I hope that everyone is enjoying the fall season and our students are settled in their respective educational institutions. May I take this time to congratulate those who have graduated and are starting new careers.

Casino Rama

On September 3, 2002 Council met to discuss the community consultation package on the Casino Rama Funds. Council has directed the Technical Services Department to get updated estimates on a number of potential projects.

Community Members will have the opportunity for their input into how the Casino Rama Funds are spent. You will also have the opportunity to prioritize the projects and to identify new potential projects in the upcoming community survey.

Casino Rama Investments

On September the 12, 2002 Jeff Curtis, from Bank of Montreal/Nesbitt Burns, met with Council to advise Council on the performance of the Casino Rama investments. The management equity portfolio is down from last year, with lower interest rates being earned. The managed equity portfolio is earning less interest than last year. The cash investment is earning 2.4 % per annum. The managed bond portfolio has been doing well and is earning 5.5% per annum.

The market value of the three categories of investments as of August 31, 2002 is \$9,123,262.00.

At the meeting Council approved to change the manager of the diversified equity portfolio from McLean Budden Inc. to Foyston, Gordon, Payne Inc. to reduce the short-term volatility associated with equity markets and to provide superior long-term returns.

Council confirmed the investment mix for the Casino Rama Funds as:

- Short Term Investments (Cash) 5%
- Managed Bond Portfolio 70%
- Managed Equity Portfolio 25%

The investment will be re-balanced quarterly and reviewed by BMO Nesbitt Burns and Council quarterly.

La Fleshe Landfill Site Visit

On September the 20th representatives from Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, Tyendinaga Township Council as well as a community member attended the Lafleshe Landfill site near Casselman, Ontario to determine if this would be a suitable option to dispose of waste from our respective communities.

The La Fleshe Landfill site is an environmentally engineered landfill site. The nearest body of water is the Nation River, which is ten kilometers away. The natural features of the site include a sixty-foot naturally occurring clay liner.

Everyone was impressed with the site and felt this option should be investigated further. Further information will be gathered on the cost associated with transporting our waste to this site as well as the capital construction costs of building a waste transfer station.

Richmond Landfill Expansion

On September 16, 2002, I filed an affidavit in the Superior Court of Justice, Belleville. The affidavit has been filed in support of a motion for an order staying any further proceedings under the terms of reference approved by the Minister of the Environment until the Court has heard and ruled on the judicial review application. It is expected that the judicial review application will be heard January 2003.

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has refused to provide any assurance that while the application for judicial review is pending, the Ministry will not entertain an application for approval from Canadian Waste Services Inc., thereby rendering the judicial review application moot.

The judicial review relates to the legality of the terms of reference for the environmental assessment of the proposed Richmond Landfill expansion. The Ontario Ministry of the Environment should not consider approving any environmental assessment before the judicial review application is heard. There have been extensive delays from the outset in having the respondents file materials in a timely manner with the court, thereby creating delays and necessitating requests for extensions.

Post-Secondary Education Funding Increase

We have recently been informed by Indian Affairs regional office that we will be receiving an additional \$50,000 for post-secondary education funding.

Off Reserve Daycare Funding

On August 29, 2002 The Ministry of Community, Family and Children Services approved to provide the community with \$ 40,000.00 for off reserve daycare subsidy fees,

Capital Plan—Water and Sewer

The majority of wells within our community are polluted with unacceptable levels of bacteriological contamination and approximately 123 have experienced E-coli contamination.

Our community has an urgent need to have a communal water system and adequate sewage disposal system to ensure the public health and safety of our community.

In November 1998 Council approved to hire First Nations Engineering Inc. from Oshweken to complete a 20 year capital plan to identify the Tyendinaga Mohawks Communities infrastructure needs. The plan proposed to build a water and sewer plant on Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory which would serve part of the Ridge Road, QMS, the Health Centre, and westward to the Village of Shannonville. The proposal also called for the building of a sub-division development near Quinte Mohawk School to address our community's future housing requirements.

