# Are you interested in a career in policing?



#### QUINTE MOHAWK SCHOOL WATER TREATMENT SYSTEM UPGRADE

February 2, 2009

Please be advised that the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have now received INAC funding approval in the amount of \$132,662 to proceed with the water supply system upgrade at Quinte Mohawk School.

Initial work commenced following an inspection of the antiquated water treatment system in February '08. (The existing water treatment system was installed in the early 1970s, around the time the school was built.) Significant investigation and preliminary engineering was required to ensure a holistic comprehensive work plan was developed. Engineering activities included site evaluation, 24hr pumping tests, sampling, drinking water system option evaluations, site meetings, research of original system construction, reporting and Engineering Evaluation Report.

Throughout the year, regular conference calls involved participation from several agencies, MBQ and environmental consultants to ensure a collaborative approach to the school's water situation was developed. While this work was underway, as a precautionary measure, bottled water was supplied to the school and daycare, (although regular testing of the water continued to test safe for consumption.) We are happy to report that the band received reimbursement from Indian and Northern Affairs totaling \$8,179 for the bottled water expenses.

As a follow up to the environmental engineering study, the following work will now commence.

- 1. Installation and commission of four (4) Homespring Ultra Filtration units.
- Installation of two (2) submersible pumps with controllers, new pressure tanks, isolate and relocate floor drainage piping from cisterns, removal of all non functional equipment, seal cistern, includes all required plumbing and electrical.
- 3. Well improvements extend casing to above 0.6m above grade. XCG stated "... in their opinion the proposed drinking water system, which includes prefiltration, ultrafiltration via *Homespring* units, and continuous turbidity monitoring, meets the requirements of Ontario Regulation 170/03."
- 4. Remote phone call unit for turbidity meter monitoring.

Final invoices will be submitted upon completion of the work. XCG, the band's environmental consultant, will continue to oversee the installation of the new equipment and repairs. It is anticipated the work will be completed by the end of March Break 2009.

Tyendinaga Mohawk Council would like to thank all the agencies that assisted in finalizing the work plan in an effort to address our concerns with the Quinte Mohawk School water supply.

#### An Overview of FNTI

FNTI (First Nations Technical Institute), an Aboriginal owned and controlled post-secondary institute, was created in 1985 through innovative and dynamic partnerships between the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, FNTI Board of Directors, Indian and Northern Affairs Canada and the Ontario Ministry of Education & Training. We deliver post-secondary programs approved by the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

Currently there are over 300 post-secondary students and adult learners from across the country enrolled in capacity building programs at FNTI and over FNTI's history there have been over 2000 successful graduates from a variety of certificate, diploma and degree programs.

- In August 2008, FNTI celebrated its 23<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of providing quality educational programs to Aboriginal people across Canada.
- FNTI is the longest standing Aboriginal post-secondary institution in Ontario.
- Aboriginally owned and operated, and directed to wholistic learning opportunities for Aboriginal people, FNTI embodies the concept of life-long learning.
- FNTI facilitates Aboriginal student recruitment to postsecondary education through education programs offered at the elementary and secondary level.
- FNTI's success is rooted in its unique culturally-driven delivery style and learner-focused environment.
- FNTI has contributed to First Nation community capacity building through the advancement of its communitybased best practices in learning education model.<sup>1</sup>

- FNTI is a model of success for post-secondary education in Ontario boasting a 90 percent graduate employment rate.
- Other post-secondary institutions in Ontario, Canada, and globally, have adapted FNTI's approach to learning while developing their programs.
- Since its inception, FNTI has forged several educational partnerships with other colleges and universities, primarily in Ontario, but also in Saskatchewan.
- International educational partnerships have been forged with Indigenous peoples of Chile, Ecuador, Nunavut and South Africa utilizing FNTI's highly recognized PLA experience and techniques.
- FNTI is the second largest employer on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.
- Locally, FNTI provides over 60 jobs in the Quinte area, resulting in an estimated \$6-million contribution to the local economy.
- FNTI has forged numerous governmental, corporate and industry training partnerships over its 22-year history, and is a pioneer of the concept of public-private partnerships.
- Current examples of industry partnerships include Trillium Wind Power, Waste Management and the Strategic Alliance of Broadcasters for Aboriginal Reflection.
- FNT1 has undoubtedly contributed significantly to an increase in post-secondary graduation rates of Aboriginal people in Ontario<sup>2</sup> with over 2000 graduates, half of this number within the last six years, attesting to the Institute's growth and success.

