### NOTICE PROCEDURE FOR CONTACTING PIERCE ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

Residents can call (613) 966-4483 leave your name and phone number so that they can contact you.

They are available **24** hours for emergencies. An emergency would be a dog that is injured and the owner is unknown, a dog that is harassing livestock, a dog endangering the public or an animal suspected of having rabies. If a resident would like to log a complaint or inform them of a dog running at large they can do so by calling Monday to Friday between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

They are not available to pick up strays running at large on weekends or statutory holidays. All animals that are picked up are taken to the Quinte **Humane** Society and their hours are 12:00 noon to 5:00 p.m. Monday to Saturday and 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Sunday. The Quinte Humane Society is also closed on statutory holidays.

The Quinte Humane Society is located on Avonlough Road which is at the west end of Belleville off of Dundas St. west (Hwy #2). Their number is (613) 968-4673.

It would be best if your pet has been picked up that you call ahead to the Humane Society to confirm the cost involved in redeeming your pet.

### Attention Community Members

#### Purchase of burial plots

Please be advised that the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Administration Office is now allocating cemetery plots for Band owned property-Christ Church Grounds-Columbarium, All Saints Church and Native New Life.

The fee for a single plot is \$150.00 and \$300.00 for a double. We are also encouraging people to purchase corner markers to ensure their final resting place. These corner markers can be purchased through Campbell's Monuments or Lons Memorials in Belleville. We do ask that you call Twila Brant at 396-3424 to ensure the proper placement of your markers.

There are some burial sites on the territory that are not clearly identified or have no identification. A site visit may be very important to complete our records so if you have any information on a previous interment of a relative/friend please feel free to contact Twila Brant at the Administration Office 396-3424.

### To All Interested Parties

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Council are in the process of creating a Cemetery Committee to assist with the planning and upkeep of the perpetual care. The development of this committee will provide a fair and consistent form of allocation of plots and record keeping for our cemeteries. The committee shall be comprised of six people. We will be accepting applications for a Chairperson and Secretary/Treasurer. Resource people such as the Director of Housing, Parks and Band Property Maintenance and funeral directors may form part of the Committee but will not be counted as voting members. The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Band Council will select a representative and the Cemeteries portfolio will be designated to that councilor. The Chief is an ex-officio member of the every Committee. The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Lands and Estates Manager shall be an appointed member. The congregations from Christ Church, Native New Life and All Saints shall each appoint a member. The balance of the membership (2) will be selected from community applications.

### EXPIRY DATE ON STATUS CARDS

Our First Nation members have been inquiring why there is an "expiry date" on our status cards. I e-mailed Indian Affairs to inquire about the expiry dates.

Here is their answer:

Our INAC policy is that the cards need to be renewed every 3 years for children under 18 yrs of age (because their appearances change quite a bit while growing up). For the adults the cards need to be renewed every 5 years as they also change, but not as quickly. These expiry dates are also implemented as they will be keeping in line with other government issued type of documents/cards such as health cards, drivers licenses, passports, etc. Plus once the new card comes into effect (we do not know when yet) these dates will be automatically system generated on the cards. This will help to ensure for INAC and First Nations that there are less fraudulent cards in circulation. My only advice would be to alert the First Nation members to renew their cards before the expiry date, so that they will not experience difficulties when travelling/shopping.

Thank you for voicing your concerns and I will certainly let our headquarters people know the dilemma the expiry date puts on First Nation members

### TYENDINAGA MOHAWK COUNCIL MINUTES MARCH 16, 2005

A meeting of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council was held on Wednesday March 16 2005 at 9:00 a.m. in the Council Chambers

Present Chief R. Donald Maracle  
Councillors Willard A. Hill, Blaine Loft, Roy C. Maracle and Velma Hill-Dracup arrived at 10:24 a.m. due to a previous commitment  
Staff Angela Maracle, A/CAO

Chief R. Donald Maracle opened the meeting with a prayer in Mohawk

Council gave Bill an informal commitment for \$2,500.00, as per the Donation Policy in the new fiscal year.

Bill inquired as to if Council would waive the rental fees for the Community Centre for the February 13, 2005 fundraising dance, as attendance was low.

Bill reported that the far east gate, nearest the Orange Lodge, needs repairs so that there is no access to the fairgrounds - revenues lost on admission.







