




ONTARIO WOMEN GET GREATER CHOICE IN CHILDBIRTH

TORONTO -- Minister of Health Ruth Grier today announced the locations of three freestanding birthing centres in Ontario.

The ministry will now begin negotiating the funding with The Toronto Birth Centre Inc., St. Jacob's Family Birthing Home Inc. in the Kitchener-Waterloo area and Sudbury Birth Centre. They are three of 12 community groups that responded to the ministry's request for proposals last year.

The government has committed over \$2 million annually for birthing centres in Ontario.

The ministry will also be meeting with a fourth proposer, Nee-Gan O'Chee Community Services Inc. in Fort Albany, to discuss how to meet the special birthing needs of their community.

"Women and health planners alike have been saying that healthy women with low-risk pregnancies don't need to have babies in hospitals. Some women want to have their babies in an environment that treats birth as normal, and not as a condition requiring medical intervention," said Mrs. Grier. "With birthing centres, we are responding to that need."

Birthing centres will have home-like atmospheres. The care they offer is based on the midwifery model, in which the woman is well informed about the process and is able to be a full partner in the birth. Midwives offer care that is safe, and avoid unnecessary technology and interventions.

Midwives are expected to start delivering babies in birthing centres within a year. Negotiations will begin shortly, however, it will be several months before the groups can begin to buy or lease property and renovate existing buildings or put up new ones. Each centre's funding needs will vary depending on, for example, the cost of real estate and the number of women expected to use the centre. Each group presenting a proposal has asked for between \$200,000 and \$700,000 in annual operating costs.

Each proposal was reviewed by the local district health council, a ministry committee and a midwife advisor from outside Canada. The original RFP called for three sites to be licensed.

"I'm proud that women in Ontario will now have greater choice in childbirth," said Mrs. Grier. "They have been asking for years for safe alternatives to having their babies in hospitals."

The Nee-Gan O'Chee proposal meets the special needs of the northern aboriginal population in Fort Albany. The ministry hopes to support the community's efforts to establish community-based birthing services. Currently, many aboriginal women are flown out of their communities to hospitals two to four weeks before their due date, which means they must be away from their families for one month or more.

"We intend to give aboriginal women as equal an opportunity as possible for safe, secure childbirth, with their families around them," said Mrs. Grier.

The ministry will evaluate the birthing centres over the next five years. Birthing centres support the ministry's goals to deliver health care that better meets communities' needs.

Dear Stakeholder:

I want to tell you about an important issue that affects you and your community.

For nearly a decade, Ontario has faced unfair and inequitable treatment from the federal government. The people of the province have received proportionately less federal support for many vital programs and services than the people in other provinces. The impact has been especially hard for the organizations and people who provide and use public services such as job training, immigration services and social assistance.

Ontario made frequent appeals to the former Conservative government to end this discriminatory funding. For years, those appeals were ignored. But there have been indications that the new federal government may have a better understanding of the hardship that has been caused in Ontario.

That is why we are urging Ottawa to restore equity to the funding process, beginning with the 1994-95 budget.

We are asking Ottawa to ensure it allocates money equitably not that it necessarily spend more. No province has a
better understanding of fiscal restraint than Ontario. And no
province has worked harder or more effectively to ensure that
the resources that are available are allotted fairly. We want
that same fair treatment to be put in place by Ottawa.

Equitable funding would allow us to expand out programs that are already in place to promote economic growth and create jobs. The figures prove that Ontario is on the right track with its job creation and infrastructure investment programs. With additional funds, we will be able to do more, and do it faster.


Premier Rae has already written to all 97 Liberal Members of Parliament from Ontario to outline our concerns. I have enclosed, for your information, a copy of his letter and a booklet entitled "Ontarians Expect Fairness from the Federal Government", which describes in more detail Ontario's case for equitable treatment.

I hope you share my belief that Ontario should be treated fairly in the next budget with respect to the fiscal year 1994-95. You may have the opportunity to express your views publicly in the coming weeks, and may even have the occasion to speak to federal parliamentarians on this important matter. I encourage you to do so, because we all have a stake in how the federal government responds to our concerns.

UPDATE ON THE OHF VISIONING PROCESS

In response to financial pressures, changing trends in heritage preservation and promotion, and increased demands for services from across the province, the Ontario Heritage Foundation (OHF) recently completed development of a new vision and set of strategic priorities.

"The new vision and strategic priorities are designed to increase the effectiveness of the OHF as a body that promotes, protects and preserves the many diverse aspects of Ontarjo's heritage, for all the people of this province", says Lesley Lewis, Executive Director, OHF.