At a meeting on April 5, 2002, Glen Gilbert, INAC Capital Funding Manager wanted a closer examination of the Deseronto expansion option. At this meeting Council approved to give further study to the Deseronto water and sewer expansion option. Council contracted with First Nations Engineering Inc. to undertake this study. The study has been completed and reviewed by Council on September 24, 2002.

In 1985 the Bay of Quinte was identified as a vulnerable body of water by the International Joint Commission. A remedial action plan was developed to address the concerns of phosphorous nutrient overloading, bacteriological contamination, toxic contamination and loss of fish habitat.

The Bay of Quinte contains 18,000 square kilometers of drainage area. The Remedial Action Plan identifies 43 areas of concern. Since 1985 the Bay of Quinte has been on the list of the International Joint Commission which is charged with the responsibility to arbitrate and discuss any boundary issue about water quality. The Remedial Action Plan recommendations have not been legislated. However, the Ontario Ministry of the Environment rely heavily on these recommendations in considering granting Certificate of Approvals for sewage treatment expansion projects under section 53 of the Ontario Water Resources Act.

In 1997-98 the Ontario Ministry of the Environment placed a cap on phosphorous nutrient loading for the existing six sewage treatment plants currently discharging into the Bay of Quinte Watershed.

Currently Trenton and Deseronto plants have tertiary treatment for their sewage systems.

The Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory requires 16,000 cubic meters per day capacity for a sewage treatment plant capacity to handle our community's requirements over the next 20 years. This translates into 480 grams of phosphorous nutrient loading per day for discharge into the Bay of Quinte watershed.

On September 30, 2002 Council discussed the problems of the lack of phosphorous loading capacity for our proposed sewage treatment plant expansion plans and approved to contact the neighboring municipalities to see if we could acquire some of their surplus phosphorous loading credits.

Council expects it may be difficult to obtain these credits because the neighboring municipalities will be preserving their credits for future growth requirements.

In order to proceed with the construction of a new sewage treatment plant or the expansion of the Deseronto sewage plant it will be necessary for our community to obtain phosphorous loading capacity credits and a Certificate of Approval from the Ontario Ministry of the Environment. Without the MOE Certificate of Approval, Indian Affairs will not fund the construction of a new sewage treatment plant. To date Council has paid approximately \$130,000 to First Nations Engineering Ltd. to develop our capital plan. It is critical to resolve this issue.

AIAI Elders Conference

On September 17 and 18, 2002 our community was host to the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians Annual Elders Conference. I would like to thank the Health and Social staff, Councillor Christine Claus, Elmer Maracle, Alan Brant, Betty Maracle, Blaine Loft, Suzanne Brant, Jennifer Brant and Carl, Quinte Mohawk Dancers, the Mohawk Singers, Rev. Cheryl Watson, Steven Maracle, Alvin Maracle, the Mohawk Fire Department, The Orange Lodge Members, and the community catering groups who furnished such superb meals. The 150 people who attended the conference found it a very rewarding experience and many positive comments were made about the excellent hospitality extended by our community.

Congratulations to David W. Brant for receiving the Canadian Peacekeeping Services Medal from the Governor General for 25 years of peacekeeping service in the Canadian Armed Forces and Canadian Military Police. The medal was presented to David at the Tyendinaga Mohawk Community Center on September 17, 2002..



Tyendinaga Police Service



Between August 26th and September 22nd the Tyendinaga Police Service investigated 87 calls for service. Among these calls were several occurrences for which the Tyendinaga Police Service is requesting assistance from the community.

On August 26th, Tyendinaga Police Service received a report of a break in to a cottage that is located on Norway's road. The break in had occurred sometime in the previous two weeks. There did not appear to be anything taken, however, some sort of powder was spread throughout the cottage. There are no suspects at this time.

On August 27th, Tyendinaga Police Service received a report of a cottage on Gordon's Point being broken into. The owner of the cottage reported that a video camera and water bottles for a water cooler had been taken. There are no suspects at this time.

