MINISTRY OF HEALTH & LONG-TERM CARE FUNDING

On July 18, 2006, I received a letter from George Smitherman, Ontario Minister of Health advising of the new funding commitments for First Nations communities in 2006-07. In his letter, Mr. Smitherman has committed \$6.0 million dollars for First Nation communities. The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte's share of the new funding is \$416,800.00. I enclose a copy of Mr. Smitherman's letter for your perusal.

GREEN LANE LANDFILL – St Thomas, Ontario

On September 19, 2006, Toronto City Council voted 26 – 12 in favour of purchasing Green Lane Landfill near St. Thomas Ontario. M.P.P. Ernie Parson responded to the decision on September 22, 2006 in the Belleville Intelligencer by stating "the City of Toronto's decision to buy a landfill site in St. Thomas should eliminate any need to expand the Richmond dump near Napanee. Certainly I'm pleased because it removes any pressure to bring their garbage to the area. Toronto has found a solution to its garbage and without Toronto, I don't think there is a need for another mega-dump in Ontario for Toronto's garbage."

Toronto announced that it will buy the Green Lane Landfill south of London because it will no longer be permitted to truck garbage to Michigan after 2010.

Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte and Tyendinaga Township residents have been fighting the Richmond Landfill expansion for more than eight years and are urging the Minister of the Environment, Laurel Broten to reject Waste Management of Canada's controversial bid to expand the landfill sixfold and to deny Waste Management's request to send it to an Environmental Review Tribunal. Minister Broten is expected to make her decision before October 13, 2006.

AMENDMENTS TO ONTARIO RETAIL SALES TAX – PURCHASE OF MOTOR VEHICLES

On September 12, I received a copy of the amended policy on the application of retail sales tax (RST) to motor vehicles purchased by status Indians, Indian Bands, and Band Councils. Attached is a copy for your perusal.

It was a great honour to welcome the Canada World Youth to Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory on September 19, 2006. There were twenty youth participants from all over the world involved in the Tyendinaga/Napanee Peru Program with the focus on meeting various community members and to learn more about Tyendinaga and our culture. Dear Chief Maracle:

The McGuinty government is continuing its ambitious reform of health care in Ontario. Over the past three years, this government has made unprecedented investments in primary care, long-term care homes, home care and in mental health. This year, the government is building opportunities for Ontarians to achieve better health through new programs to promote health and prevent illness, better access to doctors and nurses and shorter wait times for key services.

The government's investment in health care will grow by an additional \$1.9 billion to \$35.4 billion in 2006-07, rising to \$38.8 billion in 2008-09.

I am pleased to confirm that our government is approving an additional \$13.9 million in community services, including community support services, acquired brain injury and assisted living services in supportive housing funding bringing total funding to \$507.1 million in 2006-07.

ADMINISTRATION

Within the \$507.1 million, I have committed \$6.0 million for First Nation communities. In 2005-06, my ministry allocated \$285,000 in base funding to First Nations providing community services. A base funding increase for 2006/07 of \$129,300 for First Nations providing community services was included as part of our government's May 1, 2006 home care funding announcement. Of the remaining funding, \$1.0 million is being allocated to the Chiefs of Ontario to plan and coordinate training of First Nation employees involved in the delivery of community support services. The remaining \$4,585,700 is available to expand community support services in First Nation communities.


A plan for the allocation of these expansion funds was developed in consultation with Chiefs of Ontario and was informed by their survey, environmental scan and focus groups. The funding allocation considered the population needs of Ontario First Nations, each First Nation's access to on-reserve provincial funded health services, and remoteness of the First Nation. Your organization's share of this new funding is \$416,800.

Your funding increase is contingent upon review of your proposed service plan and budget, and approval and execution of a 2006-07 service agreement that includes client and service targets and other accountability expectations. New funding will flow shortly after receipt of your signed 2006-07 service agreement.

