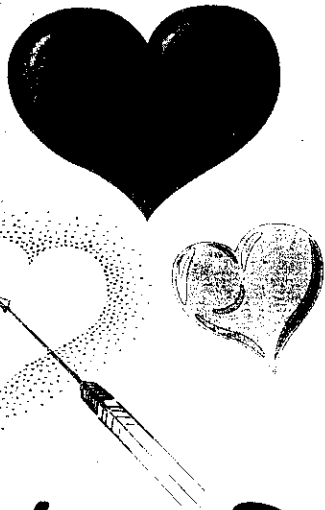

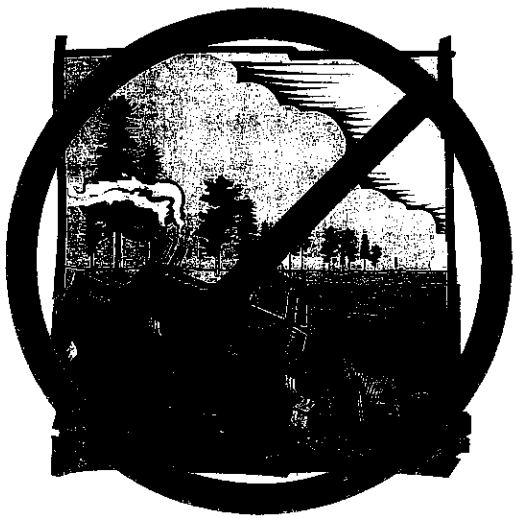

MPPs join fight against landfill

NAPANEE - A plan to expand an Eastern Ontario landfill site six-fold will put the environment in harm's way, two local MPPs insist.

Both claim the economic benefits do not warrant constructing one of the largest dumps in the province, 30 kilometres east of Belleville.

At what was formerly known as the Richmond Township site, leaching liquid pollutants are seeping up to 100 metres from the

older, unprotected portion of the 43-year-old dump.

The landfill is used by Belleville and several other Quinte area communities.

Hastings Frontenac-Lennox and Addington MPP Leona Dombrowsky, and Prince Edward Hastings MPP Ernie Parsons say concerns of farmers and residents who live on the fringes of the site should take precedence over a business plan by the site's owner Canadian Waste Services (CWS).

The company has submitted an application for review by the Ministry of Environment to expand the Richmond site's capacity from 125,000 tonnes of waste a year to as much as 750,000 tonnes.

Last fall, Minister of Environment Tony Clement approved

terms of reference for the proposal paving the way for an environmental assessment by year's end.

The site currently takes in garbage from Belleville through to Kingston but could ultimately provide a home for garbage from across the province, said Kevin Bechard, CWS vice-president of facility development. The site lies north of Deseronto Road and Hwy. 401 and is located in former Richmond Township, now part of a newly-merged Greater Napanee.

Bechard tried to allay fears of neighbouring residents, saying his company would install 60 millimetre thick double polyethylene liners and contingency plans to prevent further leaching of polluted water runoff.

While some leachate has migrated, he said, it has been contained on the site. "There is no landfill impact off site, it is being monitored. As part of the Environmental Assessment we will have to define our contingency plan of dealing with the release of contaminated ground water off site," said Bechard.

Parsons, however, is fighting on behalf of nearby residents and challenged the environment minister in the House recently to give them money to combat the CWS proposal.

"The process is very unfair, big companies have big dollars, these residents have little money for a fight. This American firm will come in and fill our land with

garbage for 25 years, head south, then leave us with the garbage forever," said Parsons, Tuesday. "We're putting pressure on the minister. His role isn't to represent the company, it's to represent the people."

Parsons has called a press conference for this morning to expand on his plans.

Dombrowsky, meanwhile, said she has reviewed the landfill company's proposal documents and cannot support the dump expansion, citing a recent incident she was told happened at a hazardous waste site in Sarnia where a protective liner designed to contain landfill water runoff broke and leachate flowed from the site.

"There is no guarantee that

these liners won't leak. What if, in 30 or 40 years, it breaks down and there is serious leaking? Can we overlook the potentially damaging effects this could have on many future generations?"

Dombrowsky said the landfill is already having a negative effect on the area with residents complaining of a strong odour daily emanating from the garbage. Some residents nearby "have been told not to drink from their wells," she said.

Stephen Geneja is vice chairman of a 200-member citizens' group calling itself Committee of Concerned Citizens Tyendinaga Stop the Dump which has met several times to fight the expansion.

