Dear Grand Chief Maracle:

Thank you for your letter about the collection of Ontario's retail sales tax (RST) at international border crossings from residents returning to the province.


 $\ensuremath{\mathtt{I}}$  am happy to inform you that Ontario's policy remains the same regarding Status Indians. They will continue to enjoy the exemptions for goods imported for their own use or consumption on a reserve. As a result, the border collection agreement will have no adverse effect on First Nations.

Upon showing their federal Certificate of Indian Status identification card to the Revenue Canada customs official and declaring that the non-commercial goods are to be used or Status Indians are not required to pay RST on goods brought into Ontario.

Goods entering Ontario destined to Status Indians through the postal or courier stream are not easily identified as exempt. Therefore, Status Indians will be required to pay the RST on goods imported through Canada Post or couriers. Revenue Canada will process a refund of the RST paid upon receipt of a refund application form (Form BZG, Customs Informal Adjustment Request), along with a copy of the Certificate of Indian Status card and a declaration statement that the goods are delivered to an address on a reserve in Ontario, for use or consumption on the reserve.

Dear Lyle:

The Federation of Saskatchewen Indians has filed a court action against the Queen for depriving Native Veterans of post-war benefits that were given to other Canadians.

Grand Chief, Anderson of the Saskatchewan's First Nations Veterans Association has informed me that they wish to hold a conference this summer to address outstanding Veteran's compensation issues. Two Native Veterans from each province and territories will be requested to attend this conference. The Native Veterans Association requires \$250,000.00 to sponsor this conference. Would it be possible for you to raise this matter with you cabinet colleagues and to make inquiries within the federal government senior civil service levels to determine if financial assistance could be provided for this conference?

I am enclosing a copy of the Statement of Claim and a copy of the Assembly of First Nations Resolution #6, which was passed on April 13, 1999.

I am very supportive of this conference, and I am sure that you will agree that this conference is overdue, and that you will be supportive of addressing outstanding issues of the Native Veterans of this country who served Canada with distinction and honour during the war years.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Assembly of First Nations Chiefs in Confederacy support the demand for a National Monument devoted solely to First Nations Veterans.

FURTHER BE IF RESOLVED THAT the Assembly of First Nations Chiefs in Confederacy support and assist First Nations communities and individual in acquiring their lost benefits and

FINALLY BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Assembly of First Nations Chiefs in Confederacy endorse and support the planning and organizing of a National First Nations Veterans Conference in Winnipeg from August 25 – 27, 1999.



#### ADDITIONAL FUNDS TO ADDRESS URGENT HOUSING NEEDS

TORONTO, ONTARIO (March 10, 1999) - Seventy-four First Nations have received additional funding to accelerate housing activities thanks to an additional \$20 million in funding made available by the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) for housing on-reserve across Canada. The additional \$20 million brings to approximately \$200 million the total DIAND investment in on-reserve housing for the current fiscal year

Mt. David Iftody, the Parliamentary Secretary for Indian Affairs and Northern Development Minister Jane Stewart, announced the additional funding at the First Nations' Housing Conference: Building into the 21th Century which was organized by the Assembly of First Nations on March 10-12 in Toronto. The conference focussed on sharing information and learning about new technologies and techniques in the construction sector

"We are pleased to support projects with such potential to deliver important, practical improvements for the residents of these First Nations," said Mr. David Hody, on hehalf of Minister Stewart. "These First Nations have demonstrated their commitment to improving housing in their communities - they have the tools in place and the capacity to do it. Building strong communities, people and economies is key to changing our relationship with Aboriginal people and is one of the themes of Gathering Strength -- Cunada's Abortginal Action Plan."

Housing is one of the most critical issues facing First Nations and the Government of Canada. The objective of the On-Reserve Housing Policy, announced by the Government of Canada in July 1996, is to increase local control and accountability, improve program flexibility and encourage more non-government resources to achieve immediate and sustainable improvements to on-reserve housing conditions. Under this policy, First Nations may coordinate housing, job training and social assistance-based programs in community-based housing projects.

The Innovative Housing Fund, announced earlier this year, allows First Nations to develop innovative housing ideas such as new house building techniques and alternative house designs and energy sources to accommodate the diverse housing needs within their communities. DIAND developed the *Innovative Housing Fund* in collaboration with First Nations organizations including the Assembly of First Nations.

While significant progress has been made, overcrowding still exists in many First Nations communities. These additional funds will allow the construction of new houses and help to reduce the number of multiple families living in a single residence. A portion of the funds will also be used to repair or renovate existing houses, thus enabling the First Nations to meet their goal of bringing all houses up to normal adequacy standards. In addition, improved housing and ocio-economic conditions on-reserve may contribute to addressing urban homelessness among First Nations people.

## Press Release - April 1999

The enforcement of traffic rules and regulations is just one of many ways the Tyendinaga Police promote Traffic Safety. Enforcement places the onus on Police to assist people to understand these principles and their importance in regard to safety. Therefore Traffic Education is essential when maintaining a high level of safety for the Citizens of Tyendinaga Territory.

Council is now in the process of reviewing a new approach to Traffic Safety on the Tyendinaga Territory. The Driver Safety Course will be administered by the Tyendinaga Police to violators found committing certain traffic offences on Tyendinaga roadways. This approach is designed to formally correct poor driving habits without costing demerit points or a severe fine. A driver will only be eligible to take the Driver Safety Course once per year and again this will only be available if the driver has not been involved in a collision and the offence is in the category listed.