#### A Mohawk Law to Recognize FNTI

Until 1951, First Nations people could only attend university if they enfranchised. Enfranchisement meant giving up one's identity as a First Nations person in Canadian law. In the mid-1960's there were only two hundred First Nations people enrolled in a college or university in Canada.

In 1985 the people of Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory had the inspiration and vision to establish FNTI, a First Nations owned and controlled post-secondary institution and the first of its kind in Ontario. FNTI has built a strong track record of success with over 2000 graduates in its history. FNTI is known as a leader in the field of community based education and prior learning assessment, and providing culturally based programs grounded in Indigenous knowledge.

Neither the federal government nor the government of Ontario have taken steps to fully include FNTI in the family circle of recognized colleges and universities. It is taking them awhile to catch up to the good things that are happening in First Nations country.

This draft Mohawk Law proposes to recognize FNTI as a degree and diploma granting institute, just as colleges and universities are recognized by provincial and federal laws. It will be the first law of its kind in Ontario.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte require that a community meeting take place to review the proposed law prior to its adoption. Look for an announcement of the specific date and place for a community meeting in January 2009.

Sidebar 2: Enfranchisement and Post-secondary education

"The first reference to enfranchising Indians (which meant giving up Indian status) who obtained a university degree, a reflection of official beliefs that possessing higher education gave one a type of independence such that he need no longer remain an Indian, appeared in Canadian legislation in section 86(1) of the 1876 Indian Act:

Any Indian who may be admitted to the degree of Doctor of Medicine, or to any other degree by any University of Learning, or who may be admitted in any Province of the Dominion to practice law either as an Advocate or as a Barrister or Counselor or Solicitor or Attorney or to be a Notary Public, or who may enter Holy Orders or who may be licensed by any denomination of Christians as a Minister of the Gospel, shall ipso facto become and be enfranchised under this Act.

This clause reappeared as section 99(1) in the 1880 Indian Act, section 86 in the 1886 Indian Act and section 111 in the 1906 Indian Act. The clause remained until the 1927 Indian Act when it was replaced by another clause that, although it did not specifically refer to universities, was actually broader in scope. That clause allowed the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs to appoint a board "to make enquiry and report as to the fitness of any Indian or Indians to be enfranchised, and such report shall have the same force and effect and shall be dealt with in the same manner as if the same had been made upon the application of an Indian or Indians under this section. The above clause confirmed the continuing agenda of Indian Affairs to coerce Indians to enfranchise."

A MOHAWK LAW TO CONFER UPON FIRST NATIONS TECHNICAL INSTITUTE THE POWER TO GRANT CERTIFICATES, DIPLOMAS, DEGREES, HONORARY DEGREES, AND GRADUATE DEGREES

WHEREAS the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Council have the inherent, Aboriginal, and Treaty right to establish education insitutions and systems, and this right is recognized and affirmed by Section 35 of the Constitution of Canada.

AND WHEREAS Article 13 of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, adoped by the UN General Assembly on September 13, 2007, affirms that "Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons," and further declares that "... States shall take effective measures to ensure that this right is protected...".

AND WHEREAS Article 14 of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples affirms that "Indigenous peoples have the right to establish and control their educational systems and institutions providing education in their own languages, in a manner appropriate to their cultural methods of teaching and learning" and further declares that "States shall, in conjunction with indigenous peoples, take effective measures,

in order for indigenous individuals...to an education in their own culture and provided in their own language."

AND WHEREAS "First Nations Technical Institute", also referred to herein as "FNTI", is a non-profit corporation under the Canada Corporations Act – Part II functioning as a lifelong learning institute based in Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

AND WHEREAS FNTI initiatives are carried out in Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory, throughout Canada, and elsewhere.

