Notes Changes in Water Quality in the Bay of Quinte

prepared by Fred Stride, 14 May 1998

- It is possible to identify three distinct periods of ecosystem change: (1) pr P control (1968-1978), post-P control (1979-1995) and zebra mussel invasion (1995-1997).
- Phosphorus loads to the Bay of Quinte have remained constant in recent years. BQRAP phosphorus controls (e.g., STP upgrades, farm practice improvements) are helping to (1) reduce phosphorus concentrations and loads in the bay and (2) move water quality toward the BQRAP targets.
- Phosphorus concentrations in the Bay of Quinte are still sufficiently high to cause eutrophic conditions. The average upper Bay of Quinte P concentration is between 25-30 ug/L with peak concentrations in August exceeding 50 ug/L. In comparison, the average Lake Superior P concentration is 1-5 ug/L and Lake Ontario is 10 ug/L. The increase in lat summer Bay of Quinte P concentrations are caused by decreased water flow from the tributaries and sediment P feedback. The BQRAP objective included shifting the trophic status of the bay from hyper-eutrophic to eutrophic.
- Zebra mussels invaded the Bay of Quinte in 1994. One impact is increase grazing of algae. With less algae biomass, summer (May to October) me chlorophyll concentrations in the bay are decreasing while the summer mean water clarity level is increasing. Upper Bay of Quinte chlorophyll concentrations have dropped from 30 ug/L to about 7 ug/L in recent years In the same period, water clarity has risen from 60 cm to 300 cm. It shou be noted that, in comparison, Lake Erie phosphorus concentrations have increased in recent years, and reduced algae biomass has not been observed in the offshore zones of Lake Ontario.
- The P:Chl ratio is changing (i.e., P loads remain the same while chlorophy levels are dropping). To return to pre-zebra mussel chlorophyll levels wou require massive increases in P loads. More phosphorus will bring with it other nuisance problems such as more attached algae in the nearshore zones and increased blue-green algae growth throughout the bay.
- Food web productivity in the Bay of Quinte is the same, but zebra mussel are causing the productivity to be shift from pelagic (open water) to bottor dwelling species.
- Zebra mussels are consuming the more common blue-green algae and allowing a different blue-green algae, Microsystis, to dominate. Some additional environmental concerns may become apparent as a result (e.g. toxicity of Microsystis). Overall, the biomass of blue-green algae is decreasing, although algal blooms occur in August and September. The BQRAP objectives included decreasing the severity of blue-green algal blooms
- No recent data are available to report on changes in aquatic plant biomas or coverage. BQRAP modelling (Technical Report #14) suggests the BQRAP targets and objectives will likely result in increased plant coverage in most nearshore zones.
- The ecosystem links between lower trophic levels and fish species are no fully documented. The BQRAP objectives included establishing a more diverse fish community to ensure a more sustainable ecosystem.
- In summary, the Bay of Quinte is not nutrient limited; rather, the bay is enriched and, while planktonic production is decreasing, overall web food productivity remains high. Recent scientific research shows the zebra mussel filtering of algae is causing the productivity of the Bay of Quinte to shift to other species and and change the Bay of Quinte ecosystem.

REPORT FROM COUNCIL by Wm. J. Brant

Enclosed with this report is the unaudited budget financial statement highlights for April 1, 1997 to March 31, 1998. Next month I will include the 1998-1999 budget highlights.

I have asked by motion for the proposed 1998 budgets from each of the companies owned by the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte as well as the first quarter financial reports. I will keep you informed.

It is my opinion that the loans for houses and renovations <u>not</u> be handled by the Band Council but rather by a qualified loans officer hired by MBQ who has experience in dealing with loans and collections. This person would work under terms of reference set by MBQ Council and would include personal interviews and strict confidentiality guidelines similar to other financial lending institutitions.

My reason for suggesting this plan is that all loan clients would be dealing directly with the person taking the application and making the decision, thereby giving the client firsthand information as to why a loan may not be granted. Clients thinking they were not treated fairly or were discriminated against by the loan officer would have the right to appeal their case to the MBQ Council for a hearing.

I am not in favour of the present method for selecting housing loan clients. I believe that applicants have been misled under this system to think that those scoring the highest points would receive loans. This is not the case. In the 1998 selection, an applicant with 38 points did not receive a loan when applicants with 28 and 27 points did receive a loan. This is a clear indication that the present system is not working the way it was initially designed to work.

A motion was moved and passed by Council to hold a General Council Meeting on Sunday, July 5, 1998 to hopefully answer any questions or concerns you may have concerning MBQ Council business.

Spring for me is a very busy time as I try to plant crops and harvest forage. As a result I was unable to represent you at the recent three day AIAI meeting held in Tyendinaga on May 21, 22 and 23rd. I apologize for not being able to attend and to give you a report on these discussions.

