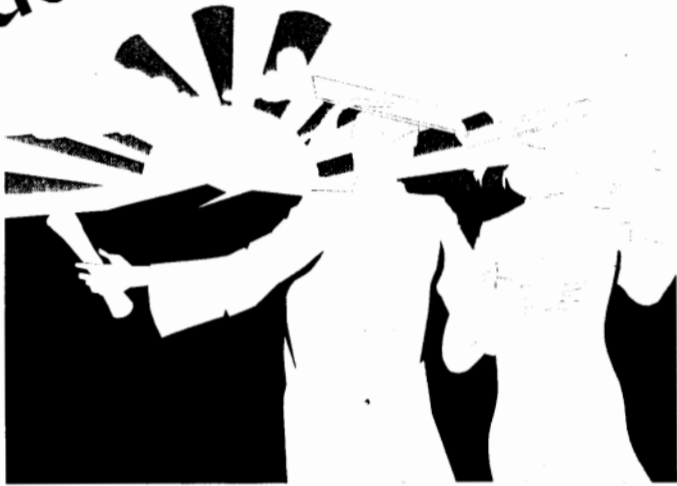

This procedure has not been established to hinder your access to the Council, but to enhance service in a timely fashion.

**PROCEDURE FOR LOCAL BUSINESS**

Local Business Meetings are held the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday's of each month at 7:00 p.m. unless otherwise notified.

The deadline for inclusion on the Local Business Agenda is the previous Friday at 12:00 p.m. Requests made after the deadline will be placed on the following Local Business Agenda.

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council requires that the Community member provide a written statement on the issue the member wishes to discuss by the deadline. Assistance will be provided upon request. This will allow the staff the opportunity to gather any additional information on the issue so the Council can be fully informed and that your time is well spent.

All requests are to be directed to Angela Maracle, Administrative Officer, or Bonnie Thompson, Administrative Support.

The order for the agenda is determined on a first-come, first-serve basis and each slot is scheduled for 20 minutes.

Please be advised that Community members that do not follow this procedure will not be recognized to be heard at the meeting. This is to ensure that all the proper information is available to the Council so that an informed decision can be made that is fair and equitable to every member.

**This new procedure becomes effective for the first Local Business Meeting in March 2004.**

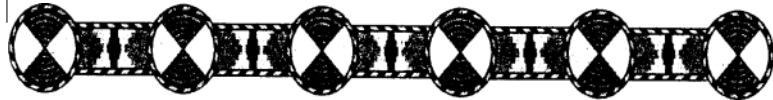

## MEETING MINUTES



### TYENDINAGA MOHAWK COUNCIL MINUTES MARCH 16, 2004

A meeting of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council was held on Tuesday, March 16, 2004 10:00 a.m. in the Council Chambers.

Present: Chief R. Donald Maracle  
Councillors: Blaine Loft, Roy C. Maracle and Willard Hill  
Staff: Scott Maracle, Cindy Thompson  
Guests: Margaret Tims, First Nations and Inuit Health Branch-NIHB  
Jeff Stonefish, AIAI Policy Analyst

The Draft Privacy Code has been eliminated from the 2004-05 Contribution Agreement due to its draft status as confirmed by Cindy Thompson and Margaret Tims of Health Canada.

Several problematic issues were identified in the First Nations and Inuit Health Branch's draft Privacy Policy including significant Client Consent reference. Consultation regarding the Privacy Policy by First Nations and a final document is to be provided by FNIHB

Privacy training for staff needed. Funding is needed to implement the security measures around computer systems, identification, office security, keys, lock, and safe combinations relating to security of Privacy of Information

The final document is signed off by the Assistant Deputy Minister

Maracle that Council approve to sign the Medical Transportation Contribution Agreement #ON0500047 with Her Majesty the Queen as represented by the Minister of Health Canada, First Nations and Inuit Health Branch for the fiscal year 2004-05 in the amount of \$93,170.00 with the Draft Privacy Code removed from the agreement. Carried

There has been no increase in the medical transportation budget since the fiscal year 1999/00. Margaret Tims advised that Council will soon receive 2003 medical transportation audit comments from Health Canada. This is the first year Health Canada will provide audit comments to First Nations.

