Update From The Chief
October 5th, 1999

Seken Sewakwekenh

I am happy to provide an interim update to our community members on a number of issues at this time.

Resignation of Councillor Colleen Maracle

Resignation of Councillor Colleen Maracle was accepted by TMC on August 18th, 1999. She has taken a job in Cranbrook B.C. We extend sincere thanks to Colleen for her one and a half years of service and wish her family well.

By-election

The council discussed the issue of holding a by-election and decided not to hold a by-election, due to the upcoming December election. The Federal Government order of Council dated November 12th, 1951, set the size of the council as a Chief and four councillors. Section 74 of the Indian Act wording states that if a position is vacant for three months then "an election may be held."

Since this decision was made community members have attended council stating that the community was under-represented on the council and requested a by-election. The council confirmed that there would be no by-election.

Culbertson Claim

The Culbertson Claim is a 800 acre land claim affecting the easterly portion of the Town of Deseronto, from Mill Street East and from the Bay of Quinte to the train tracks. The claim was filed with Indian Affairs and the Attorney General of Ontario in November 1995. The Federal Government has completed the counter research with an addition document being found confirming that the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte protested the sale of the land by John Culbertson. It is expected that the Department of Justice will complete its legal opinion on the matter by November 1999 and that a meeting will be scheduled with Council after that date.

Hunting Rights

Council has met with Mr. Pratt from the Canadian Wildlife Service to discuss hunting at Prince Edward Point. A committee has been struck to deal with hunting issues comprised of Councillor William J. Brant, Police Chief Larry Hay, Constable Ron Maracle and Brant Barty. There have been two committee meetings to date, the next meeting will be advertised.

Highway 2 Issue at Shannonville

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte has never given consent or been compensated for 8 acres of land used for the old highway 2 in the Turton Penn area. The band are the land owners for this area. Council has been discussing this issue with the Indian Affairs, the Department of Justice for Canada, and the Ontario Indian Affairs Secretariat. Public History Inc. were selected by Council to do the counter research required by the process which concluded that the band had not given consent for the highway to be built on this property nor been compensated. The meetings have not occurred due to the recent provincial election and council expects to resume discussions on this matter within the upcoming weeks.

Fishing Mediation

Money was provided to Council to participate in the fishing mediation discussion with the Ministry of Natural Resources, Indian Affairs, and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans. A completed biological report on the Bay of Quinte confirming that the Mohawk fishery is not affecting the fish stocks in the Bay of Quinte. Joan Holmes, an expert historian, has also completed a historical report which confirms there has been continuous Iroquoian occupation of the north-shore Lake Ontario which supports that the Mohawks have Aboriginal rights in this area. At the last fishing mediation held on September 20th, 1999 the Ministry of Natural Resources were maintaining that the mediation discussions were part of a pretrial process and that the reports could not be released to the public, pursuant to Judge Hunter's order. This will be discussed at our next meeting. All members of council indicated that they would like the historical and biological reports presented to the community.

Companies Owned by Council

Council has never paid for their shares. As of March 31st, 1999, First Nations Air Service made a profit of \$33,000.00 and the Air Craft Maintenance Organization made a profit of \$3,800.00. Peace Tree suffered a loss of \$103,000.00. The Kente Bay Board of Directors have negotiated a local labor market agreement with Kagita Mikam in partnership with Human Resources Canada to provide funds to hire professionals from CESO, to provide management and the development of a business and marketing plan.

The Price Waterhouse report indicated that all the companies had tremendous potential.

Section 95 Housing

The eleven new units under construction in the subdivision will be completed by November 1999, with a rent set at \$476 per month, in addition there is a four plex nearing in completion.

Infrastructure

Progress in the building of capital infrastructure has slowed in this term. Councillor Colleen and I were able to secure \$190,000.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck, as well as \$45,000.00 for the design of Norway's Side Road.

Capital Planning

Council is considering building a water and sewer system in our community, with a sewage treatment plant located in the Sucker Creek area and the water filtration plant in the Ridge Road area. In addition, the Council will have to purchase 60 acres of land in the Ridge Road area for a subdivision development to justify the project for Indian Affairs funding.

