Due to recent circumstance with Canada Post, the Newsletter for the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory will be delivered by Private Courier.

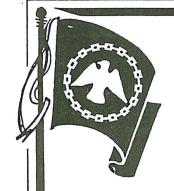
Costs for processing our Newsletter have increased through Canada Post Mailing system and it is now the least inexpensive manner for delivering the newsletter.

NOTICE TO COMMUNITY MEMBERS

A concern has been brought to the attention of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council regarding the number of dogs that are running loose on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

Attached is a Dog <u>Policy</u> which Community members are being asked to review and respond.

At the present time, Yarrow Animal Control of Trenton, (613) 392-7045, picks up dogs on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory. It is recommended dogs be tied up or caged for easy pick-up, otherwise there will be an added charge if the dog needs to be tracked down and caught. Cats are also an added cost and these costs may be applied to Community members who place the call.

Yarrow Animal Control does call the Police Office and Administration Office for confirmation of their work and presence.

DOG POLICY

Passed in Council February 20, 1990 - Motion #2

1. PURPOSE

The following is a policy to regulate the control of dogs within the boundaries of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Community.

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council hereby enacts this policy as of February 20, 1990.

2. DEFINITIONS

"Dog" means any male or female dog.

"Owner" means any person who possesses or harbours a dog.

"Animal Control Officer" means the organization or person who has entered into a contract with the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council to control dogs on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

"Council" means the elected officials of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

"Running at Large" means that a dog is found elsewhere other than the property of the owner and not under the control of a competent and responsible person.

3. REGULATIONS

Every owner of a dog shall register the dog(s) with the Tyendinaga Administration Office during or before the Annual Rabies Clinic occurs.

The Tyendinaga Administration Office will issue a dog tag and record the serial number of the tag, the address and telephone number of the owner, description of the dog, name of the dog and any special marks or features of the dog.

In order to cover administration costs, the fee to obtain a dog tag is \$2.00 (two dollars).

It is the responsibility of the owner to ensure the dog tag is worn by the dog at all times.

It is the responsibility of the owner to inform the Tyendinaga Administration Office should any information concerning the dog or the owner change.

Owners of Kennels registered with the Canadian Kennel Club Incorporated shall ensure that the Tyendinaga Administration Office is either informed of the dogs tatoo number or that they obtain a dog tag for all the dogs.

Owners shall not allow the dog to run at large within the boundaries of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Community.

Dogs reported to be running at large shall be retrieved by the Animal Control Officer. In order to obtain their dog, owners must contact the Tyendinaga Administration Office for the information on the Animal Control Officer.

Dogs with tags under the control of the Animal Control Officer shall be kept for three (3) days. If owner fails to claim the dog within the three (3) days, the dog shall be disposed of in the most humane manner by the Animal Control Officer. Owners are responsible for all fees, damages and costs caused by the dog. No damages or compensation can be received by the owner from the disposal of the animal, if the owner attempts to retrieve the animal after the three (3) day limit.

Dogs without tags shall be disposed of in the most humane manner by the Animal Control Officer after one (1) day.

Dogs taken outside of the owners property must be on a leash or under the absolute control of the owner.

Owners should be aware that these regulations apply to the Tyendinaga Mohawk Community only. Dogs found outside the Community are subject to the external laws.

The National Chief Ovide Mercredi is having a meeting on May 27 & 28, 1995, in Ottawa to prepare for a Round Table Meeting with Honourable Paul Martin and the Honourable David Anderson.

Marilyn Buffalo from National Office is coordinating some special events to coincide with the meetings. One of the events is an Art and Craft auction on the Sunday evening. She is requesting donations from First Nations across the country and that these items be mailed to the National office prior to the conference.

I am sure that any donation will be greatly appreciated.



The Highway Traffic Act Section 62 Subsection 16 was amended in 1994, it allowed volunteer firefighters to use a flashing green light when responding to fires or other emergencies.

This green light is used in personal vehicles because all volunteers do not respond in fire apparatus. The Mohawk Fire Department has purchased these lights for use in the community by our fire fighters.

The flashing green light does not give these vehicles any more driving privileges than anyone else, but indicates the vehicle is a volunteer responding to an emergency. So out of courtesy, drivers using the roadways should pull over and let them by as you would a police vehicle, fire truck, or any other emergency vehicle.

The Mohawk Fire Department responded to 43 emergencies in 1994. The responses included people trapped in vehicles, vehicle fires, grass fires, house fires and medical emergencies including one infant. Thankfully there was no loss of life.