Story continued from page 1. The chief concern, said Geneja, is that the ministry approved the terms of reference in September, 1999, while local residents remain still fearful of what the health effects of the existing dump are now.

"I can't show you a crate of dead canaries, a bucket of dead fish or dead cows. We as a group do not have the money to do this (fight the plan)."

Fellow group member Alan Gardiner claimed leachate from the site over the years has already leaked into nearby Marysville Creek and neighbors are worried the leachate could contaminate their wells used to supply cattle and crops.

"These meats and crops are going out for human consumption," said Gardiner. "This leachate problem is a bomb ready to go off and they want to expand?"

CWS spokesman Bechard, however, said information collected for the proposal is not only being studied by the company for its submission and the MOE for its minister's final decision, but is also being reviewed by Napanee council and will be vetted by an independent peer review later this year for an unbiased check of all data.

All information will be included in the final environmental assessment, which should be completed by year's end and submitted to the environment minister, said Bechard from Toronto.

According to provincial legislation, Clement has the final word on whether the expansion will go ahead. He has said he will make a decision on the matter some time in 2001.

John Steele, MOE spokesman, couldn't be reached for comment Tuesday in Toronto.

PARSONS LAUNCHES POSTCARD CAMPAIGN AGAINST THE PROPOSED EXPANSION OF THE RICHMOND TOWNSHIP DUMP

BELLEVILLE -- Prince Edward - Hastings MPP Ernie Parsons today launched a postcard campaign, which calls on Premier Mike Harris to stop any expansion of the Richmond Township landfill site.

"My constituents who reside near the dump are worried about the proposed expansion and want to send Premier Harris that message," said Parsons. "This postcard campaign, which will be mailed to all homes in the area will provide my constituents with the opportunity to communicate their opposition directly to the Premier."

Since his election in June 1999 Parsons has been working with local residents to bring their concerns to the Harris government's attention about the potential for environmental damage to area rivers, creeks and ground water. In a recent statement to the Ontario Legislature, Parsons questioned why the Richmond landfill site "should be the dumping ground for all those communities who are unable to take care of their own waste." Parsons went on to tell the Legislature that "not only has the Harris Government been silent on the dump expansion they have not provided one cent to area residents who wish to conduct independent studies as to the potential health risks the proposed dump expansion may cause."

"Prince Edward - Hastings is blessed with an abundance of creeks, rivers and farm land that helps feed the entire province," Parsons stated. "Mike Harris needs to understand that my constituents are not willing to support any expansion that will potentially jeopardize the quality of their water and the value of their land. Those who live in the area want to be heard on this issue and they demand that their concerns be addressed before any expansion is approved by the Ministry of Environment."

Richmond Landfill Site

I was pleased that Liberal MPP's, Ernie Parsons and Leona Dombrowsky have taken a political position against the Richmond Landfill Site expansion

I was pleased to meet with Ernie Parsons following the provincial election to relay the concerns of our community about the dump expansion and the harmful environmental risks that could affect our community

Rick Lindgren is an environmental lawyer from Kingston who acts on behalf of the Tyendinaga Township resident Mr Lindgren has indicated that there should be a judicial review of the matter because the Ontario Minister of the Environment, when approving the terms of reference for the environmental assessment failed to ensure that options to the dump expansion were included.

The new Council met on January 15th, to be briefed on the issue with Alan Gardner in attendance. The Council passed Motion #1 at this meeting was to do the following:

- 1) To draft a fact sheet on the issue to the community which will be reviewed by the band's lawyer prior to its release.
- 2) To be involved in coordinating a demonstration with the Tyendinaga Township Citizen's committee and the public liaison committee.
- 3) To send a letter to the Minister of Fishery and Oceans outlining Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte concerns about the impact that the dump expansion may have on the fish habitat.
- 4) To arrange a meeting with John Donnelly, Regional Director General, for funding for independent consultants.
- 5) To follow-up with Trish Rae regarding the eastern Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory boundary question and the status of the GPS survey.
- 6) To obtain all historical documents concerning previous environmental assessments leading up to the licensing by the province of Ontario for the existing site.
- 7) Todd Kring is to report critical time lines and dates to the Council concerning the EA process
- 8) Council will meet with David Galloway to review the plasma waste smelter garbage disposal option. Council has previously met on this issue before.