The need for a Patient Transportation Coordinator position was discussed. The two requests submitted to First Nations and Inuit Health Branch to use the 2003-2004 Patient Transportation surplus to partially fund a coordinator position was denied. The surplus is to be used on "other health related" activities/service. Cindy Thompson stated that Coordination of the program is direct client service and without it there would be no service. Margaret Tims will advise of the definition of "other health related" as written in the contribution agreements. Margaret Tims agreed to reply by March 20, 2004

There are 80-100 clients per month from the community utilizing the Medical Transportation Program.



WHEREAS INAC personnel have reduced FNTI's 2004 – 05 fiscal year allocation to \$2.2 million and have converted \$1.7 million of education dollars from Economic Development and are flowing this money on a one time basis to FNTI through the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte; and

WHEREAS FNTI has been advised that the only funding available to it for fiscal year 2005 – 06 is the \$500,000 Indian Studies Support Program allocation; and

WHEREAS 17 people on layoff notice due to the reduction in funding and more positions may be in jeopardy, less spending locally will have an economic impact, and the loss of local jobs, results in negative social and financial impacts; and

WHEREAS partnerships and affiliations that FNTI has taken years to develop could jeopardize the advancements that have been made in regards to access to education for Aboriginal people in Ontario and Canada;

THEREFORE the Chief and Council of the Mohawks of The Bay of Quinte resolve that they very strongly support the effects of FNTI in offering Aboriginal controlled and delivered educational programs.

AND FURTHER, the Chief and Council request the immediate intervention of the Minister of Indian and Northern Affairs Canada in an effort to come to a positive resolution of this crisis. M.C.R. #2004/05-032







Maracle that the Council approved to tender the Mud and Sucker Creek Bridge Rehabilitation Project and advertise in the Daily Commercial News, Kingston Whig Standard, Belleville Intelligencer and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte by special flyers. The tender will close on June 1, 2004 at 2:00 p.m. and tenders are to be returned to the Mohawk Administration Office. The contractor's bid must provide either financial security, a Bid Bond or a certified cheque. G.D. Jewell Engineering will supervise and inspect the project and Peter Brant will be the Project Manager.

Council reviewed Tyendinaga Landfill management issues. Todd Kring reported that the four additional monitoring wells will be installed during the week of May 17, 2004 at a cost of \$47,500 for the wells and monitoring program. INAC will be requested to reimburse these costs.

Waste disposal bins have been installed and Nibourg Waste Management is transferring the waste to Lafleche Environmental Incorporated 17125, Moose Creek, near Cornwall, at a cost of \$80 per tonne and \$250 rental fee of three garbage bins

Council reviewed the May 5, 2004, Tyendinaga Landfill Closure Plan, outlined in the letter to Ginny Pearce, A/Capital Management Officer at Indian and Northern Affairs Canada. The capital cost for closure is estimated to be \$3,272,300 and annual costs for operation maintenance to monitor the existing landfill site and set up a waste transfer station is estimated to be \$244,860.



## Trustee Report

### May 2004.

On May 11th, 2004, a final decision was made by both the HPEDSB and ALDSB to accept the "Staggered Bussing Proposal", to be implemented for September 2004. This was not an easy decision to make since there was much opposition by parents and other stake holders. In the end, it was felt that the advantages greatly outweighed the disadvantages as far as safety, ride times and reduced costs were concerned. It should be noted that 54 of the 72 boards in Ontario are already operating on an early schedule for secondary schools and a later schedule for elementary schools and have not expressed concerns relating to student's performance which was one of the major concerns of parents. It appears that Quinte Mohawk School will decide to remain on their regular schedule of 8:50am - 3:10 pm which will coincide with Deseronto Public School and possibly other HPEDSB schools that do not have bussed students which have the option of starting on their regular start and finish time. This may cause some fine tuning in coordinating athletic events with other elementary schools but may also help with more buses available to Quinte Mohawk School since the secondary schools will be starting at 8:15 am and finishing at 2:30 pm. which means that some secondary school buses may be available to do additional runs. The administration at Quinte Mohawk School will make any adjustments required during the next school year.

The new start times will have an impact on secondary school students from the Territory since all secondary schools in the HPEDSB and ALDSB will start earlier at 8:15 am and finish at 2:30 pm. Pick up times will have to be determined when all information is shared by the Tri-Board Student Transportation Services. Initial indications are that there will be minimal changes required to adjust pickup times for secondary school students.

## Who can attend HOPE?

Students must be between the ages of 16 and 20 years of age and, in most cases, will have been out of school for at least six months.

## Where is HOPE?

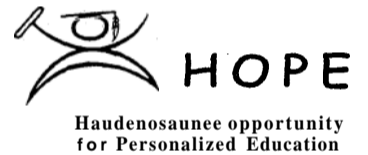
The HOPE program is located on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory at the First Nations Technical Institute.

