

Ontario Hydro Demand/Supply Plan Hearings Audiences sur le Plan d'offre et de demande d'Ontario Hydro

TO: Members of the Public Interested in the Environmental Assessment of the Ontario Hydro Demand/Supply Plan

In July, 1991, I provided a brief update on the Environmental Assessment process which is taking place concerning Ontario Hydro's 25 Year Demand/Supply Plan. Since that time, the Hearing has continued. A brief summary of recent events follows:

Ontario Hydro's Witness Panels

Following our summer break, Ontario Hydro presented the evidence of its fourth witness panel. This panel provided information on Hydro's Demand Management or conservation initiatives, including a general description of Hydro's commitment to demand management, the potential for reducing future demand through demand management and efficiency improvements, and information about conservation programmes. Questioning of these witnesses intervenors was completed on September 30, 1991.

Evidence-in-chief of Witness Panel 5, which dealt with Non-Utility Generation, began on October 1, 1991. Witnesses described the terminology, the advantages and disadvantages of various types of non-utility generation, and the development of hydro's non-utility generation programme, including rate-setting, support programmes, and planned future intiatives. A substantial increase in the forecasted non-utility portion of generation was described, and new targets for the contribution of this type of generation to the overall supply plan were provided. The witnesses were questioned by twenty of the intervenors, a process which was completed November 4, 1991.

A ruling by the Hearing Panel on the scope of the evidence to be addressed through Witness Panel 6 on the Hydraulic Plan was delivered on October 30, 1991, and a further hearing on this matter took place on November 12, 1991. As a result of the Hearing Panel's rulings, some revision of the evidence to be presented by Hydro was necessary, so the Witness Panel did not begin to give its evidence until November 27, 1991. Questioning by the intervenors was completed prior to the Christmas break.

The scoping for Witness Panel 7, which deals with purchase options and transmission, raised some concerns about the original notice for the Hearing, and its implications for the approvals to be

granted by this Hearing and in later site specific assessments. A motion to consider these matters will be heard on January 7, 1992, after which the evidence-in-chief of the witnesses will begin.

Travel

On September 2, 1991, members of the Panel, two staff members, and a number of the intervenors travelled to Timmins en route to the Moose River/James Bay area for a site visit. Travel by helicopter enabled members of the group to view various hydraulic sites on the way, and to note the features of the basin and the surrounding terrain. Community meetings were held in Moosonee on September 3, Moose Factory on September 4, and in Kapuskasing on September 6. Hundreds of members of the public attended the meetings, and many made oral or written submissions to the Panel. A visit to Harmon Generating Station provided first-hand information on hydraulic generation in this setting.

On October 15, members of the Panel, staff and intervenors visited the Niagara Generating Station and Nanticoke. Tours of the facilities were provided by Ontario Hydro, and written information received at these sites has been filed as part of our Hearing information.

<u>Intervenor Cases</u>

During December, a number of meetings were held to discuss the manner in which the intervenor cases will be presented to the Panel. In the result, it was decided that written submissions as to the best way of providing intervenor evidence and participant submissions to the Panel will be filed with the Panel by January 30, 1992, and oral submissions will be heard on this material on February 6, 1992. In the meantime, Ontario Hydro is expected to file an update to the Demand/Supply Plan with the Hearing Panel in mid-January.




Assembly of First Nations Organizational Chart

The new structure is intended to create a national political office which will meet the needs of our constituents in a more timely fashion.

There are two parts to the new structure. The political branch and the operation and administration branch. As each issue is brought forward to the Assembly of First Nations, it will initially undergo research and investigation. Next, it will be determined if the issue is a political issue or policy issue and will either be forwarded to the political branch or forwarded to the Lobby and Advocacy Unit before final distribution occurs.

RE:

CURRENT DEVELOPMENTS AND ACTIVITIES

The Assembly of First Nations is currently in the process of restructuring the AFN Environment Program and expects to complete this process early in 1992. We intend to make the program more dynamic and responsive to the needs of the First Nations. However, the success of the program will be determined, in part, by your support and active involvement in coordinated activities, designed to resolve the environmental problems confronting First Nations.

Please let us know if you wish to become involved in the AFN Environment Committee, if you are not already a member. We are currently engaged in a number of activities on environmental issues, and would appreciate the benefit of your counsel, involving your expertise, knowledge and experience, on the following issues.

(1) AFN EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RESOLUTION

At the December 10, 1991, meeting of the AFN Executive Committee, a resolution was passed which ensures that the enhancement of the AFN Environment Program is a priority on the agenda of the Secretariat. Additionally, in support of this commitment, the Environment Program issues and concerns will be guaranteed a time allotment in all future meetings of the AFN Executive Committee. This commitment reflects the growing concern among First Nations on environmental issues.

(2) UNITED NATIONS CONFERENCE ON ENVIRONMENT AND DEVELOPMENT

The Assembly of First Nations will be making a submission to this conference on the Co-Management of Natural Resources from the First Nations perspective. We are requesting information from you on co-management agreements in your region, which may be utilized in this report. First Nations possess the knowledge and motivation required to co-manage natural resources in a way that benefits our peoples and communities. We wish to demonstrate this in our submission to UNCED.

(3) GLOBE '92 CONFERENCE ON SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Assembly of First Nations has been invited to participate in this international conference which will be held in March of 1992. Several Native speakers will be required to ensure that the concerns of aboriginal people are heard throughout the conference. CANADA'S GREEN PLAN

A key element in Canada's Green Plan is the concept of partnership: the need for Canadians in every sector of society to work co-operatively toward the common goal of a cleaner, healthier environment.

