

COMMUNITY VOTE

NEGOTIATIONS FOR THE RETURN OF CONTROL OF THE LANDS KNOWN AS THE TURTON-PENN LEASE HAVE TAKEN PLACE BETWEEN THE DEPARTMENT OF INDIAN AFFAIRS AND LESSES WITHIN THE LEASED AREA OF SHANNONVILLE. THIS INITIATIVE IS AS A RESULT OF THE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (M.O.U.) SIGNED BETWEEN THE TYENDINAGA MOHAWK COUNCIL AND THE DEPARTMENT OF INDIAN AFFAIRS ON JULY 4, 1991.

THIS MEMORANDUM HAS CERTAIN CONDITIONS THAT APPLIED TO THE RETURN AND ARE LISTED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. IT IS AGREED THAT THE M.O.U. IS NOT INTENDED TO RESOLVE ANY CLAIM THAT MBQ MAY PURSUE AGAINST THE CROWN IN RIGHT OF CANADA;
- 2. IT IS AGREED THAT THE CROWN WILL EFFECT THE RETURN OF LANDS BY ACQUIRING THE INTERESTS ON THE LANDS;
- 3. THE MINISTER WILL, ON THE LANDS ACQUIRED IN ARTICLE 2, CANCEL THE REMAINING LEASE AND RETURN THE SAID LANDS, FREE FROM ANY ENCUMBRANCES OR OTHER OUTSTANDING LIENS, TO THE MBQ;
- 4. MBQ ACCEPTS NO RESPONSIBILITY FOR ANY ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS:
- 5. APPRAISED VALUE OF IMPROVEMENTS ON THE LANDS WILL BE CONSIDERED IF MBQ FILES CLAIM PURSUANT TO THE LEASED LANDS;
- 6. MINISTER WILL RECOMMEND THAT MCTAGGART/LATCHFORD BE RETURNED TO RESERVE STATUS; (COMPLETED)
- 7. MOU SHALL BE WITHOUT PREJUDICE TO LEGAL POSITIONS OF EITHER THE CROWN OR MBQ;
- MBQ AGREES TO DISCONTINUE COURT ACTION.

SIMCOE DEED

GEORGE THE THIRD by the Grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith and so forth.

Know ye that Whereas the Attachment and Fidelity of the Chief Warriors and People of the Six Nations to us and Our Government, have been made manifest on divers occasions by their spirited and zealous exertions and by the bravery of their conduct; And We being desirous of shewing Our aprobation of the same, and in recompense of the losses they may have sustained of providing a convenient Tract of Land under Our protection for a safe and comfortable retreat for them and their posterity Have, of Our special Grace, certain knowledge and mere motion, Given and by these presents Do give and grant unto the Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six nations and their heirs for ever all that District or Territory of Land being parcel of a certain District lately purchased by Us of the Mississauga Nation lying and being limited and bounded as follows (that is to say) the Tract will then be bounded in front by the Bay of Quinte between the mouths of the River Shannon and Bowen's Creek about Twelve Miles Westerly by a Line running, North Sixteen Degrees West from the West side of the Mouth of the River Shannon, and Easterly by a Line running North Sixteen Degrees West from the Mouth of Bowen's Creek and Northerly by a Line running East Sixteen Degrees North and West Sixteen Degrees, South at the distance of about Thirteen Miles back from the Bay of Quinte, measured on the Western Boundary aforesaid, to the North East Angle of the Township of Thurlow. To Have and to Hold the said District or Territory of Land of us Our Heirs and Successors to them the Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations and to and for the sole use and behoof of them and their Heirs for ever freely and clearly of and from all and all manner of Rents, Fines or Services whatsoever to be rendered by them the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and people of the said Six Nations to us or our successors for the same and of and from all conditions, stipulations and agreements whatever except as herinafter by us expressed and declared. Giving and granting and by these presents confirming to the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations, and their Heirs, the full and entire possession, Use benefit and advantage of the said District or Territory of Land to be held and enjoyed by them in the most free and ample manner and according to the several Customs and usages by them the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations. Provided always, and be it understood to be the true intent and meaning of these Presents; that for the purpose of assuring the said Lands as aforesaid to the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the Six Nations and their Heirs and of securing to them the free and undisturbed possession and enjoyment of the same. It is Our Royal Will and Pleasure that no Transfer, Alienation, Convey-

