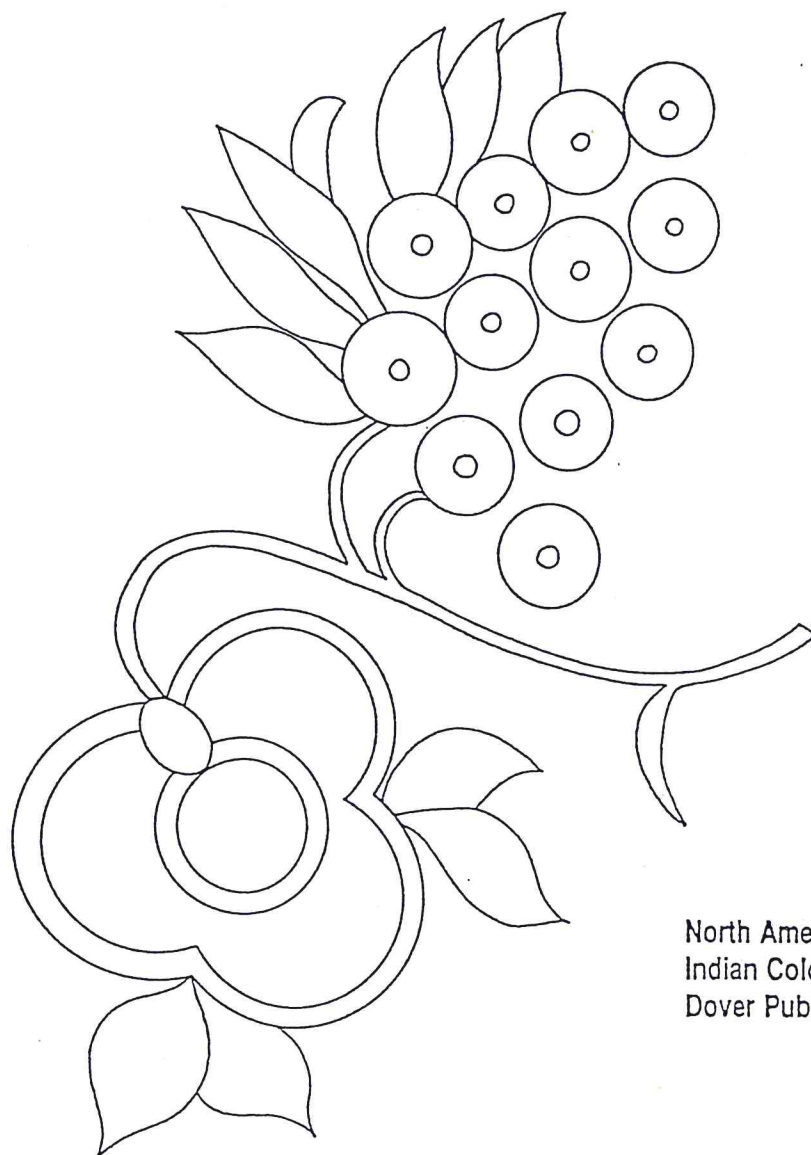

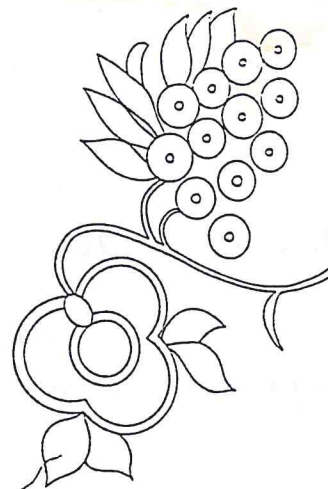

PRESS RELEASE:

RE: Reciting of the GREAT LAW of the Rotinonhshón:ni Confederacy to take place beginning September 19,1992.

Ohsweken, July 3 - Jake Thomas, well-known educator, historian and interpreter of Iroquoian oral culture and traditions as well as respected condoled chief of the Cayuga Nation will be presenting the Great Law for one of the very few times in English.

