# National Aboriginal Day of Action Update

**T**oday, May 29, 2008 has been designated as the National Day of Action for Aboriginal people across Canada. In the spirit of educating the public, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council wishes to clarify its position regarding the ongoing Culbertson specific claim negotiations. Our community and our neighbors, the municipalities of Deseronto and Tyendinaga Township, with whom we have always had cordial relations, have encountered a period that is difficult for all of us, and these relations have been strained by recent events.

First of all, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council has only one mandate from our members, and that is to uphold our treaty rights and to restore the land that has been lost to us because of the Crown's breaches of its treaty and fiduciary duties owed to our people.

We have a young and growing population who are living on less than 20 percent of the land that was granted to our people by treaty in 1793. The lands were granted to our people in recompense for the loyalty of our ancestors during the American Revolutionary War, which had resulted in the loss of much Mohawk blood, fighting as an allied nation of the British Crown. In 1793 our people were promised the Mohawk Tract under a solemn treaty. We were promised that none other than Six Nations people could reside on the Tract. We were promised that it could never be diminished without our formal and informed consent. We were also promised that the Crown would eject any trespassers from our land in order to maintain and restore it to our exclusive possession.

In 1837, the Crown wrongfully patented 923.4 acres of Mohawk land to an individual without the consent of the Mohawk people. The Mohawks Chiefs immediately protested, and told the Crown that it had breached the treaty. However, no action was taken by the Crown to remedy the injustice.

Several subsequent attempts by the Mohawks to have this injustice resolved were ignored. Until 1951, it was illegal for Indians to make a claim against the government. There was no land claim process until 1973. Canada did not formulate a policy to address land claims until 1982. Up until 1991, there was no process to address pre-confederation claims, specifically claims that saw Indian lands taken prior to the Confederation of Canada in 1867. After the pre-confederation bar was lifted in 1991, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte made a formal claim to the governments of Canada and Ontario for the return of the land and compensation in 1995. In 2003, by accepting the Culbertson Tract claim for negotiation, the federal government made it clear that the Culbertson lands were illegally taken. The Government of Ontario recently appointed a representative to the claim as well. For the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte, the restoration of lands that were wrongfully taken is essential to the fulfillment of our treaty and the honour of the Crown and also to the memory of our ancestors who gave their lives as loyal military allies to the Crown. It is also a practical necessity for us, in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, to have a sufficient land base for our growing population to meet its social and economic needs.

Following the acceptance of the Culbertson Tract Claim by Canada, some members of our community have taken actions to protest the Crown's breaches. The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council is on public record that we do not agree with blockades. At the same time, we understand the frustration of our members and agree that the claims process is far too slow and ineffective.

We wish to make it clear to our neighbours in Deseronto and Tyendinaga Township that we have no intention of permitting the Crown to perpetrate further injustice to them. Yes, we wish to have the Culbertson Tract, which we already own and which we have never surrendered, formally restored to our control and administration. However, it is our desire that the Crown offer fair and even generous compensation to all third party owners of property in the Culbertson Tract in exchange for their surrendering their paper title to our land. We also desire that the Crown offer fair and generous compensation to the municipalities who will lose tax revenue when the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte reassumes its rightful jurisdiction.

We therefore wish to make it clear to our neighbours, and to the public at large, that we call upon the Crown in right of Canada to purchase, openly and fairly, all of the private interests that now encumber our title to the Culbertson Tract.

We do not wish to put any artificial time-frame upon the purchase of these third-party encumbrances on our title. Life in Deseronto and Tyendinaga Township can go on in peace and harmony, while the non-Mohawk residents have sufficient time to relocate to lands to which they will have clear and unclouded title and the Crown and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte make reasonable and practical arrangements with the neighbouring municipalities for a transition to full Mohawk control.

We ask the governments of Canada and Ontario to consider the mounting financial costs of policing in our communities, and whether these public funds would be better spent on a long-term solution to our claim through the fulfillment of the Crown's duties owed to us. Finally, we ask our members for patience and wisdom as we negotiate a settlement of this very sensitive and important claim and to remember that we have not only been the allies of the Crown, but also family, friends, as well as neighbours of the people of Deseronto and Tyendinaga Township.

**There are a lot of myths and misinformation regarding First Nations land claims in Ontario and Canada, as well as other issues affecting our communities. Here are some little known facts about land claims and other issues facing First Nations communities today:**

## Did you know?

First Nations occupied 100 percent of Canada before contact yet today First Nations territories occupy less than 1 percent of Canada.

To accommodate settlement of immigrant populations, the British Crown (later Canada) signed treaties with First Nations. The Royal Proclamation of 1763 outlined a process to address First Nations title interests in land. Aboriginal and Treaty Rights are supposed to be protected by the 1982 Constitution Act, and previously the British North America Act of 1867. (When Canada officially became a country) In many cases, Canada has not lived up to its treaties made with First Nations people.

Up until the early 1950s it was ILLEGAL under Canadian Law for First Nations to make any claims against the government.

Canada didn't have a formal land claim process to hear First Nations claims until 1973.

Canada's land claim process was formally revisited in 1982 in a document called "Outstanding Business" which outlined the land claim policy of Canada, whereby Canada acts as judge and jury against itself in land claim grievances advanced by First Nations.

Until 1991, Canada would not accept First Nations land claims that predated confederation in 1867.

The way Canada has traditionally negotiated claims it has accepted is that it will only discuss monetary compensation and not land, even though the return of land is a compensation option outlined in Canada's land claim policy.

Canada's approach to assessing the monetary value of land taken away is the unimproved current market value. Therefore, land is appraised as if it is vacant land with no improvements, regardless of what buildings exist on the land.

Canada's approach to dealing with lands is that First Nations may purchase their property back with funds from their settlement then apply to the bureaucracy of Indian and Northern Affairs to have the land added to the community.