On Saturday, January 29, 2000, there was an impromptu protest in the Town of Napanee, organized by residents, against the dump expansion. Unfortunately, my staff did not receive information about the protest until Saturday, January 29, 2000 and all the members of Council could not be reached in order to attend. I am sure there will be other demonstrations in the upcoming months.

I have written a letter to Mr. David Anderson, Federal Minister of Environment and Tony Clement, Ontario Minister for the Environment, concerning the dump expansion and the letters are enclosed for your perusal.

I will keep you updated on this issue.

Drill Hall

On January 20th, Council met with members of the Brant family on the Drill Hall issue. On August 31, 1999, the representatives of the Brant Family gave notice to Council that the March 1, 1961 lease will be terminated effective March 31, 2000. Council is considering purchasing land at the drill hall location and will be having another meeting with the Brant family in the near future.

Third Quarter Budget Review

Council and finance staff met on January 25th, 2000, to review the third quarter budget ending December 31, 1999. As of March 31, 2000, Council is proposing a deficit of \$612,750.23. It is expected that this deficit will be reduced since there are currently a number of band positions that are vacant, resulting in salary savings. The budget is reproduced and enclosed in the newsletter for your information.

Casino Rama Funds

The Assembly of First Nations meeting in Ottawa in December, 1999, it was decided that a closure committee would be struck to finalize an agreement with the Rama community, the Casino Corporation of Ontario and the Chiefs of Ontario. The agreement is necessary before any Rama money can be released to the First Nations of Ontario. The closure committee met at the Delta Chelsea Hotel, in Toronto, on January 28 and 29, 2000 to finalize the agreement. A media blackout was ordered.

First Nations are represented by Chief Lorraine Mcrae from Rama, Grand Chief Mike Mitchell, and Mike Sherry, (lawyer at Chiefs office) and Bliss White, (lawyer from the firm of Blake, Cassels in Toronto).

The province of Ontario was represented by Mr. Yan Lazore, (Assistant Deputy Minister of the Ontario Native Affairs Secretariat), Mr. David Aranoff, (Assistant Deputy Minister

of the Ontario Casino Corporation), and Mr. Mark Freeman, (lawyer for the Ontario Attorney General, Mr. Flaherty).

The closure committee continues to meet as of the writing of this letter and it is expected a news release will be forthcoming the first week of February, 2000.

Civil Matter Regarding Insurance Claim

On December 1, 1999, Council authorized a payment of \$500.00 to a band member representing the deductible portion of that member's insurance policy. Council Doug Maracle and I were opposed to the payment because this was a civil matter between two band members and the band was not responsible for the damage.

On January 12, 2000, the band member's insurance company asked Council to reimburse the \$600.00 settlement that they had paid. On January 19, 2000, Council authorized a letter to go to the insurance company stating that the band accepted no liability for the damage and that it was a public relations gesture which was not to be interpreted as an admission that the band was in any way responsible for the damage.

Purchase of Commercial Building

On January 19, 2000, Council passed Motion #33 to investigate the purchasing of a commercial building from the Indian Agricultural Program of Ontario due to a defaulted loan.

Chief Administrative Officer

Glenda (Sam) Maracle is on education leave and I wish her well with her studies. I want to recognize her hard work and dedication to the band over the years.

I am happy to provide you with this update and I wish you all best wishes in the year 2000.

Re: Proposed Expansion of Richmond Landfill Site by Canadian Waste Services Inc.

On September 17, 1999, you approved Terms of Reference of an "environmental assessment" prepared by Canadian Waste Services Inc. ("CWS"). I am writing to express the concern of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte regarding your decision, and to protest that decision.

CWS made no attempt in its Terms of Reference to address the need for an expansion of the Richmond Landfill site. It made no attempt to consider alternatives to that expansion. Its Terms of Reference were a contemptuous flouting of the *Environmental Assessment Act*.

Your decision if it stands would grant CWS a green light to pursue its corporate objectives free from any scrutiny of need and alternatives.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte are currently investigating a number of matters that are relevant to this proposed expansion.

First, it appears likely that the expansion is occurring on lands that were in fact granted to the Mohawk Nation in 1793, and have never been surrendered. If that is the case, the provincial legislation has no jurisdiction over this proposal.

Second, it appears that the existing landfill site is contaminating the ground waters in its vicinity. If CWS cannot contain leachate from its present facility, how can it be trusted to expand it manyfold?

Third, since the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory is downstream from the existing site and the proposed expansion site, section 48 of the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act* is triggered.