Norway's Road Re-construction

I opened tenders on September 27th, 1999 for the re-construction of a three kilometer portion of Norway's Side Road, between the Ridge Road and York Road. The lowest bid of the nine bids received was from Warren Paving Ltd. at \$497,919.84. The tender was posted on September 11th, 1999 and on September 17th, 1999, Addendum No. 1 was issued indicating that the contract was subject to the availability of funds. On October 5th, 1999 council met with the contractor, Warren Paving, to discuss a deferred payment plan against next year's capital allocation for a portion of the contract. The contractor was confident that the work could be completed this fall with a surface treatment deferred until the year 2000.

Community Centre Renovations

I congratulate Chris Maracle, housing director, for the successful writing and lobby of a proposal to renovate the community centre. The Ontario Ministry of Culture and Recreation agreed to provide the community with \$250,000.00 for this project, with council contributing \$100,000.00 from the Ottawa Revenue Trust Fund. A total of \$87,000.00 has been received to date from the Ministry and the project will be beginning within the next few weeks.

Personal Debt Consolidation Loans

The council have approved a number of consolidation loans at their in-camera meetings. The Department of Indian Affairs permits Indian Bands to make personal loans as long as there is a published policy. There is no published policy.

Casino Rama Money

Tyendinaga's initial allocation is approximately 4 million dollars. The Ontario Management Board must sign an agreement with the Chief's of Ontario before any funds can be released. Council still needs to meet to develop a list of priorities and hold public consultations with the community.

Richmond Dumpsite

In April of 1998 an environmental committee was established to deal with local concerns relating to the Richmond Dumpsite. Councillor William J. Brant agreed to be the band representative on this committee and did not attend the first 17 meetings that were held on this issue. As a result our council were deficient in information concerning this matter.

A recent water testing program in Mud Creek conducted by XCG indicated that an additional sampling should be conducted this fall because of a concern with one of the test results. If the Ministry of Environment approves the dump expansion in the year 2000, it is estimated that approximately 20

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
million tonnes of garbage could be brought to this location in the next 20 years. The band submitted our concerns to the Ministry of Environment. The environmental review process has started and should be completed by mid 2000 with approximately twelve consulting firms engaging in the review. The dump expansion has the potential of having a negative impact on the fish habitat in our streams. The council has requested a proposal from XCG to conduct an additional water sampling program in the streams this fall.

Christ Church, Her Majesty's Royal Chapel of the Mohawks

The committee has raised \$252,000.00. Heritage Canada has agreed to provide \$500,000.00 over the next four year, on a cost sharing basis. A contract for phase 1 has been awarded to Santan Masonry Company in Kingston, through a tender process. The contract is for \$276,000.00 to provide for the re-construction of the east and west walls of the tower, as well as the re-pointing of the mortar joints in the tower. Two community members will be hired to work on the project to develop masonry skills. A ceremonial agreement signing will be held at the church on Friday, October 8th, 1999 at 11 a.m. with refreshments following. Everyone is welcome to attend.

I am happy to provide this interim report and will provide a more detailed report at a later date, due to my very busy schedule.







New CD-ROM seeks to preserve and promote the Ojibwe language

On Monday, September 27, at 2:30 p.m., the University of Sudbury's Department of Native Studies and Cambrian College's Wabnode Institute will celebrate the launch a CD-ROM entitled *Foundations of Nishnaabemwin: Stepping Stones to Conversational Fluency in Ojibwe*. This public launch, to be held in the University of Sudbury's Canisius Hall, will also mark the official opening of the Ojibwe Language Lab at the University of Sudbury.

This CD-ROM was written by Prof. Mary Ann Corbiere, Native Studies Professor at the University of Sudbury, and Martina Osawamick of Cambrian College's Wabnode Institute. Alice Dickson was the instructional designer, while Joanne Philipow and Léo Duquette of Media Concept were responsible for the computer programming and for the technical production of the CD-ROM.