If you currently do not have a community service agreement with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care, you will need to discuss the requirements with ministry staff at your local regional office.

I would like to take this opportunity to again convey my sincere appreciation for the considerable contributions all members of your organization make in the provision of health services in your communities.

Dear Sir/Madam

Please be advised that the Ministry has amended its policy on the application of retail sales tax (RST) to motor vehicles purchased by Status Indians, Indian bands, and band councils.

The Ontario *Retail Sales Tax Act* provides for an exemption from RST on taxable goods situated on a reserve, when these goods are purchased by a Status Indian, Indian band, or band council.

In the past, motor vehicle vendors were required to obtain proof that a given vehicle was registered to a reserve address before completing the sale on an RST-exempt basis. Vehicles purchased by Status Indians, Indian bands, and band councils and registered to non-reserve addresses were subject to RST, regardless of the fact that a federal "Certificate of Indian Status" card may have been provided and/or that the vehicle may have been delivered to a reserve address.

Under the revised policy now in effect, vehicles purchased on-reserve by Status Indians, Indian bands, and band councils are not subject to RST. Vehicles purchased off-reserve now similarly qualify for exemption from RST provided:

- the vehicle is registered to a reserve address and the purchaser shows their "Certificate of Indian Status" (individual Status Indians) or issues a valid Purchase Exemption Certificate (Indian bands or band councils),

OR

- the vehicle is registered to a non-reserve address, the purchaser shows their "Certificate of Indian Status" (individual Status Indians) or issues a valid PEC (Indian bands or band councils), and the vendor arranges to have the vehicle delivered to a reserve.

In order to substantiate the non-collection of RST on motor vehicle sales to Status Indians, Indian bands, and band councils, vendors are expected to:

- record the "Certificate of Indian Status" card number, name, and Indian band or registry number of individual purchasers,

OR

- retain Purchase Exemption Certificates issued by Indian bands or band councils,

AND

- retain documentation showing that the vehicles are either registered to reserve addresses or were delivered to reserves.

As previously discussed the County of Hastings and the City of Belleville are undertaking work on County Road 2 and Burns Drive Bridge.



First Nations Technical Institute only received 50% of the Provincial Program Funding this fiscal year.

Whereas the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council has deemed our language to be a vital component of our Mohawk Culture;
Whereas the Tsi Kionhnheht Ne Onkwawenna Language Circle, in partnership with FNTI and Trent University, is offering a two year diploma program in Mohawk and culture,
And Whereas the MBQ post secondary education funding from INAC has fallen substantially short of student requests,
Therefore Be It Resolved that the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council approve to utilize the Casino Rama funds under the Cultural Development component in the amount of \$204,544.00 for the Tsi Kionhnheht Ne Onkwawenna Language Circle to provide tuition, living allowance and books for up to 17 students who meet the course requirements for the 2006/2007 academic year; and further that the post secondary education department of MBQ will administer the funds according to MBQ post secondary education policies. Carried.

This initiative will free up 7 spots in the regular post secondary program.

Rod Jeffries provided an update on the Tyendinaga Community Safety Commission and the need to establish a working group to develop the terms of reference for the commission.

Rod Jeffries informed Council that FNTI wanted to meet on the development of a new education complex and the construction of a hotel complex which would be for tourism, community development, and a hotel management training facility. The new facility is proposed to be built on band property in Hickory Lane area.

The meeting is scheduled at FNTI on September 6, 2006 at noon to discuss the FNTI/MBQ partnership on the development of a new FNTI Educational Campus and a hotel/conference centre.

Rod Jeffries has completed five months of his six month contract which expires on September 30, 2006. Council will entertain an extension to the contract which will be brought back to council before this end of September 2006.

Rod is negotiating with FNTI to move Technical Services over to the FNTI building to make room for the new staff which will be starting in the next few months.


Rod reported that the Home Support Program will be moving to the B.J. Pole Line Building which will be rented by MBQ.

