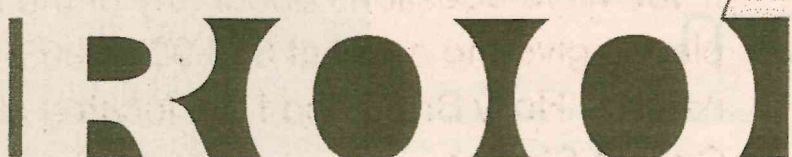

Rental Opportunity for Ontario Families (ROOF) is Ontario's new \$185 million housing allowance program.

A "housing allowance" is a financial supplement given directly to a tenant to help pay the rent.



Rental Opportunity for Ontario Families

HOW MUCH IS THE ROOF HOUSING ALLOWANCE?

Under ROOF, eligible families will receive \$100 per month, starting in January 2008.

AM I ELIGIBLE FOR ASSISTANCE UNDER ROOF?

You may be eligible for the program if you:

- ☐ Work and have an earned income of at least \$5,000 and an Adjusted Family Net Income below \$20,000.
 - Adjusted Family Net Income is the total adjusted net income of the applicant, plus the adjusted net income of any spouse or common-law partner.
 - Adjusted net income is the amount from line 236 from your 2006 income tax return, minus your Universal Child Care Benefit.
- ☐ Have one or more dependant children under the age of 18.
- ☐ Are paying more than 30% of income towards rent.
- ☐ Have less than \$10,000 in liquid assets (e.g., cash, bank account, bonds or stocks).
- ☐ Are not receiving social assistance or any other rent subsidy.
- ☐ Are a resident of Ontario and meet program requirements for status in Canada.

HOW LONG DOES THE PROGRAM RUN?

ROOF is a five-year program. Eligible families will receive the housing allowance assistance for up to five years, starting in January 2008.

HOW CAN I GET ADDITIONAL INFORMATION?

- ☐ You may sign up to receive an application or contact us for more information at www.Ontario.ca/ROOF, or by calling 1-888-544-5101 (TTY: 1-800-263-7776). Applications will be sent in late summer 2007.
- ☐ Applications will also be available at participating social service agencies in late summer 2007.
- ☐ First payments will be made to qualified applicants in January 2008.
- ☐ ROOF funding will provide assistance to approximately 27,000 families.

Helpful Water Hints

(TO HELP MAINTAIN POTABLE WATER)

FAQ: Bacteria such as e.coli and total coliform can grow inside your screened taps. To prevent bacteria growth, soak your aerators in javex and remove all debris from the inside of the screen.

FAQ: Water storage tanks/cisterns can become contaminated. You should have your water tested to ensure its safety. Instructions can be provided to help you clean your tanks/cisterns if required.

FAQ: Used or soiled dish clothes can contain bacteria. You should never wrap a used dish cloth around your tap or have it near the aerator. This can cause the bacteria to spread into your tap.

FAQ: Animals that have access to drink the water directly from the taps can also cause bacteria growth in a faucet. Never allow an animal to drink directly from taps or sinks.

FAQ: If you are reusing drinking water containers, disinfection is essential. Bacteria could potentially build up if containers are not cleaned frequently with pure javex.

FAQ: Water coolers should also be cleaned with javex at least twice a year to prevent bacteria growth. Instructions can be mailed to you if requested.

ONTARIO TRILLIUM FOUNDATION 2007 GREAT GRANTS AWARD WINNERS: QUINTE, KINGSTON, RIDEAU

Kingston, October 22, 2007 – Six remarkable Ontario not-for-profit organizations will be honoured for the difference they have made in their communities at the Ontario Trillium Foundation's 25th Anniversary celebration in Kingston, October 22, 2007. The evening will be hosted by Hugh O'Neill, Vice-Chair, Board of Directors, Ontario Trillium Foundation.

"The Great Grants Awards recognize the vision, commitment and energy of Ontario's volunteers and community organizations," said John McDougall, Grant Review Team Chair for Quinte, Kingston, Rideau. "This is our 25th year of strengthening communities and we're celebrating by holding 16 award events across the province. We look forward to meeting community members in the Quinte, Kingston, Rideau Region who help make Ontario a great place to live."

The Foundation presents the Great Grants Awards every two years. The award winners were selected by volunteers who serve on the local Grant Review Team. In Quinte, Kingston, Rideau, six organizations were chosen for their outstanding achievements in the Arts and Culture, Sports and Recreation, Environment and Human and Social Services sectors.

