Speech of Donald Maracle, Chief for the Molly Brant Commemoration held Sunday August 25, 1996

It is a great Honour for me to give this address today commemorating the contributions of our beloved Mohawk Ancestor Molly Brant.

Molly Brant exercised considerable political influence over her life time among the Six Nations of the Iroquois which preserved the historic Mohawk Military Alliance with the British which had began with the 1677 "Silver Covenant Chain of Friendship".

Molly Brant was born at the upper village of CANAJOHARIE, along the Mohawk river in the year 1736, and was given two Mohawk names DEGON WADONT, which means "Many opposed to one" and KONWATSI TSIAIENNI which means "someone gives her flowers".

Molly's father Peter died in 1743, shortly after the birth of her brother Joseph Brant.

In 1753, Molly's mother Margaret married Brant CANAARADUNKA in a Christian ceremony. At this point in time Molly and Joseph's life changed, for their Stepfather was one of the wealthiest men in CANJOHARIE who encouraged Molly and Joseph in their education.

Molly Brant was a member of the wolf clan and the granddaughter of Hendrick, one of the four Indian Kings who was part of the diplomatic delegation to Queen Ann at St. James Palace in London in April of 1710.

Molly Brant's relationship with Sir William Johnson heightened her position in both Indian and Colonial Society. William Johnson soon became one of the most powerful men in North American possessions. William Johnson was born of Anglo:Irish parentage in 1715 in the county of Meath Ireland and came to America in 1738 to oversee the Mohawk Valley plantation of his wealthy and influential Uncle, Vice-Admiral Sir Peter Warren.

Through Sir William's fair business dealings he gained a broad understanding and acceptance by the Iroquois people especially the Mohawk.

The reciprocal trust between Sir William Johnson led the British to appoint him as a superintendent of Indian affairs for the Northern District in 1756. The appointment of a single Crown Agent for the Administration and Management of Indian Affairs was a sensible and long overdue imperial initiative. The new vehicle for implementing policy was the British Indian Department "to court and maintain the allegiance of the Native people to the Royal cause". The British Indian policy was rooted

in the mutual need and desire for protection and survival. The first enemy was the French, the second was the American Colonial Rebels.

William Johnson had been awarded a baronetcy for his victory over the French at the battle of Lake George.

William Johnson had been formally married to Katherine Wisenburgh. By the time of Wisenburgh's death in 1759 William Johnson had already begun a new relationship with Molly Brant. Their first son was born in 1759 and he was named Peter Warren after Sir William's Uncle, Vice-Admiral Sir Peter Warren. Molly Brant was the consort of William Johnson and was his wife in every respect but British law. Some say William and Molly were married in a Mohawk ceremony.

At Johnson Hall, a large and elegant colonial mansion, Molly Brant enjoyed an upper class life of comfort and luxury, servants and slaves. She was hostess to numerous important guests and was an invaluable help mate.

It is doubtful that Molly had any inherited influence among the Six Nations, but her inside knowledge of the people, culture and complex political practices of the Six nations helped William Johnson immensely in his role as Superintendent General of Indian Affairs and helped immensely in maintaining the Mohawk-British Military Alliance.

During the 1760's and early 1770's, Sir William in his function as Superintendent of Indian affairs, frequently held large Indian Council's at Johnson Hall. On these occasions, Molly Brant served as an excellent advisor in carrying out his work in maintaining, cultivating and strengthening the Mohawk-Six nations Military Alliance.

Molly Brant was able to act as a excellent political advisor to Sir William Johnson because she understood the language of the several sacred rituals, medicine societies, harvest dance ceremonies and political complexities and political protocol of the Iroquois Confederacy through the Clan system. Molly Brant understood the early agreements between the Mohawk and the British that were recorded on the wampum belts kept by the Onondaga Nation of the Confederacy.

In later years, Governor General Haldimand, in a letter to the colonial Secretary noted that Johnson was much indebted to Molly in his successful management of the Six Nations.

Molly Brant also contributed to building Johnson's large personal fortune and was valuable in helping acquire

larger tracts of land in the Mohawk Valley from the Six Nations.