I have set aside Wednesday of each week, beginning June 3, 1998 to hold regular office hours from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. giving you an opportunity to voice to me your concerns. Phone 967-9861 and Linda Maracle will schedule an appointment. After hours your call will be taken by a mechanical secretary.

I thank you for your patience during my busy spring season.

☺ The Passing of the Sacred Wampum Belt **☺**

In the Spring of 1997, I spent some time in Kahnawake to learn about their community activities that came about from having Kahnawake Schools Diabetes Prevention Project in place for three years. While I was there Alex McComber took me around to all the schools to be introduced. One person in particular whom we talked with was an Elder named Joe Jacobs, who asked Alex "When are we going to walk to Akwesasne to carry the message of the seriousness of diabetes to our people, the way our ancestors did?" Alex responded with "Yes Joe, we'll have to work on that when it gets warmer out."

On Friday, July 4th, Joe Jacobs dream was finally realized, when after a tobacco burning, he and a number of other walkers left Kahnawake on foot to reach Akwesasne Saturday July 5th at about 6pm. And so the creation of a traditional wampum belt with the message "Telakonekwenhstatsikhetare - meaning, Our Blood is Too Sweet" was made and passed to Akwesasne that day. I attended the closing ceremony as the tired and determined walkers reached the end of their destination. More than 24 people walked one hundred and ten kilometers in total. Joe Jacobs talked of the hopes of more diabetes awareness and prevention programs happening so future generations will be more healthy and perhaps won't even have to contend with this disease. It was a very inspiring experience.

Not long after this event was completed, I received a call from the "Tsitewatakari:tat

- Let's Get Healthy Program" of Akwesasne, letting us know that the Wampum was coming to Tyendinaga in October of 1997. Tyendinaga is 264 kilometers from Akwesasne, therefore they thought it was more feasible to cycle the Wampum here instead of walking. So on Thursday, October 16th, after the traditional tobacco burning the cyclers set out on their two day trip to arrive in Tyendinaga on Friday October 17, 1998 at about 4:30pm. With the help of staff and many volunteers we put on a nourishing meal which was followed by a closing tobacco ceremony with the actual exchange of the Wampum which has been displayed at the Thavendanega Health Centre.

Now it's our turn to pass the Wampum on to the next place, which is going to be Alderville, an Ojibway community near Warkworth, Ontario. For this to happen, we will need volunteers to provide sandwiches, fresh fruit, juice and water for the participants who will be walking. We will need volunteers to drive vehicles to follow the walkers into Alderville, and of course we will need people to walk from this community. We can set up a relay system so that no one will have to walk the whole way, which is approximately 130 kilometers. This will take a commitment of 2 days to complete. So you have some time to contact me at the Thayendanega Health Centre. The target date for this event is Monday, June 29th and Tuesday, June 30, 1998, with hopes that traffic will not be too heavy on those days. Please call to register if you want to take part in this important event at

967-3603.

What's the Significance of This Event? We are trying to get the message out that Diabetes is a serious disease and you must treat it as seriously as Cancer or any other life threatening disease. Diabetes is also a "Do it Yourself Disease", meaning you must take a role and responsibility in your own health care. As I have said before, make healthy choices with food as often as possible, be active every day, take your medications appropriately, and maintain a positive attitude. This formula can mean the difference between having cold feet or no feet. Dialysis, blindness, amputations and nerve damage do not have to happen. These complications can be prevented if you take charge of your own health.

Please come out and show your support and help us pass this important message on across Indian Country. And don't forget, you can count these miles on your Moccasin Trail walking calendar too!

Check in with your mileage the first Tuesday every month at the Thayendanega Health Centre from 8:30 am to 6pm.



EVENFLO HAPPY CAMPER PLAYPEN

RECENT DEATH PROMPTS ADDITIONAL WARNING

Evenflo and Health Canada are aware of a recent death of an 11 month old child in Montreal who got his neck caught in the top rail of a Happy Camper playpen when the hinges folded.

Evenflo Company Inc., of Oakville, Ontario is offering free hinge cover kits to all 211,000 owners of its portable playpens sold under the Happy Camper, Happy Cabana and Kiddie Camper model names. If the top rail hinges are not fully rotated, the product can fold, possibly trapping the child in the "V" formed by the folded top rails. Also, if leaned on or sat upon, the rotating plastic hinges in the middle of the folding top rails can crack or break causing small parts, sharp edges or the playpen to collapse.

Playpens subject to this action are the rectangular-shaped Happy Camper and Happy Cabana models and the square-shaped Kiddie Camper model. "Evenflo" and the model name of the playpen are printed on the side rails. Each playpen folds compactly and comes with a carrying bag and mattress.