### Diabetes...Did You Know??

What is Diabetes?

Diabetes is a lifelong condition where your body does not produce enough insulin or your body cannot use the insulin it produces. Your body needs insulin to change the ingested sugar from food into chemical energy. When you don't have enough insulin, the sugar stays in your blood so that your 'blood sugar level' gets high. High blood sugar levels over long periods of time can cause complications such as damage to blood vessels, kidneys, and difficulties with circulation.

There are three main types of diabetes: Type 1, Type 2, and Gestational Diabetes:

- ◆ Type 1 Diabetes: This is when your body makes little or no insulin
- ◆ Type 2 Diabetes: This type of diabetes is where your body makes insulin but cannot use it properly
- ◆ Gestational Diabetes: This is when your body is not able to properly use insulin during pregnancy. This is the diabetes that is most common in First Nation People.

Many years ago, diabetes was not a concern for Aboriginal people. In earlier times, Aboriginal people needed to be very active in order to survive, and they also ate traditional foods. Some people think that the change in lifestyle for Aboriginal people has caused them to be less active and eat different foods. This in turn, puts Aboriginal people at a greater risk for developing diabetes opposed to other Canadians.

### INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY HEALTH APPROACHES PROGRAM

#### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Indigenous Community Health Approaches program will explore Indigenous knowledge and philosophies as they relate to human health and the natural environment. The program will be rooted in Indigenous knowledge and will expose First Nations health professionals to cultural teachings which will broaden their understanding about health, health care and environmental and human health issues facing First Nations communities.

This one (1) year certificate post-diploma program will provide the First Nations health professional with the opportunity to acquire new skills and understandings. The program of study will outline how cultural knowledge can be applied in resolving health issues facing First Nations communities, while creating opportunities for enrichment of their own personal cultural knowledge.

#### DELIVERY

The program consists of twelve courses totaling 600 hours of study. Upon successful completion of the program the learner will earn an Indigenous Community Health Approach Program post-diploma certificate.

The program is offered through a partnership agreement between First Nations Technical Institute (FNTI) and St. Lawrence College of Applied Arts and Technology.

#### WHO SHOULD PARTICIPATE?

This program has been designed to meet the learning and professional development needs of current First Nations Health professionals. It is intended for those health professionals who would like to gain a greater appreciation of Indigenous knowledge and its application with respect to human and environmental health.

The Program will focus on prevention and awareness, diabetes, diet, natural/herbal medicine, how care of the whole person and care of the body relates to the "good mind".

#### APPLICATION

To reserve your seat in this new program please complete and submit an application form. Application forms can be obtained from our website or by contacting First Nations Technical Institute, Health and Environment Department 613-396-3100.

#### ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The learner must possess an Ontario College Diploma, Ontario College Advanced Diploma Degree, or Equivalent in a health related field. It will be an asset for learners to be currently employed in the health field.

HOWEVER, learners that do not possess a post secondary diploma/degree may apply under the Prior Learning Assessment process.

#### COST

Total tuition for the program is \$3900. Course handouts and books are included in tuition fees. All travel and accommodation will be the responsibility of the learner (or the sponsor).

#### HOW AND WHERE WILL THE PROGRAM BE DELIVERED?

Learners will be required to attend eight (8) one-week in class sessions from September 2004 – August 2005. The courses will be offered at First Nations Technical Institute, Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory, Ontario.

### BREASTFEEDING CIRCLE

*I heard that so far one breastfeeding baby tested positive for West Nile Virus and that the virus may have passed from the mother to the baby in the breastmilk. Could my baby get West Nile Virus from breastfeeding? Should I stop breastfeeding if I think I may have been infected?*

**KEEP BREASTFEEDING.** If you become infected, it may be what protects your baby !

The following message comes from Dr. Jack Newman MD, a Toronto pediatrician who specializes in breastfeeding. (An explanation of medical terms follows the quote). . .

"As this virus is coming back into the news with a vengeance, it will happen, perhaps, that a breastfeeding mother may get or be suspected of having West Nile Virus. What should be done with her nursing infant? The following is quoted from the Academy of Breastfeeding Medicine News and Views, Volume 8(4), 2002, page 36. Written by Lawrence Gartner (neonatologist).

