



## Tyendinaga land claim nearly settled

It's taken almost 200 years, but Tyendinaga Mohawk Chief Earl Hill is finally seeing some light at the end of the tunnel when it comes to land claims.

Optimistic about the prospects of signing a deal June 22 to break the deadlock over 200 acres of disputed territory near Shannonville, Hill said Monday settling the issue could be a sign of things to come.

"We're hoping it's going to set some kind of precedent," said Hill.

"Perhaps it's a sign of the times."
The land in question was severed

from the reserve 156 years ago and leased to Montreal businessman Turten Penn in a 999-year agreement. In return, the Mohawks were guaranteed 30 barrels of flour as an annual rental fee.

While Hill said the deal suited the Mohawks' purposes when it was signed, he said it has been outdated and neglected for some time.

"It may have been good in its day," said Hill.

"But with only three bags in a barrel, we'd need more than double that just to get by these days."

The entire controversy started in 1971 when the contract was breached as a result of the Mohawks being given rotten flour. Shortly after, the deal fell through and the flour stopped coming.

With a buy-out offer from the federal government on the table, Mohawk band council will meet tonight to discuss the issue.

Should the band decide to accept the offer, which would see the government purchase the leasehold interest, the deal could by ratified June 22 in a meeting with Minister of Indian and Northern Affairs Tom Siddon.

Although Hill said he's optimistic the deal for the 200 acre parcel, now

occupied by 46 homes, could go through, he couldn't comment on the particulars of the negotiations.

"It looks encouraging to me," said Hill.

"It's been a long time coming. But I can't say the deal will be accepted for sure," he said.

As far as compensation for loss of use of the Land is concerned, Hill said it is a dead issue.

"We're not including that in the deal," said Hill, who feels settling the issue may pave the way to an agreement over the band's actual Land claim.


#### NEMIAH VALLEY INDIAN BAND FIGHT TO SAVE THEIR WAY OF LIFE

UPDATE: June, 1991
Nemiah Valley, BC VOL 1X0

In December, 1989, the Nemiah Valley Indian Band formally unveiled the Nemiah Declaration. In Tŝilhqot'in (Chilcotin) and English, the Declaration outlines the Nemiah Aboriginal Wilderness Preserve. The Band is adamant that the Preserve will remain undisturbed by hydroelectric dams, mineral exploration, and the more immediate threat of logging and road building. The Band's states their willingness to share their territory with those who respect the natural integrity of their land. The Band also states that they are prepared to defend their territory in whatever way they are able.

Nemiah Band members live a traditional way of life. They hunt, fish, and harvest wild foods. Trapping provides band members with a major source of cash income. There is no hydro service to the Valley, and Tŝilhqot'in remains the first language of most Band members.

The Nemiah Valley is 140 miles southwest of Williams Lake, B.C., on the shores of Chilko Lake. With approximately 350 members, the Nemiah Band is one of six which form the Chilcotin Nation.



#### The Immediate Threat

In 1989, two companies, Fletcher Challenge and Carrier Lumber, notified the Band of their intention to log within the Band's registered trapline, an area of approximately 5,000 square kilometers. In December, 1989, the Band commenced proceedings in the Supreme Court of British Columbia, naming the provincial Crown, Carrier Lumber and Fletcher Challenge as defendants. The Band is seeking a legal declaration that the Band has an aboriginal right to trap. The Band hopes to use that declaration to prevent clearcut logging within their trapline area. There are no clear legal precedents for this action.

Since aboriginal rights are recognized, but not defined, in the Canadian Constitution, those rights are increasingly defined and shaped by judicial decisions. In the absence of formal government recognition of aboriginal title, it is hoped that the courts will expand the definition of aboriginal rights to include the right to trap. The Band hopes to prevent logging in their territory by showing that the very animals they depend on would be eliminated if logging is allowed. The Band has chosen to pursue this course of action because actions based on aboriginal title are lengthy and extremely costly. It is believed that this action will achieve the same protection with less cost.

By late 1990, Carrier Lumber had built roads deep inside the Band's trapline area. Carrier was preparing to log and the Ministry of Forests was ready to issue cutting permits. The Band sought an interlocutory injunction to stop logging until the issue of trapping and aboriginal rights could be heard in the Supreme Court of British Columbia. At the eleventh hour, Carrier Lumber agreed to a consent order, pending a full hearing. By consent, they agreed that they would not log within the trapline, that the 17 kilometers of road already constructed would be closed, and that the Band would receive 3 months' notice of any future plans to log. In this sense, the order of December, 1990 was temporary -- Carrier remained free to resume harvesting plans at any time. While the order applied only to Carrier Lumber, Fletcher Challenge has agreed out of court to avoid logging within the Band's trapline for five years.

In May, 1991, Carrier Lumber gave the Nemiah Valley Indian Band the requisite 3 months' notice that they intend to proceed with logging. For the Band, this means that they must proceed *immediately* to prevent the clearcut logging within their traditional territories.

