

Festival at Loyalist

Tom Lee has always been proud of his native heritage.

That pride propelled the 22year-old Lee to dance this past weekend at the first Festival of Native Arts held at the student activity centre at Loyalist Col-

Lee, whose native ancestry is Apache, was thrilled with the opportunity of participating in the festival.

"Dancing is a celebration," he said Sunday. "It's an honor and adoration for my people and for everyone who's gone before me."

The second-year law and security administration student is one of more than 100 native students enrolled at Loyalist. When he learned about the weekend'snative arts festival, he asked organizers if they needed dancers.

They did and Lee danced — two hours Saturday and another two hours Sunday.

"I haven't danced in a while, so I'm a little rusty," he said.

Native dancing is a spiritual activity for Lee.

"It makes me feel like I'm one with the people and the spirits,"

Normally, he dances by himself. But he was joined by other native students for group dances this weekend.

"I was very proud to be able to dance this weekend," said the Sharbot Lake native.

The festival served as a celebration of the richness and the arts of native culture, said Linda Magill.

"There was a lot of joy in being able to present one's heritage for others to enjoy," said the Loyalist business teacher, who also boasts a native background. It's been one neck of a

The head male dancer was Seth LeFort and the head female dancer was Tanya Leary - both from the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

Also on hand were native crafts people who displayed and sold everything from designer clothing, jewelry and drawings to birch bark, baskets and leather

Native dishes were also sold for visitors. These included bear and moose stew, lyed corn soup, fry bread, Indian tacos and

Magill said the festival was made possible because of the inception last fall of the native resource centre at Loyalist. The centre boasts two native counselors, educational materials, computers and couches for relax-

She's overwhelmed with the number of visitors to the weekend festival and said next year's event may have to change venue.

"It's my belief that the student activity centre won't be big enough to hold it next year. We'll only singing and dancing but in need more room for the public."





ABORIGINAL YOUTH CAREER FAIR

ONE OF CANADA'S LARGEST EVER ABORIGINAL YOUTH CAREER FAIRS TO BE HELD FEBRUARY 5 AND 6

TORONTO, January 24, 1997 - The Canadian Native Arts Foundation announced today that one of Canada's largest ever Aboriginal youth career fairs, Blueprint for the Future, will be held February 5 and 6 at the Calgary Convention Centre.

"It is a distinct pleasure to announce that approximately 1,000 Aboriginal high school students, from across Alberta, will be converging on Calgary to participate in this year's Blueprint for the Future," said Mohawk composer and conductor John Kim Bell, Founder and Chair of the Canadian Native Arts Foundation, the National Aboriginal Achievement Awards and Blueprint for the Future. "Joining them will be representatives from some of Canada's leading corporations and a long list of Aboriginal achievers. Through career seminars, speeches and informal conversation with these leaders, Aboriginal youth will be introduced to some of the most exciting careers this country and world can offer."

"There is no one out there who can deny that future employment prospects for Aboriginal youth appear bleak," Bell said. "It is our job, as Aboriginal people, to do all we can to combat this. We have to ensure that students receive practical information on career options, educational requirements and employment trends as the new century approaches."

MP Elijah Harper, Grand Chief Phil Fontaine of the Manitoba Assembly of Chiefs, scientist Albert Rock, Ontario Judge Mr. Justice Harry LaForme, NWT Cabinet Minister Stephen Kakfwi, Cape Breton poet Rita Joe, former Moderator of the United Church of Canada, Reverend Stanley John McKay, Toronto Gators' pitching superstar Darren Zack, Cape Dorset artist Kiawak Ashoona, justice system reformer Chester Cunningham, youth NAAA recipient George Berthe and Northern Québec Cree Chief Billy Diamond are just a few of the Aboriginal achievers who will be leading career seminars at the fair.

These Aboriginal achievers will be joined by Blueprint for the Future's sponsors including founding sponsor CIBC, in a special partnership with the Royal Bank; Indian and Northern Affairs Canada; Canadian Heritage through the Multiculturalism Program; City of Calgary; Environment Canada; Frontec; Health Canada; Human Resources Development Canada; Husky Oil Ltd.; Industry Canada through Aboriginal Business Canada; Petro Canada; Placer Dome Canada; Poco Petroleum; Scotia McLeod Inc.; Shell Canada Limited; Solicitor General Canada; Suncor Inc.; Syncrude; Telus and Telus Mobility; and, Treaty 7.

"I see Blueprint for the Future as a way of introducing - breaking down barriers if you like - the world of Aboriginal youth and the high power world of Canadian business," Bell said. "Some of Canada's largest corporations will be represented on Blueprint for the Future's Corporate Leader's Panel. This is significant progress."

The Canadian Native Arts Foundation, a nationally registered charity established by John Kim Bell in 1985 to assist Aboriginal students by providing educational scholarships, has arranged for food and lodging for more than half of the student participants and their chaperones. Students will have travelled to Blueprint for the Future from as far away as Fort Vermilion in isolated Northern Alberta, thanks to corporate donations the CNAF has sought out.