"The West Nile Virus (WNV) report from the CDC (Centre for Disease Control) is of great importance but we need to look at the facts. This is only one child. **The child was entirely well and asymptomatic.** The child is now apparently immune and presumably protected from future risk of infection. The mother continued to breastfeed the child throughout her illness. There is no evidence yet that any breastfeeding child has been ill from WNV infection. Finally, if a mother develops symptoms of WNV while breastfeeding, the greatest risk to the infant may come from interrupting the breastfeeding. Transmission of the virus almost certainly occurred during the period prior to the mother's developing fever and headache, when the viremia was at its peak. Shortly thereafter, through her breastmilk, she provided the infant with some immune protection as well as some non-specific antiviral agents. If the infant had not continued to receive breastmilk from the mother, the child might well have become clinically ill. Thus, the advice we need to give is to continue the breastfeeding even if the mother is symptomatic with what may be West Nile Virus infection -or any other infection -as long as the mother is clinically able to do so." Jack Newman, MD, FRCPC "

## RED CEDARS

### ROSE'S STORY

The following **story** of a woman may sound familiar to you. Perhaps these **things** have **happened** to you, a **friend**, or a **family member**.

I came to Canada 15 years ago. I feel very alone in Canada, especially when my husband is mean to me. I miss my family, my friends, and my community back home. Here, I feel sometimes that I have no one to turn to. Our community is very small and everyone knows each other. I am ashamed and scared to talk to them about how my husband treats me.

Sometimes my husband calls me stupid, and makes fun of my English. Sometimes he kicks and punches me. I depend on him for everything. I work with him in his jobs, but I do not have my own money. I have to beg him to buy me things I need, like boots and a winter coat.

A friend in my English class told me about agencies that help women. She told me that she had talked to a worker there about her husband and how he threatened her, made her feel worthless, and did not give her money. He locked her in the house, and stopped her from calling her parents. She did not know the same was happening to me. The worker in the agency told my friend that these are all forms of abuse, and that this abuse has an effect on her and an effect on the children.

My husband says if I leave our home, he will take the children. I am scared of losing my children. When I cry, he says, "If you don't like it, I'll send you back." I thought he could send me back, but I found out that it is not true: I have rights. There are agencies that help families where there is violence. I thought that maybe if I talked to them I would feel stronger. But it is still hard to think of leaving him.

I told Anna about my husband. She works in a women's agency. Anna listened to me and helped me to see I had choices. She helped me make a safety plan in case I wanted to leave suddenly. She also told me about the Protection Against Family Violence Act. It's a law that I can use if I am being physically abused or threatened.

Sometimes the hitting was so bad that I wanted to call the police, but I was afraid. One day, my husband was so loud – throwing things and hitting me – that the neighbours called the police. When the police came, they told me what the police could do. They can lay charges, remove him from the house, or take me to a safe place. I didn't want them to lay charges, but it was not up to me. I let the police take the children and me to shelter for abused women.

I talked to a worker at the shelter. I told her how my husband treats me and the things I'm afraid of.

- I am afraid my husband will take the children to another country and I will never see them again. The crisis worker told me about custody.
- I am afraid he will use the law against me to accuse me of kidnapping. The worker at the shelter said that I could apply for interim custody. You need to do that if you take the children with you.
- I am afraid that his family will come after me. His family is abusive to me, too. They say I can bring shame to them in our community. I am scared of what they would do to the children or to me. The worker told me how I could ask for protective orders.

The crisis worker also told me about other things such as legal aid and going to court. I learned about what I need to know and what my choices are. I know that there are things I can do.

#### "Custody"

Rose learned about child custody.

Custody is a legal term meaning the care and control of a child. It means having the right to make all major decisions about and for a child. Very often in Canada, it means having the child live on a day-to-day basis with the person with custody, but not always.

There are other related questions that Rose may have:

- Can he take the children away from me because I have no job and live in a shelter?
- What happens if I take the children from home with me to a shelter for abused women?
- How can I be accused of abducting my own children?
- How can I show that I felt the children or I were in danger of being harmed?
- How can he apply for custody of the children when he is threatening to harm them?
- What can I do in order to get custody of my children?
- How will I be able to prove to the court that abuse took place when no one else ever saw it?
- Do we have to sort out custody by fighting in court?
- How can I find a lawyer to help me?
- Do I need a lot of money to get a lawyer in order to get custody of my children?
- How long will it take to get an order for custody?
- Do I have to let him see the children even though he has threatened me that he will kidnap them?
- What can I do if my husband or partner breaks the custody

#### Can he take the children away from me because I have no job and live in a shelter?

If your partner asks for custody of the children or if he contests an action that you start, a court will make the final decision about where the children should be. The court will take many things into account when making this decision, but the guiding principle is what is best for the children.