The Environmental Achievement Awards celebrate that co-operation. The awards honour the efforts and commitment of individuals and organizations from all walks of life who work, through diverse but mutually reinforcing actions, to protect and restore our environment.

The 1992 awards ceremony will take place during the month of May. Nominations are invited in a wide range of categories. People and organizations nominated in previous years, and not chosen as award-winners, may be nominated again. An independent advisory body, the Canadian Environmental Advisory Council, will select the winners.

Please join us in recognizing the men and women who make Canada — and the world — a better place in which to live.

CATEGORIES

Environmental Achievement Awards will be presented in six categories:

1. Non-profit Organization

This award is for a non-government, non-profit group that has made an outstanding contribution to the protection of Canada's environment. The contribution may be a long-term, ongoing effort or a single, recent accomplishment. It may take the form of increased public awareness or the promoting of a particular cause.

Eligibility: Any Canadian organization, or Canadian branch of an international organization, that is a non-government, non-profit group and that (a) focuses on conservation, wildlife, energy issues, toxic chemicals, or any other concern central to improved environmental quality, or (b) has developed a program that deals with an environment-related topic.

The 1991 award-winner was the Western Canada Wilderness Committee for its work in preserving British Columbia forests.

2. Outstanding Communications for Environmental Awareness

This award is for an author, journalist, broadcaster or film-maker who is a Canadian resident and whose work has significantly broadened Canadians' awareness of environmental issues. The award-winner will have contributed to increased knowledge, concern, commitment and/or hope for the environment.

Eligibility: This category is open to a professional communicator in any medium.

The 1991 award-winner was Graeme Ferguson, co-founder and past President of IMAX Corporation, for the film "Blue Planet".

3. Corporate Environmental Leadership

This award recognizes innovative and/or exemplary environmental conduct by a Canadian corporation, institution or association — industrial or other. The winner will have shown that environmental concerns can be reflected in economic decisions, as urged by the World Commission on Environment and Development, and by Canada's Task Force on Environment and Economy.

Eligibility: The nominee must be a corporate entity (not a municipality or charitable organization). Crown corporations are also eligible. The nomination should identify how the company in question has protected the environment or conserved natural resources.

The 1991 award-winner was INCO Limited for its commitment to cleaning up and restoring the environment, demonstrated at every level of its operations.

4. Lifetime Achievement

This award is given to an individual Canadian whose lifetime dedication to the environment is a source of inspiration.

Eligibility: Any individual Canadian. The nomination should describe the person's work, focusing on his or her motivation and scope of activity. Both successes and failures should be cited.

The 1991 award-winner was Dr. Louis LaPierre for his work, both in New Brunswick and on the national stage, in championing environmental protection.

5. Environmental Leadership by a Municipality

This award recognizes an innovative and/or exemplary environmental policy, project or activity of a municipality.

Eligibility: Any Canadian regional government or municipality. The nomination should outline the type of policy, project or activity and identify the benefits to the environment.

The 1991 award-winner was the City of Montréal for designing an innovative water purification system at a public beach.

6. Environmental Science Fair Project

Environment Canada works with the Youth Science Foundation to select the best environment-related science fair project across the country. Nominations are, therefore, not required for this category.

The 1991 award-winners were Samir Gupta and Denis Tsui, two high-school students from Brossard, Quebec, for a project on consuming PCBs and cleaning up the contaminated soil.

Nominations must be postmarked on or before February 15, 1992.



MENINGOCOCCAL MENINGITIS

WHAT IS IT?

Meningitis is an infection of the central nervous system and may be caused by a number of bacteria or viruses. The outbreak of which we are hearing so much in the media is caused by a bacteria called Neisseria meningitidis and is called Meningococcal meningitis. The infection enters the body through the nose and throat and infects the bloodstream and the lining of the brain and spinal cord.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS?

Symptoms of meningitis include a fever, feeling generally unwell, headache, vomiting, and stiff neck. As the disease progresses, persons may become drowsy, excited or confused. Sometimes a body rash develops. Early treatment with antibiotics is important. Of course, many other illnesses have similar symptoms. It is important that the individual see his or her family physician to determine the cause.

WHO GETS IT?

Meningococcal bacteria live in the nose and throat, and perfectly healthy people who have no symptoms can be carriers. About 25% of the population are carriers with no way of knowing The bacteria are spread to others by way of droplets in sneezes and coughs; they don't just float in the air. To become infected, a person must be in close contact with the person carrying the bacteria. Young children are most susceptible to infection as they have no immunity to the bacteria. develops only after an encounter with the organism, and most adults have at some time been exposed, although they probably didn't know it. However, Meningococcal meningitis can affect teenagers and adults as well. Usually, when a number of cases occur in one community the patients have been in contact over a period of time, but sometimes cases are isolated with no link between patients.

HOW IS IT TREATED?

When a patient is diagnosed with the condition, antibiotics are begun immediately. Doctors will also ensure that the patient does not become dehydrated. In most instances, patients recover completely. Household and intimate contacts of affected cases are asked to see their physician regarding possible antibiotic treatment to prevent the illness. Casual contacts such as classmates or co-workers do not usually need preventive antibiotics.

SHOULD COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES BE AVOIDED?

There are no special measures that need to be taken in the community in order to prevent infection; no need to stop any recreational or social activities such as sports, parties, movies or shopping.

WHY DOES AN OUTBREAK OCCUR?

Why an outbreak occurs is not known. It is thought that a more virulent strain of the bacteria appears in cycles, but it is not known why. Typically, an outbreak in North America ends as mysteriously as it began. There has not been a large epidemic in North America for many years. However, in other parts of the world epidemics are more common.