Operated in conjunction with each year's National Aboriginal Achievement Awards gala, Blueprint for the Future has already doubled in size since the inaugural career fair last year. After Calgary, the CNAF has arranged for an encore presentation of the Blueprint for the Future career fair to be held in Winnipeg, April 9. This will bring to 2,000 the number to students who will have taken part in this career experience in 1997.

"We're hoping to spark an interest and drive that will lead to good, solid career choices being made by Aboriginal students," Bell said. "There will be workshops on everything from becoming an airline pilot to becoming a zoologist. We're talking about providing the spark that could lead to a whole new generation of Aboriginal people taking on careers that are among the most exciting the world has to offer. If this happens - and it will - we all win."

1997 NATIONAL ABORIGINAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS RECIPIENTS ANNOUNCED

TORONTO, January 1997 - The Canadian Native Arts Foundation has announced the 14 winners of the 1997 National Aboriginal Achievement Awards.

"The National Aboriginal Achievement Awards (NAAA) have quickly become an empowering and positive symbol for all of Canada's Aboriginal peoples," Mohawk composer/conductor John Kim Bell, founder and chair of the NAAA and the Canadian Native Arts Foundation (CNAF) said in making the announcement. "They have helped build a bridge of understanding between Aboriginal peoples and other Canadians by showcasing the best of who we are in the Aboriginal world."

Now in their fourth year, the NAAA recognize outstanding career achievements by Aboriginal people of First Nations, Métis and Inuit ancestry. Fourteen awards will be presented -- 12 career, one lifetime achievement and a special youth award that carries a \$5,000 scholarship.

They were established by John Kim Bell to pay tribute to the United Nation's International Year of the World's Indigenous Peoples in 1993 and are a special project of the Canadian Native Arts Foundation, a nationally registered charity that has provided approximately \$5 million in scholarships to Aboriginal students. Recently, the CNAF was selected to manage the Aboriginal Veterans Scholarship Trust, a \$1.15 million trust that will assist Aboriginal students in business and science academic programs.

The first NAAA were presented in Ottawa in 1994, Vancouver in 1995 and in Winnipeg last year. This year, recipients will receive their NAAA at a gala awards ceremony to take place in Calgary, February 7at the Jubilee Auditorium with an audience that will include His Excellency, Romeo LeBlanc, Governor General of Canada, Alberta Premier Ralph Klein, CIBC Chairman and CEO Al Flood, CNAF patrons and benefactors and Canada's Aboriginal leaders. The show will be televised nationally on CBC February 13.

The 14 Aboriginal achievers for 1997 are:

- Cape Dorset Inuit artist, Kiawak Ashoona;
- Northern Québec's rising political and social advocate George Berthe, the special youth award recipient;
- Alberta based film and television director and producer, Gil Cardinal;
- Alberta based Aboriginal justice reform worker, Chester Cunningham;
- Northern Québec Cree business leader, Chief Billy Diamond;
- Historian and writer, Dr. Olive Dickason, this year's lifetime achievement recipient;
- Toronto based Dances With Wolves academy award nominated actor Graham
- Nova Scotia's award winning poet Rita Joe;
- NWT Cabinet Minister Stephen Kakfwi;
- Ontario Court of Justice (General Division) judge, Harry S. LaForme;
- Manitoba based Rev. Stanley John McKay, the first Aboriginal person to become Moderator of the United Church of Canada;
- Vancouver based kidney transplant specialist Dr. Martin Gale McLoughlin; Northern Québec's Aboriginal constitutional rights advocate, Senator Charlie Watt;
- Ontario based, Pan-Am Games gold medal and world championship winning pitcher Darren Zack.

"Whether in politics, the law, medicine, academia, the arts or other fields, each member of this group has attained astounding levels of accomplishment," Bell said. "As an Aboriginal person, they make me feel proud and confident about our future. But, these winners are also a credit to the larger Canadian community. They are truly achievers of which all Canadians can feel pride."

Since 1993, 55 outstanding individuals have received a NAAA including: MP Elijah Harper, provincial court judges Murray Sinclair and Alfred Scow, NHL coach Ted Nolan, the late women's rights activist Mary Two Axe Earley, various Olympians, scientists and numerous artists.

This year's winners were chosen by an all Aboriginal jury that included: Ambassador Mary May Simon, New Brunswick Chief Roger J. Augstine, Ontario Métis leader Tony Belcourt, Mohwak conductor/composer John Kim Bell, retired Trent University professor Marlene Brant Castellano, BC Nisga'a leader Dr. Frank Calder, Saskatoon's award winning author Maria Campbell, Ontario psychologist Dr. Edward A. Connors, Alberta Aboriginal leader Strater Crowfoot, Calgary dentist Dr. Shannon Fiddler, Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs Grand Chief Phil Fontaine, BC inventor Albert Rock, Inuit leader Mary Sillett, Ottawa entrepreneur Marsha Smoke, BC fisherman James Watson Walkus, and Edmonton lawyer David C. Ward.