Ohahase Education Centre is operated by First Nations Technical Institute to provide programs for students seeking to achieve an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (O.S.S.D.). Ohahase means "new road" in the Mohawk Language and that is why we say it is "Your Future Path to Success"! Ohahase is a Private Secondary School that is inspected and licensed by the Ontario Ministry of Education. Each year our curriculum and guidelines are inspected and the Principal is granted a license to operate and grant credits. Ohahase currently offers two programs; a full-time day program for youth and an adult program of correspondence and night school.

Program Mission

Ohahase....

Is a centre for excellence, providing holistic and respectful learning rooted in Mohawk language and cultural practices; and

Will facilitate a multigenerational community that fosters belonging through encouragement, motivation and laughter – striving for the goals of self-sufficiency and biculturalism.

Learning Programs

Full-time Day Program for Youth

This program is a Private Secondary School program currently for grade nine and ten students. There is no tuition charge or fees for status Native students or community residents as the school is funded by Indian and Northern Affairs Canada. The program consists of regular semester periods in which students take a maximum of four classes per day in each semester. We offer a unique and challenging curriculum that meets Ontario guidelines and includes aspects of Mohawk language and culture. Students of all ages and levels of ability are welcomed as we are able to provide a small teacher-student ratio. We have been in operation three years and will expand to include grade eleven and twelve in the immediate future.

Courses/Program Requirements

Students are required to earn 30 credits to achieve an O.S.S.D. (18 compulsory and 12 optional credits). Our grade 9 and 10 programs in the past have included the following courses:

Adult Education Program

This program is designed as a self-directed learning program with a support system. Adults are offered correspondence courses from the Independent Learning Centre that are approved by the Ministry of Education. Students may work at their own pace and staff at the school, are available to provide assistance when required. The length of the program varies depending on the number of credits required for graduation.

Courses/Program Requirements

O.S.S.D (Ontario Secondary School Diploma) requires students to earn 30 credits. Credits may be earned from high school subjects, maturity credits or equivalency credits. At least 4 credits must be senior credits (grade 11 or 12) and a senior English credit must be included.

Maturity Credits – the Ministry of education grants up to 12 mature credits to adults returning to school. These credits apply to adult students who started high school in the Province of Ontario before September 1999.

Equivalency Credits – some non-post secondary courses that adult students have taken qualify for credits, i.e. apprenticeship training, community college upgrading, etc.

All courses are divided into 20 lessons. Each course is 1 credit unless otherwise stated. Courses are offered at various levels of learning to accommodate educational goals related to work, attending College or University. There is no fee for community members to take a course through correspondence, as the initial registration fees are subsidized by local community service organizations.

Night school is offered periodically and in the past we have offered courses in English, Presentations and Public Speaking Skills, Computers, Math and Mohawk language. Other non-credit workshop courses are available periodically such as leather crafts (moccasins).

Trustee Report: September, 2006.

The 2006/2007 school year is now well underway with teachers and students settling in and focusing on making this a quality year for everyone involved.

The Aboriginal Education Office in Toronto is currently requesting feedback on the draft document entitled Aboriginal Education Policy Framework. This will include submissions from the Chiefs of Ontario, Native Organizations, Boards of Education, University Faculties of Education and individual First Nation Territories.

On September 14th, a team of seven representatives from the Hastings and Prince Edward District School Board attended a regional meeting in Kempenville which was one of six regional meetings that the Aboriginal Education Office hosted to obtain feedback to the draft document entitled Aboriginal Education Policy Framework. There were a total of nine Boards of Education and representatives from two University Faculties of Education in attendance.

When the day was over there appeared to be tremendous support for the draft document with the feedback from all representatives agreeing that certain changes and additions would make the draft document more meaningful and would partner more with Aboriginal People to improve the quality of education for Aboriginal People across the province.

