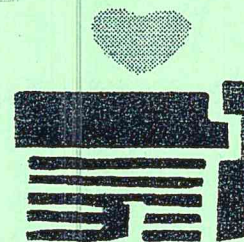
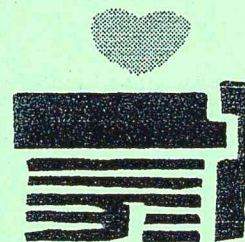
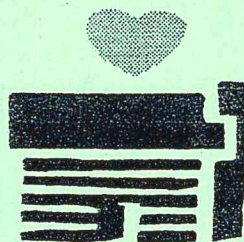
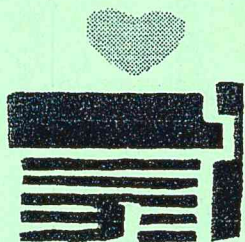
Monetary donations are also accepted. Let
