





TERMS OF SETTLEMENT



As a result of mediation conducted June 2nd, June 3rd, and June 4th of 1994, the following conditions were agreed to by the parties:

28

- 1. A general meeting will take place on June 13th, 1994, subject to the availability of the required people, or as soon as possible thereafter, which will be advertised to the community at large by way of advertisement.
- The meeting is open to Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte of Tyendinaga Territory band members only.
 - 3. The media will not be allowed to attend the meeting.
 - 4. The meeting will be conducted in an orderly fashion, failing which, the meeting will be adjourned to another date.
 - 5. Representatives of Wilkinson & Company and Band Council's lawyer will be in attendance to answer questions concerning the Wilkinson report.
- 6. The Chief and Band Council will address the community with respect to the Wilkinson report and the recommendations regarding financial policies and procedures with a limited question period to follow.
 - 7. The second issue discussed at mediation is the implementation of a process to exchange information between Band Council and the community.

One-day seat belt count a great success

TORONTO -- Belleville, Mississauga and Tillsonburg drivers lead the province in seat belt use with more than 93 per cent of drivers buckling up, a survey organized by the Ministry of Transportation reveals.

"These communities set an example in safety for the rest of Ontario," said Transportation Minister Gilles Pouliot. "But all of the participating communities helped us emphasize the importance of seat belts — that they save lives and reduce human suffering and also prevent unnecessary legal, medical and insurance costs."

The survey held April 30, the final day of the spring scat belt campaign, was conducted in 45 communities that took up the ministry's challenge to beat Ontario's average seat belt usage of 84 per cent.

About 431 volunteers from community policing groups, driving schools, high schools and district health offices spent two hours counting seat belt use among drivers stopped at local intersections.

"My driver education instructors stood outside for two hours in the pouring rain because they believed this was a worthwhile cause," said Sherrie Horrar, a Windsor volunteer.

Most communities met or came close to the Ontario average. The worst showings in the province were in Fordwich, Ohsweken and Delhi where there was less than 60 per cent compliance.

"If we gained nothing else by doing this survey, we made about 80 students very aware of an important issue," said John Moore, a Delhi teacher from a participating school. "Possibly, through them, we might reduce the risk of personal injury or death."

Although the survey was informal, the ministry will use the results in future challenges and possibly to determine which communities may need more ng enforcement and education.

GRANT FUNDING UPDATE

WATER QUALITY FUNDING EXTENDED ACROSS BAY OF QUINTE AREA

Environment Canada through the Great Lakes Cleanup Fund will provide funding to the Bay of Quinte Remedial Action Plan to extend the geographical area eligible for grants under the Clean Up Rural Beaches program (CURB).

Grants, duplicating those of the CURB program, will be available to farmers and other rural landowners. Eligible projects must be associated with solving surface water contamination problems in the Bay of Quinte drainage area.



Natives and Vegetarianism

The following is reprinted from Amerrikua (a Native American newspaper) and contains the opinions of Rita Laws. Rita's Native American name is Hina Hanta, which means bright path of peace.

I am happy to share with you what I have learned about Native American culture and vegetarianism.

I can't quote a lot of sources — it's just material I have read over the years. Any comprehensive history of the Choctaw tribe would verify what I say. Michael Dorris, in his book, *The Broken Cord*, touches on some of this — especially how the horse changed everything.

Basically, I am a vegetarian because animals are my friends, and I can't bear the thought of eating them. But I also made this choice eleven years ago because I am a Native American — Choctaw by my father, and Cherokee by my mother. The old Native custom is vegetarian; meat is really quite new to the Native diet dating from the 1500's when the Spaniards and the trade routes introduced horse to this great land. They also introduced the idea of eating meat often instead of rarely.

The horse was to us what the car is to modern people. Now Indian a choice to either stay put in their agricultural villages and eat their grimarily vegetarian diets (depending on the tribe) or become nomadic, follow the herds of buffalo and other game, abandon farming, and hunt and gather in order to survive. Tribes like the Sioux chose the latter and everything about their culture — what they wore, what they lived in — changed. My particular tribe, especially the Choctaw, chose to remain agricultural and to hunt little or not at all.