The first United Nations in North America based on democracy was, in fact, the League of the Five Nations, better known as the Rotinonhshon:ni [or Iroquois] Confederacy. The Confederacy was created in order to bring peace, harmony and prosperity to all of the people and its principles are outlined in the Great Law. Because the Great Law stresses caring, respect and appreciation for one another its message is as important and needed for the troubled world of today as for times past. Additionally it provides invaluable guidance for daily living for people of all cultural backgrounds.

Commencing on September 19 and continuing until September 27, Chief Thomas will recite the Great Law at the site of the Iroquoian Institute, on Regional Road 20, between Seneca and Mohawk Roads, on the Six Nations Reserve, Grand River Country. A 6:00 a.m. sunrise ceremony will begin before reciting the Great Law which will continue into the afternoons. Following the recitals there will be a social in the evenings. Admission is free. An invitation is warmly extended to all interested native and non-native persons alike. In addition volunteers and native crafters are most welcome.

RE: The Peace Tour 1992 - to take place July 25 until August 2, 1992.

Ohsweken, July 3 - A week long journey by van retracing the steps of the Peacemaker will commence on July 25 from the Iroquoian Institute. The Peacemaker was a Huron sent by the Creator to bring the Good Message (the Great Laws of Peace) to the Five Nations. After a sunrise ceremony Jake Thomas will explain the oral history as it unfolds through the Path of the Peacemaker. In addition Dinners and Socials will be hosted by the native communities visited and there will be rest periods and time for leisure shopping.

The fee is \$250 per adult, \$100 per child under 12 (tentatively). Rooms will be shared. Additionally it is advisable to bring extra money for meals and incidentals.

BANK OF MONTREAL SEEKS ABORIGINAL VP

TORONTO, July 14, 1992 - Bank of Montreal today announced that it is entering the final stages of its search for a VICE-PRESIDENT, ABORIGINAL BANKING. And while it is currently interviewing candidates for the newly created post, the Bank stressed that it is still accepting applications for the position and encouraged candidates anywhere in the country to get in touch with the Bank for further information.

"Response so far has been excellent, however we want to be sure that we give all qualified candidates every opportunity to apply," said Bank Vice-Chairman AL McNALLY.

The creation of the new position was announced by Al McNally at the beginning of May as part of Bank of Montreal's new approach to Aboriginal banking. This approach includes working with Aboriginal communities both to provide more employment opportunities for Aboriginal people, and to make banking services more accessible to Aboriginal communities. The Bank is also consulting with First Nations across Canada on the make-up of a Circle of Aboriginal business leaders who will provide guidance to the Bank on Aboriginal banking. In addition, the Bank will soon announce the opening of a new branch in a First Nations' community.

"It's not only the right thing to do, it's the SMART thing to do," Al McNally said when he announced the new approach.

The Bank is convinced that the new partnership can be rewarding for both the Bank and Aboriginal peoples. "We want to earn your business," said Al McNally.

The successful candidate will have a solid understanding of the financial services industry. He or she will also possess strong marketing skills, and will lead the Bank in building business and strengthening relationships with customers in the Aboriginal communities. The Bank hopes to fill the post by early Fall.

A MESSAGE FROM MOHAWK AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Re: 1992 Mohawk Fair

Fair time is fast approaching and plans are well underway for the best show ever.

As everyone probably knows by now, the Mohawk Fair has expanded to a three day Fair to allow for a better balance of events. The scheduled dates are September 11, 12 and 13.

The Fair Prize Lists are now available at the following locations: Mrs. Herbs, FNTI, Shirley's Variety, Wards Gas Bar, The Warehouse Restaurant, Mohawk Band Office, and from our Secretary, Caroline Brant (396-2536). This year our Prize List includes a tentative program of events along with an exhibitor's sheet for your convenience.

To allow for the expanded program for this year's Fair, some changes from previous years are evident. Exhibits in all buildings will remain on display for one additional night to allow for Sunday viewing. Since the upstairs of the Community Centre will be required for these exhibits, only one adult dance will be held in the downstairs of the Hall. The upstairs dance and the youth dance have been cancelled for this year. Tickets for the dance will be available for sale during Fair Day on a first-come-first-served basis.

