Ex-Grandview minmates to be compensated

Former inmates of a reform school for teenage girls will be eligible for compensation regardless of the outcome of a sexual-assault trial of its former chief psychologist, Ontario's social services minister said Wednesday.

"Under criminal compensation rules, a conviction is not necessary in order to get compensation," Marion Boyd told a news conference at the provincial legislature in

"What is necessary is a police in-

vestigation."

A two-year investigation into allegations of widespread abuse by guards and staff at Grandview training school in Cambridge, Ont., led to the arrest of Robert Ross this

Ross, 59, of Ottawa, was chief psychologist at the school in southwestern Ontario from the mid-1960s until 1976 - when it closed after complaints of sexual abuse became

He made a brief court appearance Tuesday in Kitchener to face 21 charges — including rape, indecent assault and gross indecency.

Police involved in the Canadawide investigation have said more

arrests are likely.

"We have more people we are investigating but I won't speculate on when more charges might be laid," Insp. John Beecock of the Waterloo Region police said Wednesday.

"If we get into crystal ball gazing we're just throwing away our credi-

bility."

Allegations aimed at Grandview have also claimed political victims - an NDP cabinet minister and a senior aide to Premier Bob Rae have both resigned after links to the investigation were exposed.

Boyd expressed optimism the compensation offer will prove to

the 64 women who say they were abused while at Grandview that the Ontario government is working in good faith.

"I think it will help them to understand how seriously we take their complaints and how seriously we take the responsibility to deal with these issues in a very clear way," she said.

Boyd acknowledged it may take years to settle the claims.

A project manager has been assigned to help the women identify their needs — including financial compensation - and to provide an

opportunity to ensure other former inmates feel enough support to come forward with their claims, she said.

After the arrest one of the former inmates said: "it's almost like restoring your faith in society, in authority.'

Ross was released on bail and ordered to return to court March 10. He had already been relieved of his duties as a criminology professor at the University of Ottawa pending the outcome of the police investiga-

The Grandview case has also created political fallout at the provincial legislature, tying up the daily question period and prompting the resignations of two members of Rae's NDP government.

The film blends traditional Iroquois imagery, music and themes with motifs from contemporary, secular life. An original score, and innovative visuals make It Starts With a Whisper a delight to watch, as well as a timely challenge to movie stereotypes of First Nations people.

Eighteen-year-old Shanna Sabbath, who has grown up on the Reserve must now decide what path to follow in life. The choice between traditional and contemporary values seems impossible. She feels all alone, yet she is watched over by ancestral spirits - three "matriarchal clowns" - who sometimes appear in the form of her outrageous aunts, Emily, Molly and Pauline. The aunts take Shanna on a mythic journey to Niagara Falls. The waters that whispered along the banks of the Grand River have become the thundering torrents of Niagara Falls, as Native people around the world celebrate their cultures and gain empowerment.

Her aunts' warmth and humour, and a dream-like encounter with a well-known Native leader help Shanna realize she is loved, and is entitled to live her life, remembering and respecting the people of the past and traditional ways.

ENGLISH BISHOPS TARGET TRAPPERS

London

About 40 Anglican bishops in England are support a campaign against the fur trade based on the premise that it is cruel to animals.

The bishops also cite the immorality of killing animals for fashion and the importance of good stewardship of animals to support of their stand.

The most senior of the bishops, Archbishop Alwyn Jones of Wales, has written the foreword to a new book which argues that animal welfare should be a leading Christian issue.

An anti-fur campaign organization called Lynx says it intends to lobby the government to ban the keeping of animals for fur.

In Canada, Bishop Christopher Williams of the Arctic wonders if all 40 Church of England bishops involved in the anti-fur campaign are vegetarians.

"Their support is probably misplaced and their stand based on misinformation," Bishop Williams said.

He added that in the case of Canada's Inuit people, who make up a large proportion of the population in his diocese, "the gathering of seals and animals for food and skins is not and has never been any more cruel than killing beef or pigs or anything else."


Bishop noted that Canada's seal hunt was virtually eliminated because of an international campaign based on anti-cruelty sentiments.

This, he said, has had "an extremely detrimental effect on the economy of native peoples and has driven many of them to the welfare lines."
