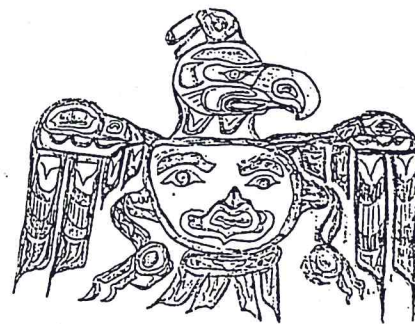

Dear Chief Hill:

I am writing to advise you that effective December 1, 1993, all pharmacies participating in the Pharmacy Claims Processing System (PCPS), will be required to adhere to established client identification criteria.

As you are aware, it has been our practice, since the introduction of PCPS in Ontario on April 1, 1991, to pay first claims submitted for authorized benefits, even if the client information submitted was incomplete or incorrect. This temporary arrangement, known as *First Forgiveness*, was originally intended to be in effect for six months in order that pharmacies would have sufficient time to gather the required client information. This practice was subsequently extended for more than two years.

I trust that you would agree that pharmacies have now had sufficient opportunity to collect the required information and to thoroughly familiarize themselves with Blue Cross requirements, while working out any problems that arose with billing procedures. The practice of *First Forgiveness* will therefore end on December 1, as will this office's current procedure of providing First Nations with a monthly listing of *First Forgiven* clients.


The office of the Chiefs of Ontario, Provincial Treaty Organizations, and Tribal Councils are also being informed of this implementation, as has the Ontario Pharmacists' Association. Participating pharmacies are being contacted as well, requesting that they make full use of the services provided by the Ontario Blue Cross Toll-Free Centre, where they can receive assistance in resolving issues relating to Client Verification, Benefit Verification, and Frequency Limits.

Canada

Provided that our clients continue to give complete identification to participating pharmacies, I do not foresee any major difficulties after December 1. Nevertheless, I would like to encourage all First Nations to inform me immediately if problems do arise, in order that they can be addressed and resolved as quickly as possible.

Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any concerns or would like clarification of any point. I am confident that, by working together, we can ensure that all clients will receive prompt and efficient service.

RE: Refund of Income Tax paid as a result of the Glen Williams
Decision

Prior to the Williams decision, income such as Unemployment Insurance was considered taxable income of an Indian and Income tax was withheld from each U.I. cheque. The Supreme Court ruled that if an Indian's earnings were tax exempt, then in turn so was his Unemployment Insurance benefits. After the court decision it was required that the Federal Government pass a remission order which it did in April of 1993. Attached for your information is the Province of Ontario's remission order. Indian people in Ontario are able to get an adjustment to their income tax returns for any income tax paid on U.I.C. cheques back until 1985 which originated from tax free earnings.

On the recommendation of the undersigned, the Lieutenant Governor, by and with the advice and concurrence of the Executive Council, orders that:

Sur la recommandation du soussigné, le lieutenant-gouverneur, sur l'avis et avec le consentement du Conseil des ministres, décrète ce qui suit:

WHEREAS by Privy Council Order 1993-523 entitled the Indian Income Tax Remission Order the Governor General in Council remitted federal income tax to certain individuals in respect of,

- (a) employment income payable to an Indian by an employer residing on a reserve or Indian settlement, for the 1992 and 1993 taxation years, and
- (b) unemployment insurance benefits included in an Indian's income and determined by reference to employment income of the Indian that is exempt from taxation under section 87 of the Indian Act (Canada) or in respect of which there is a remission of tax payable under the Income Tax Act (Canada) by a taxpayer who is an Indian, for the 1985 to 1991 taxation years;

AND WHEREAS the remission of federal income tax in respect of the employment income was granted to provide employers and their Indian employees with an opportunity to adjust to a 1992 court decision which held that such income is not necessarily exempt from tax under section 87 of the Indian Act (Canada), as previously determined by the courts;

AND WHEREAS the remission of federal income tax in respect of the unemployment insurance benefits grants to Indians for 1985 to 1991 taxation the benefit of the 1992 court decision which held that unemployment insurance benefits are exempt under section 87 of the Indian Act (Canada) where the qualifying employment is on a reserve;

AND WHEREAS the Minister of Finance recommends that it is in the public interest to grant a corresponding remission of Ontario personal income tax and any applicable interest and penalties to the same individuals for the same taxation years;

PURSUANT to section 11 of the Ministry of Revenue Act, remission be granted to the individuals who are subject to tax under the Income Tax Act (Ontario) and entitled to a remission under the Indian Income Tax Remission Order for a taxation year of the amount of tax, interest and penalties payable under that Act for that year that exceed the amount of tax, interest and penalties that would be payable under that Act if the amount of tax payable under Part I of the Income Tax Act (Canada) that is remitted under the Indian Income Tax Remission Order for the same taxation year was not taken into consideration;

CESO ABORIGINAL SERVICES RECEIVES ENDORSEMENT FROM ABORIGINAL LEADERS

TORONTO -- CESO's new program of cooperation with the Aboriginal peoples of Canada is receiving the support of Aboriginal organizations across the country, including the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs (AMC) and the Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations (FSIN).

The program is based on a concept of partnership with the Aboriginal peoples which will be implemented through the development of alliances with leading Aboriginal organizations and centres of influence. It is the result of a year of consultations about needs and resources with Aboriginal leaders, businesses and community organizations across Canada.

Chief Roland Crowe of FSIN calls the new program "timely" and adds that CESO's alliances with Aboriginal grassroots organizations is the way to "successfully address the needs of our communities."