Produced jointly by the University of Sudbury's Department of Native Studies and Cambrian College's Wabnode Institute, the *Foundations of Nishnaabemwin* CD-ROM is expected to be a valuable linguistic tool. It gives a comprehensive introduction to the Nishnaabemwin (Ojibwe) language for learners with no previous knowledge of the language. Its focus is on building communicative competence.

The Department of Native Studies and the Wabnode Institute consider it vitally important to preserve and promote Native languages. Ojibwe has been taught in their programs for many years now, but comprehensive grammars for pedagogical use have been lacking to date. This CD-ROM project is thus seen as an opportunity to contribute to the teaching and preservation of the Ojibwe language. It represents a significant milestone in Nishnaabemwin curriculum development.

The *Foundations of Nishnaabemwin* CD-ROM contains 13 in-depth lessons that teach the learner how to compose basic sentences. Each lesson provides thorough explanations of sentence patterns used, many examples in text and on audio, and activities to build aural comprehension, pronunciation, and composition skills. A manual, consisting mainly of a workbook with written exercises for further practice, accompanies the CD-ROM.

The *Foundations of Nishnaabemwin* CD-ROM, which sells for \$59.95, will be available shortly at the University of Sudbury Department of Native Studies or Wabnode Institute at Cambrian College.

MOHAWKS OF THE BAY OF QUINTE AGREE TO TAKE LEAD TO CONTROL RACCOON RABIES

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte will take the lead to control incidents of raccoon rabies at the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory near Belleville, Ontario. In an agreement with the Province of Ontario signed today, the Mohawks will implement a point control procedure to contain any potential spread of the raccoon strain of the rabies virus should a confirmed case occur.

"It is very important to have a protocol agreement and co-ordinated strategy to effectively and swiftly deal with any outbreak of raccoon rabies given that there has already been two cases in southeastern Ontario and a number of cases in Upper New York State," says Chief R. Donald Maracle, Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte. "I am pleased that the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources has agreed to provide financial and technical advisory services. All of the parties will work together to ensure public safety."

Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (OMNR) Rabies Research staff will provide training, wages for the trapping team, and equipment including rabies vaccine to Tyendinaga trappers who will then fully implement the Point Control tactic. The tactic includes the euthanizing of all raccoons, skunks, and any other mammal within a five kilometre radius of the location where a confirmed case of raccoon rabies occurs. Trappers will then conduct a trap-vaccinate and release operation in a five to ten kilometre radius of the location to build a population of animals that are immunized from the rabies virus around the site.

"We are pleased to provide the support and training to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte," says John Snobelen, Minister of Natural Resources. "The agreement is good for a couple of reasons. People who know the land will implement the Point Control tactic, making the tactic even more effective. Ontario benefits from this extra protection at strategic locations where rabid raccoons could enter from the United States."

The Point Control Tactic is the same operation that was successfully used earlier this summer when the first two cases of raccoon rabies occurred in Canada near Prescott and Brockville, Ontario.

In the past, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory has been included in the aerial bait drops intended to immunize raccoons and skunks. This strategy should reduce the potential spread of the rabies virus should an infected animal enter the area.

A MESSAGE FROM A MEMBER OF MOHAWKS
OF THE BAY OF QUINTE BAND COUNCIL (MBQBC) FOR SEPTEMBER 1999

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Band Council (MBQBC) travelled to Akwesasne this month to speak with Grand Chief Mike Mitchell to view their system of administration. Akwesasne Band Council (ABC) has been meeting with other Mohawk Nations in round table discussions. The five areas of discussion that have been formally set as agenda items for these talks are as follows:

1. Justice (Policing, courts etc.)
2. Health
3. Economic Development
4. Taxation (goods brought across the USA borders)
5. Multi-jurisdictional issues (some territories are in Quebec, Ontario & U.S.A.)

MBQBC has been interested in this type of association because many of the problems these Mohawk Nations face are very similar to those that we are experiencing. MBQBC has asked to be given notice of the next meeting of this group so that we might participate should it be beneficial to our own Nation.