- A) DRIVER SAFETY COURSE NOTICE shall not be given for the following offences:
  - involving motor vehicle collisions
  - involving class L, Gi, G2, Ml or M2 drivers
  - of Carcless Driving
  - of exceeding the Speed Limit by 20 Km/h or more
  - involving a School Bus
  - equipment on commercial vehicles

 involving drivers licenses or permits

#### **DESIGN**

This is a voluntary program that is a formal extension of the warning system now in use by our officers engaged in traffic enforcement duties on the Territory. The added "fee for service" driver education feature is designed to assist drivers in understanding the principles and realities of failing to adhere to rules of the road.

Under the existing process an offender may receive a warning or be issued an offence notice. The offender receiving an offence notice may select one of three options;

- pay the fine,
- attend a Justice of the Peace office and give an explanation to their guilty plea.
- or set a court date for a trial.
- under the proposed process a fourth option would be available to the driver as follows;

Officers would issue a DRIVER SAFETY COURSE Information sheet with an explanation of this option and the listed \$55.00 fee.

Driver Safety Course (D.S.C.)

Under the Driver Safety Course (D.S.C.) program, offenders are

given the option to attend OUR course and educate themselves as a means to correcting poor driving habits. After attending the Tyendinaga Police Office (within 5 days of receiving their D.S.C. Notice) and completing the course (usually 30-40 minutes in length), they leave more aware of the consequences of poor driving habits and without receiving a Provincial Offence Notice or any dement points on their

There are many forms of abuse present within our community that work against its harmony and wellness. We have all heard of alcohol and drug abuse, sexual abuse, domestic abuse physical mental, emotional and spiritual. There is another form of abuse and we call it " lateral violence."

Gossiping family feud religious fights extreme competitiveness

Lateral violence plays a role in our community by disrupting community welfness and resiliency Our Elders say if we speak badly of someone it diminishes our Spirit. Gossip is a very negative form of Lateral violence and may emotionally hurt the person it is directed at. It is this negativity which spreads to our Spirit and builds barriers between people in our community. Spread rumours and gossiping may seem harmless but in actuality is a very real form of abuse. It creates feelings of low self-worth, fear, humiliation and shame. When we listen to gossip we are perpetuating the spreading of it, if we choose not to listen then it ends it.


There is a saying "If you have nothing nice to say about person, then don't say anything at ail." Be

respectful of others and their privacy. Support the people in your community by saying positive words rather than hurtful. As Haudenosauriee we know the importance of unity in our Nation and the strength we receive from that unity. Accept the diversity of others and respect their choices and our Nation will become stronger. If we choose to listen to gossip or spread it, then we diminish the Spirit of our community and Nation

"The Five Rites are for the express purpose of restoring health and youthful vitality to the body. Other factors help determine whether you will dramatically transform your physical appearance, as I have done. Two of these are mental attitude and desire.

"You've noticed that some people look old at forty, while others look young at sixty. Mental attitude is what makes the difference. If you are able to see yourself as young, in spite of your age, others will see you that way too. Once I began practicing the rites, I made an effort to erase from my mind the image of myself as a feeble old man. Instead, I fixed in my mind the image of myself when I was in the prime of life. And I put energy in the form of very strong desire behind that image. The result is what you see now.

"For many people this would be a difficult feat hecause they find it impossible to change the way they see themselves. They believe the body is programmed to sooner or later become old and feeble, and nothing will shake them from that view. In spite of this, once they begin to practice the Five Rites, they will begin to feel younger and more energetic. This will help them to change the way they see themselves. Little by little, they will begin to see themselves as younger. And before long, others will be commenting that they have a younger appearance.

"There is one other extremely important factor for those who want to look dramatically younger. There is an additional rite which I've intentionally been holding back on. But Rite Number Six is a subject which I'll save for a later time."

"Of course," he added, "you must practice the rites every day in order to achieve real benefits. You may skip one day a week, but never more than that. And if you allow a business trip or some other commitment to interrupt this daily routine, your overall progress will suf-

"Fortunately, most people who begin the Five Rites find it not only easy, but also enjoyable and rewarding to perform them every day, especially when they begin to see the benefits. After all, it takes only twenty minutes or so to do all five. And a physically fit person can perform the rites in ten minutes or less. If you have trouble finding even that much spare time, then just get up a few minutes earlier in the morning or go to bed a little later at night.

Sadie's Walk was successful with a total of 60 people participating in the walk. The ages represented ranged from seven months to seventy plus years



They portrayed Earl in a way in which I actually saw him: a man who was dedicated to his people and worked tirelessly on their behalf, even to the point of endangering his health. Earl was depicted as a man who was never vendictive nor did he sing his own praises but yet accomplished much in his twenty years as Chief of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

#### Needs Assessment Results from The Aboriginal Head Start Developmental Project - April 1999

#### Dear Community Members:

As many of you are aware the Aboriginal Head Start Developmental Project hosted a Needs Assessment by telephone survey. This survey consisted of contact with parents/guardians of children 0-6 years of age. During this survey we attempted to reach as many participants as possible. Unfortunately we were mable to contact everyone that we planned to. We would like to extend a big thank-you to all of those who participated in the telephone survey. We realize that the survey was lengthy, but this had to be done in order to cover the six components of the Aboriginal Head Start Program. We could not print all of the survey results here, due to its length, but if anyone is interested in seeing the complete survey results, please call Tracey Gazley or Tina McDonald at the Health Centre at 967-3603. A special thank-you goes out to those who used their evenings and weekends to make the telephone contacts and/or home Visits.

The purpose in doing the survey was to establish the following:

- Demographics (population statistics)
- Types of services that are presently being used under each of the 6 components (Culture & Language, Health Promotion, Nutrition, Education, Social Support Services and Parental & Family Involvement)
- · The participants awareness of available services.
- What services and programs the participants feel should be made available to benefit our Children/Community.
- What types of advertisement people are aware Of and/or using.

- Special skills/talents of participants which may enhance Children's programming.
- Ways in which participants are willing to assist with Children's programming.