2007 Great Grants Award Winners: Quinte, Kingston, Rideau

- **Arts and Culture:** Tsi Kionhnheht ne Onkwawenna Language Circle (Mohawk Language Circle): In 2006, OTF granted \$39,000 to the group to establish a summer Mohawk language day-camp for children and continue with evening language courses for adults. The organization has been instrumental in strengthening the identity and wellness of its people.
- **Sports and Recreation:** Centre Hastings Skatepark Committee c/o Community Futures Development Corporation of North & Central Hastings and South Algonquin. With help from the Foundation, kids in the village of Madoc can "ollie off the kicker" at the Madoc Skatepark. In 2005, the Madoc Skatepark Committee, a six member collaborative led by the Community Futures Development Corporation of North and Central Hastings and South Algonquin, received \$75,000 to develop a skate park.
- **Environment:** Greater Bobs and Crows Lake Association In 2004, OTF provided \$71,500 over two years to help the association formulate a plan to preserve and enhance the environment around the Greater Bobs and Crow Lakes.
- **Human and Social Services:** Lanark Transportation Association In 2006, Ontario Trillium Foundation granted the Lanark Transportation Association \$35,000 over six months to buy a van that provided accessible transportation for eligible residents of Lanark County and Smith Falls. Because of its success, the Association may now be the site for a provincial pilot program. Thanks to LTA, people needing transportation in Lanark County now have a ticket to ride.
- **Grant Review Team Chair's Award - for exemplary volunteerism:** Rural Volunteer Capacity Development Initiative c/o Country Roads Community Health Centre: In 2006, OTF awarded the Centre \$140,000 over 36 months to increase its volunteer sector through a variety of strategies. In partnership with the North Lanark Community Centre, the Centre is identifying needs and developing a framework to support and train new volunteers in rural communities.
- **25th Anniversary Award - for remaining a leader in the not-for profit or charitable sector by consistently delivering on the Foundation's granting priorities:** Youth Diversion Program Serving Frontenac County. In 2006, OTF granted the organization \$47,200 for CARE, a pilot project to support victims of youth crime and to promote community awareness and education.

MEETING MINUTES

IROQUOIS CAUCUS

UP-DATE – BORDER CROSSING WORKGROUP
OCTOBER 16th, 2007

The Elected Councils of the seven Iroquois communities of Kanehsatá:ke, Kahnawá:ke, Akwesásne, Six Nations of the Grand River, Oneida of the Thames, Tyendinaga and Wahta have been meeting as an Iroquois Caucus for the past three years. They have joined together to develop harmonious relations, mutual respect and sharing. The Elected Councils of the Iroquois Caucus signed a Declaration of Principles at the Annual Border Crossing Celebration in Niagara Falls on July 21st, 2007.

We have agreed to promote and protect the Iroquois languages, culture and autonomy, while respecting and recognizing the unique responsibilities, authority and jurisdiction inherent within each respective community.

One of the important issues that the Iroquois Caucus is jointly working on is the production of Identification Cards that can be used for crossing the U.S./Canada border. In this regard, the Iroquois Caucus has formed a Border Crossing Working Group with representatives from each community.

As of January 23rd, 2007, a Canadian or American Passport is required if you are flying from Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean and Bermuda into the United States. The only other documentation that will be accepted is: US Permanent Resident Card, asylee or refugee document, Merchant Mariner's Document or NEXUS Air Card. You do not need a Passport if you are flying from point to point within the United States (example – from Buffalo to Florida).

As early as the summer of 2008, all persons traveling into the U.S. from Canada, Mexico, Central and South America, the Caribbean and Bermuda by LAND OR SEA, may be required to present a Passport or other documents as determined by the Department of Homeland Security. While recent legislative changes permit a later deadline, the Department of State and Homeland Security are working to meet all requirements as soon as possible. Ample advance notice will be provided to enable the public to obtain Passports or Passport Cards for land and sea entries.

The Iroquois Caucus Border Crossing Working Group is working on a date in October to meet with the Department of Homeland Security to present an ID Card for our members, which will be acceptable for crossing the border. The Iroquois Caucus has identified a card manufacturer who will be making the presentation of the card to the Department of Homeland Security.