Admission to 1992 Mohawk Fair will remain at \$4.00 per adult per day. However, we are offering a weekend pass for a cost of \$10.00 per person which entitles entry for all three days at a slightly reduced price. These passes will be available for sale Friday evening, and in advance from our Secretary. Entry to the Fair Grounds will be restricted to individuals holding Weekend Passes, Exhibitor's Cards, Complimentary Passes or Director's Ribbons. A Membership Card will no longer provide free admission.

The next meeting of the Fair Board will be held August 3, 1992, 8 p.m. at the Mohawk Fire Hall.

During the month of August, meetings will be held every Monday night, same time, same place, until Fair Time.

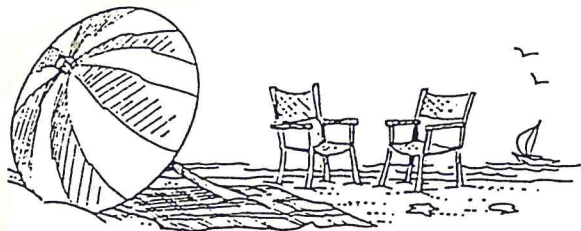

COOL COOKING FOR KIDS

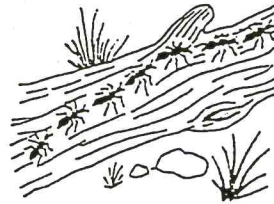
Peanut Butter Banana Whip

 raisins

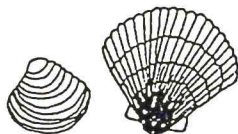


Spread celery with peanut butter and put raisins on top. Remember to brush your teeth after eating raisins.

They'll never be worshipped like One of These.

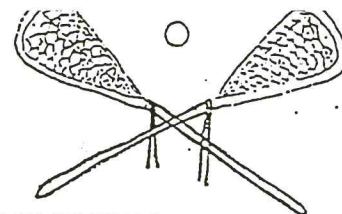
GODS MIRACLE

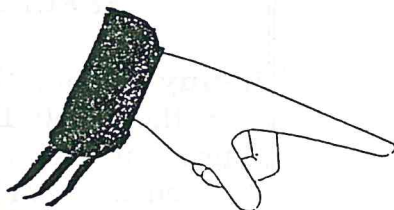

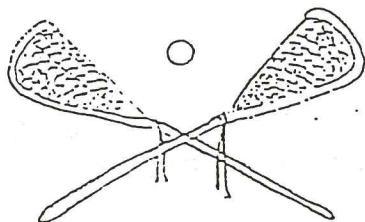

Told with pantomime, mask, dance, spectacle and scenes enacted in the Ojibway language, this story tells of the great migration of the Whitefish River First Nation from old Birch Island to what is now called Birch Island just off Manitoulin. Nongose, daughter of the Chief, is ready to marry. Suitors come from all over, in canoes laden with treasures to offer. Among these suitors is Nimke, the man she truly loves. An old woman arrives with her son in tow, with twelve large canoes filled with bounty. The Chief disregards tradition, and allows Nongose to marry Nimke. The old woman, a shaman, is angered, and she performs a ceremony to allow her son to transform himself into a Great White Wolf. The men of the village go off to trade in the south, and the elders, women and children remain. The White Wolf begins to terrorize the village at night, devouring people. A council is held, and the community heeds the dream of an elder: they must leave the island, and travel across the water. At sunset, the exodus occurs, but Nongose has dropped the token of marriage given to her by Nimke. She returns to the village, finds the token, and meets the Great White Wolf. Before her eyes, he transforms from the most hideous monster into the most perfect male she has ever seen. He begins to seduce her and, hypnotized, the token falls from her hands. The sound it makes reawakens her, and she runs for her life. The darkness is upon her, the night is without moon, and she stumbles and falls, and dies from a blow to her head. The Great White Wolf goes to the shore and begins to pursue the villagers. When he hits the water, he bursts into flame. Singed, he returns to the island. Nimke returns to do battle, and is killed by the Wolf. The old woman mourns her greed, and begs the creator for forgiveness. As punishment, her son will remain forever alone, always the Wolf, trapped on Old Birch Island where no man walks today without fear. Fishermen have reported hearing a young woman singing during the false dawn, and some have reported a young woman and her man walking through mists across the water.