Of course it is hard for the children to be living in a shelter away from their home and especially difficult if you have no income. If you have left an abusive situation, however, and you can show that the children and you were in danger of being harmed, the court is not likely to put the children at risk by placing them back in the home.

#### What happens if I take the children from home with me to a shelter for abused women?

There are two possible courses of action that your partner or husband might take using criminal or family law:

- He might make a complaint to the police that you have abducted the children.
- He might start a legal action for custody of the children.

#### How can I be accused of abducting my own children?

The law says that where there is no custody order in existence, it is an offence for one parent to take children under fourteen years of age from the other parent with the plan of keeping them away from him/her. If you hide the children so that they are not available to their other parent, there is a possibility that you will be charged.

Removing the children could also be an offence if it is against the terms of a custody agreement that already exists.

There is, however, a defence to any possible criminal charge. If you can show that you took the children away because the children or you were in immediate danger of being harmed or even that you honestly believed such a danger existed, then you may be able to resist criminal charges.

#### How can I show that I felt the children or I were in danger of being harmed?

It is extremely important to have proof to support your claim. If you are in an abusive situation, try to make some plans before you leave. Keep a record of when and how you or the children are abused. If you or the children are seeing counsellors because of the abuse, keep records of this also.

It will also be useful if there are any witnesses to the abuse. Even though you may think it is taking place in private, your friends and family may notice more than you think. Try talking to them to see if they can help.

### How can I apply for custody of the children when he is threatening to harm them?

Even when parents separate physically, they both still have equal custody rights to their children until a court order says differently.

### What can I do in order to get custody of my children?

It is very important that you deal with the issue of custody of your children immediately. This applies whether you take the children with you or whether you have to leave them behind with your husband or partner.

The only way that you can legally obtain custody of your children is by asking for an order from a court that deals with family law. It is possible for you to do this by yourself, but in reality it will be quicker and easier for you to get advice and assistance from a lawyer or from an agency that specializes in family matters.

### How will I be able to prove to the court that abuse took place when no one else ever saw it?

First, tell your lawyer everything that occurred so that he or she can bring the facts to the attention of the court.

In order for you to remember everything, try making some detailed notes as soon as you can. Make a note of every time your partner abused you or harassed you. Even though the incidents took place in private, your friends and family may have noticed more than you think and could be helpful witnesses. Try to remember times that you may have sought medical help or counselling as the hospital or crisis centre will have records.

Remember that the courts will need good reasons to give sole custody to one parent.

### Do we have to sort out custody by fighting in court?

It is always possible for parents to agree that their children should live with just one parent. The agreement can be informal but usually the agreements are put before the courts and made into court orders. If custody can be worked out by agreement and the court approves of the arrangement, there is no need for arguments and fighting in court. The court will simply approve the agreement made by the parents.

In a situation where the parents cannot agree about custody arrangements or where one party fears for the safety of the children, it is necessary to persuade the court to make the appropriate order.

### How can I find a lawyer to help me?

You need a lawyer who practices in the area of family law. There are several ways that you can find one.

- Lawyers are listed in the Yellow Pages
- Look for one who specializes in family law
- Ask your friends if they can recommend a person or a law firm
- The Law Society of your province will have a list of lawyers in your area who practice family law
- Legal Aid can refer you to a lawyer practicing in family law

### Do I need a lot of money to get a lawyer in order to get custody of my children?

There are many ways to get legal assistance when you have limited finances. First, you may be eligible for Legal Aid. Legal Aid is a fund that will pay part or all of your legal costs depending on how much money you have.

Second, you can discuss payment with your lawyer. He or she may be willing to charge a lower fee or let you pay by instalments.

If you are planning to leave an abusive situation, it is a good idea to put some money in a secret emergency fund that you can use when you leave.

### How long will it take to get an order for custody?

Although it can take anywhere between two months and two years to get a final custody order, the courts can grant an interim custody order quickly. For example, if you see your lawyer one afternoon, he or she can apply for the order the next morning. An interim custody order can give you temporary sole custody until the matter is finally resolved.

### Do I have to let him see the children even though he has threatened me that he will kidnap them?

The court normally gives the parent that does not have custody of the children access or visiting rights. The view of the courts is that normally every child has the right to see and associate with both parents. Exceptions can be made in a situation where it is likely that the child will face physical or emotional harm.

