### TYENDINAGA MOHAWK COUNCIL

January 14, 1994

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council today announced that it had succeeded in defending a court challenge to its jurisdiction. On January 12, 1994. Madam Justice Helen MacLeod of the Ontario Court (General Division) ruled that the provincial Landlord and Tenant Act did not apply to tenancies between Council and members of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Nation. A member of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Nation, Harold Brant, had sought an order from the Court that would have made his rental agreement with Council subject to provincial law.

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council relied on the Simcoe Deed of 1793, also known as Treaty 3½, as well as common law principles and the *Indian Act* in arguing that the right to occupy housing on the Territory was a matter within the jurisdiction of Council, and was not subject to provincial law.

In my view the Landlord and Tenant Act does not apply to Indian Reserve Lands and therefore the common law applies.

Order to go that Mr. Brant have until January 31, 1994 to sign a lease with the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, being the same terms and conditions as the lease presented to him on October 1, 1993, failing which the Council shall be entitled to possession of the premises effective March 1, 1994.

The rent cheques for 4 months are delivered to the applicant who acknowledges their receipt.

### services terminated

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council will be scheduling a public meeting shortly to answer concerns of band members concerning the termination of Ken Crowe as office manager for the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

Crowe determined that it was in the best interest of the band to terminate his services as manager.


An investigation had begun in November of last year to deal with a number of complaints from band employees concerning some practices at the band office.

One key report dealt with slightly over \$1 million missing from the housing budget over a two-year period.

Council received lengthy written submissions from Crowe with respect to the report prepared by the band's auditors, Wilkinson and Company, in order to comply with the requirements of procedural fairness.

Please be advised that we have reviewed the article printed in the Napanee Beaver on January 10th concerning "Office Manager Services Terminated". We note in the fourth paragraph that there is a statement to the effect that "One key report dealt with slightly over \$1 million missing from the housing budget over a two-year period".

We would like to assure both Council and the public that, while our review included the housing budget, there was no reference in the report to any shortfall in the neighbourhood of \$1 million. This is an entirely fallacious statement and I have been advised by the partners and staff of this firm that no such statement was ever made to the Napanee Beaver or to any other media outlet.

Dear Chief Hill:

Thank you for your letter of November 8th, 1993, in which you expressed concern over members of my department conducting manoeuvres in the hamlet of Shannonville on November 3rd, 1993, without the prior approval or sanction of your community.

It has been determined that the individuals in question were students and staff from the Canadian Land Force Command and Staff College at Kingston. I understand that they departed when asked to do so by members of your band.

The Staff College is aware of the sensitivities associated with the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory. For this reason, it has explicit instructions which prohibit exercising in that area. The group was, therefore, in error when they stopped at the Shannonville bridge. Steps have been taken to prevent a recurrence.

Please be assured that no harm was intended by the actions of the group. May I join the students and staff of the Canadian Land Force Command and Staff College in apologizing to you and the members of the Tyendinaga Mohawks for any concern or inconvenience caused by this incident.

Once again, thank you for your letter and for bringing this matter to my attention.

### TAX EXEMPTION FOR EMPLOYMENT INCOME

### BACKGROUND

This bulletin will provide an update on the recent legal and political developments regarding tax exemption and employment income in relation to Section 87 of the Indian Act.

After the Nowegijick case in 1983 section 87 of the Indian Actowas employment income of a status Indian person was exempt from income tax if the employer was located on reserve, regardless of where the work was actually done.

The basis of the Williams case in 1992 was to extend the tax exemption to include income from Unemployment Insurance (UIC) benefits where the original employment income was tax exempt.

In December of 1992 Revenue Canada put an entirely different interpretation on the decision. The location of the employer was no longer the prime consideration. The onus would now be placed on the

individual to meet the "connecting factors test". This meant that each case would be individually reviewed and an officer from Revenue Canada would determine if there were sufficient "connecting factors" to link an individual with a reserve for the purposes of tax exemption.

Revenue Canada determined that it Car interpreted to mean that the relevant connecting factors would location of work, the include: residence of the employee and the residence of the employer. The new of the interpretation was to take effect on January 1, 1994.

> Revenue Canada undertook to issue draft guidelines based on their interpretation of the Williams case early in 1993, however, they were not issued until December 15, 1993.

Prior to the federal election Mr. Chretien went on record as disagreeing Canada the Revenue interpretation of the Williams case. Mr. Chretien was also critical of the Revenue Canada failure to properly consult with First Nations, not only in

relation to the development of the guidelines, but also on a broad range of taxation issues.

In early December the Assembly of First Nations arranged a meeting with Revenue Canada Minister David Anderson. During the meeting several facts emerged:

- the Minister accepts the premise that the <u>Williams</u> connecting factors test re-interprets the Nowegijick case.
- Revenue Canada still intends to issue draft guidelines based on the Williams case.
- discussions, NOT CONSULTATIONS OR NEGOTIATIONS, would take place with AFN but the final decision would rest solely with the federal government.
- the moratorium for the application of the "connecting factors" test would be extended to January 1, 1995.