Molly Brant helped the Mohawk Nation by dispensing food, blankets, rum and cash to countless indigent persons in need. The bounty of her benefaction made Molly the most powerful woman among the Mohawks and more influential than any Clan Mother.

One of the British Policy Statements that emerged under the Administration of the Indian Department under Sir William Johnson was the Royal Proclamation of October 7, 1763. Only an agent of the crown could purchase Indian lands to stop abuses which the Native people had complained of for decades. The 1763 Royal Proclamation is now embodied in Canada's Constitution.

In the evening of July 11, 1774, Sir William Johnson died suddenly while holding Indian Council at Johnson Hall. His son John Johnson moved into Johnson hall and Molly Brant returned to CANAJOHARIE with her eight young children in a comfortable house.

Shortly thereafter, dissidents in the thirteen colonies were beginning to agitate for independence from Britain. Agitation soon turned to acts of rebellion and among the people most affected by the American Revolutionary war were the inhabitants of the Mohawk Valley, both White and Indian.

After Sir William's death Molly Brant continued to have close and useful relations with the William's influential three white children and their families. Sir William's daughter Nancy was married to Colonel Daniel Claus, a high official in the Indian Department. Another married Colonel, Guy Johnson, who acted as interim Superintendent of Indian Affairs after Sir William's death. The third child Sir John Johnson inherited the bulk of his fathers estate. He now was the largest landowner in the Mohawk Valley and was soon made Major General of the district militia.

While American rebels invaded Quebec in 1775 to 1776, the three brother-in-laws strove to keep the local population loyal to the British Crown.

By spring 1776, however, revolutionary feelings had become to strong and to avoid capture by the rebels, the Claus and Johnson families and several hundred Loyalists, including many Indians were forced to flee north to Montreal or west to Fort Niagara. However, Molly Brant and a number of other Loyalists were resolved to remain on their lands.

Some of those who stayed on suffered immediate consequences as they were arrested and imprisoned by rebel Committees of safety. One was the fourteen year old Philip Frey, who was incarcerated at Johnstown in the spring of 1776. for refusing to join the rebel forces. He ultimately escaped with another prisoner and the pair

contacted Molly Brant who hid and fed them for a week until the search parties gave up looking for them. Brant then supplied the two Loyalists with provisions and an Iroquois guide who eventually conducted them to safety at British- held, Fort Niagara.

In 1777, Daniel Claus and Sir John Johnson returned to the Mohawk valley with a large party of Iroquois and three Loyalist immigrant battalions, the expedition, led by Colonel Barry St. Leger,

hoped to re-establish British control in the area. By early august the force was besieging Fort Stanwix, a rebel stronghold. At the same time, fifty miles away an Canajoharie, Molly Brant heard that General Nicholas Herkimer and eight hundred rebel militiamen were on their way to relieve the Fort. She sent Indian messengers with news to her brother, Joseph, who was serving with St. Leger, with this information, the British were able to surprise and crush the rebels in a bloody engagement at nearby Oriskany. Molly Brant's contribution to the victory was recognized in British military dispatches.

Although the battle was a grievous defeat for the American cause, the victors, especially the Indians, also suffered considerable losses, and St. Leger ultimately had to give up the siege of Fort Stanwix.

The Battle of Oriskany proved to be a turning point in the history of the Iroquois confederacy. Until that point, the Six Nations had not definitively committed themselves to supporting one or other side in the Whiteman's civil war. While many of the Mohawks (such as the Brant's) were decidedly pro-British, some Oneidas had sided with the Americans. Most Iroquois, however, wanted to remain neutral. After Oriskany neutrality was impossible as both circumstances and pressure from the two belligerents forced the Iroquois to choose sides. The result was an Iroquois civil war. The confederacy as a whole was badly sundered and some of the Six Nations were themselves divided internally. The breakdown might have ensued in any event, but one incident seems to have sparked the explosion. Immediately after the battle of Oriskany a number of the victors, including some Mohawks, destroyed a nearby Oneida village. The Oneidas reacted by attacking Mohawk and other Loyalist settlements; a reciprocal cycle of vengeance and retaliation ensued in the Mohawk Valley.