### TRUSTEE'S REPORT April 2005

April has been a month of looking at possible personnel changes at HPEDSB to fill positions relating to retirements and strengthening programs and schools. The usual business of operating a school board continues to be ongoing. On the local front, the tuition agreement that is signed by DIA and HPEDSB expires the end of August 2005 and is up for renewal. This tuition agreement sets out the terms and conditions under which our students from Tyendinaga will continue their education in the provincial system in secondary school. We have put together a subcommittee composed of education staff and TEC members to review the existing tuition agreement with the purpose of evaluating how it has served our needs. We will add or change any of the terms and conditions which we feel will better meet our current and future needs.

Since we are not a third party signatory to this tuition agreement, it will be important for us to work closely with the HPEDSB senior administration and have them support any changes that we put forward to be included in the new tuition agreement. This process will insure our students continue to get the best education possible.

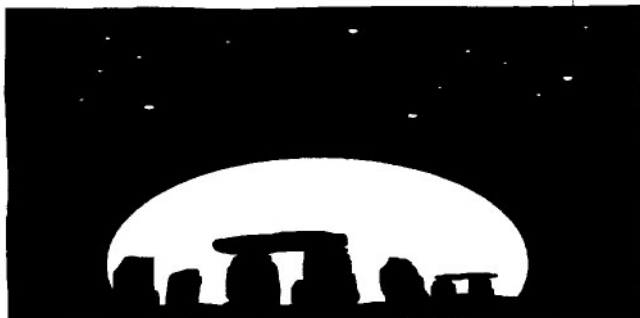

### What is Bullying?

Bullying is a conscious, willful, deliberate, hostile **and** repeated behaviour by one or more people, which is intended to harm others. Bullying takes many forms, and can include many different behaviours, such as:

- Physical violence and attacks
- Verbal taunts, name-calling and put-downs
- Threats **and** intimidation
- Extortion or stealing of money and possessions
- Exclusion from the peer group

Bullying is the assertion of power through aggression. Its forms change with age: school playground bullying, sexual harassment, gang attacks, date violence, assault, marital violence, child abuse, workplace harassment and elder abuse. "Bullying is not about anger. It is not a conflict to be resolved it's about contempt—a powerful feeling of dislike toward someone considered to be worthless, inferior or undeserving of respect. Contempt comes with three apparent psychological advantages that allow kids to harm others without feeling empathy, compassion or shame. These are: a sense of entitlement, that they have the right to hurt or control others, an intolerance towards difference, and a freedom to exclude, bar, isolate and segregate **others**."

### **Bullying Myths and Facts:**

**Myth:** "Bullying is just a stage, a normal part of life, I went through it my kids will too."

**Fact:** Bullying is not "normal" or socially acceptable behaviour. We give bullies power by our acceptance of this behaviour.

**Myth:** "If I tell someone, it will just make it worse."

**Fact:** Research shows that bullying will stop when adults in authority and peers get involved.

**Myth:** "Just stand up for yourself and hit them back"

**Fact:** While there are, some times when people can be forced to defend themselves, hitting back usually makes the bullying worse and increases the risk for serious physical harm.

**Myth:** "Bullying is a school problem, the teachers should handle it"

**Fact:** Bullying is a broader social problem that often happens outside of schools, on the street, at shopping centers, the local pool, and summer camp and in the adult workplace."

**Myth:** "People are born bullies"

**Fact:** Bullying is a learned behaviour and behaviours can be changed.

### **Bullying is a Community Issue!**

Bullying is not a "school" or a "kids" problem per se. It is a broader, community **and** societal problem. Bullying does happen to youth in the playground, the hallways, the classroom and on the school bus, but is also happens at home, the local pool, hockey rink, summer camp, to adults in the workplace to seniors citizens.

If you or someone you know is being bullied, it is important to tell someone. You can talk to your parents, teacher, coach, police officer or call

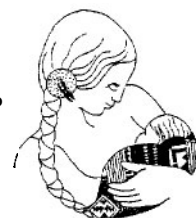

How Mothers Came To Be

### WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT WEST NILE

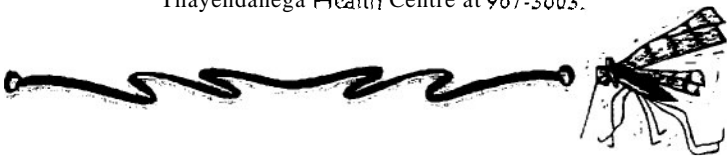
Mosquito season is here and we should make sure we know what steps we should take to protect ourselves, and prepare our homes and cottages.

