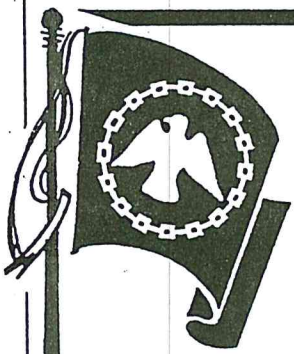
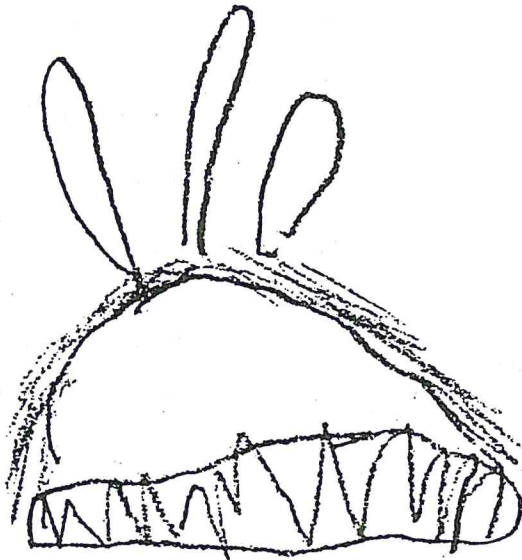

Dear Chief Maracle;

District Discretionary Minor Capital Infrastructure Budget

I am writing to inform your Council and administration about the department's southern district plans this year for funding the C-31 related requirements in 1994-95. DIAND is no longer funding C-31 related requirements separately, the funding has been rolled into the region's total capital allocation and has become a part of the region's base for capital.

The southern district has been provided a discretionary minor capital infrastructure budget of \$ 3,528,000 for 1994-95 with which we will attempt to address the following:

A) Existing C-31 housing/infrastructure pressures .

We recognize that many First Nations have existing housing projects related to C-31 populations and are counting on receiving assistance this year. To assist the communities, we will allocate a portion of this overall budget for this year (60%) to meet the needs. The allocation for the discretionary minor capital infrastructure budget will be \$ 2,116,800. We will distribute the funds based upon your 1993-94 allocation for C-31 housing and infrastructure. While the overall allocation available for 94-95 is reduced, we are ensuring that every community gets a share of the available funds. Each community will get the same percentage distribution of the 94-95 allocation as was received by the community last fiscal year.

Your community's allocation for 1994-95 will be \$ 86,945.

A notice of budget adjustment will be forwarded to you by the Funding Services unit very shortly and you will be requested to adjust your minor capital plan to indicate the project details. Documentation of C-31 housing units / recipients will no longer be required.



B) Other Minor-capital Infrastructure

The District will be utilizing the remaining \$1,411,200 to deal with the minor capital infrastructure issues that arise during the year:

- o Minor-capital infrastructure projects that fall under the District infrastructure program introduced in 1993-94. This is a cost-shareable program wherein we provide funding for priority water, sewer, and roads projects and communities contribute 10 % of the costs through re-imbursement in the next fiscal year.
- o High priority projects related to the identification or remediation of environmental issues;
- o Other requests for special funding. The department's Ontario regional office in Toronto will no longer be retaining funds for emergency minor-capital issues. Districts must manage from within their budget allocation.


The District's Capital Management Committee will manage the budget based on projects submitted during the year from First Nations. Project requests should be made through the Funding Services Manager for your area. Health and safety related infrastructure projects will as always be given priority. Funding is very limited.

Looking Ahead

The District has been provided with target allocations for our district discretionary minor-capital infrastructure budget next year and the year after. The District budget will continue, but will be allocated funding by region on the basis of the adjusted population formula. Since we have been funded above those formula levels in the past, the result will be a further reduction of the discretionary minor-capital infrastructure budget in 1995-96.

During the fall of 1994 I will be arranging for several workshop sessions with the Chiefs of First Nations to discuss some options for distribution of the discretionary minor capital funds in the 1995-96 year.

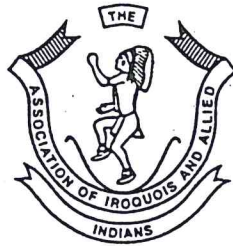



Dear Chief Maracle:

This is in response to your letter concerning tax exemption for gasoline purchases by your community.

This branch has no desire to deny your community's tax exemption on gasoline purchases and at no time has the branch done so.

The gasoline tax refund program allows First Nations people to purchase gasoline exempt of provincial gasoline taxes from authorized dealers on their reserve. The dealer subsequently claims a refund for the tax from this ministry.

Mohawk Imperial Sales, a commercial business owned by Mr. Andrew Maracle, is authorized to participate in the refund program but appears to have chosen not to. By not participating, he is requiring his First Nation customers to pay the gasoline taxes on their purchases. Mr. Maracle's decision to deny the tax exemption to your community is a matter that your Council should address with Mr. Maracle.