On August 27th, Tyendinaga Police Service received a report of a shed at a cottage on Gordon's Point being broken into. The owner advised that the shed had been entered sometime between the dates of August 23rd and 24th. Reported missing, was a green electric weed eater, a drill, some assorted tools and a reciprocating saw. There are no suspects at this time.

On September 9th, Tyendinaga Police were advised of a bicycle being stolen from a yard along York road. The bike was taken sometime in the previous four days, and is described as a girls, blue "Mud Slide" and is valued at approximately \$150.

Age-horsepower restrictions prohibit operators under the age of 16 years from operating craft above specified horsepower limits. This applies to the operation of pleasure craft fitted with a motor and used for recreational purposes. If an operator is accompanied and directly supervised in the pleasure craft by a person 16 years and older, the age-horsepower restrictions do not apply. These restrictions also prohibit persons under 16 years from operating personal watercraft regardless of whether they are accompanied by an adult.

The following table summarizes how these restrictions apply.

The *Competency of Operators of Pleasure Craft Regulations* require operators of pleasure craft fitted with a motor and used for recreational purposes to have proof of competency on board at all times. These requirements are being phased in over ten years (see table).

Operator competency requirements*

How this applies to operators** of pleasure craft fitted with a motor and used for recreational purposes	Date at which proof of competency required on board
All operators born after April 1, 1983	September 15, 1999
All operators of craft under 4 m in length, including personal watercraft	September 15, 2002
All operators	September 15, 2009

* These requirements apply in areas outside the Northwest and Nunavut Territories at this time.

** Applies to non-residents operating their pleasure craft in Canadian waters after 45 consecutive days. Operator card or equivalent issued to a non-resident by their state or country will be considered as proof of competency.

Proof of competency can take 1 of 3 forms:

- 1) proof of having taken a boating safety course prior to April 1, 1999.
- 2) a pleasure craft operator card issued following the successful completion of a Canadian Coast Guard accredited test;
- 3) a completed rental-boat safety checklist (for power-driven rental boats).

The operator card is good for life. Boaters can obtain their card after receiving a mark of at least 75% on a Canadian Coast Guard accredited test. Boaters also have the option of taking the test without first completing a course.

For a list of organizations that have accredited boating safety courses and tests, visit the Canadian Coast Guard web site at www.ccg-gcc.gc.ca or call the Boating Safety Infoline at 1 800 267-6687.

TIP: Certificates for boating safety courses completed before April 1, 1999 will be recognized.

If you've already taken a course prior to these regulations — and have proof — then that course certificate or card will be accepted as proof of competency!

Age-horsepower restrictions*

How this applies to operators of pleasure craft fitted with a motor and used for recreational purposes	Power restrictions
Under 12 years of age, and not directly supervised**	Can operate a vessel with no more than 10 hp (7.5 KW)
Between 12 years and under 16 years of age, and not directly supervised**	Can operate a vessel with no more than 40 hp (30 KW)
Under 16 years of age	Not allowed to operate a PWC***
16 years of age and over	No power restrictions

* These requirements apply in areas outside the Northwest and Nunavut Territories at this time.

** Directly supervised means: accompanied and directly supervised in the boat by a person 16 years of age or older.

*** Personal Watercraft

Note: These restrictions are made under the Boating Restriction Regulations and are not affected nor superseded by the Competency of Operators of Pleasure Craft Regulations. The Boating Restriction Regulations and Competency of Operators of Pleasure Craft Regulations are entirely separate regulations and their respective requirements should be looked at separately in order to avoid any confusion.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT SEPTEMBER 2002

At the September meeting of the Hastings and Prince Edward District School Board (HPEDSB) staff announced the results of the Grade 10 test of reading and writing that was written in February 2002. The good news is that 80% of the Grade 10 students who wrote the test met the literacy requirement for obtaining a Secondary School Graduation Diploma. The bad news is that 20%, one out of five students, have to repeat the reading portion or the writing portion or both parts of the test. All students who are working toward a diploma are required to write the test and pass it in addition to completing their course credits. All students take the same test, whether they are planning to go into the workplace after high school, or post-secondary education.