Mohawk Firefighters are highly trained to rescue people in fire, water, ice and vehicles, however if they cannot reach their equipment and arrive on a scene quickly a persons chance for survival diminishes quickly. Seconds count! Please give the fire fighters right of way, possibly the next emergency could affect your property or family member.

NOTICE OF THE FIRST SITTING OF THE INTERNATIONAL **FIRST NATION** COURT OF JUSTICE

- TO:

All First Nations and PTOs

FROM:

THE CHIEFS OF ONTARIO

Please be advised that pursuant to Resolution 95/23, an interim International First Nation Court of Justice will be instituted in the last week of June (June 19-23, 1995) to deal with the taxation issue.

The objectives of the Court will be:

- to assert the right of First Nations to implement their own justice system;
- to educate the public on First Nations' tax immunity;
- to require the federal government to publicly defend the taxation of First Nations;
- to create a precedent for the establishment of a long-term International Court of Justice; and
- to create a just and fair process which is credible and which will produce a fair

The question to be answered by the Court will be broad and will deal with the issue of taxation:

When and how did the federal government believe it acquired the power to tax First Nations?

By phrasing the question in this manner, the decision of the Court will be one which specifically rejects the taxation of First Nations and which will place the federal government in the position of having to publicly defend its actions in light of the evidence presented to the public during the

Some Further Points

- The federal government will be duly notified of the action so that it can send a representative to argue on its behalf. However, in the event that the government fails to respond, a Friend of the Court will be appointed to argue on its behalf.
- The Court will sit in Ottawa.
- a concentrated media campaign will be organized to publicize the event. Any and all First Nations media (radio stations, television programs and newspapers) will be notified as soon as possible. Non-Aboriginal media will also be contacted.
- substantial funding will be required to complete the project. To that end, each First Nation and PTO will be asked to contribute anywhere from \$500 to \$1,000.
- a protocol agreement in support of this initiative will be created for all First Nations to consider and possibly sign. This will ensure that the process will be credible and well substantiated.

Several months has passed since the project started and particularly since our visit in Tyendinaga. This letter is an update of the activities of the project to the people of Tyendinaga, and special mention of what we plan to do with the information that we have gathered.

When we first started the evaluation at Quinte Mohawk school last fall, 141 parents out of 199 (70.9%) consented to their children's participation by signing and returning the consent form. The response rate in the community of Kahnawake was 87.1 percent. The slightly lower rate of participation of children in Tyendinaga was probably due to less advertising done in the community, since no intervention had been planned. All team members were really please to see such a high participation rate overall.

From the questionnaires that the students filled out, we received really interesting comments from parents and children:

« Great Idea! Interested to hear the results. ».

« It was good for us to take a look at how we eat over a week and how we play. We need more physical activity and could change a little in our eating habits »

Some parents were concerned because of the timing of the questionnaire (shortly after Halloween). A few parents brought up to our attention an important factor:

« It was not a normal week. My daughter consumed more pop, chips, chocolate bars than she normally would ».

Some parents demonstrated interest in the intervention project:

« Shouldn't Tyendinaga have the same prevention program or does it have to work in another community first? Diabetes is a problem here too. »

Also, some of the older students wrote a few things.

- « I liked the running and walking and I would like you to come back sometime ».
- « Yes I think this is a good thing you are doing. It helps people from eating junk food and helps to exercise a lot more ».

Late in December, data from the evaluation project were entered in the computer at our office. We are just starting to analyze this information that we have gathered from the two communities last fall. An Activity Report had to be written on the activities that were held from July to January. That report was completed in February.

Since September the Intervention team here in Kahnawake has used the local newspaper and the radio station on a regular basis, to inform the people in the community of Kahnawake on activities being organized to promote healthy eating habits and daily physical activities. We are now preparing our own newsletters for the project. The newsletter will focuses on health topics and suggestions for healthy lifestyles family activities. We will also use it to inform parents of upcoming community events relevant to the project. It will be sent home with children of the two elementary schools in Kahnawake. Also, we have organized a series of workshops, presentations, and display booths in the schools, hospital, and in the community to promote healthy eating habits and regular physical activity.

During the first part of the project, we kept close contact with people in charge of a similar project in Akwesasne so that we could possibly learn from one another.

We also did interviews with teachers in the schools to find out what they know and what they think about the project. We are presently conducting similar interviews with parents of children who participated in the evaluation.