In the meantime, I assume that community members will continue to purchase their gasoline tax-free, from the other three authorized dealers.

## **Sheppard subway construction creating up to 15,000 jobs**

**TORONTO** -- Construction of the Sheppard Avenue subway will bring major economic and social benefits to Metro Toronto, Ontario Premier Bob Rae said today at the official groundbreaking for the new transit line.

"This significant investment in transit is vital to jobs, people and economic activity in Metro," said Premier Rae. "In many respects, expansion of our transit system is not just the best option, it is the only option to ensure the continued economic growth of Metro. There is no room for more cars on Metro's roads."

Construction of the 6.4-km line is expected to create up to 15,000 full-year jobs and cost \$945 million. The province will provide almost \$709 million, with Metro providing the balance. Over time, 20 per cent of the total is expected to be recovered from the private sector.

The new subway line, scheduled for completion by 2001, will serve Metro's most heavily used transit corridor. It will have five stations -- Yonge, Bayview, Bessarion, Leslie and Don Mills -- and will be fully accessible to people with disabilities.

The Sheppard subway is one of four projects the province is proposing under the \$2.5-billion Rapid Transit Expansion Program. Also included are a new line along Eglinton Avenue West and extensions to the Spadina and Scarborough Rapid Transit lines.

First announced by the premier in February, 1993, the JobsOntario transit program is expected to create up to 50,000 direct and indirect jobs.

"When we improve our public transit systems we improve the quality of life for local residents," said Transportation Minister Gilles Pouliot. "We are working with Metro to ensure all four lines can be built now, because it makes good sense -- financially, environmentally and socially."

## **DIAND RELEASES DEPARTMENTAL AUDIT REPORTS**

**OTTAWA (May 9, 1994)** -- Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND), Ronald A. Irwin, today released departmental audit reports prepared by or for the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

"We have a responsibility to provide information to the public on the department's programs and policies," said Minister Irwin. "The efficiency and effectiveness of those policies and programs must be shared with Canadians if they are to be kept informed on how their tax dollars are spent."

The release of the 31 reports today underlines the Minister's commitment to open and accessible information sharing with First Nations and the public in general.

"I believe information sharing is essential for responsible and representative government," added the Minister. "It is fundamental to achieving the goals of First Nations while respecting the concerns and interests of all Canadians."

### **Graduated licensing enforcement starts June 6**

**TORONTO** - Ontario becomes the first province in Canada to implement graduated licensing for new drivers on Monday, June 6 when the final phase of implementation -- mandatory driver restrictions and police enforcement -- go into effect.

"We are serious about saving lives and making our roads safer," said Transportation Minister Gilles Pouliot. "New drivers, regardless of their age, are over-represented in traffic collisions and fatalities. Graduated licensing addresses this problem."

Ontario's graduated licensing system is a two-year, two-level program affecting new drivers of all ages in the province. It is designed to ensure these drivers can gain experience gradually under low-risk conditions. Among the requirements in Level One, car drivers may not drive without a qualified accompanying driver, may not drive between midnight and 5 a.m., and may not drive if they have been drinking any alcohol. In Level Two additional privileges are granted. However, drivers must still maintain a zero blood-alcohol level.

Drivers who violate the conditions of graduated licensing are subject to a fine and a 30-day suspension of driving privileges. The 30-day period is added to the time requirement for that level. Drivers in the graduated licensing system who accumulate nine demerit points for driving offenses will receive a 60-day suspension of their licence. In comparison, fully licensed drivers receive a 30-day suspension after accumulating 15 points.

"If we can save even one life by requiring new drivers to get experience before they earn a full licence then graduated licensing will be a success," said Pouliot. "We are confident it will make our roads safer for all users."

To cover the cost of the comprehensive new system the total fee for the written and first road test has increased to \$50. The fee for the new Level Two road test has been set at \$75.

The licensing fees for driver-related tests for air brake endorsement, truck, bus and driver instructor road tests, are also increasing to reflect the cost of administering them.

**PROVINCIAL ABORIGINAL BUSINESS VENTURES PROGRAM  
EXPANDS ASSISTANCE TO FIRST NATION'S ENTREPRENEURS**

**TORONTO** - Ontario Economic Development and Trade Minister Frances Lankin, today announced that the Aboriginal Business Ventures Loan Program has been extended to run to early 1995.

Introduced as a one-year pilot program in September 1993, the program provides provincial loan guarantees of up to \$15,000 for members of First Nations communities to start-up new or expand existing small businesses.

"This program enables us to increase the opportunity for Aboriginal entrepreneurs to work together with the province to create jobs, establish viable businesses and boost the economic potential of local communities," said Ms. Lankin.

The program was developed in partnership with the financial community and Aboriginal business and economic development representatives. It originally targeted the First Nations communities of Akwasasne, Moose Factory, and Manitoulin Island and Lake Huron's north shore as far west as Sault Ste. Marie.

