Dear Ken:

My name is Hersh Spiegelman. I'm a practising Chartered Accountant living near Toronto and have been in business for 15 years preparing financial statements and tax returns.

I'm contacting you because of the recent decision by the Supreme Court of Canada in the Glen Williams case. This case decided that unemployment insurance benefits received by Reserve Indians were not subject to income tax in certain situations.

Due to this case Reserve Indians in the future should find their U.I. benefits noticeably larger since income tax will no longer be withheld.


THIS DECISION ALSO MEANS THAT those individuals who had received U.I. benefits in the past (where the tax was already deducted and withheld) can now refile their personal income tax returns all the way back to 1985 and be entitled to receive a refund of all taxes withheld. The government will also pay you interest back to 1985. In other words even if one has already filed a personal tax return any time between 1985 and 1991 and received a refund at that time, YOU MAY REFILE AGAIN AND POSSIBLY RECEIVE A LARGER REFUND.

I represent an income tax recovery company, and we wish to offer our services to assist in refiling tax returns for everyone who might be affected on your Reserve. We have had a significant amount of experience in the income tax field and although refiling can be a technically complex exercise, we are confident we can handle it quickly and efficiently.

Summer Student Introductions!



This is brief introduction of the student study team that will be helping to study the Big Marsh (Mud Creek Marsh). The purpose of the marsh study is to determine the present condition of the marsh as well as determining possible ways by which the marsh may be improved. This may include management methods so that an increase of fish and wildlife could result.

The Perils of Packaging

he production, use, and disposal of the materials we use to wrap our foods, clothes, and other consumer goods contribute to many environmental problems, from litter through waste disposal to acid rain.

The more expensive the item, the more layers of wrapping. Witness that expensive box of chocolates or the pricey mushrooms in a plastic box wrapped in plastic. Few products need more than one layer of packaging, almost none need more than two layers. Yet a common sight in supermarkets is two or four tomatoes sitting in a cardboard box and surrounded by plastic wrap.

Traditional packing materials have given way to foamed plastics and aluminum; plastic wrappers and the plastic rings on six-packs (banned in many U.S. states) strangle and suffocate birds and marine animals. Although paper and cardboard eventually break down as waste, they're rarely made from recycled material. In a year each of us might use two trees' worth of packaging material.

Even juice boxes, valued because they're light and store neatly without wasting space (hence saving fuel used in transportation), are environment-unfriendly because they're not being recycled. But instead of buying one large recyclable glass container of juice, we opt for boxes made from plastic wrap, cardboard, and foil, then packaged in sixes wrapped in more plastic. And biodegradable and photodegradable plastics aren't a solution either; many environmentalists feel these will only leave us with plastic dust, the environmental impact of which isn't known.

Consumers do have a say in packaging. Their reaction, for example, removed a new plastic soft-drink can from the market in the U.S. Some U.S. states are imposing waste taxes on packaging materials that can't be recycled, which are added to the price of products like toothpaste. There's also a shopping bag tax: bring your own bag to the store (and get a rebate, in some places) or pay for a new one.

A British borough council has a campaign called Don't Choose What You Can't Reuse. This won't do the whole job; reuse must be combined with recycling and — most important — reduced consumption. But every bit counts. Here are some measures you can take that will help considerably.

- L'se your municipality's Blue Box recycling program, if it has one, for cans, bottles, and acceptable plastics.
- Choose returnable bottles.
- Don't litter anywhere with anything.
- Cut down on the amount of plastic and foam packaging you bring home.
- Buy products made from recycled materials; if they're not available, ask why.
- Reuse plastic bags when you can't avoid buying foods in them. For example,
 Plastic milk bags are excellent for storing foods.

Degradable Plastics

any Canadians are concerned about the amount of plastic we add to our garbage – 16 to 18 kg per person per year. We know those plastics will pile up over the centuries as a lasting monument to our throwaway sociary. All of us have seen, too, the many plastic items that aren't put out in the arrhage; they litter our roadsides, parks, and campgrounds. And so the new biodegradable and photodegradable plastic bags seem on the surface to be very beneficial. But we may have to think again about these wonder products.

Biodegradable plastics are made by including comstarch with the polyethylene in the manufacturing process. When the plastic item is discarded, the comstarch is eaten by bacteria, which causes the polyethylene to break down into pieces too small to see. Another chemical added during manufacture helps provide on, gen to the bacteria, which also aids in the decomposition of the plastic.

Photodegradable plastics are used in bags and in the plastic rings used to hold six-packs of cans together. In this case, a light-sensitive additive is mixed with the plastic to help break the product down into small particles in the presence of sunlight. This is important environmentally not only because of the despoiling of nature by litter, but also because seabirds often choke or strangle on plastics.




Paper vs. Plastic Bags

There's been a lot of argument over who is really the better environmental citizen. Paper makers say their industry is based on a renewable resource, unlike the petroleumbased plastics industry. Plastic manufacturers insist that more air and water pollution is generated and more energy consumed making a paper bag than a plastic bag. And although paper is biodegradable and can be composted, it can take decades to decompose when buried deep in a modern landfill site. Of course, plastic bags take even longer to break down — they will be with us for centuries. Neither paper nor plastic shopping bags are currently recycled to any great extent.

Don't Use Either!

Instead of arguing which is the lesser of two evils, the Green Consumer leaves the bag behind in favour of a reusable tote bag. If you need to take a bag, choose one you can recycle or reuse later.