#### Support for the Nemiah Band

Since their struggle began, the Nemiah Valley Indian Band has received the support of a number of individuals and interest groups -- the Western Canada Wilderness Committee, the Sierra Club, Project North and the Union of B.C. Indian Chiefs have offered technical, financial and/or political assistance.

In 1990, the Friends of Nemiah was formed to engage in education, research and fundraising in support of the Band. In conjunction with the Band, the Friends have prepared a slide show which illustrates the natural and human richness of the region.

#### How You Can Help

The Band and their supporters are making an urgent appeal for financial assistance.

To forestall logging which could start as early as August, 1991, the Band needs \$35,000 IMMEDIATELY!

To finance the Supreme Court action pertaining to the right of aboriginal people to trap, the Band will need additional funds.

#### KEESEEKOOWENIN BAND TO GET PARK LANDS BACK

Affaires indiennes

OTTAWA (May 31, 1991) -- The Honourable Tom Siddon, Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development and the Honourable Jean Charest, Minister of the Environment today announced that the Keeseekoowenin Indian Band would regain the use of its former reserve land located in Riding Mountain National Park.

In a letter sent to Chief Harry Bone, Ministers Siddon and Charest indicated: "We have been advised by the Department of Justice that the lands set aside as Clear Lake Indian Reserve No. 61A by Order-in-Council on July 8, 1896, remain reserve lands at the present time and the band has the right to occupy same". These lands represent approximately 293 hectares of a total park area of 2,976 square kilometers.

Based on the evidence available, Canada has also accepted for negotiation under the Specific Claims Policy the band's claim for past loss of use of this land.

The Ministers also noted with interest that an interim agreement is being negotiated that will allow for the smooth transition of the lands from Canadian Parks Service to the Band with the least possible disruption to the general public and that an arrangement is being worked out with the full cooperation of the Band to ensure the lands in question will be managed in harmony with the surrounding Riding Mountain National Park.

MANITOBA BANDS TO RECEIVE FUNDING INCREASE FOR SPECIAL NEEDS

Winnipeg (May 31, 1991) -- The Honourable Tom Siddon, Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) today announced a \$1.2 million increase to the base funding of special needs for on-reserve social assistance recipients in Manitoba for fiscal year 1991/92. The increase raises the special needs budget from \$0.7 million to \$1.9 million.

Special needs benefits are supplementary to social assistance funding. Band members requiring additional assistance with items such as household furnishings, appliances and house repairs -and other approved items over and above their basic needs -- can apply to the band social assistance worker for these supplementary benefits.

"The increase in resources has been made available through the redirection of DIAND funds from reimbursements to the province for off-reserve social services to on-reserve requirements in Manitoba," said the Minister. "This increase supports the Native Agenda objective of improving economic and social conditions on reserve."

Chiefs and Councils will be informed of the details regarding new budget levels and amendments to their bands' special needs budgets in the very near future.

BARRIER-FREE ACCESS IN ONTARIO COURTS FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

MAY 30, 1991

TORONTO - The Ministry of the Attorney General and the Ministry of Government Services have initiated a program of converting the province's courts to ensure barrier-free access for people with disabilities. As part of the government's commitment to ensuring accessibility to the courts, new facilities will be sought and existing courtrooms will be renovated. Consultations will be held with organizations for people with disabilities, in determining the necessary renovations.

"The government is committed to protecting the rights of people with disabilities by ensuring their freedom from discrimination in the province's courts," said Attorney General Howard Hampton. "This initiative will enable the ministry to meet it's obligations under the Human Rights Code to accommodate the needs of persons with disabilities."

A toll-free number will be promoted this fall to provide information on barrier-free accommodations. The Ontario Office for Disabled Persons will operate the information line and will refer callers to appropriate Ministry of Attorney General staff, responsible for scheduling accessible court arrangements. As well, the Ministry of the Attorney General is seeking the participation of law enforcement agencies in providing notice of the toll-free number and services.

"These initiatives are being undertaken to improve accessibility to the justice system and to respond to the needs of all members of society," said Mr. Hampton.

The Ministry's modernization program is being announced as part of the government's focus on National Access Awareness Week. The week promotes the social integration of people with disabilities, through better access to employment, transportation, education, housing and recreation.

- Project Grants are available to Ontario-based Native organizations. Project Grants are directed towards arts related projects and may cover such costs as professional artists' fees and travel costs, exhibition fees, publication expenses, and costs associated with the preparation of arts related resource materials.
- Project grants should not be interpreted as an OAC commitment to annually fund organizations with either project or operating assistance.
- Applicants are advised to discuss any proposed project with the OAC officer in charge of
- · Native Arts.
- Please note that Project Grants will not fund the total project; there must be some evidence of local support and contributions from participants.
- Organizations applying for assistance must have been in existence for a minimum of one year.

#### **DEADLINES:**

Requests for assistance must be submitted on this application form. The deadlines are May 1st for projects commencing by October 31st, and November 1st for projects commencing by April 30th.

