

Aboriginals to Lead Hide Collection Program

Natural Resources Minister Howard Hampton and Grand Council Chief Joe Miskokomon today announced that the Union of Ontario Indians and the Ministry of Natural Resources are working together to establish greater Aboriginal participation in an annual hide collection program.

The Union of Ontario Indians is administering and coordinating the hat incentive aspect of the program for the 1993 hunting season.

"We see this as an important step in helping Aboriginal communities and artisans in Ontario to explore all aspects of the hide program for ways to generate economic opportunities," said Mr. Hampton. "We are working in partnership with the union to establish greater Aboriginal participation in the collection of hides."

"This is an important step toward ensuring a continuation of a successful program," said Grand Council Chief Joe Miskokomon. "It enables Aboriginals in Ontario to access a resource that supports traditional heritage, economic gain, and promotes the total use of harvested animals.

"The Union has always recognized the importance of this program, and will continue to promote this native and non-native venture that enhances co-operation and mutual interests," Chief Miskokomon added.

The hide program allows hunters to drop off animal skins at designated collection sites throughout the province. Many of these hides are used by Aboriginal artisans for craft making. There is strong consumer demand for authentic Aboriginal leather crafts.

The original program got its start more than 20 years ago as a way to provide Aboriginal artisans with tanned or untanned hides for making crafts and leather goods. Hunters receive a hat in exchange for contributing a hide.

Hunters who contribute a moose, deer or bear hide to the program receive a bright orange cap. Traditionally, the Ministry of Natural Resources has collected and distributed the hides and outfitted participating hunters with hats.

Starting this fall, hunters who contribute a moose, deer or bear hide will receive their hats from local Aboriginal-sponsored collection agents. BRT Trading Ltd. will make tanned hides available to Aboriginal artisans.

Three hat logos have been designed by the union that will appeal to hunters who collect hats. A different logo will be displayed on the hats for three consecutive years starting with a deer emblem in 1993. A moose will be featured on 1994 hats followed by a bear in 1995.

MNR will continue its commitment to deliver raw hides to remote Aboriginal communities in Red Lake and Sioux Lookout District. Hides will also be sent to Aboriginal communities on the coastline of Hudson Bay and James Bay.

The decision to switch the program operation is based on the recommendation of the Federal-Provincial Resource Development Agreement Committee (RDAC). RDAC provides funding for Aboriginal economic development opportunities that are based on renewable natural resources.

Hide collection would be received this year at a storage building directly across the Tyendinaga Airport on Airport Road, starting October 18, 1993 to no later than December 4, 1993.

The Future of Training in Aboriginal Policing starts with Traditional Ojibway Ceremonies at Cranberry Inn Training Session

Next weekend, Cranberry Inn will be home to leading edge peacekeeping and law enforcement training techniques as Toronto's Loss Protection Services Training Institute holds an innovative workshop weekend to help law enforcement trainers understand the cultural uniqueness of the aboriginal students they will be training to work within Canada's aboriginal communities.

Clayton Mitchell, who serves as Aboriginal Programmes Director at the Institute and who is also a veteran Metropolitan Toronto Police officer currently with the Aboriginal Peacekeeping Unit, has laid out the working sessions and plans to start with a traditional pipe ceremony and prayer in the Ojibway's mother-tongue.

Mitchell says his focus is "to acclimatize instructional trainers to have a better understanding of how to deal with natives and this won't be easy because they'll be working with the different life experiences of urban and reservation natives.

"Our trainers have to be up-to-date on the major issues in today's native communities, including self-government and traditional policing methods."

Working with Mitchell, whose aboriginal peacekeeping experience has been developed in an urban setting, will be Bill Brant, an OPP and RCMP veteran who will speak to student trainers from the perspective of his reservation experiences.

The training session will be officially launched by Mark Philips who will use his highly respected position as a traditional native pipecarrier to take the group through the 'sweetgrass smudge' ritual and describe the sacred medicines used for purification purposes. Mitchell explains that Philips is a very traditional Ojibway who runs sweat lodges and travels the province attending native cultural events.

"It's amazing how much misunderstanding occurs between our cultures," Mitchell continues, "there are significant differences in behavioural mannerisms and these can be traced back to the residual results of residential school systems that took seven year old children away from their families for 7 to 10 years.

"It not only destroyed entire families but undermined the individual's cultural and personality development."

Mitchell believes there are some very basic do's and don'ts that need to be understood and that by teaching these elements to the Institute's staff, they will be properly equipped to lead their native student trainers.

The Loss Protection Services Training Institute, which was founded by Robert Tye, a 23 year professional in the law enforcement community and a recognized specialist in crime prevention, provides comprehensive training and skills enhancement programs to the loss protection and law enforcement communities.

The Institute is also the only privately run school to offer Firearms Training Systems (FATS) courses for individuals in the law enforcement field. The different FATS programs currently offered by the Institute are FBI-DEA Qualification Program and Judgemental Decisions Program.



