A MESSAGE FROM THE TYENDINAGA MOHAWK COUNCIL REGARDING THE STATUS OF THE WATER QUALITY AT QUINTE MOHAWK SCHOOL

The following information is presented to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte membership to address community concerns regarding water quality at Quinte Mohawk School. The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte respective staff have been working diligently on this issue and will continue to work toward addressing this issue in a responsible manner.

As reported to the community on October 9, 2008, there are community concerns regarding water quality at QMS. An inspection of the water system was conducted by the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte on February 5, 2008. Based on this inspection, on February 7, 2008, Health Canada advised the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council that, due to the fact that the water treatment system was old and did not meet the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act (which was enacted following the Walkerton affair), a precautionary boil water advisory was recommended for the school. (The original water treatment system was installed in the 1970s when the school was originally built.) The water at the school has been regularly tested since the late 1980s for bacterial contamination. The water continues to test safe from bacterial contamination, and the boil water advisory was a PRECAUTIONARY MEASURE ONLY because of the age and debilitated nature of the treatment system.

The same day that the precautionary boil advisory was issued by Health Canada on February 7, 2008, the band commissioned an environmental consultant for a request for proposal on a full analysis and review of the school's water treatment system. As a precautionary measure, the drinking water fountains were covered up and bottled water was provided to the school on February 8, 2008. A letter was also immediately sent home to parents by school officials to explain that this was a precautionary measure only.

There is a fear that bottled water is not safe to drink due to recent media hype surrounding reusable water bottles made of polycarbonate that contain a chemical called Bisphenol A. Preliminary research has indicated that there may be a public health risk that BPA can be released when boiled water is put in the polycarbonate plastic water bottles. According to information provided by Health Canada, polycarbonate plastic water bottles usually contain the number 7 on their recycling symbol, and some have a "PC" stamp as well. Health Canada is studying the issue further from a public health perspective and recently announced on October 17, 2008 that it will take measures to ban the import and sale of polycarbonate plastic water bottles while further research is being conducted. The bottled water bottles provided at Quinte Mohawk School do not contain the number 7 on the bottom of the bottle. (For more information on Bisphenol A you can call the toll-free Government of Canada inquiry line at 1-866-891-4542.)

XCG Consultants submitted a proposal to review the water situation at the school on February 8, 2008, and this report was immediately submitted to Indian and Northern Affairs for consideration. The band also submitted a funding request to Indian and Northern Affairs to conduct the environmental consultant review. INAC confirmed commitment of \$12,680 to cover the cost of the environmental consultant review. The work was

commissioned and completed in May 2008. A review of the band's environmental consultant's work was conducted by INAC in July 2008 which recommended further considerations. During the months of August and September, the band continued to exchange correspondence with INAC's technical and environmental representatives as well as the band's environmental engineer.

During the month of October the band hosted two meetings with INAC officials, QMS officials, Health Canada, and the environmental engineer. As a result of the diligence and persistence of the band, the work to address the water issues at QMS is now underway. There are also greater plans for a community water and treatment plant that are in the final stages of design modifications. Once the design is finalized, the project will be submitted to Indian and Northern Affairs for approval.

To improve sewer services at the school a \$1.6-million sewage treatment system was installed over the past year to replace the antiquated sewage treatment system.

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council will report the progress of this work once completed. In the meantime any questions or concerns regarding water issues at Quinte Mohawk School can be directed to the Mohawk Administration Office, 613-396-3424, ext. 134.

INFORMATION FOR MBQ HOUSEHOLDS

CONNECTED TO THE SEWER SYS-TEM

Human waste and grey water collected by the sanitary sewer system is discharged to the Deseronto Wastewater Treatment Plant. This is a typical plant, designed to remove pollutants and pathogens before discharging to the Bay of Quinte.

Sanitary sewers are designed to collect biodegradable wastes only. Biodegradable means microscopic organisms break down and consume the waste material. A toxic waste could upset the operation of the Deseronto Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP), preventing the adequate cleaning of the wastewater before it is discharged to the Bay of Quinte, which is the receiving body of water.

Examples of household hazardous wastes that should not be discharged to the sanitary sewer systems include:

- paint / stain
- paint thinners
- varsol
- oil
- gasoline
- any other liquid waste products that are labeled with a poisonous or flammable symbol.

If the WWTP receives toxic waste, it may kill off the organisms that break down the incoming sewage. Such a discharge is considered serious since the WWTP cannot effectively treat incoming sewage and therefore will be out of compliance with environmental regulations and the receiving body of water could be adversely affected.

It should also be noted that residents should not put clothing or rags (such as J-cloths) into the toilets as these items could adversely affect pumping station

components such as pumps/ impellers causing sewage backups.