If you fear for the safety of your children you will have to tell your lawyer so that he or she can ask the court that special terms be written into the custody order. Examples of terms that could be requested are:

- No access is given, or
- Any visits are to be supervised by someone like a social worker, or
- Specific times and places are given when visits can take place.

It is very important that the terms of the order be specific and very clear. This is so that there is no confusion if the order is broken and it has to be enforced.

### What can I do if my partner or husband breaks the custody order?

You can immediately go back to the court for help. The court can order the police to enforce the order. It is very important that the terms of the order be specific and very clear, so that there is no confusion. The police will also need very clear evidence that the order has been breached. Keep records and ask for help from witnesses.

If someone resists or disobeys enforcement of the order, he or she can be fined or sent to jail. The children will be returned to you if they have been removed when the order was broken.

### POSTCARDS FROM THE VISION QUEST

#### Assuming the (Historical) Position

Here's a secret: I still have an Ontario driver's license. I still have Ontario plates on my car. In Tennessee you're supposed to replace **all** that stuff within three months of residency.

Three months versus nine years ...what's the difference?

I know, I know. For me, you have to understand, Indian Time is on sedatives.

**As** with everything, there's a story. I was okay with my Ontario license and plates as long as I was in school. Then I could justify the situation because I was on Mom's insurance policy. **So**, in truth, I've been doing wrong for only four years. (Yes, only). Everything would've been okay, in fact, until Ontario put **in** place the mandatory emissions test. It left me with only two options this year: drive my car to Canada for the test, or break down and finally admit that I live here.

I've mentioned this before: I sometimes feel like a visitor in Tennessee. With a populace whose near-universal sense of morality can only be described as dilapidated, with most individuals' inherent distrust of government juxtaposed with a universal need to voice political opinion, with an economic system that values the individual over community, and a near-total lack of Native life here (due to the Trail of Tears a hundred years ago), there is good reason I should feel like an outsider.

It is ironic. These are exactly the issues that meant nothing to me as a boy of nineteen years when I moved here. I remember a visit with one of my high school guidance counselors, I was filling out the application form for the institution that was to become my post-secondary alma mater. **As** she scanned the form – does anyone remember Ms. Lewis? She went to Moira, as I did, after **BCI** closed in **1992** – she looked at me and said, "Just glancing at this form, I can see about ten Ontario human rights violations!" (For example, the application asked me to send a photo of myself. Why? "...so we'll know who you are," I was told when I called).

I laughed it off then. That moment and those direct quotes have come to represent all of what I'd eventually learn in the years that I'd live here.

It's interesting how time can adjust our thoughts, and opinions, on our own lives. History and all the details force events to take place that may not have occurred if for any other reason. I'd have been content to someday move home with Ontario plates intact *twenty* years after I left. All this time I've found myself more closely linked to home and Canada every time I spotted my car in the parking lot at the mall, the garage at work, or when I stepped out of my apartment.

No longer, though.

Now ...I'm a Tennessean.

Of course, it's not only my car that I'm thinking of now. As many have asked, I do wonder why I still live here. Native people are resilient, yes, but there comes a time when the feeling that one can overcome any obstacle becomes a matter of self-identification. I know many of us will agree, regardless to where we live: don't you sometimes feel like an unappreciated martyr?

Historically, it is an important time to live in Tennessee. The racism, the homophobia, the ecclesiastic influence on everyday life, each of them has evolved to fit the (varying degrees **of**) political correctness this day and age requires. To witness the responses each member of each group adopts – whether a minority or not – to sustain their integrity and their emotional stability is a treasure to me.

It's informed my debating technique, demanded better articulation on my part, and forced a more clear understanding of my own personal constitution.

Which isn't to deny that one of my fantasies is to find some attractive, innocent Tennessean, drag him home with me to Canada and Tyendinaga ... and civilize him! What a fascinating historical – and literary – turnaround that would be.

**Of**course, you know we'd only mess him up.

He'd find his way back to Tennessee someday far in the future and tell everyone – or perhaps never tell anyone – about how we placed him within our residence and schooled him: that we made him grow his hair long, stripped him of his culture, taught him about our spirituality, customs and history. all the while convincing ourselves that this is required for him, and people like him, to become full citizens of our more-fully-evolved society.

It's a **fun** little fantasy, yes. Honestly, though, I can imagine none **of** us would feel terribly great knowing that we'd have guinea pigged someone else's life for our own retributive historical reasons.