AND WHEREAS FNTI delivers programs in the province of Ontario which are approved by the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

AND WHEREAS the objects of FNTI include the provision of training, education and skills in the field of technology and other vocations and disciplines to Aboriginal people and others.

AND WHEREAS FNTI represents Aboriginal diversity within the Ontario post-secondary education community.

AND WHEREAS the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Council wishes to sanction and promote the design, development and provision of all manner of post-secondary education, training and lifelong learning opportunities, including applied knowledge and research, for Aboriginal people which strengthens Aboriginal identities, languages, and intellectual traditions, and meets the education, economic, social, and cultural needs of Aboriginal communities and nations.

AND WHEREAS the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Council consider it to be expedient and necessary to confer upon FNTI as a lifelong learning institute the power to confer degrees, graduate degrees, honorary degrees, certificates and diplomas in any and all branches of learning.

NOW THEREFORE the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Council hereby makes the following law:

#### 1. SHORT TITLE

1.1 This by-law may be cited as the "FNTI Charter".

#### 2. DEFINITIONS:

#### 2.1 In this law,

"First Nations Technical Institute", also referred to herein as "FNTI", means the non-profit corporation incorporated under the Canada Corporations Act — Part II functioning as a lifelong learning institute based in Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

#### 3. SPECIAL MISSION

3.1 It is the special mission of FNTI to design, develop and otherwise provide all manner of post-secondary education, training and lifelong learning opportunities, including applied knowledge and research, for Aboriginal people which strengthens Aboriginal identities, languages, and intellectual traditions, and meets the education, economic, social, and cultural needs of Aboriginal communities and nations.

- 4. POWERS DEGREES, EYC.
- FNTI may confer degrees, graduate degrees, honorary degrees, certificates and diplomas in any and all branches of learning.
- 4.2 FNTI has all the powers necessary and incidental to this grant of authority.
- FNTI may contract, affiliate or federate with other universities, colleges, research institutions and institutions of learning.
- 5. EQUITY WITH OTHER INSTITUTIONS DELIVERING POST-SECONDARY PROGRAMS
- 5.1 FNTI shall be eligible to access all funding resources generally provided to degree and diploma granting postsecondary institutions in Canada and Ontario.

#### \*BOIL WATER REMINDER\*

As a reminder, in February 2008 Health Canada recommended the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council place a precautionary boil water advisory on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

Should your bacteriological water sample indicate a safe or adverse result please ensure the water is boiled or disinfected and filtered. The water sample may contain water borne parasites such as Giardia or Cryptosporidium without proper filtration. Please do not consume or serve the water to the public.

For information on obtaining a water treatment system for your household, business or service building please contact a licensed plumber as each water supply varies. Ensure your plumber is aware that you must have filtration for water borne parasites.

# How to use water safely during a "boil water advisory"

This fact sheet provides basic information only. It must not take the place of medical advice, diagnosis or treatment. Always with to a healthcare professional about any health concerns you have, and before you make any changes to your diet. Effestyle or freatment.

What are the reasons for a "boil water advisory"?

There are different reasons for issuing a boil water advisory.

- A boil water advisory is based on information other than bacteriological examination indicating that the water in not safe to drink (e.g., the lack or absence of disinfection residual in the drinking water.)
- A boil water advisory may be based on bacteriological (microbial) examination, including the finding of bacteria or parasites.
- A boil water advisory may follow the occurrence of an outbreak of illness in the community that has been linked to consumption of the water.

The extent of restriction on water use depends on the situation and the reason for issuing a boil water advisory. Always follow your own health unit's recommendations on water use.

General recommendations on how to use the water if a boil water advisory has been issued in your community.

How do I use water when the boil water advisory has been issued?

The water should NOT be used for drinking, making infant formula and juices. cooking, making ice, washing fruits, vegetables or brushing teeth. For these purposes, boiled water or bottled water should be used. The water should be brought to a rapid rolling boil and boiled for 1 minute. If there are children in the home, place the pot on the back burner to avoid scalds. Boil only as much water in a pot as you can comfortably lift without spilling. Discard all ice made previously and disinfect the ice cube trays. Make ice using boiled, cooled water.