ance, Sale, Gift, Exchange, Lease, Property, or Possession shall at any time be had, made, or given of the said District or Territory of any part or parcel thereof by any of the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and people of the said Six Nations to any other Nation or Body of People, Person or persons whatsoever other than among themselves the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations but that any such Transfer, Alienation, Conveyance, Sale, Gift, Exchange, Lease or Possession shall be null and void and of no effect whatever. And that no Person or Persons shall possess or occupy the said District or Territory, or any part or parcel thereof by or under any pretence whatever under pain of our severe displeasure. And that in case any Person or Persons other than the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations shall under pretence of any such Title as aforesaid, presume to possess or occupy the said District or Territory or any part or parcel thereof that it shall and may be lawful for Us, our Heirs and Successors at any time hereafter to enter upon the Lands so occupied and possessed by any other Person or Persons other than the said Chiefs, Warriors, Women and People of the said Six Nations and them the said Intruders thereof and therefrom wholly to dispossess and evict and to resume the same to Ourselves, Our Heirs and Successors.

Warriors, Women and and People of the said Six Nations should be inclined to dispose of and Surrender their Use and Interest in the said District or Territory, the same shall be perchased only for Us in our name at some Public Meeting or Assembly of the Chiefs, Warriors and People of the said Six Nations to be held for that purpose by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Person Administering Our Government in Our Province of Upper Canada.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Our said Province to be hereunto affixed; Witness His Excellency John Graves Simcoe, Esquire, Licutenant Governor and Colonel Commanding Our Forces in Our said Province, Given at Our Government House at Navy Hall this First Day of April in the Year of Our Lord One Thousand, Seven Hundred and Ninety Three in the Thirty Third Year of Our Reign

Dear Mr. Maracle:

After a year of studying the needs of Ontario's onreserve seniors, the Ontario Advisory Council on Senior Citizens has identified housing as an area of great concern.

In Council's soon-to-be-released report Denied Too Long, a bleak picture is painted of Ontario's on-reserve housing as poorly constructed often without insulation, running water, indoor plumbing or proper sewage.

Council's findings reinforce a December 1992 report of the Federal Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs which judged 70 per cent of housing on Ontario reserves as "substandard".

For seniors living on fixed pension incomes, heating bills for poorly constructed houses is a major drain on their finances. Seniors are also hard pressed to afford badly needed repairs to their homes.

Reserve housing is typically very small with only 672 square feet of living space for a family of four. To make matters worse there is a chronic shortage of housing on most First Nation communities resulting in many cases of severe overcrowding.

Time and time again studies have linked poor and overcrowded housing with health problems. For native seniors the effects of substandard housing can be acute. Dampness and cold add to their pain of arthritis. Respiratory problems are aggravated by woodburning stoves. Problems with sanitation lead to a growth in airborne and parasitic diseases. Overcrowding is often seen as factor adding to the spread of diseases such as tuberculosis.

Council has met with native seniors throughout the province including a meeting with seniors and service providers from the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte First Nation. Council applauds the community's efforts to upgrade the housing stock on the reserve.

Council also acknowledges the valuable training component of this project which employs community members in the renovation work.

For seniors it means homes without leaky roofs, malfunctioning furnaces and hazardous wiring. For the construction workers it means hands on experience.

Council congratulates this community for its initiative and concern on behalf of its senior citizens and encourages service clubs, federal and provincial ministries, housing authorities, and community groups to provide what support they can to ensure the continuation of this project.