Molly Brant was one of the first victims of the rupture. Local rebels held her responsible for the defeat at Oriskany, and the Oneidas were seeking revenge against all Mohawks. Molly Brant and her children fled Canajoharie, leaving her possessions behind to be plundered by the rebels. She took refuge among relatives of the Cayuga Nation and by the end of 1777 took refuge in Fort Niagara. At Niagara she performed invaluable diplomatic services for the British. The surrender of General John Burgoyne's army in October 1777 at Saratoga and the devastation of General John Sullivan's army caused discouragement among the Iroquois who supported the British.

As loyalty began to waiver, Molly and her brother Captain Joseph preached the long term value of loyalty to the British Crown. The Brant's reckoned that their traditionally, the British, was more likely to protect their interests in the future than the Americans. They argued that the Iroquois must maintain their peoples ancient "Covenant Chain of Friendship" with the British and actively help put down the rebellion.

Daniel Claus now Superintendent of the Six Nations informed Governor General Haldimand that Molly was in every respect considered and esteemed by them as Sir William's reluct, and one word from her is more often taken notice by them, more than a thousand from any white man without exception.

Molly Brant encouraged the loyalty of SAYENQUERAGHTA, who was the most important Six nations Chief, a leader whose support was essential to the British Crown.

At her mission at Niagara, Molly Brant did everything within her power to gain and maintain active support of the Iroquois in fighting the American rebels.

In the summer of 1779, Governor General Haldimand invited Molly and her children to Montreal where her children could obtain a better education. After arriving at Montreal, news came of the terrible losses the Six Nations suffered by General Sullivan. Large numbers of Iroquois had become refugees dependent on the British at Niagara and other Military posts. Molly felt obliged to return to Niagara, Molly set out for Niagara in September 1779, but got no further than the Garrison post at Carleton Island, possibly because the military had commandeered all transport.

For five years Molly Brant lived on Carleton Island.

After the devastation wrought by General Sullivan, many disappointed and disgruntled Iroquois Chiefs came to the Island seeking assistance and indemnification for their losses. Brant immediately went to work consoling and conciliating the Chiefs and encouraged them to be loyal in the Kings interest. The British were not reluctant to acknowledge her services.

Molly Brant and her children, of course, were entitled to regular rations from Government stores like all other refugees. Molly Brant, however demanded and received special attention. The Government paid for all board and schooling costs for her children's education at Montreal and built a house for her on the Cataraqui River in 1784 and provided her with a pension for her active years in the interest of the King.

After the Treaty of Paris of 1783 was concluded the Mohawk Nation could not return to our ancient homeland and in 1784 settled at the Bay of Quinte.

Molly Brant decided to reside in Kingston where she lived the last dozen years of her life among the white and was a devout member of the Church of England, she never assimilated and never sought to change her identity. She remained a proud and loyal Mohawk.

Molly Brant had to face a number of adversities in her private life. Exiled from her homeland and property, she was forced to live seven turbulent years in refugee camp while raising seven children. Remarkably while dealing with these difficulties, she carried on an extraordinarily active public life.

Apart from courting Mohawk British Military Alliance, Molly Brant along with her old friend Reverend John Stuart were founding members of St. George's Church in Kingston.

Molly Brant was a personal friend of Lieutenant Governor Sir John Graves Simcoe and his wife Lady Simcoe. In April of 1795, she doctored Sir John Graves Simcoe with the root of sweet flag who had been extremely ill with a persistent cough since his arrival in Kingston.

All of Molly Brant's daughters married white men of distinction in Upper Canada. her eldest daughter Elizabeth, married Dr. Robert Kern, an army surgeon, who later became a magistrate. Magdeline, the second eldest daughter married John Ferguson, who later represented Kingston in the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada. The youngest daughter married Lieutenant Hugh Earl, a Royal Naval Officer. Two other daughters married Royal Army Officers, one of whom was Captain George Farley.

Molly Brant died on April 16, 1796 and was buried in what is now St. Pauls churchyard in a ceremony conducted by her old friend and pastor John Stuart who had once been missionary to the Mohawks at Fort Hunter.