**PROTECT YOURSELF:** Cover up. Wear light colours, long sleeves and long pants. Tuck pants into socks for Extra protection. Consider mosquito netting if your in a heavy mosquito area. Use bug repellent containing DEET and read directions carefully, especially for applications to children.

**KNOW THE SYMPTOMS:** It takes 3 - 15 days for symptoms to appear after being bitten by an infected mosquito. However, four out of five people show no symptoms. For most, the symptoms are mild but for a few people, the reaction is pronounced. In rare cases, the virus causes severe, life threatening illness such as encephalitis.

**WHEN TO SEEK HELP** If you have any of the following symptoms, seek medical help: fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, confusion, severe headache, sudden sensitivity to light, and if you experience extreme swelling or infection at the site of the mosquito bite.

#### FNTI Aviation flight instructors graduate from customized program

Tyendingaga Mohawk Territory, Ontario- Six First Nations Technical Institute teachers who are also flight instructors graduated in April from a two-year Facilitator of Adult Learning program.

The program, offered by Loyalist College in Belleville, Ont., was adapted by lead instructor Diane Hill of FNTI's **Human Services** program and Professor Mark Gallupe of Loyalist to fit an Aboriginal learning model and include cultural philosophies and practices.

Six adult educators worked together since the summer of 2002 setting up the unique program. Five of them, including Hill, are Native people who are enrolled in doctoral studies at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education at the University of Toronto.

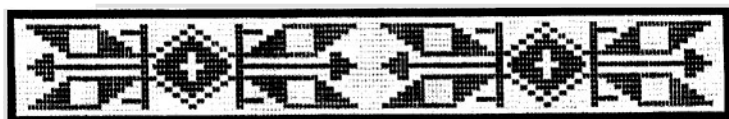
"I'm excited about their added credentials," Hill said at the graduation ceremony at FNTI's Aviation building on Tyendingaga Mohawk Territory, east of Belleville. "This will open up other opportunities for them."

The graduating flight instructors are Aaron Quin from Shawanaga First Nation, Ted Teepell of Chapleau Cree FN, Jo-anne Tabobandung, and Randy Maracle, both of Tyendingaga First Nation, Greg Luke of Mattagami FN and Sandra Marion of Beausoleil FN. Lisa Maracle, of Tyendingaga, a former teacher of academics in FNTI's Aviation program, also graduated.

The graduates teach and fly in FNTI'S Aviation program, Canada's only diploma aviation program for Aboriginal people. All flight training staff are Aboriginal people and are Aviation graduates themselves.

FNTI, which is celebrating its 20<sup>th</sup> year, is one of the oldest and largest Aboriginal post-secondary institutions in Canada and has delivered career focused post-secondary education to more than 2,000 graduates since 1985. About 650 learners are currently enrolled in FNTI programs. FNTI is non-profit and is owned by the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

### POSTCARDS FROM THE VISION QUEST

#### Tell those untold stories, let the healin' start

I just finished an interesting book yesterday.

It's a rather new one, called "Never Let Me Go" written by Kazuo Ishiguro. Yes, the most difficult part about the book is the author's name. It reminded me of the fact we each bring so much to the table when we take on the work of someone else.

Truly, though, haven't you caught yourself singing along to a song on the radio and, somehow, feel as though you could've written it (if you were a songwriter)? I find much the same experience with literature. It's that connection one person can have with another across the miles and the business of writing/reading that teachers, for some reason, can't teach.

In "Never Let Me Go" a woman of about 30 years old recounts her life and her experience of self-discovery. If you've read any of the reviews, you know what the secret is, the secret that unfolds slowly as the book progresses. As one who'd – in that sense – known all about the secret before picking up the book, I found it strange I could still have a valuable experience reading it myself. (It's not like I knew the butler did it, or anything like that; it's not a surprise secret, just a gentle unfolding that, I suspect, makes the read a little more satisfying if you don't know it).