#### Can I take a bath?

Adults and icens may shower with untreated water as long as no water is swallowed. Older children could also be given a shower with a hand held showerhead, avoiding the face. Younger children should be sponge-bathed instead of bathing in a tub because they are likely to swallow tub water.

Can I use the water for handwashing?

If the boil water advisory has been issued as a precaution and there is no outbreak of human illness, there is no need for additional hand disinfection with bleach solution or alcohol using the measures described below.

If the boil water advisory has been issued because of an outbreak, water can be used for handwashing after the following emergency water treatment: Place 1 5 oz (about 45 ml) liquid household bleach in 10 gallons (45 litres) water. Mix and let stand for at least 10 minutes prior to use.

How else can I disinfect my hands?

You can use alcohol-based hand disinfectants, containing more than 60% alcohol. These products are widely used in the health care setting after washing hands or in situations when water is not available. Please refer to information on "Hand Hygiene". The wet wipes used for cleaning babies at disper change are not effective for disinfecting hands and should not be used for this purpose.

My child was ill with diarrhea, Should I clean/disinfect toys?

Yes, toys should be cleaned and disinfected. If the toys are visibly soiled, wash them first with soap and water and then disinfect with a freshly prepared bleach solution (1/4 cup (about 60 ml) bleach in to 1 gallon (4.5 litres)

of water). Dip toys in to this solution and airdry them. Cloth and plush toys could be washed or dry-cleaned.

I have a dishwasher. Is it safe to use?

If your dishwasher has a hot setting, it safely disinfects dishes. If your dishwasher does not have a hot setting, after finishing the cycle, soak dishes for 1 minute in a solution of 10z (30 ml) of bleach mixed with 3 gallons of lukewarm water (13.5 litres). Let dishes air dry.

I wash dishes by hand. How do I disinfect them?

You could use boiled water for washing dishes. Dishes washed in soap and hot water can also be rinsed in boiled water or disinfected with the following bleach solution. Mix 1 oz. (about 30 ml) bleach in to 3 gallons (13.5 litres) of water at room temperature for at least 1 minute. Let dishes air dry.

What is disinfection?

Disinfection is a cleaning process which destroys most disease-causing microorganisms (pathogens).

How do I disinfect countertops, chopping baards or utensils which have come into contact with raw meat?

Countertops, chopping boards or utensils which have come into contact with raw meat should be washed with soap and hot water first, then disinfected with a bleach solution stronger than that used for emergency hand disinfection. Mix 1/4 cup (about 60 ml) bleach in to 1 gallon (4.5 fitres) water for this purpose. Do not reuse or store this solution, but make it fresh daily.

Should I change the way I am doing tanndry?

No. continue doing laundry the way you usually do. If you have to launder sheets heavily soiled with facces, carefully remove soil before you place the sheets into the washer, without much agitation of the cloth. Use rubber gloves when handling heavily soiled sheets.

Is the water safe to fill wading pools for children?

No, the water is not safe to use in wading pools. Water usually gets into the mouths of small children, providing a possibility for infection.

I have a water filtration device installed. Does this make the water safe for drinking or cooking?

No. Filtered water should also be brought to a rolling boil for 1 minute before drinking or using it for cooking.

My doctor told me I am immunocompromised. What should I do?

Always follow your physician's and dietitian's advice. You might be advised to use bottled water or to boil water for drinking/cooking, even in the absence of a boil-water advisory.

What should I do after the boil water advisory is lifted?

- Run cold water fancets for 1 minute before using the water.
- Run drinking fountsins for 1 minute before using the water.

- Flush all garden hoses by running cold water through them for 1 minute.
- Run water softeners through a regeneration cycle.
- Drain and refill hot water heaters set below 45°C (normal setting is 60°C).



# INFORMATION SHEET TO APPLICATION CENTRES, CHIEFS AND COUNCILS

Throughout the SCIS deployment, INAC will supply new workstation equipment to each Application Centre location which has internet connectivity. This equipment will include a computer, a scanner digital carnera, signature pad, backdrop and magnetic swipe reader.