The hinge covers fit over the hinges of the playpen only when the hinges are fully rotated into place, assuring that the playpen is properly set up. the hinge covers also provide additional reinforcement to the sides of the playpen. They snap on easily but firmly and can be moved by an adult to allow normal folding. Consumers who have a Happy Camper, Happy Cabana or Kiddie Camper playpen should stop using it immediately and call Evenflo toll free at 1-800-477-9178 (24 hours a day) to receive free hinge cover kits. Consumers may also write to Evenflo Company Inc., 1171 Invicta Drive, Oakville, Ontario L6H 4M1.

Evenflo urges consumers to carefully follow the instructions and fully rotate the hinges, to inspect the hinges regularly for signs of cracking or breaking and to avoid leaning or sitting on the top rails. Consumers who own one of these playpens with a cracked or broken hinges should stop using it immediately and contact Evenflo to receive a replacement playpen.

Christ Church Restoration is Planned

Christ Church, Her Majesty's Royal Chapel of the Mohawks, built in 1843, stands at the top of a hill in Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory. The structure itself is a monument, but its presence will not tell you who the Mohawks are nor why they settled here. A regal Gothic structure, Christ Church still stands as a symbol of the political and military alliance the British Crown made with the Mohawks. That alliance was formed over 280 years ago when the Mohawks lived in what is now the state of New York. The Tyendinaga library's archival documents, archeological evidence and the oral history of the Mohawk heritage help track the story. Like the strength found in the teachings of the traditional Long House, the church also demonstrates a strong believe in peace, unity and respect. According to Tyendinaga chief, R. Donald Maracle, "These lands through to the Quebec region were shared by the Mohawk and the Mississauga Nations. These were our hunting grounds. So the land was familiar to us. That line, the border, was

governments." History describes the Mohawk journey and the injustices created for them in what is now the United States following the American Revolution. The Mohawks had fought alongside the British against colonial Americans from 1775 to 1783. The war ended in the defeat of the British who had lost control over the area. As a result, the Mohawks were evicted from their traditional homelands, the Mohawk Valley in what is now New York State. The Treaty of Versailles, signed in 1783 between the

never there. It was a creation of non-Native

British and the Americans, made no provision for the return of the Mohawk Valley to the people who had been British allies throughout the war. In May 1784, 15 canoes with the families of John Deserontyon and Aaron and Isaac Hill arrived on the shores of the Bay of Quinte. "The area was originally named the Mohawk Tract and was later renamed Tyendinaga, "said Chief Maracle. In 1793, Treaty Number Three and a half was signed with the British under King George III. "I think we're the oldest treaty reserve in Ontario. I believe that treaty is only nine days older than the treaty signed with Six Nations," Chief Maracle added. The same year the families arrived on the Bay of Quinte, a small log building was erected. It stood as the church until 1840 and after the structure deteriorated a new building was erected in 1843. Local librarian Karen Lewis recalled a story her family had told her about the night fire claimed the former church on May 12, 1906. The story was special, Lewis said, because that was the night her great aunt, Grace Crawford, was born. Chief Maracle recalled stories about the fire as told by Elder Eva Maracle. "She's 102 years of age now. She remembers seeing the lightning hit the church belfry that night." The building was refurbished within the year with financial assistance from a Mohawk trust fund, Chief Maracle said. The church is home to many gifts from the British monarchy. The first was a silver communion set and a reed organ donated by Queen Anne following a visit to England by four Mohawk chiefs in 1710. Since then, Chief Maracle said, "There have been gifts from three Queens and two Kings sent to this

community."


He adds respectfully, "The royal family usually receive gifts. They don't usually give gifts." The Honor Roll, a list of Mohawk men who fought both World Wars hangs in the church. "There are over 200 names for World War II alone. That's a k for a small community," said Chief Maracle. "The gifts are their recognition of the Mohawk people and their contributions."

Christ Church is "the most impressive and prestigious site in the Quinte area and the oldest structure on the reserve," Chief Maracle continue When asked what he thought about the yearly influx of tourists to this special place, he said, "If people come and respect what is there, this is good. It has always been our way to show respe for things which deserve respect. A visit here may help to deepen awareness. Our traditions teach that the roots of the pine tree extend in all directions. Preserving the structure shows respect our ancestors whether they were traditional or Christian."

Chief Maracle said he recently received a call from the sergeant of the vestry at St. James Pala in England, offering to lend support to the churc restoration. The chief, who is heading up the restoration plans, says Christ Church was designated a National Historic Site in 1995 by Heritage Canada.







There once was an old woman who would knit for hours and reminisce about days gone by, trying to fill the empty space inside of her. Things weren't always that way. Life has been good to her and she knows that someday we will meet again in a faraway land where the sun never sets. For you see, this dear lady of whom I have been talking, is known simply to me as, "Mom."