We are writing reports on the different aspects of the evaluation, such as the analysis of the data that was collected in both communities. We expect to present some of the results at the Third International Conference on Diabetes and Indigenous Peoples in Winnipeg at the end of May. Prior to the Winnipeg conference, presentations will be given first to the Committee Advisory Board members (on April 19) in Kahnawake and then to the community of Kahnawake (May). We are interested in obtaining feedback from the Kahnawake people before exposing the results outside the community.

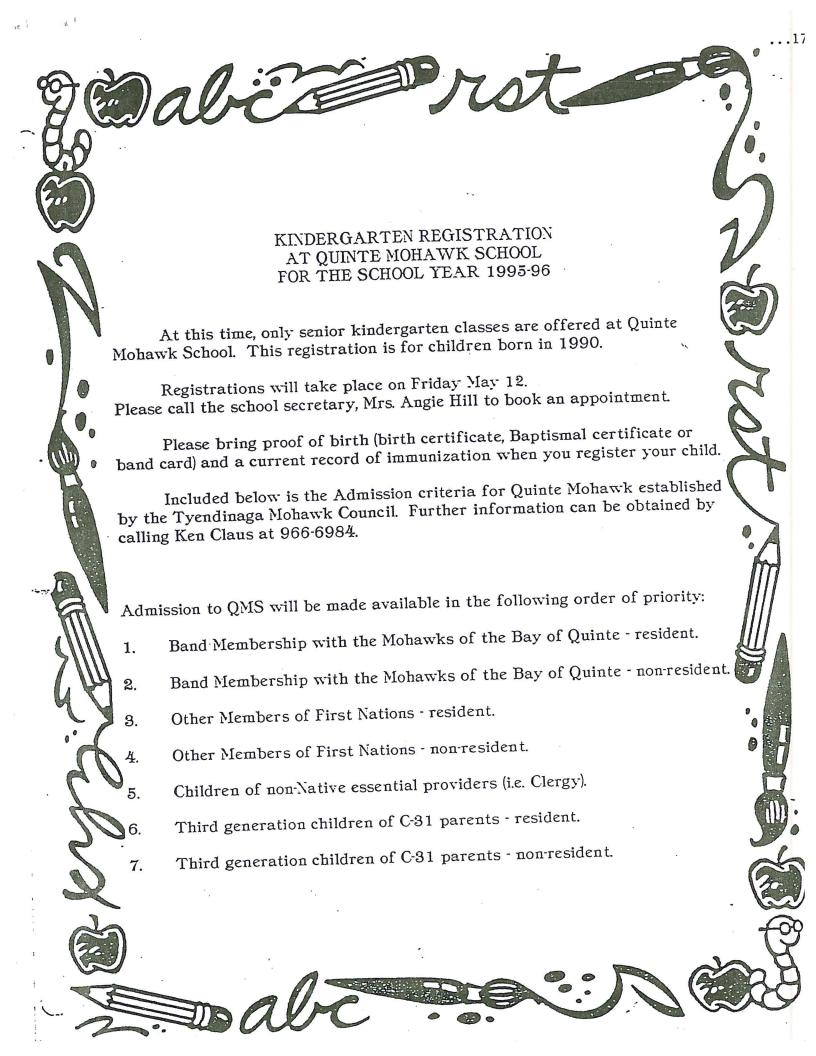
Our reports will show results from both the intervention and the evaluation. The evaluation part will present some of the characteristics of the children who participated in the evaluation and the results from the run and walk test as well as the body mass index by age and gender (body measurements that we have gathered). No data from the community of Tyendinaga will be presented at this time. Nest fall, we hope to be able to present in your community the results of the information that we gathered in October 1994.

This is where we are now in the project. There are still many activities going on at the same time. In the future, we hope to continue to inform you of our progress.

We thank all of you who have participated in the evaluation last fall and hope to have your continuing support. We want to thank the Chief and the Band members for authorizing our project in Tyendinaga. We also want to especially thank all the teachers, staff, and administrators from Quinte Mohawk school for showing much support during our visit. We realize that the evaluation process was sometimes disruptive and that they had to make compromises in order to accommodate the different activities of the evaluation. We hope to continue to have the support of personnel at Quinte Mohawk school for the well-being of the children, so that they may benefit from this project.

At this time the CHR's will be distributing packages of wild flower seeds, so don't forget to ask for yours. There will be an attendent to help with your needs. Suggestions on site preparation, planting, and caring for the seedling will be available in pamphlet form. Be sure to drop around the Community Centre on Monday, MAY 15 1995 from 9 am to 4:30 pm to get your trees and wildflower seeds.