#### Mail-In Applications

A SCIS will be approved for processing via the mail only under exceptional circumstances such as for those applicants who:

- Are bed-ridden with illness and completely unable to attend in person or have a MAC team member artend at their home; or
- Require a SCIS for imminent US border-crossing purposes but live in remote locations without IRAs and no ability to access a MAC team as required.

#### B) Mobile Application Centres (MAC)

Prior to the National Print Centre (NPC) rollout, a National MAC Team will be deployed from HQ to border communities and First Nation community events in order to proceed with a SCIS Pre-Application Processing for future card delivery to the applicants. Bands will be asked to provide assistance by supplying local First Nations security officials to be on site throughout this SCIS application process.

Following initial deployment, Regional INAC offices will be equipped with MAC units for regular use in processing SCIS applications in remote locations without IRS web access or locations without IRAs.

#### C) The National Print Centre (NPC)

The NPC will:

- receive print notification files from all Application Centres;
- produce the SCIS; and
- ship the cards via Xpresspost<sup>TM</sup>, directly to the applicants or to the Application Centres for
  activation and distribution to the applicants. Xpresspost<sup>TM</sup> deliveries will require a signature at
  time of receipt to confirm delivery.

#### IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

Implementation of the SCIS will occur early in 2009. The first priority will be to establish and train the personnel at INAC Offices and set up the National MAC Team with Mobile Applications Centres so that issuance of the SCIS can begin as soon as possible in as many regions and locations as possible.

Rollout will initially focus on INAC offices and First Nation communities located close to the U.S. border. Subsequently, rollout will proceed in FN locations that have internet connectivity.

It is important to note that all earlier versions of the CIS will remain valid for the five (5) year period stated on the individual's card. There is no need to renew a card until six (6) months prior to the expiry date of the old card unless the holder requires a new SCIS for border-crossing or other urgent purposes.

#### BACKGROUND

The Certificate of Indian Status (CIS), commonly referred to as a status card or treaty card, is an identity document issued by Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) to confirm that the cardholder is registered as an Indian under the Indian Act. An individual who is registered under the Indian Act is eligible to apply and receive a status card.

The existing status card, currently in the form of a simple laminated paper card, has few security features and can be easily altered, forged or counterfeited for fraudulent purposes. This has caused problems for some Status Indians in accessing benefits.

Since 2002, INAC has been testing the web-based card issuance application, printing equipment and issuing "Pilot" status cards in Alberta and in Gatineau, Quebec. This pilot status card includes some anni-fraud elements and has been considered to be a success with about 85,000 pilot status cards issued to date.

#### PURPOSE


The goal of the new Secure Certificate of Indian Status (SCIS) is to replace the current card with a card that incorporates the security features of a modern identification document to address issues of stolen identity and fraud.

The new SCIS will meet federal and international identity assurance standards that significantly reduce the risk of unauthorized alterations or duplication. This helps to ensure the ongoing integrity of the programs and services by protecting them from incidences of fraud and identity theft. Cardholders will have easier access to the services and benefits for which they are eligible to receive since service providers will have renewed confidence knowing these cards are legitimate.

It is important to note that applicants need not apply before their regular renewal date unless the card is required immediately for use in crossing the Canada-US border. Applicants should however begin the process of seeking their original birth documents in advance of applying for their SCIS. INAC will request that service providers continue to accept the existing CIS versions throughout the SCIS deployment period.



#### Watershed First Aid

- Scoop the poop from your pets and dispose of it properly before it is carried untreated into storm drains.
- When water flows over surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, roads, and lawns, it collects debris, chemicals, and other pollutants before entering a storm sewer. Anything entering a storm sewer system is usually discharged untreated into freshwater systems ... reservoirs, lakes, rivers, or wetlands.
- Make use of municipal waste disposal facilities instead of using the drain.





- Many garborators use more than a glass of water per second.
- Faucet aerators mix water and air and reduce the volume of water by almost one half.
- Each dishwasher cycle uses between 20 and 50 litres of water.
- A continuous flow from a kitchen tap may use 4 to 5 litres of water per minute.