If a teacher considered that a student in Grade 10 was not ready to pass the test the student could be "deferred". That is, the student will be allowed to write the test at a later date. Across all the high schools in HPEDSB 10% of students were deferred and 2% were absent for one or both of the test days. When all the students who are working toward a diploma are counted, 70% of the group was successful.

Each student who took the test receives an Individual Student Report. Parents should review the results with their student(s). If the test was passed you can all breathe a sigh of relief. If the test was deferred or has to be repeated, you should check out what arrangements are being made to work on skills that need improvement.

We sometimes think of reading as decoding the writing on a page to make words and sentences. The reading test goes beyond that to test "comprehension". Does the student understand the information and ideas stated directly in the assigned piece of writing? Can he or she "read between the lines" to see information and ideas that are presented indirectly? Can the student make connections between personal knowledge and experience and the written material to help interpret the meaning of the piece?

The actual test had students read twelve selections and answer one hundred questions about what they read. There were three types of questions: multiple choice, short answer, and short answer with explanation, requiring students to justify their answers or explain their thinking.

In the writing component students were asked to write four pieces: a summary of a longer piece of writing they were given, a series of paragraphs expressing an opinion, a news report, and an information paragraph. Here the teachers doing the marking looked for specific skills: Can the student develop a main idea? Does he provide supporting details? Can she organize and link ideas and information? Does he use language and tone that fits the purpose and intended audience? Does she use correct spelling, grammar and punctuation?

If you think this is a lot to ask of students who have just completed Grade 9, you are right. The standards applied are those that prevail in the new Ontario curriculum. The new curriculum is designed to ensure that every student who graduates with a secondary school diploma has the communication skills to deal with the demands of work in an "information society".

What can families do to help ensure that their students sail through the

Grade 10 test of reading and writing? Start when your children are young to encourage reading as a fun adventure. Read with your young children. Talk to your ten-year-old about things he discovers in books. Get a library card from Kanhiote Library and spend time browsing there and talking to Karen and staff. Find out what your child enjoys reading. Educators have discovered that many girls like novels and stories about people and relationships. Many boys like newspapers or reading that helps them learn useful things.

If your son or daughter is uninterested in reading or having difficulty, talk to his or her teacher about what the stumbling block might be. A few students have a condition called "dyslexia" (which means "difficult reading") affecting the way they see and organize letters on a page. Dyslexia requires specialized help, just as difficulty in speaking requires speech therapy. Most of the time, difficulty with reading means some building block in the development of reading skills has been missed. Teachers are becoming better at diagnosing missing skills and filling in the blanks. Television commercials that sell reading programs like "Hooked on Phonics" show grinning children who have overcome a reading block and discovered the joy of reading. I don't know about the success of packaged programs but I do know that when students find "I can do it!" they experience a great burst of energy and excitement.

The Effects of Domestic Violence on Children

Are children aware of what is going on?

Yes. Although they will not have an adult understanding of what is happening, they will recognize and be affected by domestic violence. A child's response to the violence will vary depending on his or her age. Even very young children will experience anxiety over conflicts at home. Domestic violence is a crime against all family members but often the forgotten victims are the children. We can no longer accept that children are not affected by the physical and verbal battles of their family members. Although most parents think that their children do not know about the violence, studies indicate they do. Studies show that children are in the same room or in an adjacent room in 90% of domestic violence cases.

What are the emotional and behavioural consequences for children who witness violence in their homes?