Hydraulic loading impacts

Typically, wastewater treatment plants are designed to treat normal or low flows that occur during dry periods with the occurrence of minor storm events. During heavier rainfalls or floods caused by the spring thaw for example, some of this flow can bypass the treatment system and could be directly discharged to the receiving water.

Infiltration and inflow are the technical terms referring to rainwater and/or groundwater that enters the sanitary sewer system through such sources as improper Sump Pump connections, cracked pipes, leaky manholes, or roof gutter downspouts.

Please be advised that any sump pumps connected to the sewer system in the Bayshore Road, Hwy #2 and Church Lane area must be disconnected and rerouted in an effort to reduce infiltration into the sanitary system.

Sump pump connections can cause adverse environmental impacts if increase flows cause a bypass events and it also raises the sewer fees that residents must pay.

Why are infiltration and inflow big problems?

Infiltration of water into the collection system can put extra strain on the pumping stations, which means higher electricity costs and user fees that are ultimately borne by the residents of the Mohawk of the Bay of Quinte.

During high flow situations, the collection system and the pumping stations' capacity is reduced which could result in sewage back-ups.

When the wastewater collec-

tion system is hydraulically overloaded, the flows increase requiring extra time and materials to treat, thus the costs to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte increase.

• Lastly, increased flows reduce overall capacity that could possibly reduce commercial and residential building opportunities.

To Summarize

The sanitary sewers exist to provide for the drainage and collection of domestic wastewaters to the Deseronto Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Putting non-biodegradable or household hazardous wastes (like paint thinner or oil) down toilets or drains will negatively impact the process at the sewage treatment plants. Ultimately, these toxic wastes can end up in the receiving waters and harm the environment. Sanitary sewers are not intended for the disposal of hazardous wastes. These are to be disposed of at approved locations only.

Finally, sump pump connections increase the flows into the sewer system which places hydraulic pressure on the pumping stations increasing electricity and flow charges which affect sewer fees for the residents of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

Traffic Safety Assessment Criteria



The nature of many of Canada's rural and suburban areas is changing. Population growth and increased traffic are making delivery of mail to many rural mailboxes potentially hazardous for Canada Post mail carriers and other drivers. Today, there are about 843,000 rural mailboxes which represent about six percent of Canada Post's 14 million delivery points. Given the company's responsibility to provide a safe working environment, Canada Post has taken steps to increase the visibility of the vehicles driven by its Rural and Suburban Mail Carriers (RSMC), equipping each with rooftop signs and flashing amber lights. But enhanced visibility does not address all situations where Canada Post employees, customers and other drivers are at risk.

Canada Post responsibilities and obligations

Canada Post is committed to delivering the highest standards of service possible to all Canadians. However, as an employer and corporate citizen, Canada Post, like all Canadian companies, is also bound by both the Criminal Code and the Labour Code to ensure that its operations do not put its employees or members of the public at undue risk. As a result, Canada Post is obligated to address increasing concerns about the safety of delivering to rural and suburban mailboxes.

The panel of safety experts

Canada Post engaged the services of an expert panel to develop a tool that would assess the traffic on RSMC delivery routes. The three panelists are from:

i-TRANS Consulting, a North American professional engineering consulting firm serving clients across Canada, the United States and internationally in the areas of transportation planning, transportation systems, and

Human Factors North, a Canadian consulting firm providing ergonomics expertise to design work and workplaces based on human characteristics. HFN brings expertise in traffic safety, interface design and occupational ergonomics.

Cotton Law, a legal specialist and advisor in the area of occupational health, safety and the environment.

Developing the criteria

Developing the traffic safety assessment criteria required research and expertise in the areas of traffic safety, road design, driver behaviour and the law. The result of the combined work of the multi-disciplinary team identified above is a traffic safety assessment tool, or TSAT, that can be applied to individual rural and suburban mail boxes

The traffic safety assessment criteria are accompanied by documentation that guides an assessor as to the road and traffic parameters which require measurement at a mailbox. The information gathered enables the assessor to make the decision to modify a mailbox or allow it to remain.

The approach

The approach adopted was a driver behaviour approach. This approach assesses the driving tasks of a RSMC and their requirements, as well as the driving tasks of other drivers who encounter a stopped or merging mail carrier vehicle in typical traffic and road conditions. The approach determines whether time available for drivers to carry out their driving tasks encompasses the needs of the majority of drivers.

The road conditions considered in the traffic safety assessment tool include two and four-lane roads, with and without shoulder width sufficient for stopping the mail carrier's vehicle, at the mailbox, whether completely off or partly in the path of another vehicle traveling in the same direction as the mail carrier.