Me? I'd be doing it for love.

Thus would be history, though, and our (many varied) comprehension of it.

### In remembrance of Randy Brant

**Mr. McRobb:** I'm honoured to rise in tribute to Randy Brant, who worked for the Yukon government as chief land claims negotiator from 1997 to 1999.

After a valiant battle with cancer he passed away on April 17. Born in 1944 in Deseronto, Ontario, Kaherake:ron, his Mohawk name, was a member of the Tyendingaga Mohawk Nation. As a descendent of Joseph Brant, who negotiated many treaties, Randy carried on the proud tradition of his ancestors as a statesman and respected diplomat. Randy Brant was a teacher, a community leader and an ordained minister and a distinguished public servant. He is remembered with respect in communities from

Moosonee in northern Ontario, where he first taught school, to Hope, Dawson Creek, and Westbank, B.C. In these and many other communities, he left behind an impressive legacy of community facilities and infrastructure. He was a builder of schools, churches, community health care facilities and seniors' facilities often when those around him said it was impossible and impractical.

In the early 1990s, Randy worked for the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development for the Alberta region. Before coming to the Yukon in 1997, he was the assistant deputy minister for Aboriginal Affairs in B.C. He spent many hours here in counsel with chiefs and elders, often around a campfire.

After leaving the Yukon he served in Ottawa as a director general of environment, lands and trusts service: in the Indian Affairs program for DIAND.

Randy was known for his efforts to create better understanding of cultural differences and for building bridges between the aboriginal community and non-aboriginal governments, and between industry and First Nations, in his role as director of aboriginal relations for B.C. Hydro. His vision, determination and seemingly inexhaustible energy made him a force to deal with in government. He often said it was important to make a difference and he did make a difference, because he brought such uncommon commitment and high standards to his work, whatever it was and wherever it took him.

Randy Brant was a charismatic leader who led by example, never coercion. In the historic tradition of the Hodeñosaunee and the League of the Iroquois, he sought consensus in government. He was called upon to diffuse dangerously volatile political situations, often successful, often with compassion, intelligence and respect for the issues.

Honoured by many First Nations, he was passionate about the survival of the cultural integrity of all First Nation peoples. He believed the key to good government was building healthy, sustainable communities.

His heart was always with native people, seeing ways and means to enable First Nations economic development and prosperity.

Former Chief Ron Ignace of the Skeetchestn Indian Band in interior B.C. describes Randy as a highly principled man who left a lasting legacy in that community by developing band bylaws and policies for orderly economic development.

Former B.C. minister John Cashore says Randy set the standard for how to be a "go-to" guy. He cared more about others than himself. He served to make life better for others, and he was successful in that. His hopeful spirit brought new energy to people in situations requiring clear thinking and practical advice. He was larger than life itself.

Randy loved the Yukon and enjoyed canoeing and fishing on Yukon rivers and lakes. Yukon baseball players and Kelowna hockey players will recall his ability at these sports.

Randy Brant will be remembered for his smile, his laughter and his generous heart. Our condolences to the Brant family in Deseronto, Randy's wife Ursula, son David, daughter Tamee, three grandchildren and many close friends.

## A Celebration of The 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Albany Congress of 1754

presented by

St. Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church and The Albany Institute of History and Art

The Albany Congress of 1754 included delegates from seven colonies, the Six Indigenous Nations, the Albany Indian Commissioners and the Albany Royal Governor of New York. The Congress met in Albany from June 19 to July 11 to consider strategies for Indian diplomacy and a unified colonial defense for the impending French and Indian War. The meeting put forth the Albany Plan of Union, considered by many to be the basis for the United States Constitution.

### A Colonial Entertainment

An evening of music, song, and dramatics! The St. Peter's Choir will perform light and serious music of the period. A prologue to the Congress will be presented by young people from St. Peter's and The Dutch Settlers' Society of Albany. A narrative on the Congress will be given by Benjamin Franklin and Commissioner Theodore Atkinson of New Hampshire will give a personal view of the events surrounding the Congress.

A candlelight reception will follow the program in the Garden and The Pompelly Room of St. Peter's.

### The Procession and Worship Service

At 10:00 A.M. a procession will begin at the Capitol and proceed down State Street Hill to St. Peter's Church. The procession will be led by The Sons and Daughters of Liberty Ancient Fife and Drums and include representation of the major groups who participated in the Albany Congress of 1754, Chief Dan Maracle will lead a delegation of the Mohawk Nation, the most prominent Indian contingent at the Congress. The Dutch Settlers Society of Albany will represent the Dutch who dominated the City of Albany and the Indian Affairs. The English Speaking Union will represent the English influence which governed Albany as part of the British Empire.