#### Lost in The Wash

- Next to the toilet, washing machines use the most water in the average home.
- Operate only full loads of washing to conserve water. Each load cancelled can save from 100 to 170 litres of water.
- Use laundry products sparingly. They can reduce the surface tension of fresh water, making it impossible for some surface dwelling insects to survive.
- Ample presoaking time often allows water to work its magic as a solvent.





- A shower generally uses less water than a bath.
- Save as much as 4 litres per minute by turning off the water when brushing your teeth.
- Placing a toilet dam (sealed plastic bottle filled with sand or water) in your toilet tank can save an average family over 45,000 litres of water per year.
- A dripping faucet could allow as much as 50 to 75 litres a day to go down the drain.
- Avoid using the toilet as a garbage can. A toilet can use up to 15 litres of water per flush.

#### **NEXT WAVE**

Next Wave — a cultural and arts learning exchange between Mariposa In The Schools storytellers and musicians and up to thirteen First Nation communities including young fiddlers of the Metis Artist Collective. Next Wave involves nine artists from Toronto and First Nations communities in a cultural and learning exchange of oral and music performing arts including storytelling, songwriting, puppetry and fiddling. Up to thirteen First Nations library communities will participate in this unique arts program that takes place in schools and libraries. Each visit involves hands on music, storytelling and puppetry workshops and culminates into a final performance, and in some cases, a community dance.

MITS is collaborating with First Nations Public Library Consultant Patti Lawlor who will be supporting libraries in their planning for the artist visits and will accompany the artists on all four tours. A critical piece of this cultural learning exchange is the visit of Anne Lederman and two of six Metis youth fiddlers who have been mentored by Anne and several elder Metis fiddlers. Metis fiddling (influenced by the fur traders of Irish/Scottish descent) is historically a male art form. Elder fiddlers speak of learning the fiddle at an early age, often from their fathers and uncles. These elders are now passing on this unique art form to both male and female youth. We wish to support the SOLS/OLS-N in showcasing these young talents to other boys and girls in FN communities inspiring them to develop an interest in this unique fiddle style.

With the generous funding support from the Canadian Race Relations Foundation's Initiatives Against Racism Program, Next Wave's will begin on February 13, in celebration of First Nations Library Week where the Kanhiote Tyendinaga Territory Library will host an evening community social dance. The dance features Anne Lederman and Metis youth fiddler, Alicia Blore accompanied by Tom Leighton along with caller, Bill Russell. However the day will start with Alicia Blore, the 15 year old member of the Metis Youth/Elder Fiddler Legacy Project will perform a variety of Metis fiddle tunes along with Anne Lederman for the students of Quinte Mohawk School. Following the performance, grade 5 and 6 students will take part in social dance workshops with caller Bill Russell, along with musicians Anne Lederman, Tom Leighton and Alicia Blore.

#### The Performers

#### ANNE LEDERMAN

Anne is a fiddler extraordinaire, singer of songs old and new, composer, improviser and multi-instrumentalist who revitalizes old traditions, embraces new ones, and creates music that brings it all together. Anne performs solo, as a duo with Tom Leighton on piano/accordion or Ian Bell on guitar/button accordion, harmonica, as the Fiddlesong Trio with Tom and Debashis Sinha/percussion, or Quintet with Tom, Debashis, Ian and Laura Cesar/bass. Anne is also a member of LOKA and Njacko Backo's KALIMBA KALIMBA! Anne sings in several languages and plays mandolin, piano, bones, feet, jawharp and more. Anne is involved in two very special projects. One is a research project for the Canadian Museum of Civilization on Aboriginal Fiddling in the North that took her to Old Crow in the Yukon and the Northwest Territories for a month last summer and again this coming August to interview, film and record fiddle elders. Anne's other project is the Metis Artist Collective's Elder Youth legacy Project: Fiddle Stories that forms the basis of our tour. Anne is also an important link to the older styles of fiddling in Manitoba and has taught several of the youth involved in the group. Having learned from elder fiddlers in Manitoba in the 1980s, she is now the only link to certain older Manitoba repertoires and will be passing some of that material on to the group. Our plans are to send some of these wonderful young players out to teach in other Aboriginal communities over the next few years, thereby assuring that these wonderful and unique Canadian fiddle traditions live on into the future.