Results vary from studies completed on effects of witnessing domestic violence. They generally show children exhibit behavioural and emotional problems, cognitive functioning problems, and longer-term problems. The following are possible behaviour and emotional problems:

- o Constant anxiety that can result in physical complaints caused by stress (i.e. headaches, ulcers, rashes), speech problems or hearing problems.
- o Developmental delays and learning disorders
- o Guilt for not being able to stop the abuse or for loving the abuser
- o Taking responsibility for the abuse and feeling helpless to change the situation
- o Low self-esteem, fearfulness, depression and sometimes suicide
- o Delinquent behaviours including aggression, substance abuse and running away from home
- o Poorly developed social skills
- o Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

Children who witness marital violence

Pre-schooler witnesses to marital violence may show: ~ Poor health and eating/sleeping habits ~ Excessive crying or screaming ~ Difficulties relating to peers and adults.

School-aged witnesses may show: ~ Erratic school attendance ~ Poor achievement, concentration and peer relations ~ School phobias, nightmares, bed wetting etc. Compared with peers, girls and boys may show more fear, anxiety, withdrawal etc., and boys may show more aggression, disobedience, destructiveness etc.

Adolescent witnesses may show: ~ Anxiety, hostility, aggression ~ Run-away behaviour and suicidal tendencies. Boys may become abusive in relationships with females. Girls may distrust men, be negative about marriage and be future victims of violent relationships

It is critical to remember that children who observe domestic violence will have varying reactions to the violence.

Are children who witness domestic violence at risk for other problems?

Children who witness violence also show more anxiety, aggression, depression and temperament problems, less empathy and self-esteem, and lower verbal, cognitive, and motor abilities, than children who do not witness violence at home.

Not only are children at risk for observing domestic violence, but they are also at risk for the following:

- o Children may sustain physical injuries or die as a result of either intentional harm to the child (i.e. when a child is protecting the parent) or accidental injury.
- o Older children may be at risk for committing criminal acts, including murder, to end the violence.
- o Children may also be victims of physical abuse or neglect by either parent/partner.
- o More than 50% of both male abusers and abused women who are mothers abuse their children.
- o Boys who witness domestic violence are more likely to batter their female partners as adults than boys raised in non-violent homes. There is no evidence, however, that girls who witness their mothers' abuse have a higher risk of being battered as adults.

The most important factor in the adjustment by children is a secure parent-child attachment. It may buffer kids from effects of exposure to violence. Additionally, support from other adults is critical for the improved development of the child.

Research to date has provided only limited answers to the many questions that arrive when studying this issue. Most studies are based on surveys designed to collect information on other topics. As a result, many questions remain unanswered. However, we can conclude that witnessing domestic violence has an impact on children.


Parents Have the Most Influence to Keep Their Children Free From Violence

- Be a role model.
- Be aware that everything you do, they see and do.
- Talk to them, and most important, listen to them.
- Let them know they can talk to you about anything. Good communication will make them more likely to ask you for advice than their peers.
- Spend valuable time with them that includes fun activities.
- Find out who their friends are and whether they are a positive influence.
- Find out where they hang out and/or play and make sure it is safe.
- Help them set short-term and long-term goals and help them plan to reach their dreams.
- Be involved with their education. Review their homework, meet teachers, and participate in school activities.
- Let them know you disapprove of fighting.
- Keep your children drug-free.
- Teach your children that there are consequences for inappropriate behaviour.