During the Congress, delegates worshipped at St. Peter's Church. Rector John Ogilvie of St. Peter's officiated at services for the Mohawks in their language. The Rev. Richard Peters, an Anglican clergyman from Pennsylvania preached at St. Peter's during the Congress. He later became Rector of Christ Church.

Philadelphia, Rev. Timothy Safford, Rector of Christ Church will preach at the 10:30 service of Morning Prayer. His sermon will draw on the same text used by Rev. Peters in 1754. The service will be adapted from the 1612 Prayer Book and feature portions presented in the Mohawk language, English and Dutch.

A reception in the garden will follow the service.

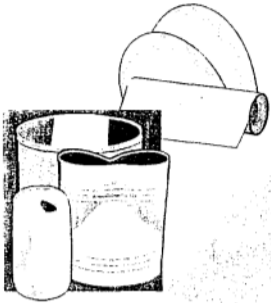
# RECYCLING



## A Recycling Reminder

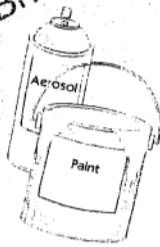
Hang this on your wall!

Bring these items to your depot



### Metal Cans & Foil

Rinse cans. Place lids in a can, pinch closed and put loose in blue bin. **Do not** put aluminum cans inside tin ones. Include clean aluminum foil and pie plates. *Flattened cans save space!* **No** pots, cigarette or butter wrappers or scrap metal. Avoid putting pop cans inside other cans.



### Empty Aerosol and Paint Cans

Make sure metal containers are empty. Take lids off the paint cans to let them dry, and place in the blue bin — *don't* bag them. **No** containers with product, paint cans larger than 4 litres (1 gallon), plastic paint cans, propane cylinders or other hazardous waste.



### Plastic Containers

Discard tops and rinse containers for soft drinks, detergents, juice, bleach, shampoo, dairy products as well as clear and foam plastic cups, trays and packaging. Flatten soft drink containers and replace lids. All plastics with the numbers 1 to 6 on the bottom are OK. **No** blister or bubblepacks, prescription bottles or toys.



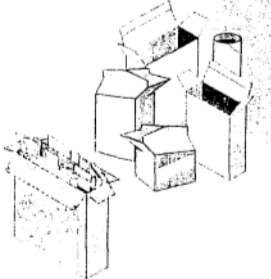
### Bottles & Jars

Remove and rinse caps and lids. Metal lids can be recycled with cans. Leave loose in the blue bin. *Don't* bag them. **No** other types of glass such as kitchenware, ceramics, dishes, drinking glasses, window glass, light bulbs or mirrors.

Place in appropriately labelled bins.

### Boxboard and Mixed Paper

Bundle junk mail and office paper separately from Boxboard. Flatten and stuff boxboard into a large box. **Boxboard** includes cereal, shoe and detergent boxes as well as rinsed milk and juice cartons, paper bags, sugar & flour bags, cardboard tubes, books (hardcover & paperback), egg cartons and other clean paper packaging. **No** drink boxes, tissue, paper towel or laminated paper. Do not put paper loose in blue bin.



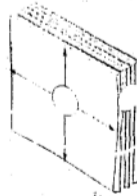
### Plastic Bags

Stuff clean, dry plastic bags into a plastic bag and tie handles. Include rinsed milk pouches, grocery, bread, dry cleaning, frozen vegetable and blue newspaper bags as well as outer wrapper from toilet and hand tissues. Remove food residue, stickers and receipts. **No** meat, cheese or stretch wrap, cereal box liners or chip bags.



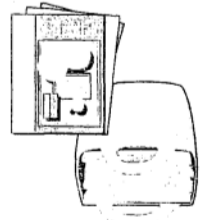
### Corrugated Cardboard

Flatten and bundle corrugated cardboard boxes into a maximum size of 30" x 30" x 8" bundles. Only broken down and bundled boxes will be collected. **No** waxed boxes, soiled pizza boxes.



### Newspapers & Magazines

Place newspapers, inserts, phone books, magazines and catalogues in a plastic bag next to your blue bin. **No** soiled newspapers. Keep boxboard and mixed paper separate, not mixed with newspaper and magazines.