#### **ALICIA BLORE**

15-year old Alicia has roots in Ste. Rose Manitoba where her great grandfather, Phillip Zastre was a well-known Metis fiddler. She has been studying fiddle since she was 9 with Matthew Johnston, Mark Sullivan and Anne Lederman, as well as competing in contests and attending camps such as Orangeville, the Grand Masters, the John Arcand Fiddle Fest and the Sturgeon Falls competition and camp.

#### BILL RUSSELL

Warm, informal and fun, Bill is known for his ability to get his audience involved and participating. A full-time performer since 1970, Bill has played in schools, libraries, festivals and folk clubs, as well as appearing on radio and television. Much of his music is drawn from the Cajun traditions of his native Louisiana and his audiences easily make the connections among the many French traditions of North America.

#### About Mariposa In The Schools

Mariposa In The Schools introduces young people to world traditions in the performing arts by offering a diverse program of world and folk music, puppetry, dance and spoken work, all delivered by a roster of professional Canadian artists committed to sharing the value of cross-cultural understanding and intergenerational continuity through their art. Common to all these art forms is an oral history where communities have told stories and have passed them on from generation to generation – also a tradition of our First Nations friends. This project is more a cultural exchange rather than a conventional tour. Toronto artists of diverse world heritage share their oral and musical stories with those First Nations and vice versa. This is our common link around a theme of community celebration. Mariposa in The Schools (MITS) began in 1969 as a community arts organization dedicated to introducing Ontario children to Canadian and American folk music performed by professional musicians. As Canada and her cultures have evolved over the last 39 years and opportunities have grown for remarkable new world artists to call Canada their home, MITS has broadened its vision to incorporate the traditional performing arts of the African and Asian Diaspora into our program roster. MITS artists are multi-lingual Canadians descended from Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Europe, North America including Francophone Ontario and our First Nations. MITS believes in providing opportunities for students to link the stories and traditions of world cultures (past and present) to the relevant issues of Canadian life today.

#### What is Emotional Abuse?

One of the most common ways an abusive partner is able to gain control over women is often through emotional abuse. Many women assume that if they're not being physically abused by their partner, then they're not being abused. They may find themselves to be in a relationship that is draining something from them. They might not have recognized that their partner has eroded their self-esteem and happiness through emotional abuse. Emotional abuse is any kind of abuse that is emotional rather than physical in nature. It can include anything from verbal abuse and constant criticism to more subtle tactics, such as repeated disapproval or even the refusal to ever be pleased.

#### Common elements of Emotional Abuse:

- A partner might control the finances, make plans for her, or not tell her what his plans are until the last minute. He may talk about to others behind her back, to isolate her from them.
- A partner might have insist she stop certain social, hobby, or work activities. She might have gotten moved to a new location, farther away from her family and friends. Or she may have been asked (or told) to reduce or stop contact with specific supportive people in her life.
- · The partner trains to her behave in ways that he wants her to behave. He gradually makes her feel differently about herself, and erodes her confidence.

It is hard to determine just how common this type of abuse is in relationships simply because many women do not repot its existence. However, Statistics Canada completed a study showing more women experience emotional abuse than physical violence. 35% of all women who are or have been in married or common-law relationships have experienced some type of emotional abuse. In comparison, 29% of women have been physically assaulted by their male partners. Emotional Abuse leaves the abused partner with a sense of powerlessness, fear and dependency, growing stronger over time. Unfortunately, the end result is self-worth is simply withered away through repetition of the abuse.