Molly Brant maintained morale and loyalty during the darkest hours of wartime. She was a woman of great internal strength and of high intelligence with remarkable ability to bridge an understanding of two very different nations and cultures. Her descent from a high ranking Indian family, her liaison with Sir William Johnson enabled her to weild incredible influence at critical moments.

Molly Brant's contribution lay largely in her efforts to gain and maintain the active military support of the Iroquois in fighting the American rebels. And in fighting the rebels, the Iroquois contributed powerfully to the defense and preservation of what ultimately became Canada.

TO ALL TYENDINAGA MOHAWK TERRITORY BUSINESSES:

In case you are not already aware, the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council is in the process of revamping their Permit to Purchase Wholesale system.

Under this new system, everyone will be reassigned a new number and an expiry date of **TWO** years will apply. It will not matter when an application is made, everyone will have the same expiry date (September 30, 1998, etc.). This new system will be in place for October 1, 1996.

A letter along with an application form was already sent out to most local businesses in order to update their file or close it if their business was no longer in operation.

If your business did not receive this package (letter and application form), please contact the Administration Office as soon as possible so we can forward this information to you.

The deadline to return completed applications is SEPTEMBER 6, 1996.

If your business is no longer in operation, please contact the Administration Office so that the proper form can be completed. If possible, your Permit to Purchase Wholesale and card should be returned to close your file. This should also be done by the SEPTEMBER 6, 1996, deadline.

Please note that if current Permit to Purchase Wholesale holders (this includes businesses with tobacco quotas) have not contacted the Administration Office in some way (written or verbal) stating that your business is or is not operating, then your business WILL NOT be included in the new system. This means that after September 30, 1996, ALL Permits to Purchase Wholesale from the old system will be NULL AND VOID. The appropriate wholesale dealers in the area as well as the Ministry of Revenue (for businesses with tobacco quotas) will be notified of the permit holders under the new system.

OTTAWA (August 9, 1996) - Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development, Ronald A. Irwin is pleased to announce that the Government of Canada recognizes and celebrates August 9, 1996 as the United Nations International Day of the World's Indigenous People.

This special international day is an annual event within the United Nations International Decade of the World's Indigenous People (1994-2004). The theme of the decade is "Indigenous People: partnership in action". Today's celebration also focuses on partnership, with emphasis on trade and economic development initiatives involving indigenous people in Canada and abroad.

"The declaration of this international day celebrates the achievements of indigenous people all over the world, with a Canadian focus in particular on trade and economic development," said Mr. Irwin. "The government welcomes the increasing participation of Canadian Aboriginal individuals and companies in international trade, and I personally am impressed by the number and variety of bilateral trade initiatives underway between indigenous people in Canada and abroad."

This international day recognizes progress made in strengthening international cooperation to solve problems facing indigenous people, the main objective of the international decade. The Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) continues to work in partnership with Aboriginal people to facilitate progress in the areas of human rights, the environment, development, education and health.

SIU DECISION - IPPERWASH INVESTIGATION

TORONTO (July 23, 1996) - - - A charge was laid this morning against Acting Sergeant Kenneth Deane of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). Deane was second-in-command of the Tactics and Rescue Unit (TRU) involved in the incident at Ipperwash Provincial Park which resulted in the shooting death of Anthony "Dudley" George on September 6, 1995.

The Director of the Special Investigations Unit (SIU), James M. Stewart, Q.C. reported to the Attorney General that he has an honest belief on reasonable grounds that Deane committed the offence of criminal negligence causing death contrary to Section 220 of the *Criminal Code of Canada*.

On September 4, 1995 a number of aboriginal people, known as "Stoneypointers", occupied Ipperwash Provincial Park located on the shores of Lake Huron in southwestern Ontario. There had been a longstanding dispute with the federal government regarding ownership of land in the region. As a result, a contingent of OPP officers were assigned to the area. During the evening of September 6, a number of officers were deployed to the general area of a boundary fence of the park, reportedly in response to a disturbance outside the park.