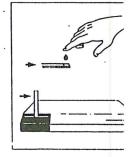

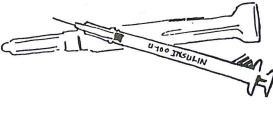

For your information, here's a few pearls of wisdom from the book "YOU COUNT...CALORIES DON'T", available at Ka:nhiote Library.

Exercise regularly at your own level, at an activity you enjoy. (This is a novel idea!)

Active living refers to enjoying physical activity and learning how to integrate into your daily life.

If you think it is difficult to take time for an activity in terms of a half hour off from your daily routine, keep in mind that you'll get back that time and more in terms of your increased efficiency and energy level which will allow you to accomplish more in less time.

During physical activity, the release of endorphins acts as a pain killer and tranquilizer making you feel more relaxed. Eating and laughter can also release this chemical. Changing your attitude and your lifestyle by adopting a more lighthearted approach can make you happier and healthier. The same temporary "high" that you get from eating can be transferred to a more sustained "high" from physical activity.

"New attitude in fitness", focus on the process of enjoyment, not the end result.

RABIES



RACCOON RABIES -- THE FACTS

What is raccoon rabies?

It is a strain spread mainly by raccoons, and is carried in the animal's saliva. Humans and other animals can become infected through a cut or scratch from an animal with rabies, or if the rabies virus comes in contact with the moist tissues of the mouth, nose or eyes.

At present, raccoon rabies is not found in Ontario.

Although Ontario raccoons are occasionally infected with rabies, it is with the arctic fox strain. This type of rabies has been present in Ontario since the 1950's.

About 2,000 rabid animals are confirmed in Southern Ontario each year. On average, fewer than 20 of them are raccoons. To date, no raccoon in Ontario has ever been detected as having raccoon strain of rabies.

Where is raccoon rabies and why we should care about it?

Raccoon rabies was first noted in Florida in the 1940's. It has been travelling slowly northward toward Ontario since then. In early 1995, the nearest case of raccoon rabies was reported about 10 kilometres from the NewYork/Ontario border. It could reach or cross the border during 1995.

Ontario has a large population, especially in urban areas. That is why it is important for Ontarians living in urban areas to understand raccoon rabies and how to protect themselves and their families against the disease.

Is raccoon rabies different from other strains of rabies?

No. Raccoon rabies kills, raccoons other animals and humans in the same way as other strains of rabies do. The only difference is that it is spread primarily by raccoons.

What can people do to prevent exposure to raccoon rabies?

People can protect themselves and their pets from raccoon rabies in the same way they protect themselves from other strains. You should vaccinate your pets, avoid stray or wild animals, and call your doctor if you think you may have been in contact with a rabid animal.

What treatment is available against rabies?

All people who are knowingly exposed to rabies must be treated immediately. This treatment usually consists of a series of five injections given over a one-month period. The treatment is safe and effective. No human death has been directly linked to raccoon rabies. The last reported death in Ontario from any strain of rabies was in 1967.

PROTECTING YOUR FAMILY AND PETS

- Have your pets vaccinated according to instructions from your veterinarian.
- Warn your children to stay away from wild or stray animals
- Raccoon-proof your home. You may want to contact a professional for advice, or raccoon-proof your home yourelf.
 - Take measures to discourage wild animals from taking up residence in your home or on your property. For example, cover up potential entrances, such as uncapped chimneys, loose shingles and openings in attics, roofs and eaves.
 - Do not attempt to trap raccoons which are causing damage to your property. Instead, contact a professional animal control officer to remove nuisance raccoons.
 - Do not trap and transport nuisance raccoons to a new location. You could help spread the disease.
 - Do not keep wildlife, including raccoons, as pets. It is against the law.
 - Report any animals behaving strangely to your local animal control office.
 - Do not touch sick or dead animals.
- If you think any member of your family has been in contact with a rabid animal, immediately call your doctor or go to your local emergency care centre.