Education representatives from Tyendinaga will also be forwarding a response to the Aboriginal Education Office in Toronto which will recognize local needs and interests of our community. This must be completed and sent in by September 29th, 2006.

The process includes timelines and reporting dates by the Aboriginal Education Office in Toronto to keep all stakeholders up to date. The final result will be the development of an Aboriginal Education Policy by the Ministry of Education for Ontario that focuses on and improves the quality of education for Aboriginal People across Ontario.

This represents a major step forward in addressing Aboriginal education by the Ministry of Education for Ontario and they seem to be involving Aboriginal People as partners which can only result in improving the quality of education for our people.

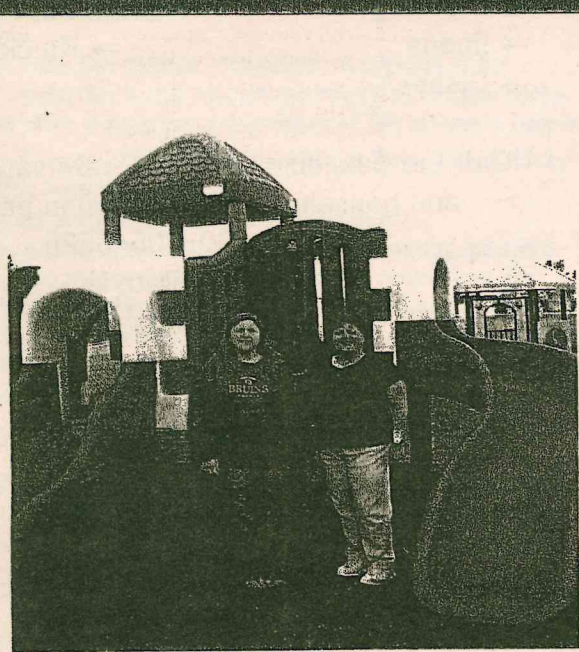

And ash created by backyard garbage burning often contains toxic metals such as mercury, lead, chromium and arsenic. Improper disposal of the ash, can cause soil contamination, and then eventually water contamination.

October is Child Abuse Prevention Month in Ontario

All of us know that child abuse exists in society, and we may personally know families where domestic violence or child abuse is occurring right now. We might not all be able to tell the signs and signals of child abuse, or know what to do if we suspect that a child that we know is being abused. Children are our future, and it is the responsibility of everyone in our community to make sure that all of our children grow up in an environment where they are safe, strong, and well-cared-for.

Because of the unique and special needs of children, it is important that they are cared for and nurtured from the moment that they are born until they reach adulthood. The ways in which children are abused differ from that of adults, because they are reliant on their caregivers – they are too young to live on their own, to work, or to take care of themselves in the same way that adults are able to do so.

Children may be abused in several different ways:

- **Physical abuse** is any deliberate force or action that results (or could result) in an injury to a child, including punching, hitting, kicking, slapping, shoving, biting, burning, or hitting or striking with an object.
- **Sexual abuse** is any sexual contact between an adult and a child, or an older child and a child; this can include direct contact, forcing a child into a sexual act, forcing a child to perform a sexual act on another person or child, deliberately exposing a child to pornography, or forcing a child to touch him or herself in a sexual way.
- **Emotional and verbal abuse** includes yelling, screaming, excessive teasing, name-calling, put-downs, insults, ignoring, isolation, as well as withholding love and emotional support of a child; while not resulting in physical injury, emotional abuse can nevertheless have devastating results on a child's self-esteem and self-worth.
- **Neglect** is the failure of the parent or caregiver to meet a child's basic needs, for food, clothing, shelter, sleep, adequate medical attention, education, and protection from harm.

Neglect is not always deliberate in nature; some parents and caregivers may have been abused themselves as children and, because they were never exposed to loving and nurturing care themselves, may not know how to care for their own children. However, while this cycle of violence and neglect may be a cause of child abuse, it is not an excuse for it – there is no excuse for harming a child, and any child who is being abused deserves the full protection of society and the law.