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Fourth, there is an excess of landfill capacity for the foreseeable future which renders this destructive expansion absolutely unnecessary.

While we are considering our best course of action, I would appreciate receiving a copy of your September 17, 1999 approval as well as your written reasons for that decision. In particular, can you explain how the approval of these Terms of Reference is consistent with the purpose of the Environmental Assessment Act and the public interest? It is inconceivable that a decision to dispense with the requirements to demonstrate the need for the expansion and to review alternatives to the expansion can be justified as being in the interests of the environment of the public interest.

I look forward to hearing from you regarding this matter that will affect the wellbeing of our citizens for generations to come.



Under these circumstances we must request that you exercise your authority under the CEAA to ensure that the proposed expansion is subjected to a complete and detailed environmental assessment.

Re: Proposed Expansion of Richmond Landfill Site by Canadian Waste Services Inc.

Thank you for letter of September 2, 1999 in reply to my letter of July 19 to your predecessor the Honourable Christine s. Stewart.

On September 17, 1999, subsequent to your letter, Ontario Minister of the Environment the Honourable Tony Clement approved the Terms of Reference prepared by Canadian Waste Services Inc. ("CWS"). I enclose a copy of my letter dated today to Mr. Clement.

The Terms of Reference are incomplete and any environmental assessment based upon them will be inadequate and unacceptable to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte. The process which occurred prior to the approval of the Terms of Reference failed to provide a forum for meaningful public consultation as required by section 5.1 of the Ontario *Environmental Assessment Act* ("the EAA"). Furthermore, the accepted Terms of Reference do not ensure that the purpose of the EAA will be fulfilled. A review of key considerations set out in the EAA such as the need for the expansion and alternatives to the expansion is not required under the current Terms of Reference.

Your letter indicates that your Department will be considering how potential impacts on water quality have been addressed by CWS. The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte look to you, as the guardian of the environment and as a representative of the Crown in right of Canada, to protect our lands and our environment. Under section 11(1) of the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, it is your Department's obligation to act in a timely manner on the identified need to conduct a separate federal environmental assessment to address these adverse effects.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte are currently investigating a number of matters that are relevant to this proposed expansion.

First, it appears likely that the expansion is occurring on lands that were in fact granted to the Mohawk Nation in 1793, and have never been surrendered. If that is the case, the provincial legislation has no jurisdiction over this proposal.

Second, it appears that the existing landfill site is contaminating the ground water in its vicinity. If CWS cannot contain leachate from its present facility, how can it be trusted to expand it manyfold?

Third, since the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory is downstream from the existing site and the proposed expansion site, section 48 of the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act* (the CEAA) is triggered, imposing a positive duty upon your Department to ensure that the environmental issues of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte are addressed. The expansion is likely to cause significant adverse effects for the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte requiring the intervention of your Department.

Watershed Conditions Bulletin

Quinte Conservation is monitoring conditions on local waterways closely. Frazil ice has been noted in the Salmon, Moira and Napanee Rivers. While no flooding has been reported at this time, frazil ice has caused high water at the Kingsford Conservation Area on the Salmon River. Flows on the Moira and Salmon Rivers are at normal levels for this time of year and flows on the Napanee River are slightly above average.

Cold air temperatures can result in the production of frazil (slush) ice in areas of fast flowing open water. This slushy ice can build up under sheet ice causing water to back up. Cold nighttime temperatures forecast for the next several days will likely contribute to frazil ice buildup.

Ice on local creeks and rivers is unstable due to fast flowing water and strong currents under the ice. Ice sheets over any river current can be quickly eroded and therefore can not be considered safe at any time. Quinte Conservation warns the public to stay off the ice on rivers and creeks and to exercise caution around all watercourses or bodies of water. Unstable ice on the rivers' edge and slippery banks also present a danger.

Quinte Conservation staff will continue to monitor local waterways closely and will issue an update to this bulletin if conditions warrant. Quinte Conservation staff monitor water levels and ice conditions carefully at this time of year as part of their regular flood forecasting and warning program.

Mohawk homes honoured

SHANNONVILLE — The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have been honoured with an Ener-Quality R-2000 Excellence Award from the Ontario Home Builders Association.

It was presented at a Building and Renovation Forum in Toronto.

The Mohawks were honoured for technical excellence under 1,500 sq. ft. for their granny flats at Lot 4, Concession 1 of Shannonville.

