# MASSIVE SHOW OF SUPPORT FOR TYENDINAGA OLYMPIC TORCH RELAY

Excitement was at an all time high when the Olympic Torch passed through Tyendinaga December 15th. Large crowds of approximately 700 community members, and students and staff from QMS cheered on torchbearers Raven Tabobandung and Camelia Maracle, waving their Olympic mittens, handmade signs, flags, and tambourines. Paul Peters and Rachael Boyd, RBC and Coca-Cola sponsored torchbearers, also carried the flame.

Recognition was offered to the Creator during the Torch Acknowledgement ceremony. Chief R. Donald Maracle addressed the supportive crowd, and Honorary Elder Firekeeper and veteran Elwood Brant acknowledged the flame. Students from Quinte Mohawk School performed two dances representing unity.

Representatives from the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte administration, the Kiwanis, and Quinte Mohawk School expressed their gratitude to the torchbearers and Elder Firekeeper during a special Recognition Assembly later that morning. Both Raven and Camelia spoke about their experience and perspective on being involved in the Torch Relay, and the magnitude of which the event meant to them.

Events preceding the Torch Relay rallied excitement for students at QMS. Students listened with enthusiasm to Marlee Maracle, Chris Auten, and Michelle Brant who spoke on the importance of being active, how to get involved, and achieving your dreams. Marlee is a 15 year old Mohawk youth, who helped lead Team Ontario in soccer to win gold at Nationals, and presented a heartfelt, positive message of working hard to pursue your dreams. QMS students of all ages energetically participated in teams during a "Mini-Olympics." Medals were presented to students during the Recognition Assembly.

We are proud of Camelia, Raven, and Elwood for positively representing Tyendinaga with grace, courage and honour. We would also like to thank everyone for their hard work in making this day a success. We extend a heartfelt thank you to everyone who came to show their support, pride and unity at the events. It was a proud and positive day for Tyendinaga as we shared in the Olympic message of peace, brotherhood and friendship.

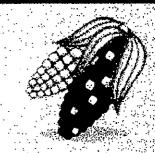

# BREASTFEEDING CIRCLE: Tips for Juggling a Nursing Baby and a Toddler

Could you use a free hand when you're nursing? While you're nursing, a pillow can help bring baby to breast level so you have a hand or two free (sometimes it takes weeks or even months to get that free hand... keep trying). If you need to support your breast with your other hand, try using a small rolled-up towel.

A sling will also free up a hand or two. Are you comfortable with using a sling and nursing baby in it? In addition to nursing while you're lying down, this is another lifesaver for many moms. It frees at least one hand and allows you to keep nursing or holding your baby while tending to and playing with another child. Also, as someone I know once mentioned, when baby is in the sling your toddler can't be pulling baby's toes, or trying to get baby out of the crib, or trying to brush baby's "teeth", or dropping toys on baby.

It can be handy to have your toddler around, as many times you can ask them to fetch things for you (a diaper, a wipe, the remote, the phone, a water bottle).

# Activities to do with your older child while baby is nursing

- Read books and snuggle and talk with your toddler while you're nursing. If you don't have a free hand, get your toddler to hold a book and turn the pages while you read.
- Play games "I Spy" and "Simon Says" are often a big hit with toddlers.
- Play with your food try counting (and eating) cheerios or raisins with your toddler.
- Some toddlers like to pretend-nurse their dolls or stuffed animals (or trucks!) while mom is nursing baby.
- Look at your toddler's baby book or baby pictures. Tell stories about when your toddler was a little baby. Tell stories about what your toddler can do now that he/she is bigger.

You can also set your toddler up with other activities to do while you're nursing. Drawing, coloring, puzzles, blocks or big legos, cars/trains, etc. Some moms keep a box of toys that is out only when baby is nursing. Things like playdough and painting and water play can keep kids interested for a long time, but depending upon where you can set it up and your child, this may or may not be something that works when you're nursing.

# If you need a nap and your toddler doesn't

Childproof a room of the house that has:

- a door or a baby gate (so your toddler can't "escape" and play in the toilet while you're resting)
- a bed or comfortable spot on the floor where you can lie down and nurse
- interesting toys that your toddler is likely play with without much interaction some moms also put on a favorite video
- a snack and a drink for toddler.

When you want to nap (or at least rest) while baby naps, close off the door so you can lie down with baby without worrying about what your toddler is getting into.

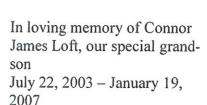

In order to provide the community with more information in regards to restorative justice, this article (and others to follow) will highlight some of the basic principles and values that make up restorative justice as it pertains to Tyendinaga.