In September MBQBC held a meeting with a company which claims that it has a new technology in the area of waste disposal. They have a smelter system which the company claims to be non-polluting, environmentally friendly and whose end-product can be used in the manufacturing of construction materials. It sounds too good to be true but MBQBC will continue to follow up on this.

The following council motions and directions may be of interest to you:

1. That MBQBC direct the First Peoples Consulting engineering firm to tender the Norway Side Road reconstruction at per government tendering guidelines and subject to funding.
2. The Mohawk Fire Department will lease a pick-up truck to expedite the delivery of their fire department operations.
3. MBQBC will pay \$35,000.00 toward the engineering costs of the Christ Church restoration.
4. MBQBC will set funds aside from the program Building Healthy Communities Fund to assist with interest buy down for fixed income owners in emergency situations.
5. ALL BAND HOUSING RENOVATIONS will be inspected. (This has not always been the case.)
6. A door to door campaign on behalf of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind be approved. It will be done in September and October 1999.
7. The Band Council Resolution (BCR) that was made re: non-native women who acquired status through marriage, lose this status upon divorce, has been rescinded.
8. MBQBC directed that we update bylaw to remove unsightly garbage, implement a recycling program and to enforce the garbage by-law that is now in place.
9. That the land fill custodian REFUSE access to the landfill to all who cannot verify residency by showing their Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory (TMT) civic address.
10. That all professional fees be documented (time rated) before payment by MBQBC is approved. (This has not always been done in the past.)

I invite your call to my office at 967-9861 or you may drop in to see me if you have any questions or concerns in regard to our community or business with our government.

I look forward to your continuous co-operation in assisting to make TMT a better place in which to live.

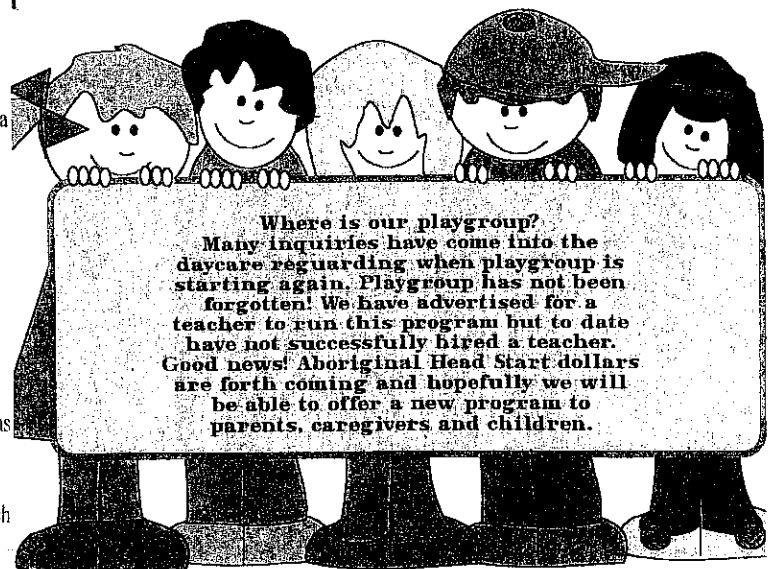

Dear Chief Maracle:

Thank you for your letter regarding the First Nations and Inuit Home and Community Care Program. I apologize for the lengthy delay in responding to you.

As you may be aware, the Medical Services Branch (MSB) of Health Canada has established a Joint National Steering Committee, which is co-chaired by the Assembly of First Nations, the MSB and the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND). Their goal is to provide direction in program development and implementation of this initiative. In addition, an Advisory Sub-Committee was established to guide the initial program development.

On June 8, 1999, I received Cabinet approval for this initiative. Communications on the First Nations and Inuit Home and Community Care Program began over the summer months. First Nations are currently providing input for the Treasury Board submission which will be put forward in early fall. Information sessions are being held in each Region over the late summer and early fall. During these information sessions First Nations will become directly involved in the program planning and implementation activities of the home and community care program in each Region. I would like to assure you that the program will be a holistic continuum of home and

community care services that are comprehensive, culturally sensitive, accessible, effective and equitable to that of other Canadians, and which reflect the unique health and social needs of First Nations and Inuit.