Using animals in food, clothing, shelter, and so on, is a relatively recent Indian phenomenon (last 500 years). An Indian must not feel he has to contribute to the suffering and/or death of our animal brothers and sisters in order to be an Indian.

One has to wonder how different things would be today if the Spaniards had not introduced the horse, if they had not interfered – some would say contaminated – our culture with their beast of burden:

- * Would most Natives be vegetarians?
- * Would the kind of respect for animal life that can only be transmitted through vegetarian culture have prevented some of the extinction of animal species which have occurred in this country?
- * Would our nation be as meatoriented and have as much heart disease and other related health problems as it does today?
- * Would our Native peoples be stronger and healthier and more numerous than they are?

Many people believe that as you treat your most defenceless, your animals, so will you treat your women, children, and minorities. If this is so, then the abandonment of peaceful eating by so many Indians is a sad chapter indeed in our recent history.

I submit to you that animal exploitation is a European idea, not truly Native American at all. I would also plead tolerance of people's differences (my husband and some of my children eat meat even though I never do - nor do I wear leather, wool, silk, etc.). But as someone who has been both a meat eater (two decades) and a vegetarian (one decade), I can assure you that you must try it to understand it. I did not expect to have a profound spiritual transformation after I changed my diet, nor did I expect to have twice the energy and to enjoy such improved health, but I did. Following the peaceful path to non-violent eating is like quitting a drug habit. You can't believe the transformations in your life until you experience them yourself.

Going Vegetarian in 1994?

Here are some tips:

- Convenience foods cut cooking time.

 Natural food stores stack a huge variety of instant soups and main-dish convenience items. Regular supermarkets also carry many fast vegetarian foods. Many canned soups, such as minestrone, black bean, or vegetable, are vegetarian. Flavoured rice mixes can be stretched into an entrée with a can of beans or vegetables. Or try baked beans, refried beans, sloppy joe sauce, and meatless spaghetti sauce.
- Ask for it! Even restaurants that don't offer vegetarian entrées can usually whip up a meatless pasta or vegetable plate if you ask. If attending a catered affair, catch the waiter before you are served and ask him or her to omit the meat portion from your plate and slip on an extra baked potato or portion of rice. Airlines offer vegetarian meals if you ask for them in advance.
- Order your next pizza without cheese but with a mountain of vegetable toppings and extra sauce.
- Find vegetarian cookbooks at the library or book store and have fun experimenting with new foods and recipes.
- As well as vegetarian restaurants the best bets for finding vegetarian food when dining out are international restaurants. Italian, Asian, Mexican, Middle Eastern and Indian restaurants all offer a good variety of vegetarian dishes.
- Texturized vegetable protein (TVP) is fat free, has a texture like ground beef, and is wonderful in tacos, chili, spaghetti sauce, stews and casseroles. Look for it in natural

food stores.

- Summer barbecues are healthy and fun with meatless hot dogs and burgers. Of for a real change of pace, grill thick slices of marinated vegetables like eggplant, zucchini, or tomatoes.
- Check out ethnic groceries for special vegetarian foods. Middle-Eastern delis offer stuffed grape leaves, falafel, and vegetable spreads. Italian markets are a wonderful place to find hearty home made breads, sun dried tomatoes and fresh pasta. Indian and Asian markets offer many vegetarian delicacies.
- The simplest dishes are often the most satisfying. Brown rice, gently seasoned with herbs and lemon and sprinkled with chopped nuts or sunflower seeds is a perfect dish.
- Add variety to your diet with ease by preparing familiar foods in interesting new ways. Cook rice in a mixture of water and apple sauce. Toss broccoli with raisins, sprinkle sunflower seeds or chopped almonds on vegetables. Simmer carrots, turnips, cabbage, or parsnips in orange juice.
- When travelling, pack plenty of vegetarian snacks like instant soups, fresh fruit and raw vegetables, trail mix, granola bars, and home made oatmeal cookies. Fill a cooler with sandwiches and individual containers of juice and soymilks.