Canada passed Bill C-31 in 1985 which restored Indian Status to women who lost their status when they married non-Indian men. Indian and Northern Affairs assured First Nations communities that Bill C-31 would not have any significant impact on their communities. In Tyendinaga our membership tripled as a result of Bill C-31, however, our land base remained the same.

First Nations people are the fastest growing population in Canada and statistics report that First Nations birth rates are 2.5 times higher than the rate of any ethnicity in the country.

Without adequate land and a share of the natural resource wealth of Canada, conflicts will continue with First Nations people across the country.

In Tyendinaga we have a mere 18 percent of our treaty land base left. More than half of the wells in our community are contaminated or dry up in the summer months. Funding for health services and education continues to be inadequate and out of proportion with mainstream communities. Funding for all First Nations programs and services continues to suffer from a two percent cap increase per year, yet the cost of living increase is usually around six percent. Research conducted by the Assembly of First Nations shows that approximately less than half of the \$10-billion announced by the federal government actually reaches First Nations communities.

We want to see our community prosper as other communities prosper. In order to create a sustainable and healthy community, we need economic development that will provide employment. Government funding provided to First Nations communities comes with strict spending guidelines mandated by Indian and Northern Affairs Canada which often limits potential community growth.

One of the oldest and most successful First Nation controlled and operated post-secondary institutions in Canada, First Nations Technical Institute (FNTI), is located in our community. With over 2000 graduates since 1985, FNTI is a testament to the success that can be achieved to address the educational shortfalls among First Nations people. In March 2008, the federal government cut three-quarters of FNTI's operating budget, almost forcing the closure of the institute. No mainstream college or university in Ontario or Canada operates without multi-year core funding, yet FNTI is expected to.

## You can help!

Contact your local MP and MPP and request that the government get serious about resolving outstanding grievances with First Nations people. Let them know that as original nations of Canada, First Nations people have a legal right to land and an equitable share of Canada's natural resource wealth.

Thank you for taking the time to read this information flyer and we hope you will support our plight for a better life for our communities.

### **ATTENTION: TERRITORY RESIDENTS & BUSINESS OWNERS**

In February 2008, Health Canada recommended Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory be placed on a Precautionary Boil Water Advisory.

Households and businesses should have disinfection, treatment and filtration on your water system to remove water borne parasites, such as Giardia and Cryptosporidium. If you do not have disinfection, treatment and filtration you **must boil your water for at least 1 minute before consuming**. Depending on your treatment system, please note that it may not remove these parasites without proper filtration. Please contact a licensed plumber as each water supply can vary.

Residential sanitation and purification incentives are available at the Administration Office for those who qualify. The incentives may be able to assist with associated costs for disinfection, treatment and or filtration. Please contact Carla Barnhardt, 613-396-3424 for further information regarding incentives.

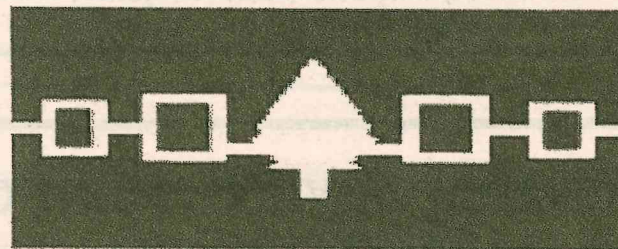

Rental Opportunity for Ontario Families

#### WHAT IS THE APPLICATION DEADLINE?

- Please send your application before June 30, 2008.
- Applications will be considered on a first-come-first-served basis, as there are a limited number of ROOF housing allowances available.

#### HOW MUCH IS THE ROOF HOUSING ALLOWANCE?

Eligible families will receive up to \$100 per month, starting in January 2008.

If you qualify, you will get a payment for your monthly housing allowances back to January 2008.

#### AM I ELIGIBLE FOR ASSISTANCE UNDER ROOF?

You may be eligible for the program if you:

- Work and have an earned income of at least \$5,000 and an Adjusted Family Net Income below \$20,000.  
Adjusted Family Net Income is the total adjusted net income of the applicant, plus the adjusted net income of any spouse or common-law partner.  
Adjusted net income is the amount from line 236 from your 2006 income tax return, minus your Universal Child Care Benefit.
- Have one or more dependent children under the age of 18.
- Are paying more than 30% of income towards rent.
- Have less than \$10,000 in liquid assets (e.g., cash, bank account, bonds or stocks).

- Are not receiving social assistance or any other rent subsidy.
- Are a resident of Ontario and meet program requirements for status in Canada.

#### WHICH TAX RETURN SHOULD I USE FOR MY EARNED INCOME AND ADJUSTED FAMILY NET INCOME?

- Please use your 2006 income tax return.

#### HOW LONG DOES THE PROGRAM RUN?

ROOF is a five-year program. Eligible families will receive the housing allowance assistance for up to five years, starting in January 2008.

#### I AM ALREADY RECEIVING A HOUSING ALLOWANCE UNDER ROOF. SHOULD I APPLY AGAIN?

- No, you do not need to apply again if you are already receiving a ROOF housing allowance.

#### HOW CAN I GET AN APPLICATION OR RECEIVE MORE INFORMATION ABOUT ROOF?

## ADMINISTRATION

This is a continuation of the Minutes of 1800. In September 1800 there was a Council Meeting held in the community that spanned 8 days. This meeting was held to try to come to some resolution of the troubles that had been dividing the community at that time.

Reprinted in this edition of the newsletter is day 3 of the Council Meeting.

