




Feud over funding

A member of the Tyendinaga band council and an official of the regional office of Indian Affairs have both denounced an allegation that band council members are collecting more pay than they are entitled to.

The charge was made by a member of a group on the Tyendinaga reserve called the Fundamental Indian Rights Movement. One of its founding members, Shawn Brant, made the charge in a list of complaints about council business that he released last week.

Mr. Brant noted that this is not the first time a similar complaint has been made. Council's composition was questioned last year by Harold Brant, a non-resident band member living in Napanee. Harold Brant lodged an appeal to have the results of the band council election of Nov. 30, 1991, overturned on the grounds that the Tyendinaga reserve is entitled to a 12-member band council, not just the current five — consisting of the chief and four councillors.

The federal Indian Affairs department reviewed Harold Brant's complaint and found his claim to be correct. However, the department recommended to band chief Earl Hill and council that they seek an exemption to the requirement rather than overturn the election.

The Fundamental Indian Rights Movement claims, however, that the Indian Affairs department has been funding 12 council positions.

Shawn Brant told The Whig-Standard that the current five members simply "divide up" the funding intended for a 12-member slate.

But band councillor R. Donald Maracle flatly rejects this claim.

"That is totally incorrect," said Councillor Maracle who is himself an employee of the Indian branch. "The department's funding formulas don't work that way at all. There are a lot of different formulas."

Doug Forbes, district director of Indian Affairs, described the allegation as "absolutely ludicrous."

One of the main reasons the band asked for the four-member exemption was to help cut administrative costs and conserve funds for the delivery of services to the community.

"The exact opposite is true," Mr. Forbes said. "This is helping them to reduce expenditures. The reality is that the council is achieving a savings that they are passing on to the members of the band."

In any event, he said, funding of bands is not based on the numbers of sitting councillors. Lump-sum funding is given to bands to run their governments, he said. No council can get extra money because of its number of councillors.






Birth Announcement!

Native Participation in the 1993 Canada Summer Games

Did you know that Kamloops is hosting the 1993 Canada Summer Games?

Did you know that this is an important event for First Nations people?

We have never been involved with the Games.

The City of Kamloops bid for the Games in December, 1988 and the dream became reality in April, 1989. The Games begin on August 8th and conclude on

August 21st

My name is Arnold Baptiste and I am employed by the Interior Indian Friendship Society (IIFS) as Canada Games Coordinator. There is a Native Participation Committee among the units of the Canada Games Society. The Committee consists of the Whispering Pines Indian Band, the Kamloops Indian Band and the IIFS.

The Whispering Pines Indian Band will present their annual rodeo at their rodeo site. Included are: Little Britches, team roping, Canadian all-girls, B.C. barrel racers, old timers, heavy horse pull, high school rodeo, open rodeo and Little Chuckwagon races.

The Kamloops Indian Band is involved with the Canada Summer Games archery

event. Archery and rugby will take place on the Kamloops Indian Band land.

The Band will be presenting their annual pow-wow. They are offering

volleyball, slow-pitch, golf and lahal tournaments.

The IIFS is involved in three events. A reception. which takes place on August 8th for Canada Summer Games VIPs, will feature Native foods. Chef Andrew George, Vancouver restaurant owner who recently won an Olympic gold medal in the culinary competition in Paris, France is in charge of preparing the menu.

Traditional Native Games will be played by teams coming from as far away as Ontario and the Yukon. Shinny (hockey), knobby or double ball, earth ball and Native basketball (Bannock ball) will be played. There may even be a demonstration of traditional games from the Yukon team. The traditional games take place on the weekend of August 14th and 15th, when some 2000 athletes, coaches and managers leave, and 2300 more arrive.

A Native Pavilion at Riverside Park will feature cultures from the Yukon, Northwest Territories, B.C. (largest representation) and Ontario. The cultures rotate

once every four days during August 8th to the 21st.

At present, there are plans to station the Native Pavilion in a log home structure and to have teepees as well. There will be static displays, theatre groups, traditional dancers with drum groups, musicians, story-tellers, poetry reading, Native curriculum, business sponsorships, marketing booths, arts and crafts and a taste test booth of traditional foods.

There is still time for entrance of teams for the traditional games, and more

participants for the Native Pavilion.

I will also need financial assistance. The Canada Games Society has given funding to the Native Participation Committee. I have developed a budget for the two IIFS events: i) Traditional Games and ii) the Native Pavilion. The Traditional Native Foods: Reception is being funded by the City of Kamloops. The funding I have received falls short and I am looking for donations.

1. Traditional Native Games

This event will rediscover traditional games that Native people have been playing for centuries. There will be over a dozen teams representing their band or region. The four games are:

- 1) Knobby/Double Ball
- 2) Shinny (Hockey)
- 3) Earth Ball
- 4) Native Basketball (Bannock Ball)

The location of the games will be at Riverside Park and the Rugby field beside the Kamloops Exhibition Association (KXA) on August 14th and 15th.

2. Native Pavilion

There will be four to six cultures represented on a four day rotation until the conclusion of the Games. Cultures represented will come from B.C., Yukon, Alberta, Ontario and the U.S. Performers will be musicians, theatre groups and traditional dancers with drum groups. There will also be static displays, business sponsorship and Native curriculum. There are plans to house the Native Pavilion in a log house structure with two to three teepees outside the Native Pavilion. The Native Pavilion will be located at Riverside Park from August 8th to the 21st.


3. Traditional Native Foods - Reception
