IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO ALL RESIDENTS PERTAINING TO WILLS AND ESTATES ON THE TYENDINAGA INDIAN RESERVE

Section 48 of the Indian Act states: that if an Indian person whether male or female dies without a will, the estate will be handled as follows:

1. If only 1 child - the spouse will receive the first \$2,000.00 plus 1/2 of the remaining estate.
2. If more than 1 child - the spouse will receive the first \$2,000.00 plus 1/3 of the remaining estate.

An example would be.....

If your estate is valued at \$50,000.00, the surviving spouse would get the first \$2,000.00 plus 1/3 of the remainder or approximately \$18,000.00. The other \$32,000.00 could be tied up in a trust account until the children reach the age of 18. This could create a real hardship on the surviving parent who has to raise the children.

If you don't have a will I would strongly advise you to call myself at the Band Office to make arrangements with Peterborough to make a will. It is most important and could save your spouse a lot of grief and hardship at a later date.

Re: Little N.H.L. Tournament

The Six Nations Indian Reserve will be hosting the 13th Annual Little N.H.L. Hockey Tournament during March school break (12th - 17th) in 1984. 1984 is also the Six Nations Bi-Centennial year.

Rules and regulations will be the same as in previous years, this being a Houseleague tournament between Reserves. Age groups open again will be:

ATOM - born between January 1, 1973-December 31, 1974.

PEEWEE- born between January 1, 1971 - December 31, 1972.

BANTAM - born between January 1, 1969 - December 31, 1970.

MIDGET - born between January 1, 1967 - December 31, 1968.

Entry fee will be \$50.00 per team and arena admission for spectators will probably be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for under 16 years of age per day. We hope most Reserves will be able to make their own motel and meal accommodations, however, if this is not possible, billeting will be available on our Reserve.

The deadline for Tournament entry will be FEBRUARY 10, 1984.

Entry forms and entry fees must be returned to us by this date. Please let us know as soon as possible how many teams your Reserve will be sending; if billeting will be required; and make your entry fees payable to SIX NATIONS MINOR HOCKEY.

REGULATIONS of RESERVE LITTLE N.H.L

1. Reserve Little N.H.L is for native youth only. It is strictly a recreation house league between Reserves. It has no signed contract. It is sponsored by Ontario Little N.H.L. It believes in the aims and objectives of L.N.H.L in Ontario.
2. All Players must be one parent of Native Birth and have a Federal Registered Band Number. Players without a Band Number and yet have one parent of Native Birth, must qualify by presenting a Legal Affidavit that proves Native Descent.
3. Birth dates of all players must be certified. Certification of players with Official Federal Government Band Numbers shall be certified from Official Federal Band List. Certification of Native players without Band Numbers must be made by certified birth certificate presented to officials before playing.
4. All players who live on a Reserve must play for his own Reserve. If his Reserve has no team, he may play for the nearest Reserve having a team provided the Band Membership is 500 or less. If a reserve wishes to allow a boy to play for a Neighbouring Reserve of 500 or less, the player must get a lease from his own band, signed by his parent, and any two of:
 1. The Band Chief
 2. Band Administrator
 3. Recreation Council

NOTE: Exceptional cases to this rule may appeal directly to the Executive of Ontario Reserve Little N.H.L. for a decision.