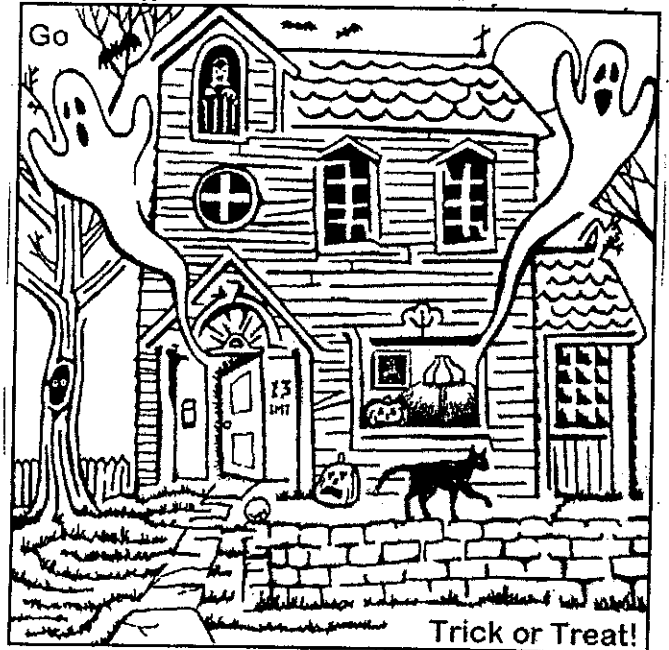

20 Ways to Beat the Allergy Blues

Airborne Allergies

- Keep the grass short but have someone else do the mowing. If you can't avoid yard duty, wear a mask when you mow.
- Don't dry clothes outdoors, Pollen bonds to fabric.
- Allergic to molds? Plan outdoor activities when the weather's hot and dry.
- Ban smoking at home and at work. Smoke only aggravates allergies.
- If you have hay fever, stay indoors when pollen is high. Avoid parks, woods and gardens during allergy season. Save errands for late afternoon or after it rains. Pollen is worst during early hours and on dry, windy days.
- Wash that pollen out of your hair - shower and shampoo frequently
- Consider your allergies when planning a vacation. Ask your doctor to suggest a spot where the source of your allergy isn't in bloom during your holiday.
- Don't move just to avoid your allergies. You may develop new ones.
- If you garden, avoid choosing plants, trees, grasses and weed with tiny flowers, such as goldenrod.
- Try to keep windows closed wherever you are.

Insect Allergies

- Never go outside when you are barefoot. And keep an eye out for insect colonies, nests and lives.
- Opt for light-coloured clothing, such as whites and tans. Avoid blues, yellows - any colour resembling flower
- Don't paint, cook meals or feed pets outside. The scents attract bugs.
- Limit the use of perfume, hair spray or suntan lotion - more bug seducers.
- Don't panic if an insect lands on you. Stay calm and gently brush it away.
- See a doctor if you have a reaction to an insect bite. There's a 60-percent chance you'll have a worse reaction the next time you're bitten.

Animal Allergies

- When choosing a pet, a dog is safer than a cat - but a fish is even better!
- If you must have a dog or cat, choose a shorthaired breed without a tick undercoat.
- Wash animals frequently and try to keep them out of your bedroom.
- Avoid feather-or-down-filled pillows, comforters and other products.

Home Remedies - Allergy-proof your home:

- Wash bedding - linens, blankets and bedspreads - in very hot water at least once a week to kill those mighty dust mites.
- Vacuum upholstered furniture weekly to remove allergens.
- Remove rugs or carpeting from the bedroom, family room and other places where you spend a lot of time.
- Encase pillows, pillows, mattresses and box springs in zippered dustproof covers.
- Some allergy sufferers benefit from a dehumidifier. Ask your doctor whether it's appropriate to your allergy and the climate where you live.
- Invest in a High-Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) filter. It does the job in labs and industries where clean environments are essential.
- Kill moulds by regularly washing bathroom surfaces with a solution of one-quarter cup bleach to a gallon of water.
- Replace heavy draperies with lightweight curtains that can be washed often.
- Resist your green thumb. African violets, geraniums and other moisture-loving indoor plants present moulds with a welcome environment.
- Run the air conditioner often and change its filter frequently

THE BREASTFEEDING CIRCLE

TRUE OR FALSE ?

Nursing mothers have to avoid eating certain foods like chocolate, cabbage, garlic, & spicy foods.

False. There are no healthy foods which need to be avoided routinely. Eat your usual healthy foods in moderation. If you find a particular food you eat bothers your nursing baby, avoid it while your baby is young and try it again later on. Foods most likely to bother some sensitive babies are those to which a family member is sensitive and foods you ate a lot of during your pregnancy with that baby.