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**Proceedings of a Council held at the Bay of Quinte beginning on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and ending on the 10<sup>th</sup> of September 1800, in the Mohawk Village**

**September 5<sup>th</sup>:**

**Present:**

The same as before

Captain John in continuation:

As soon as Miller made this report, I assembled all the Village and told them what Miller had said and asked them whether they knew any thing of the matter or not. Capt. Isaac and Capt. Aaron answered there might be some lands undisposed of but they did not know there were any and added that a surveyor had been surveying all around these Lands many years before. They then told me to look into the business and if they only got 100 dollars they would be very happy, after which the Council broke up and Captain Isaac and the party went off. I then consulted with my own people and it was agreed that it was necessary to look into the business, saying if they could get 400 Dollars for it they would be well satisfied. Miller said he was not certain whether the Land remained as formerly or whether the Americans had claimed it as theirs, but he told me he would go, himself, and let me know whether they belonged to us or not. Miller never returned according to his promise, having said before he went away he would not return unless he found the Mohawks had a right to the Land.

A little time after this I received a Message from Capt. Brant to inform me it was certain that some of these Lands remained undisposed of. I immediately assembled the Village and informed them what Capt. Brant had said. Capt. Isaac made answer that he would have nothing to do in the business, that he had thrown the land away and would have nothing more to say to it. After this declaration, I assembled my own people & told them it was a matter of consequence & I immediately appointed 4 persons to go to the States to learn what could be done in the business. Before the men went away I again assembled the Village to consult in what manner a letter could be sent to Govr. Jay on the business, but Capt. Isaac did not appear and Capt. Aaron was dead. After detaining the 4 men two days, Capt. Isaac came to my house; I was then sick and I told Captain Isaac I was unable to do any thing, but I requested of Capt. Isaac to get the letter wrote to Govr. Jay, to which he made no answer. I then sent a message to Capt. Isaac to his house, begging of him to get the letter wrote and he returned for answer that he would have nothing to do with it, as he had thrown the Land away.

Finding Capt. Isaac would not have any thing to do in the business, I assembled my own people and got Capt. Bowen and Kennedy to assist me in writing a Letter to Govr. Jay. The 4 young men went off with this Letter and when they arrived at New York they met two of Captain Brant's people, both of the name of Aaron Hill, who had been sent on the same business. When the young men returned they informed me that they were told by Govr. Jay the Land Board business was then over, but desired that I might go myself to New York in the January following and the same message was sent to Capt. Brant, that he also might go to New York.

In July, having heard that Capt. Brant and his party had passed, I set off with 5 of my party and on my arrival at Albany, I was informed by Governor Raenslow that he did not think the business could then be done and desired me to return in December following. I then returned home and made a report to the Village what had been told me. I also met Capt. Isaac on the road and told him I wished to speak to him to tell him what I had done, but he would not give me any answer.

In the fall I again went to the States with two of my young men. Before I went I applied to Capt. Isaac for 6 dollars (which had been lent by me to Aaron who had paid the same to Isaac for my use) in order to assist me on my journey, but could not get it from him. On my arrival at Albany, I

met Capt. Brant. The American Land Commissioners did not assemble until 15<sup>th</sup> of March following, 1797. Mr. Tenbrook, one of the Commissioners, laid his hand on my shoulder and said, "you talk about Lands, there is no Land belongs to you, the Lands were all gone 100 and odd years ago. We will, however, take it into consideration and see if anything can be done for you". Capt. Brant was in company at the same time. We remained there five months using all our endeavours to get the Lands sold and at last the Commissioners agreed to Pay us one thousand dollars and told us we were never after to make any more demands for Land. Governor Jay then provided a stage for Capt. Brant and myself and we were carried to Fort Schuyler where we received the money. Capt. Brant received 500 dollars and I received the other 500. Capt. Brant & myself and Party came together to Whites Town, where we separated [sic]. Before I parted with Capt. Brant I told him there was a sum of 250 Dollars due to my party for Lands he, Capt. Brant, had formerly sold and which I expected he would give me. Capt. Brant answered he could not pay me as the money belonged to the whole Village.

On my return to this place, I intended to Assemble the Whole Village, but on enquiry, I found that Capt. Isaac and several men had gone down to Montreal, and I could not find out on what business. I however afterwards found that Capt. Isaac had applied to Sir John Johnson for a pension for his former services and that he had a very good right to it, and that Sir John had answered it was not in his power. When Capt. Isaac found that he could not get a pension, he made use of very improper expressions (Mr. Lorimier being interpreter) and added he would never serve the King again. When Captain Isaac returned from Montreal, some of his own party requested him to go down to my house to enquire what I had done in the States, but he refused saying, he would have nothing to do in the business, and as we have heard he has received the money and spent it, it is therefore useless to go to him. As soon as I heard that Capt. Isaac and his party had behaved so disrespectfully to me, I did not think proper to come forward to say any thing about it.

Sometime after this I found a letter in my house directed to me but not signed by any body, expressing surprise that I had not given any account of what I had done in the States, after having been at home so long. I then wrote an answer to Capt. Isaac and his party telling them I was surprised they had not come down to me to enquire and be informed of what I had done, and told them also, it appeared by their conduct, as if I was a messenger sent by them, which I by no means look on myself to be. This letter of mine highly offended Capt. Isaac, who said to his people, "We will be a party by ourselves and will have no connection with Capt. John and his party".