The small homes, designed to provide housing for Mohawk elders, were found to be 30 per cent under their fuel consumption target, have integrated a forced air heating system, use a rented gas-fired hot water tank as a heating source and have communal waste disposal.

The flats have other benefits leading to energy conservation, the goal of R-2000 homes.

Those include R50-insulated ceilings, basement walls built with the Blue Maxx wall insulation system, a handicap design for the elderly and above-grade walls.

A MESSAGE FROM A MEMBER OF THE MOHAWKS OF THE BAY OF QUINTE BAND COUNCIL (MBQBC) FOR JANUARY 2000 Submitted by William J. Brant

In January new councillors who took office were briefed on some MBQBC policies and projects that were underway when they began their term on council.

We did receive information from the Mohawk Round Table (MRT) partners as to the work that has been completed to date on firearms registration but as of yet MBQBC has not had time to discuss this. From the information I have read, these MRT nations have the basis of a firearms registry by-law for participating Mohawk nations that would be executed and controlled by each individual Mohawk First Nation. Some areas of this by-law need more work and I will comment after MBQBC has had time for its input to this MRT presentation. As with any by-law, there would be discussion and comment from our band membership, and a vote taken to approve the said by-law before the same could be implemented here.

Our acting chief administrative officer, Glenda (Sam) Maracle is on an educational leave of absence as of January 7, 2000 and MBQBC has appointed Tom Vincent to fill this position.

Donny C. Maracle, economic development officer for MBQBC has resigned to accept a position with the Ohwistha Capital Corporation. I would like to thank Don for his past service to our community and to wish him well in his new career.

MBQBC has now received information respecting the federal government's decision Re: The Corbiere Case (band members who are not resident on their territory are to be permitted to vote in band elections). The department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) says that it would be impossible by November 20, 2000 to do the necessary consultations with the stakeholders so that the Supreme Court of Canada (SCC) decision be implemented in this time period. The Supreme Court has given DIAND approval to implement this decision in a two-stage approach which will permit these off-reserve band members to vote by November 20, 2000.

"Stage one of the strategy involves, as an interim measure, letting the seven words **"and is ordinarily resident on the reserve"** automatically drop from section 77(1) of the Indian Act upon the expiration of the suspension of the SCC's declaration of invalidity on November 20, 2000. Stage One also focuses on amending the two relevant sets of regulations: the *Indian Band Election Regulations* and the *Indian Referendum Regulations*. It is our (DIAND) intent to amend these two regulations by the expiration of the SCC suspension to avoid confusion within First nation communities as to how elections and referendum should be conducted when off-reserve members begin to vote."

"Stage Two will involve a more broadly based look at the overall Indian Act and the development of long term sustainable solutions to address the Corbiere decision and any other challenges to the provisions of the Indian Act. This stage will also provide the necessary flexibility to determine what changes to the act are both necessary and feasible."

N.B. These are excerpts from a letter to all chiefs from the minister of DIAND.

MBQBC has accepted a program called **Aboriginal Head Start (AHS)** which is funded by Health Canada to a total of approximately \$235,000.00. The following paragraphs contain highlights from the proposal which was submitted by band staff.

This is a program for children from 0-6 years (and includes the participation of the parents/guardians) with a goal of creating balanced early intervention programs that will support children in each of the four growth areas (intellectual, physical, emotional and spiritual). Suitable staff, who will take into consideration the uniqueness of each child and his/her individuality, will implement programs.

It is also the goal of the program to provide an atmosphere wherein the child can sooner reach his/her full potential through a program of varied experiences bolstered with the necessary assistance as provided by social support services as well as parental, family, and community involvement. Children will be monitored closely for any health concerns and medical conditions. High consideration will be given to each child's native heritage and he/she will be exposed to language and culture related activities. Program times would be half days (8:00AM-11:30 AM and 1:00PM-4:30PM) with hours of operation from 7:00AM-5:00PM Monday to Friday. For further information re: time of implementation and place contact the Band Office.

MBQBC has allowed for the establishment of an environmental committee to address garbage and pollution issues on our territory. The committee hasn't as yet elected its executive but this will hopefully be done at the next meeting to be held at 7:00PM, February 3, 2000 at the Band Office. Interested community members are welcome to attend and to bring your specific concerns and/or suggestions to our attention.

A good deal of the time at the environmental committee of January 13, 2000 was utilized to set goals for effective management of garbage and pollution control. I would suggest that part of the agenda for our next meeting is to prioritize these goals, set strategies and time frames to address the issues identified.