This program will build on and link with existing home care nursing services and DIAND's Adult Care homemaking and other related programs.

Thank you for bringing this matter to my attention.

EMPLOYMENT & TRAINING

Hello everyone! She:kon, Tansi, Ahnee! Just thought I would pass on this call for submissions.

I was sitting at JJ Mugs with Drew Hayden Taylor and Lee Maracle a year ago and found us talking about Star Trek NG, Voyager, the original...we noted that the only Native we have seen on tv in the future is the guy on Voyager, which looks more like a Latino with a bad tatoo. It is never mentioned who this guy is or which Nation he comes from; he is just Native. Nice try, but we all know there are many Native people in the future, and their voice has not been heard...

6 Months later, Drew, Lee and I found ourselves in Germany for a Canadian Literary Festival, and we found the subject of Native Science Fiction going up again. It is interesting that when the voices of Native people were first heard, and even before that, when stereotypes abounded and no one in film ever consulted Native people on their languages, customs, ways of life and mannerisms, Native people were portrayed as being agents of the past. Actors in the past...indeed, a part of the past.

In my lifetime, I have seen great change in Native people from many different Nations. My grandparents were raised with Tradition, but the war and their parents eventually forced them to suppress their culture and survive in the Canadian economy. My father suppressed his identity and didn't share it with our family. Of course, it was obvious enough and I began asking questions, with my brothers and sisters.

Today, I am doing my Master's in Education in Iroquois storytelling. I love to hear the stories of the Haudenosaunee, the Anishinabe, and all other Nations of Indigenous peoples around the world. There is a magic to their entertainment yet a practical lesson to be taken from each. Stories entertain, teach, amuse and raise our spirits. Our various nations have our prophecies too. We talk and tell stories of our past and our future; of seven generations behind, and seven generations ahead. The Iroquois, for example, have always included these aspects, just as millions of other Native people have. So here is the call: I am editing the first anthology of Native Science Fiction, to be published in the new millenium. The writers must be Native, and the stories must include Science Fiction or Science Fantasy which says something about Native World views or ways of living. Be specific please! We don't want any more generic Indians in space! Stories from 2000 to 8000 words will be accepted - this is only an approximate guideline. There is room for 10-12 writers, and 5 are already on board, including Lee Maracle and Drew Hayden Taylor.

Please contact me if you are interested. The timeline is as follows: I would like notice of intent to write or submit by October 15, 1999, but if anyone comes in later that is fine. I would like rough drafts or outlines by Christmas if possible, but the final deadline, regardless is March 31, 2000. This project is for up and coming artists as well as for well established ones and could be a great opportunity for a new writer with an interest in science fiction/fantasy. etho niowennake

CANCER AWARENESS

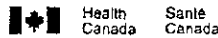
October is **Breast Cancer Awareness** month. It is estimated nearly 19,000 Canadian women will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year. It is the most common cause of death in women under 40 and is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in women.

Regular mammography at an accredited clinic is the best protection for women against breast cancer, especially in women over age 50. It is recommended that women between the age of 50 and 69 years of age have a mammogram every two years, combined with a physical examination of the breasts by a trained health professional.

Breast self-examination is very important for women of all ages. BSE should start as early as 15 years of age and continue throughout your lifetime.

Men can also develop cancer of the breast. Therefore it is as equally important for them to examine their breast and underarm area for any lumps, redness, soreness etc.


I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank the CHRs for their contribution to the community. They certainly take their jobs serious and are in tune with the Community needs.