From this period the troubles took place in the Village - That Frenchman who sits there, named Paulus, has always been stirring up strife and discord among us and also his son-in-law Thomas, the Fidler. On the 9<sup>th</sup> of October 1797, Capt. Isaac said to his people, "Now I think I can hold up my head, we will now begin and make regulations for ourselves and we will put down Captain John and he shall be no more - I will not follow his example, but will take a new method of my own". When I heard what Capt. Isaac had said, I was determined they should no put me down, as there was only one who could do it - that was the great Spirit. Soon after this I received a letter written by Thomas in the name of a Council where Isaac presided, desiring me to deliver up all the articles intrusted to me by Government, such as, I vow, Nails, Colours, Grindstones and two small cannons &c &c. The letter was delivered by the white man Mircle, and I returned an answer by him saying I would sooner lose my life, than give up the guns of the flag to them. After this there were constantly messengers passing from them to Sir John Johnson, making false stories and misrepresentations of me. They also took upon themselves to open Public Houses for the sale of Spirituous Liquors in the Village and all the Clothing which was given by Government was spent at these places and their families left naked. At one of these houses (Viz. John Hills) they had for a sign the picture of the Devil. Now, Brother, were you at the Head of a Village as I am, would you like such usage from them? You would certainly think it very hard and insufferable treatment. One of these new regulations was to beat and abuse all my friends and on New Year's Day last, one of Captain Isaac's party (Abraham Hill) came to the house of one Isaac, a trusty good man, and beat him very severely with a stick and afterwards went and bragged of it to his party. Ab. Hill and his Brother, soon after this, beat another of my people and nearly killed him, being beat as black as a kettle, without the least provocation. Nicholas Crawford, one of my people went up to Capt. Isaac and begged him to put a stop to the irregularities of his people, as it was uncertain whether the man they beat would live. Capt. Isaac answered them he could not do it as he had not that authority over them and was liable to be beat himself.

Captain John then delivered in the following papers:

Brother - You see my Expences with those who went with me, for which in Justice, I ought to be paid. Brother - now if we had lost this and had got nothing, Capt. Isaac would not have indemnified me for my trouble, for he himself would not be at any trouble about it, expecting the Commissioners would not give anything.

Signed - John Deserontyon

1<sup>st</sup> April 1797 - Albany

In company with Capt. Brant we received 1,000 dollars which we divided at Fort Schuyler, and can any reasonable person suppose that myself and two more could travel from Albany to this place without expense, and at the arrival at this place I found we had expended 100 dollars, and the expenses at

different times to Amount to two hundred and thirty seven dollars as per account, which I still keep in my possession, and the whole amount to be three hundred and thirty seven dollars.  
Signed - John Deserontyon

Brother - Since I first came to this place I have strove hard to settle the people in the best manner I was able. I have by the Assistance of our Great Father erected a Church and a school house, and have endeavoured to follow the example of Christians, like the white people in our neighbourhood, and I have used my influence to keep peace and quietness in the Village as far as lay in my power. We poor miserable tribe of Mohawks are very sensible of the great Bounty of our Great Father and are very thankful for it. We have been more indulged that we could expect, but since Capt. Isaac's party has been formed, the Door of the Church has been locked, for how could we assemble there with such a burden on our Minds? Before Capt. Isaac left the Grand River, the Church there was also shut up on account of the disturbances he made.

Brother - After hearing what I have said you must be sensible I am very much hurt. These people who have occasioned all these disturbances were driven away from the Grand River for the same kind of behaviour and came here for shelter. When they arrived I did everything in my power to accommodate them.

Now Brother, I shall begin on another subject. You say it was by Gov. Hunter's orders you came here to get a just account of the sad affairs which lately happened here. Last year the disputes between the parties began to be more serious, & they continued growing worse and worse to the time of the unfortunate business. About a year ago, Laurence, the Deceased, sent for Capt. Isaac to endeavour to compromise their differences and make friends, and expected he would come, but Capt. Isaac refused coming. The son of Isaac had frequently abused his cousins, the sons to the Deceased, and was constantly irritating & treating them in an abusive manner, having been made a Chief by his father's party.

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> October last, when the King's presents were delivered at this place, Capt. Isaac and Laurence were at great variances, and when Capt. Isaac found the division had not been made agreeable to his Wishes, he seized by force what had not been divided and carried them away to his own party & said he would divide them in the manner he pleased. Laurence seeing this behavior of Capt. Isaac's became more inveterate against him than before. Capt. John also states that a young man named William now present, had informed Laurence sometime before the murder, that mischief was intended against him and desired him to be on his guard and that Ab. Hill, one of Isaac's party, had told this young man that murder would be committed. Capt. John then says - I went up to Laurence's house on hearing this and advised him to keep himself quiet and not think of the threats he had heard, that perhaps it might not happen, and if it should happen, it cannot be helped, but I advise you not to be the first aggressor.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> June, Laurence and his family came to my house saying it was the King's Birthday and they ought to pay attention to it, but having lost my son a little before I did not intend to have any mirth about my house. Laurence and his people were, however, pressing and saying it was a day they should celebrate, desired me to give them something to drink the King's health and make a little merry. I complied with the request and sent for a gallon of Rum, thinking that sufficient. They then fired a salute and drank the Rum. Laurence then said he would go home, but on the Invitation of my wife he staid all night. My Wife was induced to keep them all night for fear of accident, knowing that Isaac's party were drunk about the village.

As Laurence went home in the morning and was passing a House where some of Isaac's part were, and being still in Liquor said, "You may hear what I say and you may go and carry the news to your Great Chief", which gave them offence. Some days before the 4th June, Laurence sent his youngest son to Capt. Isaac's house requesting him to come to his father's, that they might endeavour to compromise their differences, that things by long delay were getting worse, and the Capt. Isaac returned for answer that he would not go.

On the 9<sup>th</sup> June, a Young man called Thomas and his younger Brother, sons of the deceased Laurence, went up to a salt lick above Capt. Isaac's where the Deer usually come out of the Woods, and after staying some time without success, the elder proposed to go home again, saying that tomorrow the other brother would come. On their way back they passed Capt. Isaac's House, when he told them to tell their father not to make a practice of beating people as he had done, and if he did not leave it of, he, himself, would put a stop to it. The young man, Thos., said he did not know any thing his father had done amiss. Capt. Isaac then told him to hold his tongue, or he would take a stick and flog him and looked about for one, saying you cannot dispute with me; for I am a great Warrior. Neither can your father dispute with me; Tell him to come here, taking his Tomahawk and saying I am a great man. Thomas then said "why did you not go when my father sent for you, he sent for you with a good design". Capt. Isaac answered he would not go to see such a fellow. Thos. though it extraordinary to hear such language. Capt. Isaac then said, "I tell you again to tell your father to come over and do not forget it". The young man looked pale when he got home, which being observed by his mother, he told her it was in consequence of what Capt. Isaac had been saying to him. The young man then related to his father what Capt. Isaac had said.