The process used to develop the vision and strategic priorities included:

- A survey of more than 100 external heritage professionals and voluntéers from organizations such as The Nature Conservancy of Canada, The Ontario Archaeological Society and The Ontario Historical Society;
- Extensive consultation of OHF Board members and staff, representing all facets of heritage across Ontario;
- A thorough examination of the objectives and mandate of the OHF under the Ontario Heritage Act, as well as numerous reports on the administration and programs of the Foundation:
- A review by the Foundation's Board'committees on their areas of responsibility;
- A one day consultation with more than 50 external OHF clients held by the Foundation's Natural Heritage & Niagara Escarpment Committee, which recognized the integral role partnerships play in natural heritage preservation.

"This approach forced us to ask ourselves some hard questions and to make choices," says Lewis, "but we learned that by working creatively with our partners, at both the community and provincial levels, we can become even more effective."

The Vision and Strategic Priorities were approved by the OHF Board of Directors on December 13, 1993. The Foundation is now focusing on the next steps of the vision

and strategic priorities process — implementation. The vision and strategic priorities have been submitted for approval to the Minister of Culture, Tourism and Recreation, Anne Swarbrick. Once approval has been received, the Ontario Heritage Foundation will be publishing the new vision and strategic priorities for distribution to the public in an upcoming issue of Heritage Matters.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

DOROTHY DUNCAN, CHAIR OF THE OHF BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

The Ontario Heritage
Foundation (OHF), like many
other organizations today, must reexamine its role and responsibilities
and make choices about the wise use of its
resources. The Foundation must, like all other
provincial agencies, reduce its reliance on government funding while identifying new sources of revenue. To address this challenge, the Board of
Directors and staff, in consultation with many interested individuals, organizations and institutions,
developed both a vision and set of strategic priorities that will be our blueprint for the years ahead.

This process was a challenging one and required a considerable commitment from both the Board and staff to accomplish. I want to thank everyone involved in the process, and particularly the Visioning Steering Committee: Chair Brad Archer, former Manager of Organizational Development for the Foundation; Phil Goldsmith, Craig Heron and Anne Redish who represented the Board; and, Richard Moorhouse, lan Kenyon and Barbara McIntosh who represented the staff.

Llook forward to the Vision and Statement of Priorities being implemented to guide the Ontario Heritage Foundation into the 21st century.







Fostering and Customary Care

The traditional way that Native communities have looked after young people is being rediscovered and gradually brought back into use. The cooperative involvement of birth parents and other community members working together will be described. This will start an understanding of how Native communities view the children living away from them.

Inter Cultural Issues and Barriers-

A Native youth asks "Why am I more sensitive than others?" This will be an opportunity for non-Native parents to learn awareness and values to understand the sensitivity of a Native child. It will also describe communication differences and help develop an appreciation and understanding of those differences.

Core Emotional Issues of Adoption -

Many issues have been identified in common among adoptees, adoptive parents, and birth parents. These issues tend to arise in Native as well as non-Native adoptions. Individuals tend to feel alone with these emotions, and this workshop will provide a start to understanding of self and others in the adoption.

Native Crafts -

For mostly young and everyone who feels young, Native crafts such as beadwork and dream catchers. For many these items will be treasured reminders of the start to better self identity and healing the broken family circle.

This is a collaborative effort of Native and non-Native individuals. The planning committee is comprised of adoptees, adoptive parents, former foster children, and professionals This conference is being held at a comfortable and quiet location with accommodation, meals, and snacks provided.

The conference will then begin at 7pm Friday evening with a traditional Native welcome.

Sunday morning will include discussion circles. A closing session will address the question "Where do we go from here?" This is the opportunity to develop a working group to carry forward with the needs of the children. Departure is anticipated at 3:30 pm, following the final plenary and a closing ceremony.

The DISCUSSION CIRCLES

Substance Abuse and Fetal Alcohol Syndrome One of the emphases of the conference will be to deal with substance abuse problems as the relate to a lack of self identity and poor self esteem. This is a crucial circle in that it promotes understanding, prevention, and treatment options. This is a self abuse problem which may be associated with depression and suicidal thoughts.

Traditional Teachings -

In this circle an Elder will introduce important teachings, that will provide adoptees and foster children with a sense of direction and self. Promotion of their Nativeness will help identify heritage and open the door to further healing. Parents too will be given the opportunity to understand their children.

Rights and Benefits -

Rights as guaranteed by the Indian Act will be explained; ranging from education, optical mental, dental, medical health care and band rights. Other topics such as status applications and Bill C-31 will be explained. Referral information to appropriate agencies will be supplied.

orytelling -

For young and not so young alike, traditional stories of First Nations will entertain as well as provide important traditional teachings

Sirth Family: The Larger Circle -

Who am I? Why was I given up for adoption? Where do I come from? Do I have brothers and sisters? How do I find these people? The importance of reconnecting an adopted or foster child with their birth family will be explored. Searching techniques will be discussed and shared.