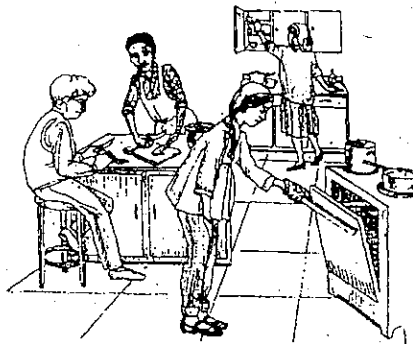

STRESS

WHAT IS STRESS?

Stress is the physiological (physical) and psychological (mental) response to internal and external stimuli

or
"the way we react to stressors."

Stressors are anything that causes stress to our body, mind, emotion, and spirit, such as:

Money Problems, Work overload, Injuries & disease, Ethnic Tensions, Relationship difficulties, Cultural conflicts, Family demands, Trauma (e.g. child abuse), Personal losses, Violence

SOME SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF STRESS

- Headaches
- eye strain, dry mouth, rapid speech
- grinding teeth
- muscle tension, shoulder areas
- tight chest
- rapid heart rate
- upset stomach, ulcers
- sweaty palms
- loss of energy
- sexual dysfunction
- hives
- nausea
- disease

FLIGHT OR FLIGHT RESPONSE

The adrenal gland is "home" to the fight or flight response. Whether we are faced with a life-threatening situation or whether we are about to run a race or meet a deadline, we have all the available energy to respond to the challenge. In response to stress, chemicals such as adrenaline, increased blood pressure, heart rate, oxygen intake, and blood flow to the muscles, combine to provide us with the strength, energy and clear thinking, necessary if we are to give our best.

A dangerous or stressful situation occurs, or is perceived by the eyes or other senses. The brain processes the information perceived, and the body's nervous system, hypothalamus, pituitary and adrenal glands begin causing changes in body chemicals.

The final reaction to the perceived stress is a FIGHT OR FLIGHT response.

This story is a continuation.

The policeman knocks once again on our door and my mother says not to answer it. I don't understand why, because he is the same policeman that comes to our school to talk about safety. I peek out the window and I can hear the policeman call my mothers name.

Finally my mother opens the door and lets the policeman in. He talks quietly to my mother. I move closer so I can hear what he is saying. When he sees me he smiles and says "hi there". I don't say anything cause I feel scared inside and I run over to my Mother and hide behind her.

He tells my Mother that he knows of a place where she can go if she doesn't want to stay if she is being hurt. The policeman says there is place she can go to, with the children, where everyone will be safe and protected. He calls this place a shelter. My Mother starts to cry again and I get mad at the policeman for making her cry. I say to the policeman "don't make my Mommy cry" and then I start to cry cause I think I will get into trouble for being sassy.

The policeman doesn't get mad at me. He says he doesn't mean to make my mother cry but that my mother is trying to make a difficult decision. He talks to my Mother some more about how Noah and I will be affected by the violence we see when Daddy hits Mommy.

The policeman says if we go to the shelter my Mother would learn more about why some people are abusive. He says we will all be taken care of and there will be counsellors to talk with us about what we experienced. He also says my Mother can learn other things at the shelter like tips on parenting and communicating.

My Mother has stopped crying and I can see she is really listening to the policeman. He says he will give her a number for the shelter and she can call to talk with a counsellor. The policeman says if she decides she would like to go he will give her a ride. My Mother looks at the policeman and she slowly shakes her head up and down. My Mother reaches for the phone to call the shelter and the policeman smiles a really big smile at me and says "everything will be OK".

HALLOWEEN SAFETY RULES

CLOTHING: Wear easy to see clothing. Try to avoid dark clothes, it is hard for drivers to see you. Dress warmly, but remember you will be moving around as you get in and out of your car. Wear something with fluorescent or reflective parts or accessories.
i.e.: reflective strips, glow sticks.

MASKS: Try to avoid plastic and rubber (latex) masks.
- They are hot to wear and it is hard to breathe with them on.
- They can distort and impair the vision of the person wearing them. If you have to wear this type of mask, wear it only at the door, NOT while walking.
Make-up is a better alternative.
- It does not restrict vision.
- Test the make-up on a small area of skin, to make sure you are not allergic to it.
- Use only non-toxic and water soluble make-up.