In the evening of the same day, Laurence, the Deceased, seeing Captain Isaac's negro boy pass, desired him to tell his master that as they could not meet at each other's houses, to point out a place where they could meet and talk over their differences; the Widow of the Deceased being now present, and hearing the message sent. Laurence's eldest son (who was killed at the same time with his Father) desired his father, as he was going to bed, to awake him early in the morning as he and his Brother, Thomas, were going to hunt.

At sun rise in the morning, some time after Laurence's sons had gone hunting, Capt. Isaac's negro boy came to the door and told Laurence that his master was at the place appointed, which was half way between their houses, and was waiting for him and begged him to make hast and come immediately. The night before Capt. Isaac told young Mircle and John Loft to go with him in the morning and he would shew them how to go to war, that he only wanted them to look on and he would show them what the warriors did. Laurence followed the boy out of the door and asked him if his master was there. The boy answered, "he thought he was there by that time". Laurence hearing that imagined he was alone. Peggy, an Indian woman who was in the house, said as Laurence was lame, it was a pity he should go alone, and sent a younger son of Laurence's after the two Brothers who had gone hunting. They were met

by him coming home. When they got into the house they put away their Guns and followed their Father who had gone, before they came home, with no weapon but his walking stick; and the young men having only their Tomahawks, which they usually carry. Laurence's wife, wishing to bring her husband back, went after him with two other women, but when she ascended a hill, she perceived he was a considerable distance and she heard Isaac's party whooping and hollering.

When Laurence arrived at the place appointed, Capt. Isaac came up to him with a sword under his arm and wished him a good morning, saying I wanted very much to see you before, and hope you will quit that way of beating and abusing people where you meet them. Laurence answered, "I never struck any of your Children or any person belonging to you, but you always make a practice of beating my Children". Capt. Isaac then took the sword from under this arm and said, "Don't you say a word, but hold your tongue", on which Laurence took his stick and stuck him on the shoulder. Capt. Isaac's son immediately called out - How! -How! - an Indian expression signifying - Come on! - Come On! - Let us begin! - upon which all of Isaac's party, who had their Knives & Tomahawks, came forward, at which time Laurence had Isaac by the Breast on the ground. At this time two women with Clubs (one of which is produced and is about 4 feet long) came up and struck Laurence very violently, they afterwards with the same Clubs came up to Laurence's Wife and knocked her down so that she was for sometime senseless. While Laurence had a hold of Isaac on the ground, John Green, an Indian, came up and struck Laurence a violent blow with the axe part of his Tomahawk so that it was sometime before he could get it out again. The Widow of Laurence had also been attacked with a club by Captain Isaac's daughter and was left for dead on the ground, on which the widow, Laurence's daughter-in-law, attacked Isaac's daughter and overpowered her, on which Isaac's daughter called out to her father's negro to come to her assistance, which he did and knocked her down with a stick.

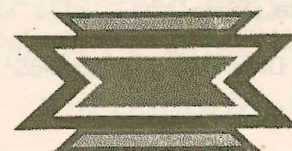
### Home Community Care Community Support Worker Visiting Program



If you are a parent with dependent children under 18 and are on Ontario Works, there are several changes to your benefits coming soon. **Single people, couples without children, and parents without dependent children will not be affected.**

### Most importantly, you need to know:

From July 2008 onwards:

- Your Canada Child Tax Credit will be **more** than before because of a new **Ontario Child Benefit**.

From August 1, 2008 onwards:

- Your regular benefit cheque will be **less** than before because of a reduction in the Basic Needs amount.

Other Changes as of August 1, 2008:

- The National Child Benefit Supplement (NCBS) will no longer be deducted from your cheque.
- There will be no more Back-to-School allowance.
- There will be no more Winter Clothing allowance.

### IT IS MOST IMPORTANT THAT YOU FILE YOUR INCOME TAX IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE NEW ONTARIO CHILD BENEFIT.

I am registered along with many of our Trustees, to attend the Annual General Meeting for the Ontario Public School boards Association which takes place June 12<sup>th</sup> through to June 15<sup>th</sup>, 2008 in Niagara Falls, Ontario. This conference will offer an opportunity to hear speakers talk about new and exciting things happening in the Ministry of Education for Ontario, and to be involved in discussions that can offer support to groups that are experiencing some vary challenging issues across the province. The contacts and the networking that takes place at these conferences are also extremely valuable.

SEPTEMBER 16, 1963

### MIGRATORY WATER-FOWL

### TYENDINAGA INDIAN RESERVE

### PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

The Council of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Band of Indians at a meeting held this Sixteenth day of September 1963 make the following by-law pursuant to paragraph (c), (a), and (r) of Section 80 of the Indian Act.

#### BY-LAW NO. 6A

A by-law to provide for the preservation, protection and management of fur bearing animals, fish and other game on the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve in the Province of Ontario

#### 1. In this by-law

- (a) "Band" means Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Band of Indians;
- (b) "Council" means Council of the Band;
- (c) "permit" means a permit issued pursuant to this by-law;
- (d) "Reserve" means Tyendinaga Indian Reserve;
- (e) "project" means the marsh land extending on both sides of Mud Creek from the dam on the said creek where it flows into the Bay of Quinte and extending to the intersection of the said Mud Creek with the East boundary of lot 11 in Concession 2 of the Reserve, the whole being designated as the Tyendinaga Water-Fowl Management Unit.
- (f) "hunting" includes chasing, pursuing, worrying, stalking, laying in wait for, trapping or attempting to trap, or shooting at whether or not the migratory water-fowl is then or subsequently captured, killed or injured;
- (g) "migratory water-fowl" means any duck, geese, rails, coots or gallinules;
- (h) "open season" means the season during which it is lawful to hunt migratory water-fowl, that is, the period commencing on 21st day of September and ending on the 14th day of December, both dates inclusive; and