YOGA to the Tyendinaga Newsletter

A lot of articles written lately on keeping up your New Years' resolutions recommend doing yoga. In the close to 20 years I've been teaching it, yoga keeps growing more popular. Hardly surprising. It is a gentle art, requiring no technology or expensive equipmeent. There are many, affordable classes. Some people are discouraged from starting, afraid they're not flexible enough to turn themselves into

Some people are discouraged from starting, afraid they're not flexible enough to turn themselves into pretzels. This is an unfounded fear. When practising for some years many people get back their youthful flexibility, but it's amazing how quickly movement becomes easier even in the short term. People often say they feel taller. If you go to a yoga class once a week it feels like a good workout with the occasional twinge the next day. For him or her (and there are more hims in classes these days) who practise at home sometimes between classes, feeling more flexible is one reward. Stress reduction is another. Through easy breath awareness exercises, often as simple as deeply inhalling and exhalling while moving, or accompanying yoga exercises, we get increased oxygen, calmness, and reduced tension. This continues in our daity awareness and movements, bringing calm to tense situations. Muscle relaxation exercises help throughout the day to bring awareness and conscious realignment, release of contracted muscles, and relief from insomnia.

Lots of yoga DVDs and websites are now available. No longer need to be bored by a single routine. There are codies to choose from, many sites have mini videos to guide your workout. A good starting place is www.aboutyoga.com

There are also many classes available locally. It's no longer necessary to go to Kingston or Belleville. Tyendinaga, Napanee and area have several good teachers and some great studios. Teachers may be long term self-taught practitioners, or certified graduates of 200-400 hour yoga teacher training programs.

RIGHT NOW THERE'S A YOGA CLASS AT THE CANTEEN AT 1935 YORK ROAD FOR \$5 ON TUESDAYS FROM 5-6 (sponsored by the MBQ recreation department and pay as you go, don't need to register, just show up). There are 3 more classes left, to be held on Jan 27. Feb 3 amd Feb 10. Filling out an evaluation form after class enters you into a draw for weekly PRIZES such as THAI YOGA MASSAGE and FITNESS CENTER COUPONS.

Increased strength is another benefit of regular yoga workout. Flexibillity and strength bring physical toning. Meditation helps slow down mind chatter. Yoga is actually an ancient healing art, and is known in today's scientific world to prevent disease, boost the immune system, and help reduce symptoms. In fact, many doctors recommend this gentle exercise. It may help avoid knee or hip replacement surgery. When in doubt, ask your doctor before starting any new exercise. For me, yoga brought relief from chronic backache. It can help tremendously for those working long hours at computers. Little mini stretches learned in class can bring welcome relief at work.

Today's yoga classes are more varied than ever. Some teachers follow a similar weekly routine, others' classes are highly varied, even introducing other movement forms, such as dance or t'ai chi, a fusion of sorts. Some have vigorous workout, including pilates or ashtanga (power yoga). Others have gentle flows. There are many possibilities scheduled at different times to meet your individual needs.

One exciling fun-filled new program is Laughing Yoga. Yes, you guessed it! An hour of silliness and gentle stretching-translates to an increased awareness and appreciation of laughter, spilling over into daily life. The Indian doctor who developed this class says that one minute of laughter benefits your heart and lungs the same way that 6-10 minutes on the treadmill does. Don't believe it? Check out Laughter Yoga on the internet. Then sample a class scheduled in Napanee Saturday, February 7th at 11-12, and Monday February 9th 6:30-7:30 at the Wild Orchid Health and Wellness Centre, corner Centre and Thomas. Keeping Journals

Journals are a great way to keep on track with a fitness program. They keep you accountable to your goals and yourself. Journals serve as a recorded measure of you success, setback and progress.

#### Workout Journals

Workout journals help you plan your workout in advance. Check to see if you have any prior obligation or appointments and schedule you workouts around them. Once you have days and times planned out, write down what you are going to do on those days. After each workout write in your journal how it went, your feelings and your energy level. If something comes up don't worry, just schedule you workout for the next day, or use the day you missed as an 'off' day.

#### Food Journals

Food journals are logs that you record exactly what you put in your mouth and when. They keep you accountable for your food intake and high light patterns of emotional eating, indicate missing or excessive food groups and help you build a healthier eating plan. Keep a journal for one week and at the end of the week add up your calorie intake. You will be able to see where you can start cutting out extras, and have a good handle on what you need to do to lose weight. Expecting to eat perfect every single day is not realistic, but don't let it completely ruin your day. Try and eat clean the rest of the day and try and stay on track the next day.