The Iroquois Caucus Working Group has already met with Canadian Government officials and has relayed our concerns to them. They have informed us that they have set up a Task Force, headed by the Minister of Public Security, Stockwell Day, which is hearing all concerns and forwarding them to the U.S. Government. The Working Group will be seeking a further meeting with the Task Force.

The Iroquois Caucus Working Group had hoped to work with the Haudenosaunee Documentation Committee that has been established for the same purpose. To date, this has not happened and both Working Groups are doing their own work. This does not mean, however, that at some point in the future, we could not join forces to jointly work on one ID Card.

The Department of Indian Affairs is also working on a revised Certificate of Indian Status Card, which they hope will meet the border requirements. There are other groups who are also working on ID Cards. (For example: The assembly of First Nations, the Province of Ontario – Ontario Drivers Licenses).

The U.S. Government issued their Proposed Rule, with respect to Land and Sea crossings in June 2007. The Iroquois Caucus has presented their input on the Proposed Rule. Submissions can be found on the following website: www.regulations.gov

The Iroquois Caucus Border Crossing Working Group will continue to work on this important issue over the next months with the hope of having a satisfactory conclusion prior to January 1st, 2008.

AND WHEREAS, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have aboriginal and treaty rights, and other rights and freedoms that are recognized and affirmed in the Constitution of Canada, which include the inherent right of self-determination and jurisdiction over their lands, peoples and territory;
AND WHEREAS, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council is the community government within the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory and has inherent jurisdiction to make laws, regulations and policies to meet the needs and concerns of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte;
AND WHEREAS, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council intends to preserve the cultural, political and economic integrity of the Mohawk territory and community of Tyendinaga;
AND WHEREAS, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council is striving to create an environment conducive to the establishment of economic development within the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory;

I will continue to update parents and the community as we proceed.

On November 26th to 28th I will be attending the Circle of Light Conference in Toronto. The focus of the conference is First Nation, Metis and Inuit Education --Achieving Excellence for all Students. The conference is sponsored jointly by INAC and the Ontario Ministry of Education and is intended to feature two days of plenary sessions, workshops and keynote speakers. Participants will learn about practical tools, strategies and best practices to help educators support the success of Aboriginal students in Ontario.

The conference is open to educators, education stakeholders and representatives from First Nation, Metis and Inuit communities and organizations. Also attending from HPEDSB will be Kathy Soule (Director HPEDSB) and at least two other Trustees. I look forward to attending and will include a brief overview of the conference in next months newsletter.

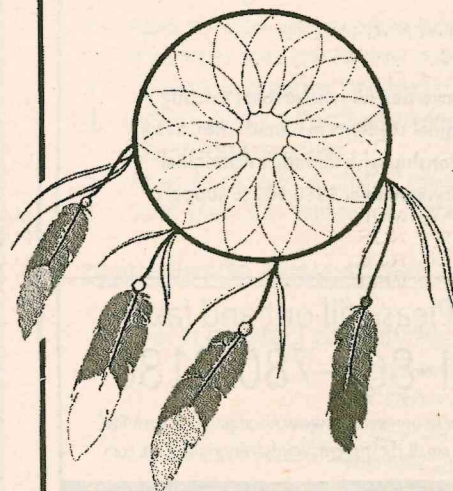

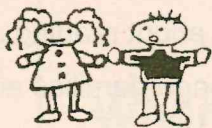

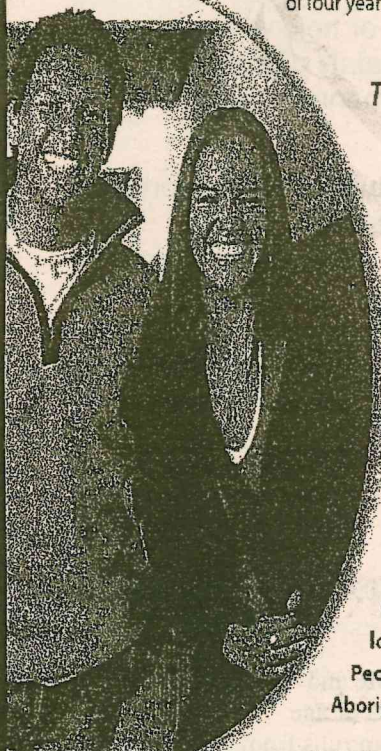

NOVEMBER IS WOMAN ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH

The Ontario Government has marked the month of November as *Woman Abuse Prevention Month*. In 1986, November was marked Wife Assault Prevention Month, which was changed to its current name in 2005. The intention of this campaign is to raise awareness about violence against women and its prevention.