On Saturday January 22, 2000 I was asked on very short notice if people of our territory would join with the citizens committee from Tyendinaga township to stage a "Stop the Dump" demonstration during a levee held by the Mayor of Napanee at North Fredricksburg township hall. I did attend with a few band

members to help raise an awareness of our Band's concerns with this proposed dump expansion.

MBQBC has done some preliminary work on a membership code and residency by-law which we will be submitting for your consideration in the coming months.

MBQBC has had discussion on the selection of candidates from our territory who may qualify as "Elders" and who would participate in important roles involving our membership and residency by-law as well as other community functions. It was agreed that some criteria and standards be set for the selection of band members to receive this honour.

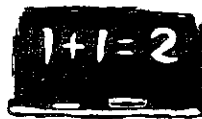

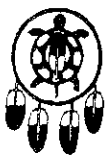

Purpose

The Outstanding Achievement Awards for Voluntarism in Ontario recognize exceptional leadership, innovation and creativity. Each year, 20 awards are given to a select group of individuals, organizations and businesses that have made superlative contributions to the their communities and the province through voluntary action.

These awards highlight the contributions of the 20 recipients and serve to inspire others by the positive examples they provide, regardless of their field of endeavour, such as the promotion of literacy training, human rights or community safety, to name only a few. A separate program, the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards, recognizes the continuous years of dedicated service volunteers generously give in our province.

A third program, the Ontario Medal for Young Volunteers, recognizes the outstanding achievements of 10 young volunteers between the ages of 15 and 24 who have made a difference in their communities.

The government is committed to initiatives, including volunteer recognition, which will help to strengthen voluntarism and improve the quality of life in Ontario's communities. By submitting a nomination, individuals and organizations can help ensure that these outstanding contributions receive the recognition they deserve.

Who is eligible?

The Outstanding Achievement Award for Voluntarism in Ontario are presented to individuals, groups, and businesses that have made lasting and meaningful contributions, or provided significant support, to the volunteer activities of: community and not-for-profit organizations or associations; co-operatives; boards; commissions; businesses; government ministries that directly recruit volunteers; art/ educational/ correctional institutions and schools; municipalities; long term care facilities; and hospitals.

How are the recipients selected?

Nominations are reviewed by a jury of seven to nine individuals from across the province, who represent a variety of disciplines. 20 recipients are selected each year.

When are the awards presented?

The outstanding Achievement Awards for Voluntarism in Ontario will be presented with the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards at ceremonies held across the province beginning in the spring. WHAT IS FATAL VISION?

Fatal Vision Simulator Glasses are a specially designed and manufactured pair of goggles that simulate the visual impairment caused by drugs or alcohol. Viewing through the goggles is rather clear but confusing to the mind. Normal movements are AFFECTED which produces one of the EFFECTS of intoxication. Both the wearer and those observing are convinced that such impairment makes activities with known risks, such as driving vehicles, very dangerous.

HOW DO FATAL VISION GOGGLES WORK?

When Fatal Vision goggles are worn, they allow an individual the opportunity to experience the dangers of impairment from drugs and alcohol without suffering the all-to-real consequences. The Fatal Vision goggles have specially cut lenses that distort visual perception. When wearing them people see things in a distorted view. Once a person has them on, they may be asked to perform task that under non-intoxicated conditions would not seem difficult to complete, but with the distortion of the goggles the tasks become difficult and maybe even impossible. Research shows that those who learn from hands-on experience retain two to four times more than those who learn from just listening and seeing.

WHO USES THEM?

Fatal Vision goggles are manufactured by Innocorp, Ltd. Located in Wisconsin. They were first introduced in 1996 at a Wisconsin Highway Safety conference. Fatal Vision goggles are now being used for instruction around the world. Teachers and instructors of many traffic safety programs, as well as drug awareness programs, use them as teaching aids. Services such as law enforcement officers, driver's education instructors, safety officers, and post secondary institutions are all utilizing the benefits of Fatal Vision.

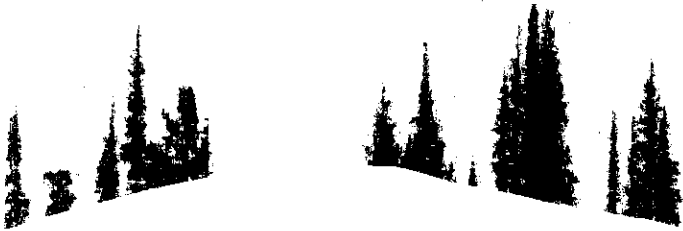

WHY DOESN'T SHE JUST LEAVE?