When OPP officers arrived at the incident scene, an altercation with "Stoneypointers" developed, and Cecil Bernard George was arrested. During his arrest Cecil George was seriously injured. By all accounts, police were pelted with rocks, sticks and burning objects. In an effort to "rescue" Cecil George, a school bus and car were driven out of the park and into the fray, striking some officers. Gunfire erupted and in the ensuing melee, a 16-year-old aboriginal youth driving the school bus was injured. Anthony "Dudley" George who was neither an occupant, nor directly involved in the movement of the vehicles was fatally shot.

The injuries sustained by Cecil Bernard George during his arrest that evening, and the injuries of the 16-year-old youth were also part of the SIU investigation. The Director concluded that Cecil George's injuries were the result of a violent confrontation between George and officers of the OPP. However, the investigation is frustrated by the fact that no one can identify the officers involved.

With regard to the injury of the youth, the Director determined that given the particular attendant circumstances no criminal charges will be laid.

A comprehensive investigation was conducted by SIU, which involved interviewing approximately 250 witnesses. "Evidence was collected, collated, and analyzed," the Director reported, "followed by a detailed review and consultative process with involved investigators."

The information charging the officer was processed this morning and the officer is scheduled to appear in Ontario Court (Provincial Division), Sarnia on August 13.

In the interests of both the accused's and the public's right to a fair trial, the SIU will make no further comments on this matter.

Visitors and buyers can meet company representatives and view Aboriginal paintings, sculpture, jewelry, and craftware at the "Canada" stand (B10 in Hall 5.0).

This is the second year for Canada's national stand at this fair, and it creates an important follow-up opportunity for buyers interested in authentic Aboriginal fine art and craft products to see what new items are being featured. Last year, approximately 100,000 buyers from countries all over the world attended the fair which, for the Canadian firms, offers an important marketing vehicle. Their work is also representative of a wide range of high quality Aboriginal-made products available in Canada and will help to generate broader knowledge and interest among Europeans which will benefit other Canadian artisans.

While the focus through this fair will be arts and craftware, Aboriginal firms in Canada are active in many sectors of the economy, including forest products, knowledge-based services, technology, tourism, high fashion, engineering and construction, and a number of others. In an effort to create greater awareness of such products and services, the Government of Canada supports the efforts of firms to explore new export market opportunities. In the case of the Tendence initiative the departments of Industry Canada (through Aboriginal Business Canada), Foreign Affairs and International Trade Canada, and Indian and Northern Affairs Canada have collaborated in a "Team Canada" approach to help feature four companies in the national stand at Frankfurt: Arctic Co-operatives Limited, Khot-La-Cha Coast Salish Handicrafts, Monague Native Arts and Crafts Ltd., and Native Renaissance II.

Timed to coincide with the fair will be a "new exporters" mission to France and Germany involving a delegation of another ten Canadian Aboriginal arts and crafts producers. This has also been sponsored and coordinated by the three federal departments working with the companies at the fair and, in addition to meeting European experts on issues related to exporting, the initiative allows mission participants to visit *Tendence* and be exposed to the requirements of selling products in an international forum. Interestingly, two of the companies featured in Canada's stand this year were participants in a similar education mission involving last year's fair. They are now taking the step to be exhibitors themselves as a result.

AIAI has been approached by Batchewana and Garden River First Nations to support and assist with a border crossing on September 7, 1996. The crossing has also received support from the Union of Ontario Indians.

The crossing will take place on the second day of the Batchewana Traditional Pow wow. People will be crossing individually and returning in a caravan formation at 4:00 p.m. from the Walmart in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

To date we expect members from the following First Nations: Batchewana, Hiawatha, Wahta, Tyendinaga, Caldwell, New Credit, Onyota'a:ka, Moravian of the Thames, Garden River, West Bay, Michipicoten, Thessalon, Serpent River, Sagamok Anishnawbek, Whitefish River, Whitefish Lake, Mississauga, Georgina Island, Sucker Creek, Wikwemikong, Sheshegwaning, Sheguiandah, Cockburn Island, Henvey Inlet, Magnetawan, Shawanaga and Walpole Island.