Woman abuse can be defined as "...any threat, act or physical force that is used to create fear, control or intimidate you."

How Can I Help End Violence Against Women?

Taken from Step It Up Ontario, here are 10 steps to help end violence against women:

1. Understand that violence against women is a equality rights issue.
2. Recognize that male power is upheld by rape and sexual harassment.
3. Stop racism/oppression; make Ontario accessible.
4. End poverty – NOW!
5. Create & maintain housing, non-profit childcare, training – NOW!
6. Provide fair access to justice for all women.
7. Hold violent men accountable for their actions.
8. Stop criminalizing & blaming women.
9. Demand secure funding for women's organizations.
10. Listen to survivors & women's advocates – they are the experts!

- Feel like you are careful about what you say or do in order to avoid upsetting or angering your partner?
- Become frightened of your partners temper?
- Feel that you have to stop seeing family or friends, or give up activities you enjoy because your partner doesn't like them?
- Refrain from telling your partner your worries and feelings about the relationship
- Fulfill your partners demands because you are afraid to say "no" or are afraid of hurting their feelings?
- Have the urge to "rescue" your partner when he or she is anxious or uneasy?
- Feel that you are the only one who can help your partner and that you should try to help him or her "change"?

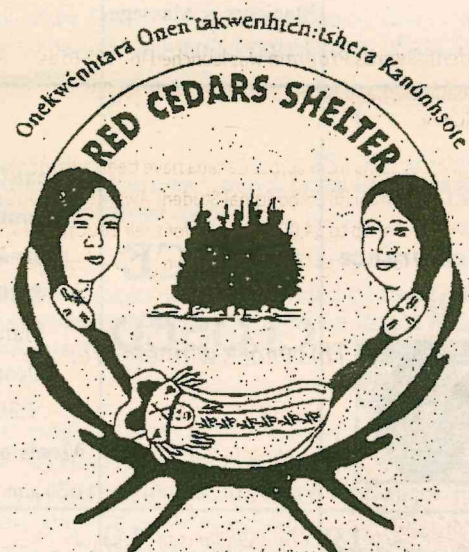

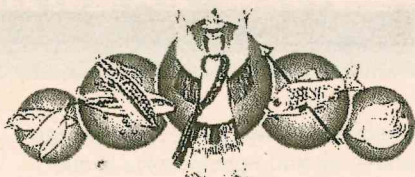



Diabetes Clinic

People of Aboriginal decent are **3 to 5** times more likely than the general population to have or develop **DIABETES**. The majority of diabetes cases found in Aboriginal population are **Type 2 diabetes**.

The reason is a change in lifestyle over time, we are not as physically active and eat less healthy food.

Type 2 diabetes is when your body does not make enough insulin to use the sugar from food as energy, or when the insulin your body makes doesn't do its job (Insulin Resistance). **DIABETES** is very serious to your health and lasts your whole life. Seeing your healthcare provider regularly and getting tested are important first steps to finding out more about the disease and whether you have it.

Other risk factors

- Over 40 years old.
- Overweight.
- High blood pressure and/or high cholesterol.
- Have a parent, brother or sister with diabetes.
- Had a baby weighing over 4 kg. (9 lb.) or had diabetes while pregnant (gestational diabetes).

Warning Signs of Diabetes

- Thirst a lot;
- Having to "pee" more than usual
- Gaining or losing weight for no reason;
- Tired and sleeping more for no reason;
- Blurred vision;
- Getting infections often or ones that don't go away;
- Cuts and bruises that are slow to heal;
- Problems getting and keeping an erection; and
- Tingling and numbness in the hands and feet.

Why take a chance? If you have any of these warning signs, see your healthcare provider and get tested for diabetes.

ATV Safety

ATV RIDERS CODE:

- Know operators manual
- Check the ATV before riding
- Wear helmet
- Protect eyes and body
- Get qualified training
- Ride with others - never alone
- Ride within skills
- Don't carry passengers
- Respect riding area rules
- Keep noise levels low
- Ride straight - no alcohol or drugs
- Preserve the environment
- Be courteous to other vehicles
- Lend ATV to skilled riders only
- Always supervise youngsters
- Have fun and be safe

Farm use of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) has increased dramatically in the last few years. ATVs were originally designed for recreation. However, the mobility of ATVs and recent development of racks, PTOs, and drawbars, make them a useful tool on the farm. Though equipped for work, ATVs do not lose their recreational appeal.