A tongue-tied baby may not be able to suck well to get enough milk, and his/her mother may develop sore nipples, low milk supply, plugged ducts &/or mastitis.

True. There is a high incidence of tongue-tie among native born babies in this area. Tongue tie can be fixed easily and painlessly, without anaesthetic and without bleeding.

Your baby will have to learn to take a bottle before you go back to work or school.

False. There is no reason your baby has to learn to use a bottle at all. There is no great advantage in a baby taking a bottle. Bottles increase the chance of infections and contribute to dental problems. The baby can be fed by cup, spoon, bowl, or dropper in the mother's absence. If a mother is not going to outside work till around or after the first 6 months, the baby will probably be ready to start solid foods by then and can continue to nurse when mother is available.

MOISTURE PROBLEMS



If the air in your house is too moist, your house structure and your personal possessions may be damaged. Air can hold only so much water.

When warm, moist air comes into contact with a surface that is too cold, it releases condensation. The water and frost that you see collecting on windows is a visible example. Condensation may also be soaking into your roof sheathing, exterior walls and insulation, where hidden leaks are releasing humid house air to the outside. Over the long term, the result may be damage to the house structure.

Air Quality Problems

Stale air is a health hazard. For the health of everyone in your home, your house (like you) should breathe properly. If it doesn't, the air in your home can become polluted with harmful chemicals released from synthetic fabrics, furnishings, household products, cigarette smoke and improperly maintained or vented combustion devices, such as cooking stoves, furnaces, water heaters, wood stoves and fireplaces..

Mould and Mildew

Problems

Mould and mildew fungi can cause:

- unsightly stains
- damaged paint, wood, drywall and fabrics
- allergies
- illness

Some symptoms

- Musty smells
- Green or black marks on the inside surface of outer walls or ceilings
- Stains in wet areas of carpets
- Mildew on drapes and backs of furniture

Prevention

Fungi (such as the wood rot, mould and mildew varieties) require high humidity levels to survive. Some fungi require condensation to start growing. Certain fungi actually generate moisture and then continue growing even when condensation stops. To Avoid Most Mould And Mildew Problems, Keep Materials Dry.

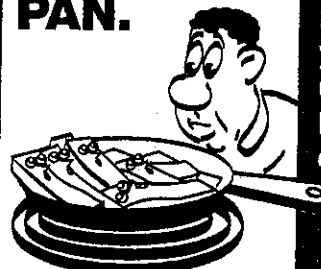
Clean-up methods

Mould and mildew on surfaces can be cleaned up with a solution of one part chlorine bleach in four parts of water.

- When applying:
- ventilate well
 - use gloves
 - let stand 10 - 15 minutes
 - rinse well
 - keep surfaces dry

Mould and mildew-stained fabrics should be removed and discarded.

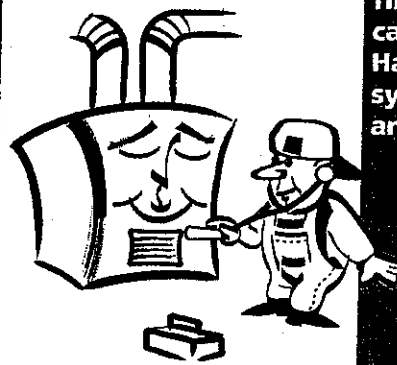



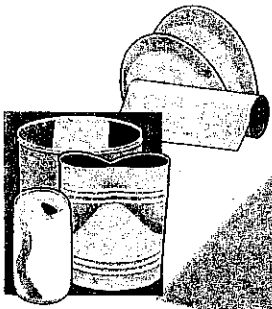

A Recycling Reminder

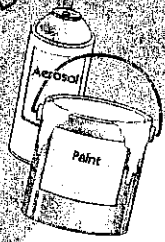
Hang this on your wall!

Bring these items to your depot



Metal Cans & Foil

Rinse cans. Place lids in a can, pinch closed and put loose in blue bin. **Do not put aluminum cans inside tin ones.** Include clean aluminum foil and pie plates. **Flattened cans save space!** **No** pots, cigarette or butter wrappers or scrap metal. Avoid putting pop cans inside other cans.