The program will operate through a new organization called CESO Aboriginal Services which has been created to help meet the priorities of First Nations in this time of rapid progress towards economic self-sufficiency and self-government.

CESO Aboriginal Services is a subsidiary of CESO, the not-for-profit development agency which provides volunteers as advisers and trainers to Aboriginal businesses and communities. This year, about 1,300 Aboriginal clients will benefit from the experience and skills of CESO volunteers. Assistance of CESO Aboriginal Services is available to all Aboriginal peoples of Canada, including non-Status, Metis, Inuit and urban residents.

Since 1969, CESO Volunteer Advisers have completed some 20,000 assignments for Aboriginal businesses and community organizations across Canada. Among private organizations, CESO probably has the longest track record of working with First Nations across Canada.

"CESO has made a noticeable contribution to the development of our communities and businesses," says Grand Chief Phil Fontaine of the AMC.

Leading the new CESO Aboriginal Services is a predominately Aboriginal Board of Directors. Board members include Viola Robinson, Commissioner with the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples and past president of the Native Council of Canada; William Shead, Chief Executive Officer of the Aboriginal Centre of Winnipeg Inc.; Susan Tatoosh, a Vancouver specialist in Aboriginal human resources and an active board member of leading Aboriginal organizations for economic development and women's rights; and Florence Walsh, business owner and Secretary of the Benevolent Society for the Native Council of Nova Scotia.

Working as a partner with Aboriginal clients, CESO Aboriginal Services is committed to a skills transfer approach that will facilitate self-government and self-sufficiency. It offers advisory and training services for elected leaders and administrators in such areas as community administration, human resource administration and financial management. It is also ready to help organizations implement federally-supported programs at a local level and to customize required training.

As well, CESO Aboriginal Services will continue CESO's work of providing advisory assistance to businesses for start-up and expansion and to help solve financial, management or technical problems.

"We created CESO Aboriginal Services after an internal CESO task force confirmed beyond any shadow of a doubt that the services we offer are more relevant and in greater demand than ever before," says Dan Haggerty, President and Chief Executive Officer of CESO. "Through this new organization we expect to double the volume of our services over the next five years."

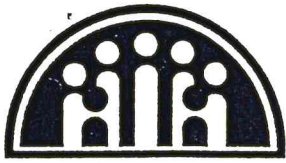

- nausea & vomiting

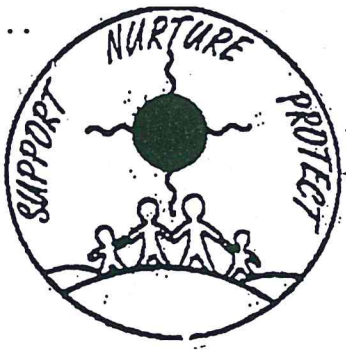
Non-Insulin Dependent Type II

Incidence increases with age and weight

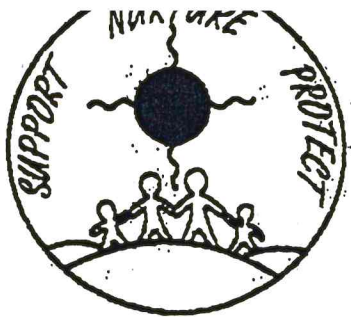

Violence Against Women is a Major Social Problem

In Ontario:

- One in every four women living with a male partner has experienced or lived with physical or sexual abuse at some time in her life.
- One girl in every five is abused or sees the abuse of her mother.

Drug use is higher among victims

Victims of violence – whether they suffer now or suffered as children – are more likely to use drugs, alcohol and prescription medications to calm down, to numb the terror, or to sleep.

- Women who have been physically assaulted by their spouses are more likely to use calming medications or sleeping pills.
- Women who have been sexually abused are more likely to use calming medications, sleeping pills or illegal drugs.
- Girls who have been physically or sexually abused are more likely to use calming medications or illegal drugs when they are adults.
- Girls who witness their mothers being abused by a spouse are more likely to use calming medications, use illegal drugs, or to drink to excess, when they are adults.

Drugs provide only temporary relief

Drugs may help victims of abuse to escape for a little while from feelings of anger, depression, fear, guilt, humiliation and self-blame, but they will do nothing to remove the threat of violence or the memory of it.

In fact:

- The use of alcohol and other drugs can lead to addiction and other health problems.
- Drugs may stand in the way of finding the real solution – doing something to stop the violence.

There are alternatives

If you or someone you know has been abused, help is available.

- In an emergency, call the police or go to your hospital emergency room.
- Check your phonebook for the Wife Assault Help Line, Women's Shelter, Rape Crisis Line or Mental Health Centre nearest you.
- Children can call the Kids Help Phone toll-free in Ontario at 1-800-668-6868 or the nearest Children's Aid Society. They can also talk to a teacher, school counsellor, or someone else they trust.
- If you have a problem with drugs or alcohol, call your local addiction assessment agency, Mental Health Centre or a self-help group. Your nearest Addiction Research Foundation office can give facts and advice.
- People who physically or sexually abuse their partners can get professional help by calling their local Mental Health Centre.

For more information on alcohol and other drugs, call the Addiction Research Foundation's Drug and Alcohol Information Line. It's free, it's confidential and it's available seven days a week from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Call toll-free in Ontario 1-800-INFO-ARF or in Toronto, 595-6111.

For emergency, crisis and agency phone numbers, check the front pages and the white pages of your local phonebook.

Coming soon is **INFO** - a database on compact disk of over 4 million titles in 170 public libraries in Ontario. Partial funding for this project is from the Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Recreation.