MOVEMENT: Do not go alone!
- Groups of three to seven are just about right.
Go to houses of people that you know - friends, relatives.
Carry some kind of light while walking, so you can see and be seen.
Have an adult take you around. They should go to the door with you, not just drive you around.

TREATS: Do not eat anything, until an adult has checked it all over.
Do not eat any unwrapped, unsealed, individual treats
- These should be removed and thrown away by the adult who checks your treats, before anything is eaten.
Apples, oranges or any other fruits should be checked by an adult, and if eaten, should be peeled and cut into small pieces.

TRICKS: Keep them funny and harmless.
Treat other people and their property as you would like to be treated.

JACK-O-LANTERNS: Have an adult help, by doing the carving.
A small disposable flashlight works better than candles. They will not blow out, and there is much less risk of an accidental fire.

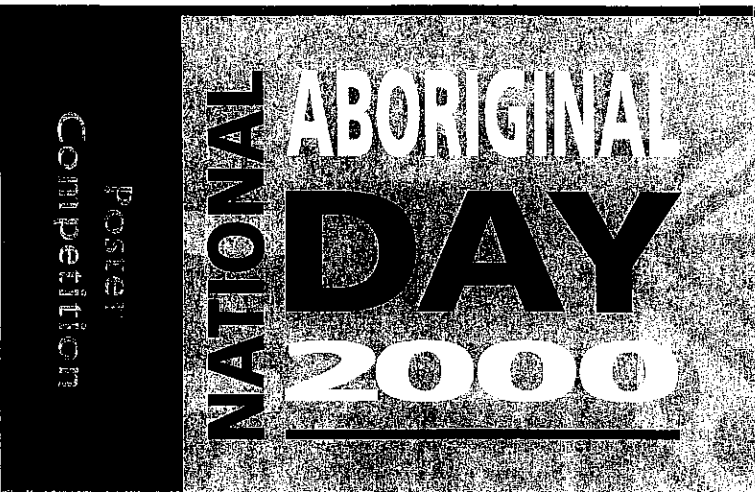

In 1996, the Governor General of Canada proclaimed June 21 of each year to be known as *National Aboriginal Day*. Every June, Canadians across the country celebrate in various ways to recognize Aboriginal peoples' unique and meaningful contributions to Canadian society.

Call for Submissions:

The Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) invites all new, emerging and professional artists of Aboriginal ancestry to submit existing or original artwork that reflects **one of three themes**:

Celebrating First Nations or Celebrating Inuit or Celebrating Métis

for a trio of posters that will be used to promote National Aboriginal Day.

Applicants must be at least 18 years old, and be of Canadian Aboriginal ancestry (First Nation, Inuit, Métis).

Entries will be limited to one theme and one piece of artwork per contestant. Pieces must be on paper (painting, drawing, original print, photograph), and contain no text. The image should be no larger than 28 x 36 cm (approx. 11" x 14"), in portrait orientation.

The unframed original should be forwarded along with the artist's résumé or biography. Please ensure that works are properly packaged and secured between rigid backing and securely wrapped. The Department is not responsible for damaged artwork.

The winning pieces will be used in the design of three separate posters, each measuring approximately 23-1/2 x 61 cm (approx. 9-1/2" x 25-1/4"). The posters will be designed to either stand alone or be posted in a group of three.

The selection jury will be made up of professional artists representing each Aboriginal group, and referred to the National Aboriginal Day Poster Contest Organizing Committee by DIAND's Indian and Inuit Art Centre.

Each entry will be judged on how well it reflects the chosen theme, its originality, artistic merit, and technical qualities. All decisions are final.

The three winning artists will each receive a cash prize of \$5,000. This will include the purchase of unlimited exclusive use of the winning art for five years. The art may be used on various products (paper products, Web products, advertisements and more) for the purpose of promoting National Aboriginal Day. Artist usage of the image during the five-year period will be limited by the Communications Branch of the Department. Artists will retain original artwork.

The deadline for entries is December 10, 1999.