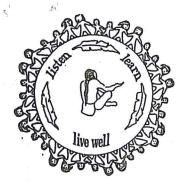

- 1. True—Asthma is a common disease among children and adults in Canada, and it is increasing. Over 1,200,000 people have asthma, of whom about 400,000 are under 18 years of age.
- 2. False—Asthma is not an emotional or psychological disease, although strong emotions can sometimes make asthma worse. People with asthma have sensitive lungs that react to certain things, causing the airways to constrict, swell, fill with mucus and become inflammed. The person then has trouble breathing and may cough and wheeze.
- 3. False—The way parents raise their children does not cause asthma. It is not caused by a poor parent-child relationship or by being overprotective.
- 4. False—Asthma episodes can be very harmful. People can get very sick and need hospitalization. Some people have died from asthma episodes. Frequent asthma episodes, even if they are mild, may cause people to stop being active and living normal lives.
- 5. False—Before a person has any wheezing or shortness of breath there are usually symptoms, such as a cough, a scratchy throat, or tightness in the chest. Most patients learn to recognize these early symptoms and can take medicine to prevent a serious episode. However, at times an asthma episode may come on quite quickly.
- 6. True—Each person with asthma has an individual set of stimuli or "triggers" for his/her asthma attacks. Recognized triggers include pollen from trees, grasses, molds, house dust, changes in weather, strong odours, cigarette smoke and occasionally food. In most asthmatics an infection or stress will aggravate their asthma. Each patient should get familiar with his/her set of triggers and avoid as many of these triggers as possible.
- 7. True—There is no cure yet for asthma. However, asthma patients can control it to a large degree by:
 - Getting advice from a doctor who treats asthma patients
 - Learning to notice early signs of asthma episodes and to start treatment
 - Avoiding things that cause asthma episodes
 - Taking medicine just as the doctor says
 - Knowing when to get medical help with a severe episode.

- 8. True—Several types of medicines are available to control asthma. Some people with mild asthma need to take medication only when they have symptoms. But most people need to take medicine every day to prevent symptoms and also to take medicine when symptoms do occur. A doctor needs to decide the best type of medicine for each patient and how often it should be taken. Asthma patients and their doctors need to work together to manage the disease.
- 9. False—Some doctors encourage people with asthma to monitor how well their lungs are functioning with a peak flow meter. The doctor should determine its usefulness for each individual and if appropriate, provide instruction in its proper usage. This small device can be used at home, work, or school. The peak flow meter may show that the asthma is getting worse before the usual symptoms appear. Daily exercise is a good habit as it allows that asthmatic patient to compare his/her exercise ability on a daily basis. Inability to perform exercise with the same degree of lung capacity would suggest that asthma is becoming more active and should lead to a change in the pattern of use of asthma therapy.
- 10. True—Both children and adults can have asthma. Sometimes, but not always, symptoms will go away as children get older. However, many children continue to have asthma symptoms throughout adulthood. In some patients symptoms of asthma may not develop or may not be recognized until the person reaches an adult age.
- 11. True—Smoke from cigarettes, cigars, and pipes can bring on an asthma attack. Indoor smoky air from fireplaces and outdoor smog can make asthma worse. Smoke can also "set off" other triggers. Smokers should be asked not to smoke near someone with asthma. Moving to another room may help, but smoke travels from room to room. No smoking is best for everyone!
- 12. False—Exercise is good for most people, with or without asthma. When asthma is under good control, people with asthma are able to play most sports. For people whose asthma is brought on by exercise, medicines can be taken before exercising to help avoid an episode. A number of Olympic medalists have asthma. Regular exercise allows persons with asthma to make a daily assessment of their lung capacity.

The Katarokwi Native Friendship Centre of Kingston is hosting its Third Annual Traditional Pow-Wow on the weekend of June 3rd and 4th, 1995 at Lake Ontario Park in Kingston.

This will be an opportunity to celebrate, share and renew the culture and traditions of Aboriginal people. The sacredness of the life relationship between mankind and the land are commemorated through the drum and the songs that are sung at the Pow-Wow. These traditional songs have been given to those few who have been chosen by the spirits of the land to be the bearers of these songs of the people. The sound of the drum and these songs mean many different things. To the people, it is the unification with the spirits and the sacredness of the land that has always been a part of Aboriginal people; and the regaining of the spiritual strength to hold Aboriginal people together and maintain the heart beat of the First Nations.

Everyone is welcome to participate and enjoy traditional singing, drumming, dancing, feasting and sharing. This is a wonderful opportunity for both Natives and non-Natives to come together for lots of fun in sharing Native culture, traditions and values. Native people in full traditional dress will dance. Arts and erafts will be on display and traditional foods will be available during the weekend.

The Pow-Wow will open with the traditional Grand Entry. Grand Entry is a ceremonial procession of the Elders, Flag Carriers, Staff Carriers, and Dancers.