The program is now available to First Nations communities located across northeastern Ontario as far west as Chapleau and the Mushkegowuk Territory in northern Ontario along James Bay and Hudson Bay, as well as all of eastern, central and southwestern Ontario.

"The extension of Aboriginal Business Ventures gives more Aboriginal entrepreneurs and business groups greater access to advice and guidance for starting up a business," said Bud Wildman, Minister Responsible for Native Affairs. "This program is one of several key initiatives designed to meet the specific business needs of the aboriginal business community."



In addition to the Bank of Montreal, four major chartered banks including the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, Toronto-Dominion, the Royal Bank of Canada and the Bank of Nova Scotia, actively participate as lenders under the program. Discussions with Aboriginal Economic Development Corporations and the chartered banks have led to the decision to extend the pilot period.

"This program is helping promote partnership between Aboriginal entrepreneurs, the government and the banking community," commented Susan Strelloff, President and CEO of the Development Corporations of Ontario.

Administered by the Ontario Development Corporation (ODC) a Crown agency of the Ministry of Economic Development and Trade, the Aboriginal Business Ventures Program operates with a budget of \$1.2 million which will assist approximately 80 aboriginal business projects by 1995.

### **Report shows there is work to be done to improve road safety**

**TORONTO --** The Ontario Road Safety Annual Report, released this week, shows there is still a lot of work to be done to improve road safety in the province, says Transportation Minister Gilles Poulriot.

"The government is doing its part to build and maintain quality road networks," said Poulriot. "But to meet our goal of making Ontario's roads the safest in North America, drivers must improve their behaviour behind the wheel. That's where it all starts."

The report, documenting the number and types of collisions occurring on Ontario highways during 1992, shows driver error and alcohol are still the two most significant factors leading to collisions and fatalities. As well, young people between 16 and 24 years of age continue to be over-represented among fatalities.

"The cost of road collisions in Ontario includes 1,100 deaths, 90,000 injuries and a \$9-billion price tag to taxpayers for health care, property damage, lost wages and insurance," said Poulriot. "That cost is unacceptably high to all of us."

The province has introduced a number of measures to improve road safety. These include: graduated licensing for all new drivers; the introduction of demerit points for drivers who don't wear their seat belts or ensure that passengers under 16 are properly secured; a pilot project using chevron markers to reduce tailgating; and a pilot project that will use photo radar to deter speeding.

"While education and enforcement will prevent some collisions," the minister said, "our message to drivers is that road safety starts with you."

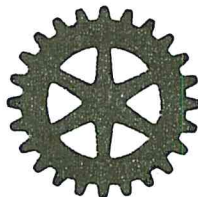

Dear Chief Earl R. Hill:

I have enclosed for your information a document associated with the implementation of the **Dental Claims Processing System 2 - Release 2** of the **Non-Insured Health Services Program**. It should be noted that this change will not be a reduction of services but rather will increase the level of automation for the processing of dental claims for services provided to the members of your First Nation.

The **Schedule of Dental Services** will be made available to all dental providers in Ontario Region and will be mailed out over the next two weeks as part of the new **Dental Practitioner Information Kit** prepared for this launch. The schedule outlines all dental benefits currently provided under the Non-Insured Health Services Program and is provided as a reference for Band and Community Health Workers.

Effective July 1, 1994 increased automation of the claims processing system will introduce the use of payment codes for settlement of orthodontic claims by Ontario Blue Cross and will require minor changes to current office practices on submission of NIHB-Dent-29 forms to either Medical Services Branch or Ontario Blue Cross. These changes are administrative in nature.



Although every effort has been made to consider all aspects of this conversion and to facilitate the transition between the current manual system for settlement of orthodontic claims by Medical Services Branch and the introduction of an automated claims processing system through Ontario Blue Cross, some disruption is inevitable during implementation. We should like to advise you and the providers of orthodontic services that we will continue to correct problems as expeditiously as possible upon identification, however, your understanding and co-operation will be necessary during the initial implementation.

I hope that this program enhancement better addresses the dental needs of your First Nation.

## **CHIPPEWAS OF THE THAMES FIRST NATION OPENS NEW HEALTH CENTRE**

**CARADOC** - The Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, located 30 kilometres west of London, Ontario, officially opened a new administration and health centre complex today.

Health Canada, Medical Services Branch provided a capital contribution of \$ 592,126 to fund construction of the Chippewas Health Centre.

Richard Jock, regional director of Health Canada, Medical Services Branch, Ontario Region, said the health centre is an important addition to the community. It will provide a place for community members to receive information, develop skills and the opportunity to improve their overall health. It is a close-at-hand resource which will offer community members support, counselling and education on a variety of health issues.

The centre includes holistic health facilities; an examination and treatment room; a community health room; office space for community health representatives, nurses, and alcohol and drug abuse program officers; a visiting professional office; a reception office; and a waiting room.

The Chippewas Health Centre will serve approximately 2000 people, both on and off the reserve. It compliments the existing and planned infrastructure including a K-8 school, as well as a community centre and library, and a fire and police station which are under construction.