Knowing what I knew about the 'arc' of the story allowed me to see the experience – to some extent – from the perspective of the protagonist. In that sense, then, it came across a lot more like an innocent retelling of information that allowed me to connect dots I'd already strung out before me.

Hindsight allows us that luxury and offers us that chance at clarity.

I found I could see the details a lot more clearly when the ending was spelled out so well beforehand. And the details matter a lot.

I started writing small capsule-comment style book reviews for a weekly newspaper about a month ago and it has forced me to read one book **per** week. Honestly, that's something I truly didn't believe I could do. In the past, I'd sit down with a new book, and seven or so years later, I'd pick it up and wondered what made me stop at page 30 or so.

For me, it seems, one of the details of my life that keeps me sane is creating a string of self-imposed deadlines. I've made my way through six books these past six weeks – only because I told myself I had to. When there's no two ways about it, you just do what you have to do.

Another of those books I read is a detailed account of the business of Wal-Mart. Over the past few months I've become a huge fan of the store. It seems nearly everyone I know refuses to shop there, disagreeing with the store's motto of lowest-price-at-all-costs. They read stories of children in third world countries working 25 hour days at 2 cents/hour so that we can save a dollar on the price of a t-shirt (that'll fall apart after two washings).

I've learned that many of America's largest companies – those that make laundry detergent, or sundry items like cereal and crackers – have all moved either satellite offices or their home office to the tiny town of Bentonville, Arkansas, to take advantage of the proximity to Wal-Mart's head office, to let themselves be directly influenced by the mega-store's buying power or face losing that make-it-or-break-it account.

For many companies, losing the business of Wal-Mart would close their entire operation. No question. Routinely, the retailer demands the lowest price and, as has been documented, the supplier must do whatever it takes to make sure they can offer their product at that price.

This is where my friends come in. They hear stories like that and refuse to shop Wal-Mart at all, because they believe someone's being screwed somewhere along the line. Perhaps someone is.

It makes me think of the sacrifices we all have to make in order to get through the day. In the present tense, I mean.

I stand back for a moment and – like the protagonist of "Never

My mom's birthday is in May and – an injustice in this case – so is Mother's Day. Every now and then I get lost in thought – like when I'm daydreaming as I drive home from work – and catch myself wondering if Mom knows how much an influence she has been on my life.

It seems funny now: when I moved away, she made sure to remind me (frequently) where my home is. Funny, because there's nothing I know to be more true than that.

It seems shocking now: to trace the sacrifices my parents made to keep me in piano lessons (don't even ask) or my brother's hockey, when it was clear they couldn't afford to support either.

It seems eerie now: to look beyond my lifetime and comprehend all that she's experienced in her life.

It seems crazy now: to think my life has been uniquely difficult, for whatever reason.

It seems magical now: to know some people don't have to talk big or look strong in order to be just that.

It seems logical now: that she'd downplay it, if I (or you) were to bring it **up** today.

It seems impossible now: that I'd ever be able to offer as much thanks as is needed.

In this world, it's strange that we search for someone to look up to when – if we just look back to our life's very first hero – we'll find her all over again.