- 2. No person shall hunt migratory water-fowl on the project unless he is in possession of a valid and subsisting permit authorizing him to do so, issued to him by Council or a person appointed by Council for the purpose.
- 3. No person shall be issued a permit unless he is a member of the Band and has attained the age of fifteen years on the opening day of the season herein prescribed.
- 4. A permit issued under authority of paragraph 2 of this by-law may authorize the bearer thereof to hunt migratory water-fowl in the project, subject to the following conditions:
  - (a) Hunting will be permitted only on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays of each week between dawn and the hour of 5 p.m. eastern daylight time, and a new permit will be required for each season.
  - (b) No person shall enter the project for the purpose of hunting unless he has reported to the person in charge of the check point and has presented his permit to the person in charge of the check point for inspection.
  - (c) No person shall leave the project unless he has first reported to the person in charge of the check point and has displayed to him all the migratory water-fowl he has killed.
- 5. The Council may from time to time designate locations on the project from which hunting may take place and shall number and mark the locations designated, and
  - (a) No person shall hunt in the project from a location which has not been so designated, numbered and marked by the Council.
  - (b) No person shall construct or attempt to construct a blind on the project other than at a location referred to in subsection (1).
  - (c) The construction of a blind shall not vest in the builder thereof any exclusive right to hunt from that location.
  - (d) No more than two persons shall occupy or use a blind at any one time.

- 6. The daily bag limit for ducks shall be five in the aggregate of all species exclusive of American and red breast, megalaners and no person shall have more than two days limit in possession at any one time, provided that such limit shall not include any canvas back or redhead or more than two wood ducks and provided further that on an after October 26 two additional scaup or goldeneye may be taken each day that hunting is permitted.
- 7. The daily bag limit for geese in the aggregate of all species shall be five and no person may have more than two days limit in possession at any one time.
- 8. The daily bag limit for rails, coots and gallinules in the aggregate shall be five and no person may have more than two days limit in possession at any one time.
- 9. No person shall have in his possession the carcass of migratory water-fowl at any time except during the period between the twenty-first day of September and the thirtieth day of August next following.
- 10. No person shall transport a migratory water-fowl from the project or reserve unless at least one wing and the plume thereof remains attached to the migratory water-fowl.
- 11. No person shall at any time sell, expose for sale or offer for sale or buy migratory water-fowl.
- 12. The holder of a permit may hunt migratory water-fowl on the project only
  - (a) with a shot gun not larger than number twelve gauge using shells with more than one ball, provided also that any shot gun of any description originally capable of holding more than three shells in the magazine shall be altered or plugged with a one-piece metal or wood filler incapable of removal without disassembling the gun so as to reduce the capacity of said gun to not more than three shells at one time in the magazine a chamber combined.
- 13. No person shall, in hunting on the project, use night lights, live birds or decoys, electrically operated calling devices or hunt within one quarter mile of any places where bait has been found or placed during the open season seven days preceding the open season.
- 14. No motor boat or power boat of any description shall be permitted on the project during the open season or seven days preceding the open season and no other boat or vehicle shall be used in such a way as to disturb or drive the water-fowl.
- 15. No person shall:
  - (a) use at any one time more than one flock of decoys
  - (b) use a flock of more than fifty decoys unless two persons are hunting together in which case a flock may consist of, but not exceed, one hundred decoys.
- 16. No person shall destroy, deface, tear down or damage poster, notice, sign or copy of this by-law that has been erected for the purpose of informing members of the Band or the public of any of the provisions of this by-law.
- 17. In any prosecution for a violation of this by-law:
  - (a) The possession of any night lights or fire arms within the project at any time or fire arms at a time and place other than as prescribed in his permit is inadmissible in evidence and is prima facie proof that the person was hunting migratory water-fowl contrary to the provisions of this by-law.
  - (b) Any gun or other weapon, ammunition, boat, canoe or vessel of any description, team wagon or other vehicle, decoy, appliance or material of any kind being used or having been used in violation or for the purpose of a violation of this by-law shall be seized and delivered to a justice of the peace who if he finds that the article was used in violation of this by-law may forfeit the article to Her Majesty in trust for the Band.
- 18. (a) Where a person is charged with an offence under this by-law the Council may suspend his permit;
- (b) Where a person is convicted of an offence under this by-law the Council may cancel his permit;
- (c) The Council may reinstate a suspended permit.



# ENVIROMENT

19. For purposes of this by-law:

- (a) a member of Council
- (b) any Indian Constable, and
- (c) any person designated by Council shall be ex officio officers for the enforcement of this by-law.

20. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this by-law shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding thirty days or both fine and imprisonment.

## OFFENSES

1. No person shall deposit, add, emit or discharge a contaminant or cause or permit the deposit, addition, emission or discharge of a contaminant into the natural environment that:

- (a) causes or is likely to cause impairment of the quality of the natural environment for any use that can be made of it;
- (b) causes or is likely to cause injury or damage to property, or plant or animal life;
- (c) causes or is likely to cause harm or material discomfort to any person;
- (d) adversely affects or is likely to affect the health of any person;
- (e) impairs or is likely to impair the safety of any person;
- (f) renders or is likely to render any property, plant or animal life unfit for use by man.

2. Section 1 does not apply to animal wastes disposed of in accordance with normal farming practices.

## PENALTIES AND ENFORCEMENT

3. Any person who contravenes Section 1 of this By-Law is guilty of an offence and on summary conviction is liable to a fine not exceeding \$100.00 nor less than \$10.00, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment.

