




If you would be interested in taking either of these courses please contact Jan or Patti at your earliest convenience and let them know which course and which term you would be interested in.







SOUNDING THE AIDS ALARM IN FIRST NATION COMMUNITIES!

People across Canada are hearing the graphic details of Kecia Larkin, a nineteen year old native girl's short troubled life. The intense personal description tells of her childhood on the reserve that was marked by physical and sexual abuse, heavy drinking by age thirteen and racist taunts from white students at the high school she attended.

During two years of heavy drug use and prostitution, Kecia became involved with a partner who, unknown to her, was already infected with the HIV virus. Last year she was tested and the results came back positive.

Kecia is trying to cope with her medical condition and has been travelling to native communities to warn them they are not immune to Aids. Through the combined efforts of the Chiefs of Ontario and our community health representative, Kesia will be here to share her story with us on:

COOKING FOR ONE OR TWO:

Whether you have always cooked for a larger family or have never cooked at all, cooking for one or two is a new challenge. All you need are a few new habits, and some interesting ideas.

- * Make your favorite recipes for stews and casseroles, divide them into meal-size portions and freeze in plastic containers or re-usable foil plates. Warm them up as you need them. You could make all of your main meals for the week on one day if this method appeals to you.

A tribute to Leslie Claus

The Quinte area has lost an outstanding citizen.

Leslie Donald Claus (Les as he was known by his many friends) died Jan. 28 in his 82nd year.

He was a unique individual, "a modern Indian hero," to quote one of his Belleville friends.

A native of the Tyendinaga Territory, Les devoted a lifetime to improving the opportunities of the Mowhaks and relating their concerns to the non-native community.

A teacher on the territory for many years, he taught and counselled hundreds of students.

The first native counsellor attached to the Hastings County Board of Education, he worked with Mohawks attending secondary school in Belleville. A knowledgeable kind counsellor, he was a role model. Les's knowledge of "his" students, their families and community helped many students adjust to education off the territory.

Even after his retirement, students in native studies classes at Moira, BCI and the Quinte Living Centre benefited from visits by Les and his wife Ella to describe what it was like growing up on Tyendinaga and Six Nations.

Less had a talent for winning friends. He and Ella were a vital link between the native and nonnative communities.

Les loved his community. He spent a lifetime working on its behalf. A recent survey he and his wife completed helped to bring about the seniors residence near Deseronto.

Les loved Mohawk history. When Gord and Audrey Davies, aided by the students of Quinte Mohawk School, created three magnificent ceramic murals depicting the history of the Tyendinaga Mohawks, he was a valued consultant.

Les loved the arts. We have happy memories of him presenting his painting of the Mohawk Chapel at Tyendinaga to Queen Elizabeth II.


Les loved his family. He took pride in what each member was doing and was delighted when his son became principal of Quinte Mohawk School.

Les was a family man, a gentle man and a community man. He will be missed by all whoknew him.

The sympathy of his many friends in the Belleville area goes out to his wife and the children, Ken, Mary and Deanna.