OFFERING SUPPORT TO THE BATTERED WOMAN

One of the biggest myths about those who suffer in abusive situations is that, if things were really so bad, they would "just leave". The cycle of abuse is such that the abuser generally creates an atmosphere where it can become almost impossible for the battered partner to leave.

HOW DOES THIS HAPPEN?

Part of the insidious nature of domestic abuse is the gradual onset of the situation. Things may start out okay in the relationship, but go downhill in such a way that the abused may not even realize how deeply she is dependent on the abuser until things are very bad - often, not until the onset of physical abuse.

The abuser will use the following tactics to create dependence:

- isolation
- jealousy
- over-protectiveness
- suspicion
- intimidation
- blame
- shame

Over time, the abused woman will begin to believe the things that the abuser tells her - that she is worthless, stupid, unworthy, useless, or unlovable by anyone else but her abuser. She may have quit working under pressure from the abusive partner, and may have given up financial control of her life. She may fear losing custody of children, or fear for their lives, or her own life. She may love her partner and believe that if she sticks with him and continues to love him, he will change. Worst of all, she may have become totally isolated from friends and family who don't understand why she stays, and may feel that she has no-one to turn to, and nowhere to go.

HOW TO OFFER SUPPORT:

- Be a friend. Offer support without judgment.
- Don't criticize the abused woman's decisions - her self-esteem is low enough from her partner without adding extra stress.
- Don't antagonize the abuser - he may laugh off your comments, but take out his anger over what you have said in public or his partner in private.
- Let her know that you are available to listen to her whenever she needs help. If you are able, let her know that she can seek refuge from her abuser. If you aren't able to take her in yourself, research your area's resources - shelters, crisis lines, support lines - and have the information ready when she may need it.
- Let her know that you care, and that, no matter what she thinks, she isn't alone.

15 REASONS TO LEAVE YOUR LOVER: WARNING SIGNS OF AN ABUSIVE PERSONALITY

There are warning signs that a partner may become abusive - violence very seldom occurs out of the blue. Although things may seem to be going along fine, there can be subtle hints that all is not well in your relationship. If you feel that something may be wrong, but you aren't sure just what, consider the following points. If any of them seem familiar, you may be on your way to an abusive relationship. Remember that it's never too early - or too late - to get out and get help.

1. **A PUSH FOR QUICK INVOLVEMENT:** Abusers are often very insecure, and will press for a commitment early in a relationship - often within the first few dates. S/he will say s/he is in love, and wants an exclusive relationship or to marry or move in together right away.
2. **JEALOUSY:** A potential abuser will be very possessive and overly suspicious - demanding to know where you are, who you call, and who you talk to at all times. He or she will show up unexpectedly, call frequently, and if you aren't there whenever s/he wants to see you, will accuse you of seeing other people. Even your family members, close friends, and co-workers may seem like a threat to this kind of person.
3. **CONTROLLING:** Requires you ask 'permission' to see your friends, to go out without him/her, controls your money and finances, transportation. The object is to make you rely on this person for everything.
4. **UNREALISTIC EXPECTATIONS:** Is unreasonable in his/her expectations of you - expects you to be perfect, and is overly critical of mistakes.
5. **ISOLATION:** Pressures you to stop seeing family and friends, may try to stop you from working. May accuse you of caring more about other people than about him/her, thus forcing you to choose between s/he and everyone else in your life.
6. **BLAMES OTHERS FOR PROBLEMS AND MISTAKES:** If anything goes wrong, it is always someone else's problem or fault; s/he will never take responsibility for bad decisions or mistakes.
7. **MAKES EVERYONE ELSE RESPONSIBLE FOR HIS FEELINGS:** An abuser will make statements like "Why do you do that when you know it makes me angry?" or "I'm placing the blame for his anger on you." S/he will say that his/her feelings come from the outside: "You make me angry/happy/sad." Instead of "I feel angry/happy/sad."
8. **HYPERSENSITIVITY:** Will feel a personal slight over things that aren't anyone's fault. Will say s/he is "hurt" when s/he is really angry. May believe that everyone is out to get him.
9. **CRUELTY TO ANIMALS AND TO CHILDREN:** Is brutal with animals - may harm, punish, or kill them. Has unreasonable expectations of children, may tease or yell at them for things that aren't their fault, or over which they have no control (like spanking an infant for dirtying a diaper). Sixty-five percent of abusers who beat their partner will also abuse children - and children who witness this behavior learn by example.
10. **"PLAYFUL" USE OF FORCE DURING SEX:** Will force unwanted or uncomfortable sexual acts, or hold you down during sex against your will. Will only be interested in his/her pleasure and not yours. Male abusers may feel that women shouldn't enjoy sex, because it is 'unladylike'. May fantasize about rape.
11. **VERBAL ABUSE:** Calls you names, criticized your dress, behavior, or mannerisms, teases you, makes fun of you, swears at you, degrades you, humiliates you in front of other people. The abuser may insist that this type of abuse is "all in fun", but will continue to do it and accuse you of being "too sensitive".
12. **RIGID SEX ROLES:** Has specific and old-fashioned ideas about what men and women are expected to do and be - the breadwinner vs. the homemaker. Men may insist that you stop working, going to school, or improving yourself, so that you can stay at home and be the "perfect wife and mother".
13. **SUDDEN MOOD SWINGS:** May fly off the handle without any warning, will be sweet and loving one minute, angry and hurtful or frightening the next.
14. **PAST BATTERING:** May admit to abusing a previous partner, but will place all of the blame on him/her - "S/he made me do it". This is an extremely important warning sign.
15. **THREATS OF VIOLENCE:** Threatens to hurt or kill you; may laugh it off or claim to only be "joking". Threats of physical violence are often the final step before actual physical abuse starts. If you have come this far in a relationship, get out - you are already being abused, and it will probably only get worse from here.