## SHORT TITLE

4. This By-Law may be referred to as Tyendinaga Environmental Hazard By-Law, 1979.

AUGUST 22, 1979

### TYENDINAGA INDIAN RESERVE #38

BY-LAW #38 OF THE COUNCIL OF THE TYENDINAGA INDIAN RESERVE #38 RESPECTING THE PREVENTION OF ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS TO HEALTH OR RESIDENTS OF THE RESERVE, AND TO PLANT AND ANIMAL LIFE ON THE RESERVE

WHEREAS the Council of Tyendinaga Indian Reserve #38 desires to ensure the prevention and correction of harm, discomfort or hazard to the residents of the Reserve, and plant and animal life thereon by environmental contamination of the natural environment of the Reserve;

THEREFORE, Council enacts pursuant to the powers vested in it by Section 81 of the Indian Act, R.S.C. 1970, c. 1-6 as amended;

### DEFINITION:

In this By-law:

- (a) "Council" means the Council as defined in the Indian Act of the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve #38;
- (b) "Reserve" means the tract of land set apart by Her Majesty within the definition of the Indian Act, for the use and benefit of the Tyendinaga Band of Indians known as The Tyendinaga Indian Reserve #38;
- (c) "Contaminant" means any solid, liquid, gas, odour, heat, sound, vibration, radiation or combination of any of them resulting directly or indirectly from the activities of man which may:
  - i. impair the quality of the natural environment for any use that can be made of it;
  - ii. cause harm or material discomfort to any person;
  - iii. cause injury or damage to property or to plant or animal life;
  - iv. adversely affect the health or impair the safety of any person;
  - v. render any property or plant life unfit for use by man.
- (d) "Natural Environment" means the air, land and water or any combination or part thereof of the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve.

### ADMINISTRATION

Council may appoint a By-Law Officer to administer and enforce this By-Law on the Reserve. The powers of the By-Law Officer shall include, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the authority to investigate and prosecute contraventions of this By-Law.

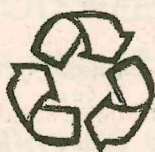

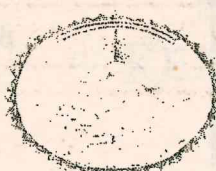

## INTRODUCTION

The Tyendinaga Justice Circle is currently being run through First Nations Technical Institute. The TJC is an alternative to the current justice system, with a focus on youth from 12-17 years of age. The circle consists of community members who have taken the initiative to become involved. Not to be confused with the "Sentencing circle", the forum brings together victims, offenders and their supporters in a safe, controlled environment "to discuss the offence and its effect and to jointly decide how to right the wrong that has been done. The Objective of the TJC is to return to a traditional form of justice. This process can be recognized as a pro-active strategy to empower the community to regain their perspective roles of respect.

## WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Restorative justice is a way of viewing justice that puts the emphasis on repairing harm caused by conflict and offence. In this approach, the term "offence" is understood as a violation of people and relationships and disruption of the peace of the community. It is not simply an offence against society. Restorative justice is collaborative and inclusive.

It usually involves the participation of the victim, offenders and the community affected by the crime in finding solutions that seek to repair harm and promote harmony.

## VALUES ASSOCIATED WITH RESTORATIVE JUSTICE

Equality, respect, honesty, trust, dignity, humility, balance, cultural diversity and sensitivity, empowerment, to encouraging accountability and provide an opportunity for healing in a safe environment.

## CULTURAL PERSPECTIVE OF RESTORATIVE PRACTICE

The Tyendinaga Justice Circle will incorporate the traditional, spiritual and cultural practices that will best serve our community's needs. The TJC will embody traditional practices associated with aboriginal justice.

## HOW WILL THIS PROCESS BENEFIT OUR YOUTH?

A restorative justice process for our youth encourages them to take responsibility for his or her harmful behaviour in a meaningful way, to gain insight into the causes of that behaviour and its effects on others. Our mandate is to help youth 12-17 years of age.

## HOW WILL THIS PROCESS BENEFIT THE VICTIMS?

When victims choose to participate, the process gives them a forum to ask questions, receive answers and gain understanding. The victim explains the impact of the crime on them and contributes to the outcome of the process. The process may result in the victim receiving some sort of reparation such as an apology, restitution, and services in a safe environment. Participating in a restorative justice circle can assist the victim in seeking closure.

## HOW DO YOU ACCESS THE TYENDINAGA JUSTICE CIRCLE?

### STEPS TO CONTACTING THE TJC.

Contact your police Service or the Justice Circle Coordinator to ensure that your case can be referred to TJC. A key component to the forum is that the offender(s) must first admit responsibility for their behaviour.

The Justice Circle Coordinator will contact you to make arrangements. Participation is strictly voluntary.

The session will be held in a location suitable for such forums. A resolution must be agreed to by all parties. The facilitator(s) do not have a say in the decision itself. They maintain a focus for the forum.

Closure to the session will be enabled by all parties gathering at the end. An agreement will be prepared by the facilitator that must be signed by all parties.

## TYENDINAGA JUSTICE CIRCLE

It is an alternative to the current justice system. No "professional" individuals are involved in the process.

It benefits the victim(s), the offender (s) their supporters, and the community in which they live.

Certified Community Volunteers facilitate the forum.

