You are cordially invited to attend the unveiling ceremonies of the Bi-centennial Mural constructed by the students of Quinte Mohawk School.

The mural is made of fired and glazed clay, in three panels and is our pictorial interpretation of our heritage. To our knowledge, it is the first work of this type ever done by Native students and the largest ceramic mural ever done by any school children. We are proud of our work and would like you to share in our accomplishment.

The ceremonies begin at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, May 25, followed at 3:00 with a performance by the Quinte Mohawk Native Dancers. The school buses will depart at the normal time of 3:30 and following their departure, a reception with refreshments will be held in the school library.

SUMMER DAY CAMP

The summer day camp program will begin on Monday, June 25 at 8 a.m. and will run for 10 weeks, ending August 31. Day Camp hours will be 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., daily (Monday to Friday).

Each child is required to bring a lunch each day, unless other plans are made by the staff. (You will be advised of any such plans.)

Day camp staff will be made up of one adult person (over the age of 24), who will be the supervisor. Also, four senior high school or post-secondary students will be counsellors.

Day camp registration will begin on Monday, May 21. The first twenty-five (25) children between five and twelve years old, will be accepted.

A fee of \$5 per child per week will be charged to help off-set expenses incurred during the program.

Applications are now being accepted for the position of Summer Day Camp Supervisor. Male or female Band Members who are twenty-four (24) years of age or more are welcome to apply.

The applicant should have some skills in working with children, knowledge of arts and crafts, and the ability to set up a daily activity schedule to maintain the interest of the children.

Salary will be \$230 per week, for a period of 10 weeks.

Deadline for all applications will be June 4, 1984 at 4 p.m.

NOTES FROM MOIRA SECONDARY SCHOOL:

A Bi-Centennial Celebration day held at Moira Secondary School on April 11th proved to be a great success. Activities were organized by Mr. G. Boyce and the native studies class that included the sale of corn soup at lunch time, films, native games and participation by Mrs. Hill's Indian Dancers. It appeared that approximately 3/4 of the students at Moira were involved as participants or observers in the activities during the two lunch periods.

The Native Studies Class is also planning a visit to the Cultural Centre in Brantford and a tour of Six Nations Reserve on May 28th, as part of their course.

Earlier this year a group of senior students from Moira travelled to St. Regis Reserve to participate in a Career Fair to gain information about potential careers in the Public Services as well as some private businesses. We will have Lillian Najiwan visit Moira in the fall, perhaps October 84, to discuss with native students opportunities that exist in the public service.

As many of the reserve residents may know, for the past number of years the Anglican Parish has been holding its Sunday School in the Senior Citizens Hall. The Senior Citizens have been most kind in allowing this for such a long time. For the past few years the Parish has been trying to raise monies to build their own Parish Centre. This year a new campaign has been initiated. A committee has been appointed to oversee canvassers who will be visiting your home to explain the needs and requirements of the project. Any donations for this needy cause would be greatly appreciated.

If you own a business or are a contractor or sub-contractor, who could provide a service to the Band, please call the Band Office and leave your name. When jobs become available, we would like to be able to contact local businesses to give them an opportunity.

Please be advised that there will be a Hearing Clinic held at Quinte Mohawk School on May 30, 1984, from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. There will be information available from the Canadian Hearing Society, as well as hearing tests if desired.

FROM HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES

This is a brief outline of what services you have as Band Members and Status Indians.

Pertaining to OHIP, the band will cover those band members who DO NOT have coverage thru their employer. This coverage is only GROUP insurance therefore WILL ONLY COVER standard WARD rates if hospitalization is required. If an employer covers any or all of your OHIP, then you will be required to keep your coverage with the employer, as the band will not cover.

Other services are coverage of glasses, dental and prescriptions as long as there is no over-lapping coverage, such as insurance coverage. All of these services require proper forms which are available at the Band Office. You are entitled to glasses once a year. Health & Welfare Canada will cover \$40 towards the frame and will cover your lenses (whether they be plastic or glass, bi-focal or seamless bi-focal). Any expense over the \$40 on the frames (tinting and optometrist fee) you will have to pay yourself. To obtain this service, you must have a prescription for the glasses and we must see it, before we issue the proper forms. Dental Work will be covered also but the proper forms must be secured from this office. We recommend that you visit only a general practitioner dentist and only see an oral surgeon or specialist when referred by the GP. In some cases, depending on the work to be done, you may have to pay a difference. Drug prescriptions will also be covered, and local Pharmacists have these forms.. If you have any other coverage, such as Blue Cross, we recommend that you utilize that service. If you secure this service and have the proper forms from this office, you must inform your pharmacist of that fact and that you have a band number, and to what band you belong. ONLY prescriptions prescribed by a physician or dentist will be covered. Any over-the-counter drugs or aids will not be considered.

All forms, except the eyeglass forms, once completed, must be sent back to this office for verification. They will then be sent to the proper agencies for payment. The eyeglass form can be sent directly to Health & Welfare Canada in Toronto by the Optometrist. We suggest that you find professionals in the above mentioned areas that might be familiar with these procedures.

Please keep in mind that if any of the mentioned services are pre-paid by yourself without the proper forms, you will probably have to cover the cost yourself as the paying agencies are not in the habit of reimbursing.

I hope this information will answer any questions in these areas. Any further explanation can be had by contacting the Band Office.