5. Friendship clubs and groups away from Reserves living in larger cities and towns can have their players participate in Reserve L.N.H.L by playing for nearest Reserve having a team or being sponsored as a team by the nearest Reserve, provided the Reserve they are playing for or being sponsored by has a Band Membership of 500 or less.
6. Native players not living on a Reserve can participate by playing for nearest Reserve that has a team, provided that Reserve has a Band Membership of 500 or less. Band Members are considered residents.
7. Only players of Junior B and Junior A are not eligible to play in Little N.H.L.
8. Native girls may play with the boys in Atom and Peewee, but not in any high series. Above Peewee, they must play in Reserve girls leagues. This rule is made because of physical and health situations.
9. C.A.H.A. and Little N.H.L playing rules apply to all games. Protests are handled by the Executive of the Little N.H.L for Reserve Hockey.
10. All card holding players must obtain proper release or permit in order to participate in the Little N.H.L Tournament.
11. Reserve Little N.H.L has an Executive consisting of President, Secretary-Treasurer, Directors, and Elected Officials. They are elected annually by the L.N.H.L Reserve Members during Tournament week.
12. The Executive meets continuously during the Tournament to consider:
 1. Tournament Protests and Rulings
 2. Location of next Tournament
 3. General BusinessDuring the rest of the year, they meet at the call of the President.
13. All Tournaments are under the direction of the Little N.H.L Reserve Executive. Host Reserves for Tournaments are responsible for all Financing and arrangements including ice rentals, official, first aid, accommodations, meals, advertising programs, and general details. Participating Reserves are responsible for Leadership and discipline of their own players.
14. The use of drugs and alcohol by all Tournament Participants will be strictly forbidden.

TOURNAMENT RULES

1. C.A.H.A playing rules and Little N.H.L playing rules apply in all games.
2. All games will consist of three fifteen minute straight time periods. The last two minutes of the game will be an exception and Stop Time will be used.
3. Minor penalties will be three minutes straight time. Major penalties will be seven minutes straight time. Fighting major will be a major penalty (7 minutes) plus a 10 minute misconduct penalty (17 Minutes).
NOTE: If a fighting major is called during the last period, the player will have the penalty continue into the next game.
4. In case of ties at the end of regulation time, sudden death will be played. Each team will drop one player and play five aside. Then if the game continues with no score, every two minutes another player will be dropped from each side until two players remain.
NOTE: Goal Keepers cannot go beyond centre ice.
2 players remaining—in case of a penalty in this situation the opposing team shall add one player.
5. Teams can only sign 16 players for this Tournament.
6. For each game, only 16 players including goalkeepers can be dressed.
7. No Team with less than 10 players including goalkeepers will be allowed on the ice.
8. Players will not leave the ice surface between the first and second period.
9. Players can play for only one team in the tournament. However where a Reserve has more than one team in the Tournament, an exception can be made in the following circumstances:
 - (a) A Reserve having a population of 500 or less.
 - (b) A Reserve having more than one team in the Tournament.
 - (c) A Reserve having less than 10 players on their team.Then under such circumstances a team of less than 16 players may draw extra players from a lower category team on their own reserve up to the player strength of 16 players including goalkeepers.
10. A team will be penalized after 10 minutes delay. (At the discretion of the Tournament Committee)
11. Slapshots will be allowed in the Novice, Peewee, Bantam and Midget divisions. Body checking will not be allowed in Novice and Peewee divisions. Penalty assessed will be 3 minutes for body checking.
12. All grievances are to be brought before the Grievance Committee at least one half hour after game time, that is in protest.
NOTE: Coaches and managers are requested to maintain discipline both on and off the ice. This includes restricting their players from the use of abusive language to the officials or to opposing players and restraining their players from fights, bench clearing, etc. Your help is greatly needed to have a successful Tournament.

NAME GIVING CEREMONY

On Saturday, April 7, 1984, the Kanyengeh Festival Board is having a name-giving ceremony at the Community Centre. Any native born person, who would like to receive a Mohawk name at that time is invited to submit the following application form to the Band Office, not later than February 17, 1984.

Since it was the custom of our people to have the clan mothers present the names, and since we do not have clan mothers, we have an interested groups of Mohawk-speaking ladies from Tyendinaga who will select the names. The information requested on the application will assist the ladies in selecting an appropriate name for you. If there are more members in one family who wish to receive a name, extra application forms can be obtained at the Band Office.

All names are to be recorded in a register and preserved as a bi-centennial record. We would request that anyone already having a Mohawk name submit it to the Band Office for entry into the register.

On the night of April 7, there will be a corn soup supper at the Community Centre, followed by the short name-giving ceremony, and a social dance. We would appreciate community participation in this and all other Bi-centennial projects.

We are attempting to make this, our Bi-Centennial Year, an exciting and eventful year, starting with our Winter Carnival on February 4 and 5. Please give us your support.