Types of circles: Pre charge forums, post charge forums, conflict resolution forums

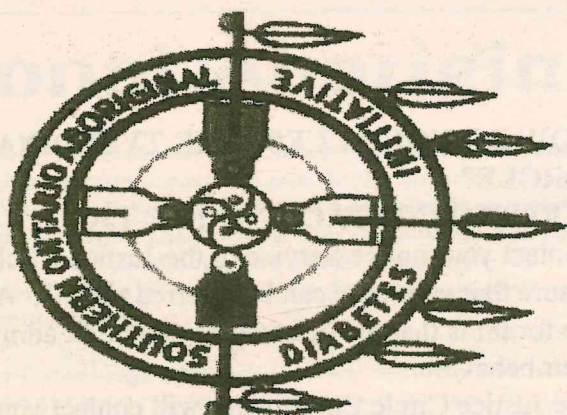

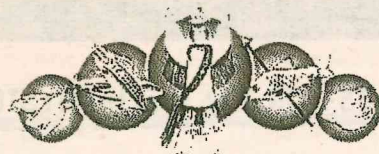

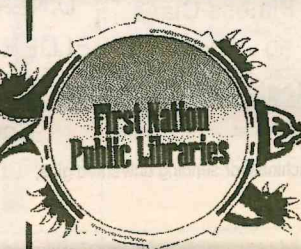

### Criminal Harassment: Stalking -- It's NOT Love

#### What Is It?

Criminal harassment, more commonly known as STALKING, is a crime. Generally it consists of repeated conduct that is carried out over a period of time and which causes you to reasonably fear for your safety or the safety of someone known to you. Stalking does not have to result in physical injury in order to make it a crime. The law protects you even if the conduct of the stalker is not done with the intent to scare you. It is enough if the conduct does scare you. This may be an advance warning of the possibility of future violent acts.

#### Are you or someone you know being STALKED?

Are you afraid for your safety or the safety of someone known to you because of the words or actions of another person?

- 1) Is someone repeatedly following you or someone known to you from place to place? **Repeatedly** is more than one time and does not have to be for an extended period of time. The incidents may have occurred during the same day.
- 2) Is someone repeatedly communicating with you, either directly or indirectly?  
Directly can be by telephone, in person, leaving messages on answering machines, or sending unwanted gifts, notes, letters or e-mails.
- Indirectly can be by contacting people you know and having messages sent through them or simply by making repeated unwanted inquiries about you.
- 3) Is someone persistently close by or watching your home or any place where you or anyone known to you live, works, carries on business or happens to be?
- 4) Have you or any member of your family been threatened by this person?

If you can answer YES to any of these questions you or someone you know may be a victim of **CRIMINAL HARASSMENT - STALKING**.

#### What to do and NOT to do

You are NOT alone! Break the silence:

- Call the police
- Contact a community help service
- Talk to a friend, co-worker or family member

Maintain detailed notes about the stalking conduct. Dates, times, places, actions and threats are easier to explain and remember when written down. Keep all recorded telephone messages, e-mails, gifts, letters or notes that have been sent by the individual. Keep a list of emergency numbers posted in several locations. Emergency numbers should include:

- police
- immediate family
- friends
- co-workers
- victims advocacy groups

Pay attention to incidents that may seem coincidental. Are you suddenly running into this person more often? If you are not sure if you are being stalked contact the police.

Do NOT agree to have contact with a person who you think may be stalking you. Do NOT try to deal with a stalker by yourself. Each stalking situation is different. Rather than intervening with the person yourself, contact the police. Consider that sometimes, when a stalker is confronted or meets with resistance, he/she may react with violence or the conduct may escalate.

#### What do we know about stalkers in Canada?

Criminal harassment (stalking) is not an activity that is attributed to any one specific psychiatric diagnosis. There is no single profile of a stalker that exists. It appears that the main motivation for stalking another person is the desire to control, particularly in cases where the subject is a former partner.

Individuals who stalk may possess one or more various psychological conditions, from personality disorders to mental illness. Most individuals who stalk are engaging in obsessional behaviour. They have persistent thoughts and ideas concerning the object of their attentions. A stalker does not necessarily have a psychiatric disorder.

#### Types of stalkers

**Simple Obsessional:** The majority of these stalkers have been in some form of relationship with the victim. The contact may have been minimal, such as a blind date, but more commonly is a prolonged dating relationship, common law union or marriage. The perpetrator refuses to recognize that the relationship with the other person is over and the prevailing attitude is "if I can't have her (or him) then no one else will." A campaign of harassment, intimidation and psychological terror is mounted. The motivation for the harassment and stalking varies from revenge to the false belief that they can convince or coerce the victim back into the relationship.

**Erotomaniac:** Is convinced that the object of his or her attention, usually of the opposite sex, fervently loves him or her and would return the affection if it were not for some external influence. The person about whom this conviction is held is usually of a higher status than the stalker but is often not a celebrity. It could be the supervisor at work, their child's pediatrician, their church minister or the police officer who stopped them for a traffic violation but did not charge them. Sometimes it can be a complete stranger. Love Obsessional: The stalker can be obsessed in his or her "love" without possessing the belief that the victim loves him or her. Very often the love obsessional stalker suffers from a major psychiatric illness such as schizophrenia or mania and wants to "win over" the love of his or her victim.

Another recognized but not well studied group of stalkers are those who stalk as a component to their paraphiliac (sexually deviant) focus. Some rapists and pedophiles have stalked because it is incorporated in their sexually deviant fantasies. Some sexual sadist will go through "behavioural try-outs" that will include stalking.

#### Facts on Stalking - Criminal Harassment:

- More than 1 in 10 women (15 years of age and over) were victims of Stalking in Canada.
- Obscene phone calls is the most frequently reported form of stalking for female victims.
- Most stalking victims know their stalker.
- Over one third of stalking victims reported stalking to police.
- 1 in 10 stalking victims sought out a protective order against the stalker - of which almost one half were violated.
- Female victims stalked by a former intimate partner experienced physical violence relative to victims pursued by a stranger or acquaintance.



### 2008 Mohawk Landing

#### Child Care Tips:

- ❖ You may have to offer a new food ten or more times before your child will try or eat it.
- ❖ Young children may not do the same task for long periods or time. So add up your physical activity in short periods of time (e.g. 10 minutes) throughout the day.
- ❖ Children have small stomachs. So for good health, they need to eat more often than adults. That's why it's important to offer snacks between meals.
- ❖ Keep portion sizes small. As children grow, portion sizes can grow too.
- ❖ Becoming active early in life increases the chances that young children will learn to move skillfully, and form the foundation for sport, dance, and exercise activities later in life.