Attention News/Sports/Photo Editors/Directors: ONTARIO NOMINATES THREE COMMUNITIES TO HOST 2001 CANADA SUMMER GAMES

TORONTO, Dec. 18 /CNW/ - London, Niagara region, and Ottawa-Carleton are

on the short-list to host the 2001 Canada Summer Games.
Ontario Minister of Citizenship, Culture and Recreation Marilyn Mushinsk announced the government's three nominations today from an unprecedented nir bids for the Games. Other bidding communities included Hamilton Brantford, Kitchener-Waterloo, North Bay-Sudbury, North York, Peterborough, and Windsor 'The interest level was so high for the 2001 Canada Summer Games from

the outset, we decided to initiate a formal provincial bid process for the first time.' Minister Mushinski said today. 'All the bids were outstanding The level of sports development in each of the bid communities is excellent. So it was a very difficult decision."

Ten thousand people, mostly volunteers, contributed to the bid process. The enthusiasm expressed in every bid community was exceptional.

'Everyone involved in the Games will be a winner -- Ontario's young athletes, the Games' sponsors, the people of the host community, and the province, 'the Minister added. 'Millions of dollars in spinoff benefits wi produce economic gains for the host community and surrounding region, including vastly improved sport and recreational facilities.

Ontario last hosted the Canada Summer Games in 1981 at Thunder Bay. Decause of the rotation system between the provinces, 2001 will be the next opportunity, where more than 4,000 young athletes will compete in 16 sports.

Canada Games Council chair Jack Pelech acknowledged the work carried out by the 2001 Canada Games Secretariat and the Site Review Committee. ''We are very pleased. The bid process was handled efficiently in a fair and open manner. The nine committees can rest assured that each bid was judged on its own merit.

The government's nominations will be submitted to the Canada Games Council, which will recommend a host site to the federal Minister for Canadi Heritage. A final decision on the host site is expected next June.

COMMUNITY POLICING

Why Community policing?

Police services in many parts of the world have been adopting the philosophy of community policing as the means by which police services are to be delivered.

The police in Tyendinaga feel the time for change is now. Other First Nations in the province have successfully adopted community policing in their service delivery

What is Community Policing?

- Community Policing is a change in the philosophy in how police service is delivered.
- Community Policing is the police working in partnership with the community to identify and establish priorities.
- Community Policing includes a proactive approach to preventing crime and other disorder thus reducing the fear
- Community Policing involves problem solving rather than just the police responding to calls for service.
- Community Policing builds trust and leads to better public acceptance of the police.

What Community Policing is not.

- It is not a "snitch" session, where the police seek information against specific individuals
- It is not the police telling the people how business is done.
- * It is not just public relations, although good public relations is a by-product of Community Policing.
- * It is not "soft" on crime or other offenders.
- It is not a place where the public can complain against individual officers.
- It is not a place where personal politics, or agenda's are discussed.

February is Heart month here in Indian country and here are some very enlightening facts on the significance of physical inactivity and risk of heart disease.

Canadians, including First Nations, are exposed to increased risk of coronary heart disease by a behaviour close to 60% of the population shares--- physical inactivity.

Physical inactivity affect a far greater number of people than the three more commonly known risk factors, namely smoking, elevated serum cholesterol and blood pressure.

Studies conducted between 1980 and 1987, indicate that ten percent of Americans are at risk through elevated serum cholesterol and blood pressure levels respectively, while 18 per cent are at risk from smoking. But, and this is a big BUT, fully 59% of the American population are at risk of heart disease because of physical inactivity.

These studies are considered relevant to the Canadian population, for which similar data is not presently available.

Forty-five studies examining the association between Coronary Heart Disease and physical activity were subjected to careful review by scientists from the Health Promotions and **Education Centre of the Atlanta Centre** for Disease Control. The results of this review were published in Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (Vol. 36, No. 26,

1987).


The review set out rigid criteria for the consideration of data presented in each of the 45 studies. For instance, since there are no standardized assessment procedures for measuring physical activity, only studies in which reliable information collection techniques were used, could be taken into account. From these studies, 32 of comparisons between physical activity levels and Coronary Heart Disease met the review criteria.

These comparisons revealed that physical inactivity's as strong a risk factor as serum cholesterol, systolic blood pressure, and smoking. Physical inactivity, however is far more important, the review found, since a larger percentage of the American population is exposed to this risk factor.

While studies using poor measurement systems for physical activity, had not demonstrated the link between inactivity and Coronary Heart Disease. The American Public Health Service, in reprinting the results of this review, concluded that better assessment methods are needed for measuring physical activity, to accommodate health research. Lack of regular physical activity is believed to be a factor in other diseases and conditions, including diabetes, cancer and mental health.

Physical inactivity is a significant risk factor, affecting far greater numbers of Americans, even when more contemporary standards are applied. The percentage of the population affected by serum cholesterol, high blood pressure, and smoking are 25 to

40%, 36%, and 30% respectively.




Regular vigorous physical activity, for 20 minutes, at least three times a week, is believed to be the optimum for reducing the risk of Coronary Heart Disease. When vigorous activity is incompatible with health conditions, less intensive, but regularly scheduled activities can still reduce the risk of Coronary Heart Disease. Which is where I make the pitch for the Moccasin Trail Walking Program. Yes, we can help you lower your risk of those diseases mentioned above in this column. Won't you come out and join now?