So what can you do if a child comes to you and tells you that he or she is being abused, or that there is abuse in his or her family?

- Stay calm and listen.
- Reassure the child and let him or her know that you believe what they are saying, and they were right to tell you about it.
- Let the child know that what has happened is not his or her fault, and that you are sorry that it has happened.
- Do not promise to keep it a secret.
- Do not promise that everything is going to be okay immediately – investigations can take a long time.
- Do contact someone and report the abuse.

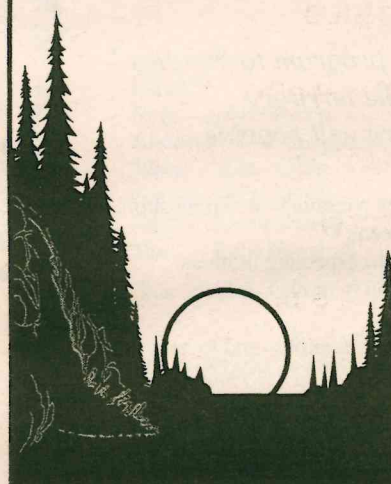
If you suspect that a child you know is in danger, there are several agencies available that can offer help and information. If a child is in immediate physical or sexual danger, contact the police via 911. If the child is not in immediate danger but you suspect he or she has been abused or is in danger of being abused, you can contact any of the following agencies:

- Deseronto and Napanee OPP (613-354-3369)
- Mohawk Family Services (613-967-0122)
- the Children's Aid Society (613-962-9291)

A child who needs help can turn to a trusted adult, their family doctor or nurse, teacher, minister, or social worker. There is also the Kid's Help Phone (1-800-668-6868), which is free and anonymous and provides help and support for kids in need.

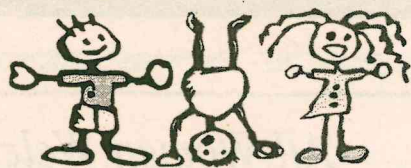

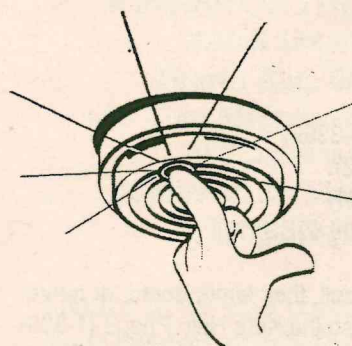

BREASTFEEDING CIRCLE

When is World Breastfeeding Week, and what is this year's theme?

October 1st to 7th is World Breastfeeding Week in Canada. The first week of October, the 10th month of the year, is chosen to celebrate because it is the first week of life, after 9 months of gestation, that a baby starts to breastfeed. This year's theme is *The International Code: Protecting Infant Health for 25 Years*. The International Code (also referred to as The WHO Code and The Code) is a document created in 1981 by the World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF that regulates the advertising of infant formula and other breastmilk substitutes in a way that prevents the undermining of breastfeeding.

The key precepts of the International Code state that there should be no advertising of breastmilk substitutes to the public, no promotion of such products through the health care system, and infant formula must not be portrayed as equally healthy as breastmilk. Aggressive marketing of breastmilk substitutes has been shown to lead to drastic declines in breastfeeding rates.

Not only does the use of artificial baby milk lead to increased health risks, but the proper use of infant formula requires clean water, good sanitation, literacy, and an adequate family income. In many communities safe water may be scarce or unreliable, illiteracy rates and poverty are high, and yet formula companies persist in attempting to convince mothers in these regions to feed their babies artificial milk.

The International Code isn't only important in the poor communities however, as studies have shown that formula-fed babies everywhere are at increased risk of childhood cancer, asthma, ear and respiratory infections, allergies, diabetes, gastrointestinal infections; score lower on IQ and vocabulary tests; and as adults are at increased risk for cardiovascular disease and obesity.