- 1. Lack of control of Council meetings by their Chairman. In the past it has been my observation that when a person or persons are attending Council meetings they are allowed to continue speaking at length. This has the unfortunate result of extending Council meetings much beyond their required length.
- 2. Lack of other Council support. When a Councillor is verbally attacked during a Council meeting by a community member, it should be the duty of other Council members to show support and act as a unified group.
- 3. Harrassment by community members. I was elected to Council for a term of only two years. My business and my family will still be a part of my life well after that term is served and I have no need or desire to submit myself, my family or my business to public ridicule.

ONTARIO MAINTAINS SUPPORT FOR ABORIGINAL PROGRAMS

The Government of Ontario moved quickly to assure Aboriginal people that Ontario's Expenditure Control Plan supports their efforts to achieve fairness and economic opportunity.

Senior officials hit the phones as soon as the plan was announced to explain to Aboriginal leaders that Ontario will maintain its programs for Aboriginal people, as well as capital spending for projects that improve health, safety and environmental conditions on Aboriginal communities.

The Expenditure Control Plan protects Ontarians who are least able to adjust to tough economic times. That includes many Aboriginal communities. Though Ontario's plan will maintain support for Aboriginal programs, senior officials believe that Aboriginal communities should anticipate making some adjustments.

"Aboriginal people may be affected by reductions in general programs like other Ontarians, since many Aboriginal people use the same educational, health and social services," said Murray Coolican, Ontario's Deputy Minister for Native Affairs.

Mr. Coolican said that he's also advising Aboriginal leaders about the need for realistic expectations because \$3 million has been cut from the 1993/1994 operating budget of the Ontario Native Affairs Secretariat.

"We are going to continue to deliver on projects like land claim and self-government negotiations, but we may not be able to take on new projects until we've completed the ones that are now underway," Mr. Coolican said.

Mr. Coolican said that the Secretariat will adjust to the reduction in its budget through increased organizational efficiencies and reductions in transfer funds for special Aboriginal projects. Examples include funding for oral history projects and computerized mapping systems.





We are writing at this time to the Community of Tyendinaga in support of a company who appear to be at the mercy of a group of individuals who would wish to see their business dissolve.

B & J Pole Line was established in 1977 through the hard work and effort of its two owners, Bud & Jeff Maracle. Throughout the years they have provided employment to an average of fifteen Reserve residents each year. Some of their employees have been with them for almost the entire time. They have always been fair in their business dealings and have always guaranteed their work.

The majority of their pole line work has been for Bell Telephone and Ontario Hydro. As everyone is aware both of those companies have been experiencing financial problems which they have passed on to the consumer in price increases. They have also begun to do a very large portion of their pole and anchor work themselves as another attempt to stay solvent. All of this is due to the recession that Canada has been experiencing.

B & J were in the position of having to let their employees go unless they diversified. They found that diversification in 1990 in construction work. In the past three years they have established themselves in the Territory as a reliable, conscientious and hard working excavating company. There are dozens of individuals on the Reserve who have enjoyed the results of their labours. Although they have been, during the 1991 and 1992 seasons the largest Native company in the area in the construction field, they did not take any advantage in their pricing policies. They have always operated their business with integrity and fair play.

As there are now other individuals established in the construction business on the Reserve, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Band Council have introduced a tender system for their jobs. B & J have been happy to submit tenders as required by due dates and time. They have been awarded a few and they have lost a few. This is good business for the Band and a practice that B & J are glad to oblige. Contrary to some beliefs Bud Maracle has excluded himself from both the bidding and awarding of all of these contracts. There has never been a "conflict of interest on his part."