Clayton Mitchell explains the importantance of understanding the different life experiences of urban and reservation natives and why he has structured a workshop session to acclimatize law enforcement trainers to these issues.

Dear Chief Hill:

I am writing to advise you that effective December 1, 1993, all pharmacies participating in the Pharmacy Claims Processing System (PCPS), will be required to adhere to established client identification criteria.

As you are aware, it has been our practice, since the introduction of PCPS in Ontario on April 1, 1991, to pay first claims submitted for authorized benefits, even if the client information submitted was incomplete or incorrect. This temporary arrangement, known as First Forgiveness, was originally intended to be in effect for six months in order that pharmacies would have sufficient time to gather the required client information. This practice was subsequently extended for more than two years.

I trust that you would agree that pharmacies have now had sufficient opportunity to collect the required information and to thoroughly familiarize themselves with Blue Cross requirements, while working out any problems that arose with billing procedures. The practice of First Forgiveness will therefore end on December 1, as will this office's current procedure of providing First Nations with a monthly listing of First Forgiven clients.

The office of the Chiefs of Ontario, Provincial Treaty Organizations, and Tribal Councils are also being informed of this implementation, as has the Ontario Pharmacists' Association. Participating pharmacies are being contacted as well, requesting that they make full use of the services provided by the Ontario Blue Cross Toll-Free Centre, where they can receive assistance in resolving issues relating to Client Verification, Benefit Verification, and Frequency Limits.

Provided that our clients continue to give complete identification to participating pharmacies, I do not foresee any major difficulties after December 1. Nevertheless, I would like to encourage all First Nations to inform me immediately if problems do arise, in order that they can be addressed and resolved as quickly as possible.

Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any concerns or would like clarification of any point. I am confident that, by working together, we can ensure that all clients will receive prompt and efficient service.

In line with our objective of self-government, I took the initiative in February of 1992 to develop and submit a proposal on behalf of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte to deliver Ministry of Education and Training, Skills Development Branch, programs and services.

On August 3, 1993 the proposal was accepted, thus enabling us to determine our own objectives and needs as they relate to Apprenticeships and Training.

Funding for this pilot project is coming from the Ministry of Education and Training, along with donations graciously excepted from Mohawk Band Council.

Please be aware that the success of this project depends largely on its target group...YOU! So please do not heitate to call on me at the above address and telephone number.

APPRENTICESHIP AND TRAINING MANDATE

- * To promote apprenticeship programs to Aboriginal communities/settlements, First Nations and Friendship Centres within the Kagita Mikam AMB parameters; (East to Ajax, North to Peterborough and West to Ottawa)
- * Adoise and counsel clients and employers who wish to utilize apprenticeships.
- * Analyze Aboxiginal training needs and develop and implement training plans and programs.
- * Liaise with the Ministry of Education and Training and Community Colleges to secure program accredibation/certification.
- * Adoise and analyze existing apprenticeship programs.
- * Arrange native program Manager/Instructor/Life Skills Coach/Health & Safety Trainers; utilize jobsOntario and CEC employment bank to develop an Aboriginal Skills Bank.
- * Tanget academic and socially troubled youth and counsel them towards School Workplace Apprenticeship Program, provide workshops for Aboriginal students (grades 8-12).
- * Implement refresher courses, Modular Apprenticeship Programs and utilize accelerated training for experienced journeypersons who lack certification.
- * Increase certification for older illiterate journeypersons by developing/devising alternate ways of testing.
- * Develop strategies to prevent access barriers to apprenticeships.
- * Match apprentices with employer sponsors.

- * Work to establish an inter-reserve training network, initiate new apprenticeships.
- * Form/co-ordinate Industrial Training Committees and Joint Apprenticeship Committees.

WHAT IS APPRENTICESHIP?

Apprenticeship is a proven way to learn and to build a successful career. Ontario's apprenticeship program, includes 69 regulated trades. It gives women and men opportunities to develop new skills and knowledge. Apprenticeships generally are offered in four sectors; construction, motive power, industrial and service.

About 90 per cent of an apprentices's time is spent on the job, gaining hands-on experience under the guidance of qualified skilled workers. The remainder is spent in study, usually at a college of applied arts and technology.

It takes a number of people to initiate an apprenticeship: a worker who wants to learn, and an employer who needs skilled employees and is willing to assume the cost of workplace training.

The Apprenticeship and Client Services Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education and Training helps by making sure that up-to-date training standards are in place to meet the needs of apprentices and employers. In addition, the ministry shares the cost of in-school training with the federal government.

Apprenticeship training leads to a portable credential. The Interprovincial Standards Program, or "Red Seal," allows skilled workers to move from one province to another and have their skills recognized in 40 occupations.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

Apprentices must be at least 16 years of age. For many occupations, a Grade 10 education is the minimum requirement, but most unions and employers are now looking for workers who have achieved Grade 12 or higher. To be competitive in

today's fast-paced job market, apprentices must have a solid grounding in subjects like math, English or French and science.