Most ATV users, whether riding for work or pleasure, have little or no formal riding training and tend to think of ATVs as toys. On the contrary, ATVs are "rider active" vehicles, which means riders must master basic riding skills in order to ride them safely. When given the proper respect, ATVs can be a valuable work tool and provide considerable entertainment. Misuse however, can lead to serious injury or even death.

Safety

To insure safety, a rider should take several precautions before attempting to ride an ATV. First, read the owner's manual and become familiar with the ATV. Second, make a pre-ride inspection of the machine. Third, wear proper clothing and safety gear. Know basic safety rules and riding skills. Practice riding skills in an open area free of obstructions.

Pre-Ride Inspection

A pre-ride inspection insures that everything on the machine is adjusted and working properly to prevent a breakdown or even an accident. In a pre-ride inspection check tires and wheels, controls, lights and switches, oil and fuel, chain or drive shaft, and chassis. A general pre-ride checklist is provided in this publication, but riders should refer to the owner's manual for a more detailed checklist for their machine. ATVs should always be equipped with a complete tool kit supplied by the manufacturer.

Helmets and Eye Protection

Safety gear is a must for the ATV rider; the most important piece of safety equipment is the helmet. A rider should always wear a helmet that meets or exceeds safety standards. Purchase a helmet that is approved and marked by either the Department of Transportation (DOT), the American National Standards Institute, or the Snell Memorial Foundation. A helmet should fit snugly and always be securely fastened.

Riders should wear safety goggles to protect eyes whenever a helmet is not equipped with an appropriate face shield. Sunglasses are not safety goggles and do not provide adequate eye protection.

Clothing

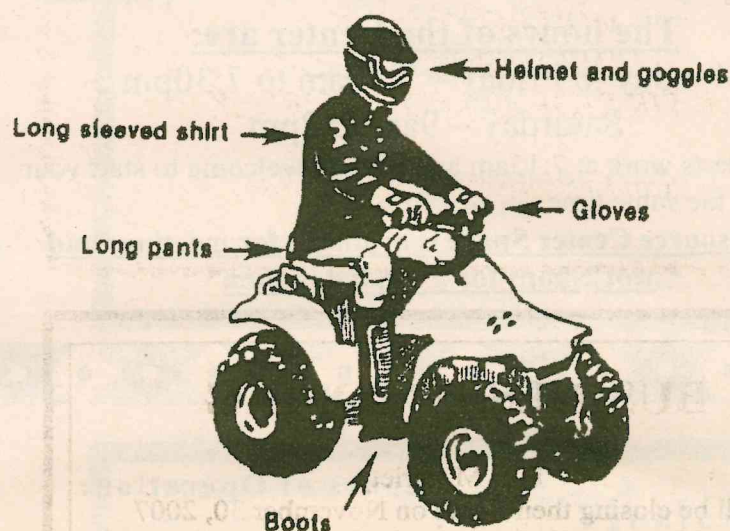


Figure 1. A well equipped ATV rider.

A well-equipped ATV rider always wears proper clothing, including gloves, boots, long pants, and a long sleeved shirt (Figure 1). Gloves prevent fatigue from vibration, scratches from brush, and protection from cold weather. Off-road type gloves, which have padding over the knuckles, offer the most protection.

Boots that rise above the ankles offer the most protection and support for ATV riders. Boots should have heels to prevent your feet from slipping off the footrests. Cowboy boots are better than tennis shoes, but lace-up work boots or motorcycle racing boots are the best footwear.

Long pants and long sleeved shirts prevent scratches from brush. Serious riders should wear off-road racing gear that has padded areas at the knees, elbows, and shoulders.

Basic Safety Rules

Once a rider has completed a pre-ride inspection and selected proper safety gear and clothing, there are some basic safety rules he or she should know and follow. These include keeping your feet on the footrests, riding single, and riding off-road only. Footrests are located just in front of the rear tires and putting a foot on the ground while riding could easily result in running over a foot or even pulling the rider from the machine. Because an ATV does not turn in the same manner as a motorcycle, a rider does not need to put a foot down while turning.