It is very unfortunate that personal feelings must trespass onto good business sense. We want the Territory to know and to remember that B & J are decent, hard working individuals who are providing work to a great number of people. Their product has been and will continue to be an excellent one- one that can be depended upon. We urge other members of this community to not listen to rumour and innuendo and think only of who can give the best value and service. 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

igibility: Any Canadian organization, or anadian branch of an international ganization, that is a non-government, m-profit group and that (a) focuses on mservation, wildlife, energy issues, toxic lemicals, or any other concern central to proved environmental quality, or (b) has eveloped a program that deals with an vironment-related topic.

ne 1992 award-winner was the nvironmental Youth Alliance for its role in stering environmental awareness and volvement among young Canadians.

. Outstanding Communications for Environmental Awareness

This award is for an author, journalist, broadcaster or film-maker who is a Canadian resident and whose work has significantly broadened Canadians' awareness of environmental issues. The award-winner will have contributed to increased knowledge, concern, commitment and/or hope for the

Eligibility: This category is open to a professional communicator in any medium

The 1992 award-winner was Tom Davey of Aurora, Ontario, a journalist and speaker on environmental issues, acclaimed in Canada and abroad.

3. Corporate Environmental Leadership

This award recognizes innovative and/or exemplary environmental conduct by a Canadian corporation, institution or association—industrial or other. The winner will have shown that environmental concerns can be reflected in economic decisions, as urged by the World Commission on Environment and Development, and by Canada's Task Force on Environment and Economy.

Eligibility: The nominee must be a corporate entity (not a municipality or charitable organization). Crown corporations are also eligible. The nomination should identify how the company in question has protected the environment or conserved natural resources.

The 1992 award-winner was S.C. Johnson Wax for demonstrating environmental responsibility in the manufacture and packaging of its products, and in its internal operations.

4. Lifetime Achievement

This award is given to an individual Canadian whose lifetime dedication to the environment is a source of inspiration.

Eligibility: Any individual Canadian. The nomination should describe the person's work, focusing on his or her motivation and scope of activity. Both successes and failures should be cited.

The 1992 award-winner was Dr. lan McTaggart-Cowan of Victoria, British Columbia, for his major contributions to environmental understanding.

Finvironmental Leadership by a

Environmental Leadership by a Municipality

This award recognizes an innovative and/or exemplary environmental policy, project or activity of a municipality.

Eligibility: Any Canadian regional government or municipality. The nomination should outline the type of policy, project or activity and identify the benefits to the environment.

The 1992 award-winner was the City of Richmond, British Columbia, for implementing environmental programs in its own operations and for city residents.

6. Environmental Science Fair Project

Environment Canada works with the Youth Science Foundation to select the best environment-related science fair project across the country. Nominations are, therefore, not required for this category.

The 1992 award-winner was Kim Nguyen of Prince Rupert, British Columbia, for a study of the environmental impact of phosphate-free detergents.



Nominations must be postmarked on or before February 15, 1993.

An acknowledgment will be sent to everyone who submits a nomination form.

OHSWEKEN: The deadline is quickly approaching for the first On Native Journalists Association's national conference being held at the Brant Park Inn, in Brantford, and on the Six Nations Indian Reserve.

It's a first and we want you to be part of it.

A year ago a handful on native journalists got together and iecided to form the Native Journalists Association and since then we have been diligently working towards the first national conference of native media communicators to ever be held in Canadian history.

And now its almost upon us.

Who are we? We are native communicators in mainstream media, print, radio and T.V., from native community radio, native community [.V., and newspapers.

We draw our membership from editors and writers of native organization's newsletters and publications and native communicators working in public relations and government media relations roles.

We are native communicators whether we are on the airwaves in Icronto, Edmonton, Calgary, Halifax or Vancouver, or in our native communities. We come from Iqualuit, Davis Inlet, Kahnawake, Moosefactory, Phsweken, James Bay and native communities across the country. We are involving all native communications societies, newspapers, newsletters and programmers.

We are all getting together for the first time to talk shop. To talk about how we do our jobs. how we can do them better and how we can help each other.

Some topics under discussion:

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
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
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


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