While on the job, an apprentice earns a wage which increases as training progresses. During the in-school portion of training, an apprentice receives income support from the federal government.

The Ministry of Education and Training encourages women to learn skilled trades. The 30 Women's Access to Apprenticeship Projects located across the province locate and inform women interested in the trades, and identify employers and unions interested in training women as apprentices.

A Community Outreach program was recently started to encourage new partnerships to improve access and increase the number of individuals from designated groups (racial minorities, persons with disabilities, francophone and Aboriginal persons) in apprenticeship.

WHY IS APPRENTICESHIP IMPORTANT?

Workers, employers and economists agree that skilled tradespeople help attract the high-wage, highly-technical jobs Ontario needs to prosper.

Surveys show that skilled workers have more stable careers and earn better wages than untrained workers. In addition, they are able to work in a variety of interesting and challenging jobs, and frequently are self-employed. Apprenticeship training can be the key to a secure and financially rewarding future.

Employers involved with Ontario's apprenticeship program find it an effective way to build a skilled workforce.

In February 1992, about 50,000 apprentices were training in Ontario. About 38,000 of them trained in construction and motive power occupations. More than 14,000 new apprentices registered during 1990-1991 and 7,100 apprentices completed their training. There are more than 300,000 skilled workers with Certificates of Qualification in the province.

HOW DO I APPLY?

If you want to be an apprentice, you must find an employer willing to participate in apprenticeship training. Training Consultants in Apprenticeship and Client Service Branch offices across the province can advise on how to start. Interested women may also contact their local Women's Access to Apprenticeship Project co-ordinator.

If you are an employer and want to set up an apprenticeship program, contact a Training Consultant who will help get you started and keep you up-to-date on training requirements.

THE FUTURE OF APPRENTICESHIP

The Ontario government recently announced a major initiative to revitalize and expand apprenticeship training. Revitalization focuses on three key issues:

- strengthening the transition process from secondary school to workplace by expanding the school workplace Apprenticeship Program;
- improving the quality of apprenticeship training and increasing the number of occupations where apprenticeships are available; and
- creating greater accessibility to apprenticeship for people who are under represented in the workplace and training system.

Recently, the Ontario Ministry of Education & Training, Apprenticeship Branch, developed regulations for the new trade "Native Clothing & Crafts Artisan". They worked in conjunction with the Inninew Friendship Centre in Cochrane. A copy of the Schedule of Training is attached for your information.

As an apprenticeship, this training is available for use anywhere in Ontario. It is an employer-established trade, which requires an experienced artisan to act as a "journeyperson" to learners in the trade. It is a natural method of passing skills from one generation to the next, or from one person to another. It also leads to provincial certification in the trade.

This is an excellent opportunity for you to have input into the further development of this trade. An important component of the Native Clothing & Crafts Apprenticeship will be the 360 hours of in-school curriculum. This curriculum is in the beginning stages of being developed, but requires the input of artisans who are familiar with the skills of the trade.

you, or a member of your band is interested participating in the development of the trade and its curriculum, please fill out the attached survey, and return it to me as soon as possible. The information you provide will be presented to the Ministry of Education and Training as research on the possible impact of this apprenticeship on the First Nations of Ontario.

BEAT THE BUG

GET A FLU SHOT

"The flu bug's" real name is the influenza virus which is a serious illness that can lead to death. Influenza leaves the body's defense weak and open to infection. In Canada, influenza and pneumonia account for 5,000 deaths each year and puts 70,000 people in hospital.

Today's influenza vaccines are extremely safe and most people have little or no reaction to the vaccine. Remember - you cannot get influenza from the vaccine.

The best time to get the flu shot is in the early fall preferably in late September or October but if you forget to get a flu shot in the fall - It's never too late to get one! Flu season can start as early as October and run as late as April in Canada.

If you are age 65 or older or are unwell because of a chronic illness (heart, lung or kidney disease or diabetes, cancer or anemia), you are at high -risk!

Anyone who is sensitive to eggs or egg products should not get a flu shot since tiny traces of egg protein may be present in the vaccine which could cause an allergic reaction.

Other candidates for the flu vaccine might include doctors, nurses and other health care workers who have contact with people in a high -risk group, household contacts of people in a high -risk group, people who provide essential community services like police and fire-fighters and any healthy person under 65 who wishes to reduce their chances of getting influenza.

The vaccine can be administered by your family physician.






A special thank you goes out to friends of Mother Earth for their generous donation of time, labour, and material in the installation of 2 Osprey nests.

The Osprey are commonly known as birds of prey. Not common but widespread, these birds can be seen on bare perches and large stick nests near water. Their diet consists mainly of fish.

The presence of the Osprey in the Tyendinaga Territory can be loosely interpreted as a resurgence in fish populations. This bird of prey pose no threat to human activities such as camping, swimming, gardening, etc.

The Osprey nesting locations were chosen based on the close proximity to water and an abundance of fish habitat. They are located on the southeastern corner of the Big Marsh and along the Bay of Quinte shoreline between Bluff Point and Trident Point.