- N.B. Requests of \$20,000 or more must be accompanied by the organization's last (latest) audited financial statement. No request for a grant of \$20,000 or more can be considered by Council unless accompanied by a copy of the organization's last audited statement.
- Decisions will be made by a panel composed of members of the Native community and appropriate Ontario Arts Council staff. In a program where a jury makes the decision, there are no appeals to Council. All juried decisions are final.
- Recipients of Project Grants will be required to submit a written report and financial statement of the project within 90 days of its completion.
- We ask that successful applicants acknowledge the support of the Ontario Government through
  the Ontario Arts Council in all of your printed materials relating to the project. This program is
  funded through a special multicultural allocation to the Ontario Arts Council from the Government of Ontario.

#### JOB DEVELOPMENT FUNDING APPROVED

Prince Edward - Hastings M.P., Lyle Vanclief, announced today that a Job Development funding application by Skills Quinte has been approved by the Minister of Employment and Immigration.

"Skills Quinte will be receiving \$124,708 for their program which will provide 10 people with 28 weeks worth of training and work. Their innovative program has the advantage of not only providing jobs to 10 people who are currently living on Social Assistance, but will also provide the Quinte Area with people possessing skills that are more and more in demand."...said Vanclief.

The participants in this program will receive training in marketing and survey techniques to be used in tasks such as public opinion sampling and interviewing for information collection and analysis. Training will be conducted at Clarke Business College, Loyalist College and at the First Nation's Technical Institute.

"It is particularly noteworthy that 5 of the 10 people who will be participating in this program will be Mohawks from Tyendinaga. I believe that the community of Tyendinaga will find ample opportunity to use the new skills which these people will be bringing with them. It is important that programs such as this not only provide unemployed people with work, but that we manage to train people with skills that are in demand and therefore give them hope of securing their futures by finding full-time work at the same time as fulfilling the needs of the community."...commented Vanclief.

Following the training portion of the program, both Skills Quinte and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have planned projects for which the program's participants will be conducting the necessary research.




- 1. Children must bring a lunch to camp with them daily unless otherwise specified on calendar distributed to children. There is a cooler to keep lunches and drinks cold.

Dear Parent:

Here are some unsettling facts. Traffic accidents are a leading cause of death for Ontario residents under the age of 45. In an average year, more than 1,200 people of all ages are killed in traffic accidents in Ontario, while more than 120,000 are injured. Of six million Ontario drivers, more than 300,000 are involved in traffic mishaps in any given year.

These statistics are why the Ontario Ministry of Transportation has just launched a "Drive Safely" awareness campaign. This initiative is designed to reduce the deaths, injuries and property damage associated with vehicle collisions in Ontario. As part of that campaign, I am writing to parents throughout Ontario to encourage them to join us in actively promoting safety on the roads of our province.

As parents, you are both teachers and role models, and you are in the best position to take steps to ensure the safety of your children. In this regard, parents can play a key role in helping to spread the messages related to driving safety, and in making certain that you yourself are engaging in safe driving habits. In fact, there are some very simple things that parents can do to make a dramatic difference to their children's safety on the roads.

For example, you can ensure that your children are always restrained correctly in car seats or seat belts appropriate to their size. You can also set a positive example by always wearing your own seat belt. You can also teach your children to be good pedestrians, and to understand that they must watch out for themselves when they are on or near the road; they should not simply count on drivers to watch out for them.

You can also ensure that your children always wear helmets when riding their bicycles. The Canadian Medical Association estimates that the protection of a helmet could prevent 85 per cent of the bicycle deaths caused by head injuries.

When you are driving, you can make sure that you observe the new school bus regulations, which come into effect on July 1. For your information, I am attaching a fact sheet to this letter which explains the new school bus regulations, as well as other amendments to the Highway Traffic Act that will be of interest to you.

We all have a role to play in making the roads of Ontario safer; both for ourselves and for the children who rely on us to protect them. I am optimistic that we can have a positive impact on safety and urge you to join my ministry in making road safety one of your top priorities.

I thank you for your attention regarding this important matter.

#### WHAT EVERY PARENT SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SCHOOL BUSES:

- 1. Starting this summer, school bus drivers will use their overhead flashing red lights and stop arm whenever dropping off and picking up children -- and not just during school hours. This will make school bus travel even safer for children.
- Starting this summer, when a school bus stops near (within about five bus lengths) a traffic signal, the overhead flashing red lights and stop arm will not be used. Instead, school children will be told to walk to the traffic signal and cross with the lights.
- 3. Every parent should know the school bus rules their children are expected to know (listed below).

#### RULES EVERY CHILD SHOULD KNOW WHEN RIDING IN A SCHOOL BUS:

- When a school bus with overhead flashing red lights is stopped, cross the road in front of the bus NOT behind the bus.
- When crossing the road, keep enough distance between the bus and yourself so that:
- a) you can see the bus driver and any crossing directions the bus driver will give you;
- b) the bus driver can see where you are; and
- c) when you look both ways you can more easily see oncoming traffic.
- 3. Even though the overhead red lights are flashing, look both ways before you cross the street.
- Do not cross the road in front of a bus if the overhead red lights are not flashing.
- 5. Listen to your bus driver. If he or she tells you to walk to the traffic signals and cross there, this is the safest thing to do.