### CURRENT

On December 15, 1993, the draft guidelines based on the Revenue Canada interpretation of the Williams case were released. Status Indians living and working on reserve, or working for non-profit First Nation organizations that serve on-reserve

populations will feel little or no change when the guidelines come into effect. The guidelines target First Nation citizens living and working off-reserve, particularly individuals employed through First Nation employee-leasing companies. The guidelines are a blatant attempt to reverse the positive aspects of the Nowegijick case and to treat First Nations citizens differently depending on where they live.

### WHAT'S NEXT

Revenue Canada has designated the end of March or early April as a "consultation" period to receive comments from First Nations specific to the draft guidelines. Revenue Canada will then develop a final set of guidelines that will come into effect in January of 1995.

The draft guidelines will be redrafted by Revenue Canada as a result of the representations made by First Nations.

Attempts are being made to secure funding for the purposes of consultation, however there is no guarantee that funding will be forthcoming. THIS HAS RESULTED IN NO FORMAL PROCESS BEING ESTABLISHED TO DEAL WITH THE GUIDELINES.

3. Ensure that your Grand Chief and your PTO are informed of activity that you have undertaken in order that they can continue to effectively advocate on your behalf.

### REMINDER

Dealing with the immediate question of Income Tax exemptions is only the short-term objective. The Planning and Priorities
Committee are continuing to devise a strategy to deal with the long-term objective of the enforcement of the full right to tax immunity for the citizens of First Nations.

LONG-AWAITED WOMEN'S INTERIM HOUSING OPENS ITS DOORS

NAPANEE, ONTARIO, JANUARY 28, 1994 - Women in need of longer term support from family violence will now have a place to call home. Sponsored by the Lennox and Addington Interval House, Bridge-It Housing for Women prepares to open its doors with an official opening ceremony on January 31 at 4:00 p.m.

Celebrations will take place at 53-55 Bridge Street and will include a tour of the apartments. An open house will follow the opening ceremonies until 7:00 p.m.

Larry McCormick, MP for Hastings, Frontenac, Lennox and Addington will represent David Dingwall, Minister responsible for Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC).

"Women escaping violence need a safe haven, compassion and time to recover. Bridge-It Housing for Women is a place where women can gain new strengths, a place where they can share their knowledge and experiences, and receive the care and support that is essential to their well-being. I am extremely pleased to begin celebrating the International Year of the Family by opening this much needed home in Napanee," said Mr. McCormick.

Bridge-It Housing For Women consists of 2 three-bedroom and 2 two-bedroom and 1 one-bedroom self-contained apartments that provide interim, longer term housing to Lennox and Addington Interval House residents following their stay in the nearby Interval House.

Located on Bridge Street in an older, renovated, Victorian home within walking distance of the Interval House and other social services in the town of Napanee, the building will be secure, wheelchair accessible and provide a common room for resident meetings.

In addition to safety and shelter, Bridge-It Housing for Women offers counselling, support and programs in a home-like atmosphere to help residents re-establish their lives.

The capital cost to renovate the two-storey house was provided through CMHC's Next Step Program, a federal program created to meet the longer term needs of women and children escaping family violence. CMHC provided the sponsor, Lennox and Addington Interval House, with a 15-year forgivable loan of \$450,000.

The Board of the Lennox & Addington Interval house is very excited about being able to offer this additional service. "Every step towards a positive life change requires strength and courage. Bridge-It Housing For Women will provide housing for women in transition from abusive relationships. By funding this project, CMHC recognizes and helps to overcome one of the obstacles faced by women who have made the choice for a safer life. The five day convention proved to be everything it was billed to be, and so much more.

"Urbana" is the largest triennial student mission convention in the world. The cosponsors, "InterVarsity Christian Fellowship" and the "International Fellowship of Evangelical Students," bring together a mix of the very best in mission speakers and representatives, Bible study leaders, musicians, seminars, exhibits and other resources for the enrichment and challenge of the convention participants. There is a large assortment of choices available, designed to meet every need and interest represented by the vast host of people present.

Attending "Urbana 93" were representatives from as far away as Korea and Hong Kong. There were even delegates from Russia and the Ukraine. Along with the rich mix of the peoples of the world, three of Canada's First Nations were represented. Among them were 3 Mohawks from Tyendinaga Territory -- Ross Maracle, Margaret Brant, and Kathy Brant.

Ross Maracle, founder and president of NNBC, and host of "Spirit Alive," was invited as a special guest to present seminars at the "Urbana Convention." His two topics, which he repeated three times each, were "Native Americans' Dilemma: A Cycle of Despair" and "Presenting Christ Creatively to Native Americans." Both of them created great interest resulting in full attendance and a heightened interest in the work of both ministries which originate right here in our own community.

The NNBC exhibit drew a wide array of interested inquirers. Some visitors came completely ignorant of native concerns and what was happening among native people. Others came from Ross Maracle's seminars with a desire to learn more. Some came to express their sorrow over the treatment that natives had experienced at the hands of their people, the nonnatives of North America. More yet came with a real desire to be part of the Christian solution to the cycle of despair elucidated by Maracle in his seminars. They wanted to be able to use their talents to serve Jesus Christ and work together with native people to bring hope and healing where there has been damage and destruction.