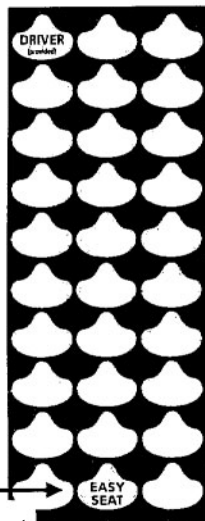

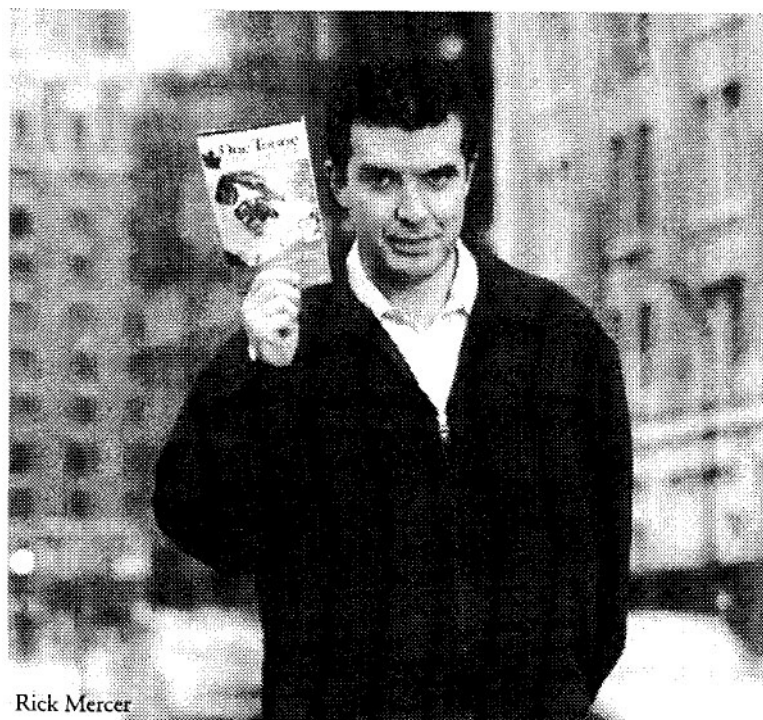

#### #1- Plastic and Metal Containers

Please deposit these items in the blue totes.

##### Metal Food and Beverage Cans

Empty cans and lightly rinse. Place metal lids from cans (and glass jars) inside the can and pinch the top to trap the lid inside. Please do not place pop cans inside of food cans. DO NOT include metal pots, butter wrappers or scrap metal

&



##### Rigid and Foam Plastic Containers

Empty and lightly rinse your containers. Discard the lids. All plastics with the numbers 1 to 6 on the bottom are OK. Include plastic containers for soft drinks, detergent, bleach, juice, shampoo, yogurt, ice cream, Styrofoam coffee cups, trays and packaging. DO NOT include drink boxes, medicine bottles, toys, parts, or blister/bubble pack.

&

##### Empty Aerosol and Paint Cans and Aluminum Trays & Foil

Please make sure that aerosol cans and paint tins are empty and dry (remove the lids from empty paint cans and let them dry out before recycling). Aluminum trays and foil such as pie plates, fast food trays and clean aluminum foil. DO NOT include propane tanks, any paint cans that have product in them or if larger than 1 gallon or, any hazardous product.

#### #2 Clear Glass & Coloured Glass

Please separate your clear and coloured glass and deposit it in the steel drums at the depot.

##### Clear and Coloured Glass Bottles and Jars

Separate your clear glass from your coloured glass. There are Blue Boxes for each type at the depot. You can recycle the metal caps with your Metal Cans. DO NOT include anything that is not a glass beverage or food bottle or jar. NO ceramics, dishes, cups, window glass, light bulbs, mirrors, Pyrex, drinking glasses or special coated liquor bottles.

#### #3 Mixed Household Paper

Please deposit all household and office paper in the blue totes.



##### Mixed Household Paper

This includes junk mail, paper bags, egg cartons, paper tubes, sugar and flour bags, rinsed milk or juice cartons, cereal, detergent and snack boxes, books, computer paper, Newspapers, Magazines, Telephone Books and other paper items. Please remove any food or liners and flatten hoses. DO NOT include soiled hoses, serviettes, Kleenex or paper towels

#### #4 Film Plastic

Please deposit empty bags in the blue totes.

##### Plastic Bags, Pallet wrap or Film Plastic

Fill a plastic bag with plastic grocery bag, rinsed milk and vegetable bags, bread newspaper, parts and dry cleaning bags. Outer film wrap from toilet paper, cases of POP and produce are OK too. DO NOT include dirty or soiled material, chip/snack bags, meat or cheese wrap, saran wrap, candy wrap, vinyl or rubber products. Please remove any food, crumbs or paper receipts. Tie your full bag shut and place it inside the depot container.

#### #5 Old Corrugated Cardboard

Please break down your cardboard boxes and place inside large cardboard boxes.

##### Cardboard Boxes

This is the type of box or case used for shipping packing larger items such as furniture, appliances and computers. The boxes have three layers with a wavy section in the middle. Please flatten your cardboard boxes down and place in the large Gaylord boxes in the corner. DO NOT include coated or waxed boxes or dirty pizza boxes.

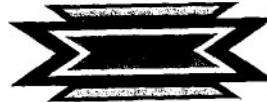