COPING WITH STRESS

Learning to cope with stressful situations is very important, especially to the person with diabetes. Both good or bad stress can cause sugar levels to increase. Some of the things to consider when coping with stress is the following:

- * Coping is having faith
- * Coping is being aware, accepting and adjusting
- * Coping is a matter of balance
- * Coping is changing in a positive way

Finding Balance

Identifying stress isn't enough to reduce its harmful effects, it requires working towards balance. We need to be aware of our emotional and physical reactions and reduce them.

Questions we need to ask ourselves about our stressors

- * Who is involved?
- * Where is it coming from?
- * When does it happen?
- * Why is it stressful?
- * What are we doing that adds to the stress?
- * Can others help us?
- * What can we change?

Coping Techniques

Physical:

- ☺ Go to your doctor for a check-up
- ☺ Eat healthy foods, vegetables, fruit, etc.
- ☺ Drink water, herbal tea
- ☺ Keep physically active, ie) go for walks, bike rides, etc.
- ☺ Take breaks from work or studying
- ☺ Get proper amount of sleep
- ☺ Learn to relax; unplug the phone, take a bubble bath, do fun things
- ☺ Use relaxation techniques, ie) deep breathing, stretching, meditation, massage, chanting
- ☺ Avoid smoking, alcohol, drugs, caffeine



Emotional:

- ☺ Talk to someone, ie) family, friends, Elders, therapists
- ☺ Be good to yourself
- ☺ Express your emotions, such as having a good cry, a good yell or a good laugh
- ☺ Develop a support system, ie) friends, family, etc.
- ☺ Use cooperation instead of confrontation
- ☺ Say NO to extra responsibilities and activities
- ☺ Stop negative self-talk
- ☺ Count to 10 when you are upset

Mental:

- ☺ Plan and organize your time
- ☺ Set priorities and practical goals
- ☺ Make lists, keep an agenda or day planner
- ☺ Delegate responsibilities to others
- ☺ Do one thing at a time
- ☺ Try a new hobby or a sport
- ☺ Get involved in your community
- ☺ Read a book on stress management
- ☺ Visualize the future in positive healing ways
- ☺ Think positive
- ☺ Listen to relaxing music
- ☺ Do journal writing
- ☺ Avoid procrastinating (putting things off until later)
- ☺ Avoid having high expectations of yourself and others

Spiritual: (use Ceremony in our lives:)

- ☺ Pray
- ☺ Smudge with Sweetgrass, Sage, Cedar
- ☺ Attend Sweat Lodge ceremonies, church, Long House
- ☺ Ask a Pipe Carrier to have a Sacred Pipe Ceremony
- ☺ Visit with an Elder or a priest
- ☺ Participate in Healing Circles
- ☺ Drum, sing and/or dance
- ☺ Burn tobacco
- ☺ Create a quiet space for reflection