According to the Correctional Investigator in Canada (2006), Aboriginal youth are overrepresented among criminalized young people. Research shows that Aboriginal young people are criminalized and jailed at earlier ages and for longer periods of time than non-Aboriginal young people. In fact, in 2000, 41.3 percent of all federally incarcerated Aboriginal offenders were 25 years of age or younger.

Furthermore, the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples (RCAP), which was established in 1991, concluded that "the justice system has failed Aboriginal people," the key indicator of which was their steadily increasing and disproportionate representation in Canadian correctional facilities. First Nations youth are the fastest growing demographic group in Canada and it is expected that this will have a significant impact on the criminal justice system.

Restorative Justice offers an alternative to the current, mainstream criminal justice system. Instead of punishing and labelling young people who have committed crimes, restorative justice gives them the opportunity to:

- 1. Take responsibility for their behaviour.
- 2. Understand the full impact of their actions on others.
- 3. Work to repair the harm done to their victims.

Restorative justice aims to repair the community relationships that are damaged when a crime is committed. Restorative justice can be used with people of all ages, in order to keep them from becoming a ward of the state and contributing to the above mentioned statistics. It can be adapted for use in many circumstances and at different stages of the criminal justice process. It is best practiced as an alternative to Canada's current expensive, often drawn-out, court processes.

# WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Restorative justice is voluntary. Nobody has to take part unless they want to. However, for the process to happen, the young person and the victim (or someone personally representing the victim – Yakokarewahtonh), must all be willing to participate.

In some circumstances, restorative justice can be used instead of charging a young person with a crime and sending them to court. It is used this way only when a young person admits they committed an offence. There is then no need for the trial. Instead of being dealt with by the authorities, the crime can be handled in the community (usually) where it took place, by the community members most affected by it.

Restorative justice can also be used in other ways. It can be used as part of a sentence when an accused pleads guilty or is found guilty by the court. Or it can be used at the end of a sentence in custody, before a young person returns to the community. When used in this way, it can help a victim and a community prepare for a young person's release back into the community. It can also prepare a young person to live again in the community with dignity and help them face the people they harmed, by taking responsibility to restore the peace.

# IF RESTORATIVE JUSTICE IS NOT PART OF THE TRADITIONAL, MAINSTREAM JUSTICE SYSTEM, WHO RUNS IT?

The Tyendinaga Restorative Justice (TJC) program is a community-based program. It was started by members of the community and is currently run by community members. Volunteers from Tyendinaga become trained as facilitators and have formed a committee in order to support the program, including all those who choose to participate.

Although all restorative justice projects are basically the same in their goal to repair harm, there are many variations. Each community chooses the variation that works best for them. For Tyendinaga, the option to use traditional medicines is available to participants, as well, at the beginning of each meeting we open using the Ohén:ton Karihwatéhkwen or the words that come before all else, in order to acknowledge all creation and prepare our minds for the matters at hand. The TJC is most interested in keeping our young people who have been labelled 'offenders' in the court system within our community, where we are able to focus on repairing the harm that has been caused, in terms of the relationships with family, oneself, the community and others.

We strive to work together as a community to not only restore relationships but work to ensure that the root cause of the crime is addressed so that participants are supported in their work towards finding peace and harmony in all their lives i.e. rehabilitation. The TJC is always adapting to better meet the needs of the community.

## WHAT CASES GO TO RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Restorative justice programs work in co-operation with the justice system, as well as the community. The local Crown attorney, police and other professionals in the youth justice system work in conjunction with the TJC. The TJC looks at each case individually when deciding whether the RJ process will work and each case is very different.

If the offender has entered the court system and the case is eligible to be diverted to the TJC, it is still up to the Courts to decide. The police also have some liberty to decide whether to charge or divert based on suitability. When deciding, some of the things they consider are:

- The young person's history.
- The seriousness of the crime.
- The circumstances.
- The attitudes of the victim and the young person.
- The willingness of both the young person and the victim to participate.

For example, although the TJC might consider restorative justice suitable for a break and entry offence, if that young person has a long history of offences, or used younger children to help commit the crime, the Crown or police may decide not divert the case back to the community.

In our experience, it is best to avoid the court processes altogether (especially for a youth's first offence) and find healing and resolution through alternative processes.

Only young people who admit they committed an offence can be sent through a restorative justice process.

Even if a case is suitable, a victim might not want the crime against them dealt with by restorative justice. Not every victim of every crime will want to participate or to have somebody else represent them in the restorative justice, and we respect that decision.