If going 'cold turkey' is too difficult, then start off by eating meat in moderation. Think of meat as a condiment or for special occassions, and not the main focus of your meal. When possible obtain the cleanest sources, i.e. organic and free range. If during your transition you slip up and indulge in something sinful, enjoy it thoroughly, then get right back on track. Don't view it as personal failure, but as an important transitional learning experience and look forward to your next great vegetarian meal.

Queen's pioneering programs for Aboriginal students to receive grant from Ministry of Education and Training

(KINGSTON, Ont) -- Queen's innovative work in Aboriginal education has received a vote of confidence in the form of an Ontario Ministry of Education and Training grant. Details will be officially announced at a news conference on campus on May 24 at 10am, by Gary Wilson, MPP for Kingston and the Islands, representing the Ontario Minister of Education and Training. Most of the money will go toward strengthening the university's pioneering work in community-based teacher training for Aboriginal students on Manitoulin Island and in Moose Factory. Some funds will also be used launch two new initiatives that will help Aboriginal students on campus, and which have been identified as priorities by Queen's new Aboriginal Council, comprising Queen's students, university officials, and representatives of more than 20 Aboriginal organizations throughout Ontario. Among those addressing the media on Tuesday will be Cecil King, director of Aboriginal Teacher Education at Queen's and chair of the Aboriginal Council, and Principal David Smith. The news conference takes place in the Collins Room on the third floor of Richardson Hall

You shared your joys and sorrows with me. You shared with myself and my family through two very dark and emotional moments in our lives — the near-tragic loss of my son Gordon in 1987, and through Helen's serious illness in 1991. This kind of love, this willingness to share and care, is what marks you people as very special in our hearts.

Then to top it all off, your Chief and Council saw fit to grant me two very high honours during the recent Mohawk Landing ceremonies; first in granting me, for life, the title of "The Honourary Chaplain to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte," and secondly, to give me my Mohawk name, 'Ra wen non ha wi. 'meaning 'Carrying the Word.' These two high honours I humbly accept, giving our Heavenly Father thanks for His goodness.

My beloved Helen joins with me in expressing our gratitude for these past seven years among you. May you all continue to grow in grace, and may God richly bless and keep you all in His abiding love and care. 'Via con Dios.'"

Valedictorian Address By Betty Carlsen

I welcome you to the graduation ceremonies of the class of 1994 from National Native Bible College. I first want to honour God and give thanks to Him for making this day possible for me.

President, Rev. Ross Maracle and Mrs. Maracle; Chairman of the Board and Board members; Academic Dean, Rev. Adrian Jacobs; Staff Members; Students; Honoured Supporters; Friends; Families of Graduates; and Teachers: Mrs. Christine Sliwa, Rev. Richard Robb, and Rev. Warren Blaisure.

Also, I give honour to my previous teachers: Rev.Mrs. Emma Crouch, Rev. Mrs. Jean Carter, Rev. Ivan Doxtator, Mr. Bill Rendell, and Rev. & Mrs. Norman Holmes. I extend to each of you a heart-felt thank you and appreciation for your guidance, patience, discipline, love and concern you have extended to me during my three years of studies at National Native Bible College.

All have contributed to the honour I have received today and the knowledge I have acquired under the teaching of God's chosen people through the Holy Spirit.

I would like to address two people who have made a special impact on my life since I've been at National Native Bible College.

President, Rev. Ross Maracle: For the great example of leadership that you have shown to me through your life and dedication to a ministry for the purpose of reaching people across the land, and a heart and vision for the Native People. You have been a great inspiration to me

God, your family, to the ministry, and to the Native People; Your diligence-of many hours, days, weeks, months and years of work; Your determination-to reach, teach, train and equip leaders to carry on the vision God has given you. I want to thank you for planting within my heart: Dedication, Diligence, & Determination.

Rev. Ivan Doxtator: I saw your...dedication--first to God, to your family and to the ministry God has given to you in teaching and counselling; your Diligence--the long hours of study and preparation; Your Determination to see the Native People succeed in life. I am an example of that teaching. I want to say thank you for your patience; your concern; the encouragements, guidance, and the wise words of wisdom I received.