What the tool assesses

The tool assesses whether there is sufficient "decision sight distance" for other drivers, traveling at typical speeds on the particular road, to respond appropriately to a stopped RSMC vehicle. Drivers need time to perceive the situation ahead, make a decision on how to react to it, and start and complete the action chosen.

The tool also assesses the ability of the mail carrier to merge safely back into traffic. Mail carriers need to see far enough behind so that they can select a reasonable gap between passing vehicles to merge back into traffic

The assessment also includes the number of vehicles using the road for two- and four-lane roads, when the RSMC vehicle is stopper on or off the road. Research has found that the drivers need to wait for long periods of time due to high volumes to get a gap to merge back into traffic, they tend to accept shorter and less safe gaps. Traffic volume measurements are taken between 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. or as close as possible to actual delivery times an RSMC is usually on the road delivering, which also takes rush hours out of the equation.

In addition, the tool assesses whether the location of the mail box meets the present legal restrictions, such as its distance from an intersection or no stopping zones.

To conclude, the traffic safety assessment tool is applied to an individual rural or suburban mailbox in order to make a legally and scientifically-based decision on whether or not the mail box can remain where it is or needs to be modified. This decision is based a number of factors including:

- an assessment of legal restrictions that apply to the location
- the number of lanes
- the number of vehicles
- the position of the stopped mail carrier's vehicle
- the presence of double yellow centerline markings
- the sight distances for approaching drivers to the stopped mail carrier's vehicle
- the sight distances for the mail carrier to merge in traffic
- the waiting time for a safe gap to merge back into traffic

Mortgage Arrears

Our recent calculations indicate that there are approximately 54 homes on the Territory that are in mortgage arrears. This equals approximately 15% of the total number of homes that hold Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte mortgages. There are currently 358 mortgages with Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

At this time there are no mortgage arrears with homes that have financed through the Bank of Montreal.

If you miss a payment on your mortgage, the 6% interest that was to be paid in that payment is still owed to MBQ and will continue to accumulate for every missed payment. This will make your mortgage balance actually increase over time if your mortgage continues to remain in arrears. For example a mortgage at a balance of \$30,000.00

with \$8000.00 in interest owed due to missed payments would become a mortgage of \$38,000.00 at the time of a rewrite.

Lateral Violence: More Harmful are experiencing some of the following: Than You Think

What is Lateral Violence?:

Most people are not aware of how harmful lateral violence can be let alone the definition. What people don't know is that Lateral violence is the act of gossiping, back stabbing, family feuding, bloodism and blaming/shaming others. Lateral violence stems from several roots such as historic and unresolved trauma, colonialism, change that is forced, internalized feeling, cultural/group oppression, frustration, anger/rage, shame and helplessness. So even though gossiping is viewed by some as a harmless act, it is indeed very toxic.

Signs that Lateral Violence are at School and The Workplace:

You may notice Lateral violence is at work/school if you notice some of the following:

Someone is aggressive with body language such as raising eyebrows, making faces,

Displays of vulgar language, abrupt responses

Judgment placed on others because of their age, gender, sexuality, ethnicity or size Intimidating & controlling behaviour Gossiping & undermining Lack of accountability & communication Strict power structure

Impacts of Lateral Violence:

There is hope! Coping & Preventative Measures:

There is hope. There are positive and effective ways to address lateral violence. Education and awareness are the 2 key factors in putting an end to it. Informing people that there is a zero tolerance rule is a step in the correct direction. Another way is by establishing consequences for lateral violence, this will show that there is zero tolerance and could be used as a deterrent for the future. Other methods would be team work training, communi-

cation training, wellness sessions and open support groups.



Along with the three Boards of Education in the Quinte area, we also have had interest shown by a representative of Loyalist College in supporting the overall effort of Voluntary Self Identification of Aboriginal students in Hastings and Prince Edward counties. A concerted effort will be made to insure our best success in reaching all Aboriginal Students.

Congratulations to Jennifer Maracle who was the successful candidate for the Board's new Aboriginal Education Coordinator. Jennifer will be busy over the next year developing and coordinating resources that will meet the requirements of the Aboriginal Education Framework Policy put forth by the Ministry of Education for Ontario. This effort will in a broad way help to identify contributions made by Aboriginal people and will be included in many courses across the curriculum both in elementary and secondary schools of the Board.

Currently we are in the final stages of the process of having our draft tuition agreement presented to INAC by HPEDSB. We are very hopeful that the proposed amendments and additions will be approved by INAC to better serve our Native students from Tyendinaga Territory. The new tuition agreement will likely be signed by next month.
