

## RE: A Call To A National Rally Parliament Hill July 15,1992

In response to a Resolution that was passed at the 13th Annual Chiefs Assembly in Fredericton, New Brunswick on June 23-25, 1992, I am calling for a National Rally in support of our Constitutional efforts to Protect First Nations Rights. It will be in Ottawa at Parliament Hill on July 15, 1992.

This is the same day that the Prime Minister has recalled Parliament. What the Parliament will be asked to consider will be determined by events this week and the results of a First Ministers Meeting on the Constitution tentatively scheduled for July 11-12, 1992.

During the last four months, we have come a long way towards including First Nations People in the Circle of Confederation. We have been constructive, flexible and positive on all fundamental constitutional issues. Despite the fact that the constitutional process has benefitted from our participation, there is the possibility that several Governments will try to back out of their promises to us.

We know that a Constitutional Process with our full and equal participation holds the greatest potential for a national consensus that is honourable, just, comprehensive and lasting. We need your continued support, so please join the Assembly of First Nations and the Canadian Public in a rally to support our Human, Aboriginal and Treaty rights, our participation in constitutional change, and to hold Governments to their promises.

SUBJECT: Gathering of Nations

WHEREAS the First Nations exist on Turtle Island as distinct nations of peoples with the responsibility and obligation to live in harmony with nature and mankind; and

WHEREAS we have entered into agreement with each other as distinct nations for the purpose of forming alliances for peace, friendship, trade and commerce; and

WHEREAS there has been concern expressed by some First Nations in Quebec that their future is unclear in the event that the Province of Quebec does not become an active participant in Confederation; and

WHEREAS there is a need for all First Nations in Ontario to join together with First Nations in Canada and the United states and internationally for mutual support for all of our nations, and in particular for the First Nations of Quebec,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Chiefs-in-Assembly agree to call for a gathering of our nations for the purposes of reaffirming and strengthening our nation-to-nation relationships and to demonstrate our mutual support for each other,

#### FINALLY BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- (1) this gathering be co-ordinated by the Chiefs in Ontario with the support of all First Nations who wish to assist; and
- (2) this gathering be held on Walpole Island First Nation, Ontario near the boundary established between Canada and the U.S.A.; and
- (3) this gathering be convened on August 13, 14, and 15, 1992, the duration of the gathering to be at the discretion of the Elders and Leaders of the nations participating; and
- (4) that prominent international diplomats/ representatives be invited to attend this gathering.

Dear Ken:

My name is Hersh Spiegelman. I'm a practising Chartered Accountant living near Toronto and have been in business for 15 years preparing financial statements and tax returns.

I'm contacting you because of the recent decision by the Supreme Court of Canada in the Glen Williams case. This case decided that unemployment insurance benefits received by Reserve Indians were not subject to income tax in certain situations:

Due to this case Reserve Indians in the future should find their U.I. benefits noticeably larger since income tax will no longer be withheld.

THIS DECISION ALSO MEANS THAT those individuals who had received U.I. benefits in the past (where the tax was already deducted and withheld) can now refile their personal income tax returns all the way back to 1985 and be entitled to receive a refund of all taxes withheld. The government will also pay you interest back to 1985. In other words even if one has already filed a personal tax return any time between 1985 and 1991 and received a refund at that time, YOU MAY REFILE AGAIN AND POSSIBLY RECEIVE A LARGER REFUND.

I represent an income tax recovery company, and we wish to offer our services to assist in refiling tax returns for everyone who might be affected on your Reserve. We have had a significant amount of experience in the income tax field and although refiling can be a technically complex exercise, we are confident we can handle it quickly and efficiently.

Please review the contents of this letter carefully. I would be more than happy to further discuss this situation and our involvement in handling the tax refiling. I look forward to your call.




#### FROM THE OFFICE OF THE EMPLOYMENT CO-ORDINATOR

#### TYENDINAGA MOHAWK ENVIRONMENTAL DAY CAMP

#### 1992 CAMP RULES

- 1. Children must bring a lunch to camp with them daily unless otherwise specified on the calendar distributed to the children. There is a cooler to keep lunches and drinks cold.
- 2. Children must bring a snack, fruit or crackers. There will be a fifteen (15) minute snack break in the morning and afternoon.
- 3. There will be a Counsellor on duty every morning at 7:30 a.m.
- 4. When there is a scheduled morning trip, we request that the children arrive 30 minutes prior to departure time.
- 5. Day Camp Hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. There is a fee of \$5.00 for every fifteen (15) minutes late in picking up your child.
- 6. The Day Camp rate for 1992 has been set as follows. One child, the parent will pay \$25. Two children the rate will be \$45.00. For three or more children, the family rate is \$60.00 This money will be paid to the Supervisor or one of the appointed Counsellors.
- 7. The Day Camp staff is not responsible for LOST or MISPLACED items.
- 8. Please make sure that children are prepared for field trips, such as swim suits on swim dates, etc. If you do not wish your child to participate in a specific outing, please indicate on the permission slip. You will be responsible to make other arrangements for your child.
- 9. If you are planning a vacation, your money must still be paid in order to hold your child's registration.
- 10. The Day Camp will be run by 'ENTER AT YOUR OWN RISK POLICY'.

Thank you for your co-operation. We look forward to a healthy, happy and safe summer experience for the children and the Counsellors.



You may remember the old saying "Leaves of three, let it be." It's a reminder that poison ivy and its cousin poison oak consistently have three leaves. But beyond that these plants can vary tremendously—which is why many people don't recognize them and end up in misery each year. They can grow as woody vines or shrubs. The leaves can be dull or glossy, from one to five inches long, and have edges that are saw-toothed, lobed, or smooth. Though usually green, in autumn they can turn yellow or pink; in spring they often bear small green or white flowers that mature into berries in late summer.

The plants are widely distributed. Poison ivy grows throughout the United States except California, which is where one type of poison oak is concentrated. Another form of poison oak grows in the southeastern states. In damp areas like swamps or bogs, you may encounter poison sumac, a small tree or shrub related to poison ivy that has seven to eight leaflets on each stem.

People who think they're immune to these plants are usually inviting trouble. Often people aren't affected after their first or second exposure. But four out of five become sensitive after several exposures to urushiol—the chemical in the oil secreted by these plants—which causes itching and burning along with a red, blistery rash. Usually the rash begins a few hours after exposure, but it may not appear for several days. And you need not touch the plant itself. Urushiol is extremely hardy, and brushing an object that was contaminated months before can cause the rash. In addition, dogs and cats that have brushed against the leaves carry the irritating oils on their fur, and may transfer it to you.


#### Preventive steps

If you walk or hike through the woods where these plants grow, wear clothing, including gloves, that protects your extremities. Always wash the clothing afterward. If your shoes might have touched a plant, sponge them off. And if you find poison ivy on your property, don't burn it; this allows the urushiol to become airborne and can cause severe allergic reactions all over your body. Dispose of plants in sealed plastic bags, or kill them with a herbicide and then bury them.

Treating poison ivy and poison oak

If you think you've been exposed, wash your skin thoroughly within minutes, using plenty of cold water. Don't use soap, which can spread the oil. If a rash develops, don't scratch it; scratching won't spread the rash, nor will breaking the blisters (the fluid inside doesn't contain allergens), but excessive scratching can


lead to infection. To relieve the itch, try compresses soaked in cool water. Calamine lotion, baking soda, and hydrocortisone cream can also be soothing.


#### MOHAWK 4-H Club