Empty Aerosol and Paint Cans

Make sure metal containers are empty. Take lids off the paint cans to let them dry, and place in the blue bin — **don't bag them.** **No** containers with product, paint cans larger than 4 litres (1 gallon), plastic paint cans, propane cylinders or other hazardous waste.



Plastic Containers

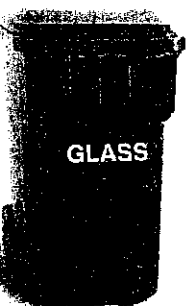
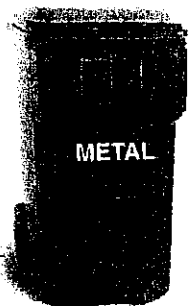
Discard tops and rinse containers for soft drinks, detergents, juice, bleach, shampoo, dairy products as well as clear and foam plastic cups, trays and packaging. Flatten soft drink containers and replace lids. All plastics with the numbers 1 to 6 on the bottom are OK. **No** blister or bubblepacks, prescription bottles or toys.



Bottles & Jars

Remove and rinse caps and lids. Metal lids can be recycled with cans. Leave loose in the blue bin. **Don't bag them.** **No** other types of glass such as kitchenware, ceramics, dishes, drinking glasses, window glass, light bulbs or mirrors.

Place in appropriately labelled bins.



Boxboard and Mixed Paper

Bundle junk mail and office paper separately from Boxboard. Flatten and stuff boxboard into a large box. **Boxboard** includes cereal shoe and detergent boxes as well as rinsed milk and juice cartons, paper bags, sugar & flour bags, cardboard tubes, books (hard cover & paperback), egg cartons and other clean paper packaging. **No** drink boxes, tissue paper towel or laminated paper. Do not put paper loose in blue bin.

Plastic Bags

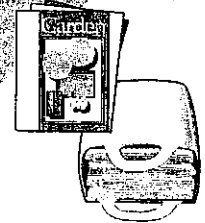
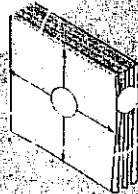
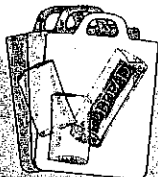
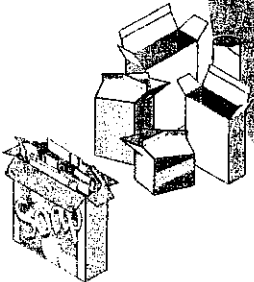
Stuff clean, dry plastic bags into a plastic bag and tie handles. Include rinsed milk pouches, grocery, bread, dry cleaning, frozen vegetable and blue newspaper bags as well as outer wrapper from toilet and hand tissues. Remove food residue, stickers and receipts. **No** meat, cheese or stretch wrap, cereal box liners or chip bags.

Corrugated Cardboard

Flatten and bundle corrugated cardboard boxes into a maximum size of 30" x 30" x 8" bundles. Only broken down and bundled boxes will be collected. **No** waxed boxes, soiled pizza boxes.

Newspapers & Magazines

Place newspapers, inserts, phone books, magazines and catalogues in a plastic bag next to your blue bin. **No** soiled newspapers. Keep boxboard and mixed paper separate, not mixed with newspaper and magazines.

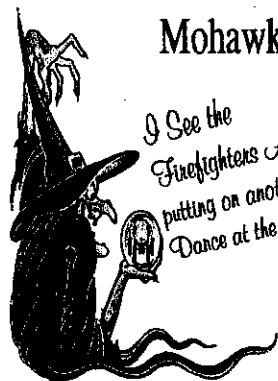

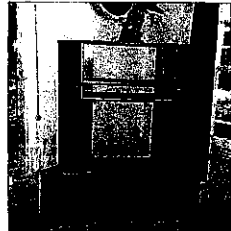