I was counselled, corrected and disciplined in times of struggles, and by the the help of the Lord, with the Holy Spirit working through you, I was made to realize the value of my life, and recognize my identity in Christ. I am a winner; I can be a conqueror; and I am an overomer. You didn't give up on me, but saw the potential in me. When I said, "I couldn't" -- you said, "I could!" When I said, "I can't"--you said, "I can!" I'm standing here today an example of your dedication to your ministry.

Thank you with respect and appreciation from my heart.

"Therefore my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as you know that your labor is not in vain, in the Lord". (I Cor. 15:58)

Coming from a background of many tragedies and failures from childhood through adulthood, enduring heartaches, hardships--abusive home, failed marriage, death of my husband, and my

night. In having to deal with the after effects of these tragedies, God saw us through. God is our everything. God was instilled within my heart as a young child because of my mother's relationship with Him and taking me to church at a very young age. I always knew there was a God.

From a child my dream was to be a preacher someday. God knows the desires of our hearts even as a child. God is bringing to pass that dream; He is calling me forth to carry His word to the people. Since I've been here at National Native Bible College: I have experienced inner healing; I have regained confidence in myself; I have experienced growth in my spiritual walk with God; I have been rooted and grounded in the Word of God; and I am standing on the sure foundation of Jesus Christ.

My tragedies and failures have been turned into victories.

My first year here was the testing year for me. There was a situation that came up that I didn't want to face. My first instinct was to retreat, leave, go home. As I was on my way to Rev. Doxtator's office to tell him I was leaving God seem to say, "Where are you going?" God stopped me before I reached his door. I turned and went back up to my room. I prayed, asking God to help me. I took my Bible, and here is the scripture God placed before my eyes: "But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify of the Gospel of the Grace of God". (Acts 20:24)

I couldn't leave--God called me to take the Gospel, and here I am today.

YOU SEE STUDENTS:

God has a plan and purpose for each and every one of your lives. He has

marvelous light. He has called you from your mother's womb. Romans 3:30 states, "Whom He predestined, He also calls, and who He calls He justifies, who He justifies, He glorifies".

He has called you with a holy calling not according to your works but according to his own purpose and grace which was given to you in Christ Jesus before the world began" (II Tim. 1:9).

When those days come with the pressures of life and you feel like giving up, look to Jesus--He is the Author and Finisher of your faith! Don't allow Satan to defeat you.

You are the conqueror not the conquered; the overcomer not the overcome; the defeator not the defeated; the winner not the loser.

If God be for you, who can be against you? Stand strong, immovable for Jesus Christ. Be like that oak tree, once you are planted on the solid foundation you can't be uprooted, you may weather the storm but after the storm you will

see the buds and out of those buds comes the blossoms--the fruits of right-eousness.

God has made it possible in the past for me to preach in Muncey, London and Toronto, Ontario, and in the future, there are opportunities for me to go into different churches to preach and also into a campmeeting. I have been asked to preach one night a month in my home church in London. Also, my goal is counsel those in need, through the anointing of the Holy Spirit, to instill hope and value in the lives of those in the times of crisis.

GRADUATES:

We have been called and selected-chosen by God --to fulfill the Great Commission Jesus left his disciples (Mark 16:15). We have been trained and equipped to go forth into the world and preach the gospel. We have been under protection, and have experienced a feeling of security by being under a covering while being trained here at

National Native Bible College for the work of the Lord. We now are stepping out of our comfort zone into the battlezone to stand on the front lines as Soldiers for Christ! We are, therefore, to preach the word, to be instant in season and out of season, to reprove, rebuke, and exhort with all long suffering and doctrine (v. 5). Be sober in all things, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill our ministry for the time of our departure has come. We have fought the good fight; we have finished the course, and have kept the faith. There is laid up for us a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge shall give us at that day" (II Tim. 4:2, 5-8). Let us go out with our lives being a reflection of Jesus Christ that the glory of God will be revealed and that our lives will bring Glory to the Father. Let the fire that burns in you spread across the land, drawing the lost souls into the Kingdom of God from out of a darkened sinful world.