AIAI has agreed to invite speakers to a forum commencing at approximately 5:00 p.m. at the Batchewana arena on September 7, 1996. Letters of invitation will be extended to the National Chief, Regional Chiefs, Ministers of the Crown and others. I will forward some of the letters of invitation to your attention.

You will find attached a flyer which has been developed for the crossing and, also attached is an article from the Globe & Mail on the meeting with Honourable Allan Rock, Minister of Justice.

Ontario natives fear loss of sales-tax exemption

TORONTO — An Ontario native group appealed to federal Justice Minister Allan Rock yesterday to ensure that Indians continue to be exempted from paying provincial sales taxes even if they are harmonized with the federal goods and services tax.

What we asked the minister to do is to take a position, that if he's in [harmonization] negotiations with the province of Ontario, that our present provincial sales tax exemption not be affected by harmonization," said Chris McCormick, a spokesman for the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians, which represents eight first nations in Ontario.

Mr. McCormick and Chief Doug Maracle, head of the association, met yesterday with Mr. Rock in his Etoblcoke constituency office.

The association also asked Mr. Rock for the same protection in the three Atlantic provinces that have agreed to harmonize their provincial sales taxes with the GST. They worry they may no longer be exempt from paying the provincial tax after it is melded with the federal tax.

"Mr. Rock said he's going to bring it to the attention of the Minister of Finance," Mr. McCormick said.

Natives are not charged provincial sales tax if they present their status card at the time of a purchase. But they are only exempt from paying the GST on goods purchased on or delivered to a reserve. Indians don't believe they should pay any tax at all.

Mr. Maracle said he was satisfied with the 45-minute meeting with Mr. Rock, which also included discussions about legislating a 252-year-old treaty to permit Indians to pass freely across the U.S.-Canadian border. A committee under the Liberal government of Pierre Trudeau had recommended passing the treaty into law 13 years ago.

Mr. Rock was not available for comment after the meeting.

"It is agreed that it shall at all Times be free to His Majesty's Subject, and to the Citizens of the United States, and also to the Indians dwelling on either side of the said Boundary Line freely to pass and repass by land, or (water)..."

"... Must shall the Indians passing or repassing with their own proper Goods and Effects of whatever nature, pay for the same any Import or Duty whatever..."

"...ti is agreed that the respective governments will mutually pronote this amicable intercourse..., and necessary protection to be extended to all who may be concerned..."

Cases must be unpublished manuscripts which incorporate aboriginal topics and related material. Topics include those that pertain to Aboriginal business, enterprise and governance. Case authors must be prepared to have their cases published by the BESS Program in a case book. Cases should be bases upon real events or situations although they can be disguised. Any case based upon real events that uses proprietary information must have permission from the source of that information. Cases based upon published information only must be certified to be so by their authors. Fictional cases must be so stipulated. While there is no length restriction, most cases should not exceed 30 pages double-spaced. Short cases of only a few pages will get equal consideration along with more lengthy ones.

The intent to enter into the competition must be communicated to the Coordinator of the Aboriginal Management Writing Competition by September 30 1996. For a complete package and entry form please call 403-329-5179 or fax 403-329-2112. All cases must be received by the Coordinator, Michelle Gellatly, The Aboriginal Management Writing Competition, Faculty of Management, The University of Lethbridge, 4401 University Drive, Lethbridge, Alberta, T1K 3M4, Canada, before March 1 1997. All finalists will be notified of their position in writing. Notification of acceptance for publication in the casebook will follow the normal editorial review process which takes about two or three months after receipt of the case.

First prize will be \$1,000 Cdn. Second prize will be \$750 Cdn. Third prize will be \$ 500 Cdn. Every entrant will receive a wooden pen and bookmark. Prizes will only be awarded to cases of suitable quality for publication.

All cases submitted will be considered for publication in the case book. Authors of cases that are accepted for publication, whether finalists or not will be notified of the reviewers' comments and provided the opportunity of amending their cases for publication. All cases published will be subject to normal copy editing by the editor of the case book. All cases published in the case book are subject to unlimited use in classes of instruction by the Faculty of Management at the University of Lethbridge without payment of royalties.