Although the International Code was ratified (endorsed) by all 182 member countries in the World Health Assembly, it has been passed into national law by only 60 nations. Canada and the United States are not among them. This is one main reason why we have such a low number of certified Baby Friendly hospitals in Canada, why formula is frequently pushed on new mothers in hospitals, and why there is so much formula advertising, samples, coupons, and special offers from formula and baby food companies. World Breastfeeding Week events will highlight the need to legislate the Code and promote the wellbeing of our most vulnerable members of society.

POSTCARDS FROM THE VISION QUEST
by Joseph Brant

Figuring out the “who” and the “how” of Native literature

So I finally picked up this book I found myself so excited about a few weeks ago. It was a Saturday, if I recall, and I happened upon this newspaper article about someone named David Treuer. Turns out he’s written three novels* and one book of non-fiction. Both the latest novel, called “The Translation of Dr Apelles,” and the non-fiction book, “Native American Fiction: A User’s Manual” came out that week, so immediately I got copies of each.

And it took until now, the last week of September, for me to pick the darned thing up. “Native American Fiction” is rightly subtitled “A User’s Manual” because, as he says, it is written with the intention not to criticize writers and their work but to suggest we as readers look at these books differently.

And that is something the nerd in me finds FASCINATING!!!

I’m almost halfway through the book and I’m just riveted. First of all, Treuer is Ojibwe from northern Minnesota. He teaches at a university and, from what I can find online, he apparently went to one of the more prestigious American colleges more than a few years ago. His first two novels were well received, by the critics, but—if proof that I’ve never heard of him is any indication—he’s not a superstar.

The simple idea is that we, as readers, look for meaning where we think we’ll find it rather than looking deeper to find exactly what makes literature by Native people just that. He’s beyond the logic that suggests anyone who is Native is therefore a writer of Native literature: if I, for example, wrote a novel explicitly about country music in the 1970s, would that be considered Native literature?

Likewise: if some white dude (and there’ve been many, as we all know) writes about life on the rez and claims it Native literature, who’s the best person to argue with that?

Interesting questions, yes, but he goes deeper to acknowledge that we—as Native people—have long been part of the mythology of life in North America, that because we are so few in number, and so rarely seen widely, most people create an idea of what “Native” is and, when they read a book by Louise Erdrich, for example, they see what they expect to see. And to some extent, we do too.

Reviewers have been complicit, he says, when they’ve read these works. The most fascinating part of the book I’ve come upon so far is his discovery that Erdrich’s use of the Ojibwe language in her most successful work, “Love Medicine,” is not just a freestanding use of language that simply—on its face—proves that it’s Native art, but that the melding of Ojibwe and English together, when used by Native characters (who, like us, speak English first), is indicative of the ways the characters (like us) WANT to use the culture, but are imperfect at it.

The best reading of Native literature, he says, doesn’t just assume that the work is Native because it says it’s Native. Some reviewers, he says, cited “Love Medicine” as uniquely Native because the narrative is shared among different characters in the story—an assertion, he says, is not necessarily false as much as its not that unique.

A reading of the book that respects “literature” as opposed to the assumptions of “culture” makes for a more sound understanding of these books. The example above is therefore a more exact description of life as Native people today live it, even if it took an ten mile winding road to get there, versus life as we (Native and non-) think it should be lived.

And I’m gonna say it again: that is FASCINATING!!!

The book, as far as I’ve gone in it, also presents interesting questions about what exactly would be considered a Mohawk style of storytelling, for example. There is a history, we all know, of allowing an individual to take his/her turn telling a story we all know, and the freedom that comes from taking that 7000th turn telling it: to make it your own in your own way, the draw it out because we all know the ending.

But does that, by definition, make it a culturally unique way of storytelling?

Lots to ponder.

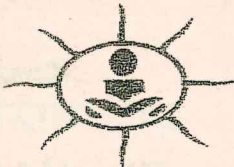
