To Whom It May Concern

It is my pleasure as Chief of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte to endorse the outstanding record of achievement which the First Nations Technical Institute has built in its thirteen year history.

Education has traditionally been a number one priority of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte. For instance, our public school was the first in Ontario to provide on-site computer training for elementary students in the early '80's. It was also a leader in opening regular classrooms to physically and mentally challenged children. Mohawk language classes have been a part of our school since the 1970's.

The environment was favourable, therefore, for the creation of a postsecondary education and training facility right here on Tyendinaga which would meet the particular needs of Aboriginal learners. And this it has done by using long-distance delivery systems as well as incorporating Native teachings, values and learnings styles into every program. Aboriginal instructors and consultants are used as much as possible, as well as Elders. Partnerships with various community colleges and universities assure accreditation for diploma and degree learners.

The Institute represents wider horizons for our Aboriginal youth everywhere. We can point to the aviation students who came to us from all regions of the country and are now flying for airlines throughout the country. An innovative Social Work Diploma program has been initiated in Moosonee in response to many requests from community workers there - and it is being run by one of the FNTI Social Work graduates. Last winter four of the technicians from the Technical Services department spent six months on Canadian Forces Bases across Canada installing and training military and civilian personnel on the new PeopleSoft software. The range of activities that FNTI is involved with is quite amazing and these are but a few examples.

We are very proud of First Nations Technical Institute and all its accomplishments.

August 1998 Report from Council by Wm. J. Brant

HEALTH CARE

Council had the opportunity to visit Akwesasne this month to view their health administration system. They administer the complete health care system, including drugs. I will be asking our Council to have a comparison done on the two systems to see if we can improve ours. I was informed 90% of Akwesasne's membership live on their Territory-high in comparison to ours.

ADMINISTRATION

As mentioned in a previous newsletter, a report addressing our administration and salary grids is forth-coming. Council met with Dr. Hamblin this month to go over his work to date. I am informed that MBQ (Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte) staff and directors will be meeting in early September with Dr. Hamblin and the final report will be ready for Council in early October.

LANDFILL SITE

I am told that our landfill site has been growing at the rate of approximately 1500 cubic metres per year. Based on this density of growth this should be a concern of EVERONE on our Territory. In the next month I will be taking a proposal to Council to address this very important concern. In the meantime I am asking that everyone using the landfill site RECYCLE AND CO-OPERATE with our site manager. I am also asking that no more garbage be dumped to the south of the present landfill area and that all waste that is not recyclable be dumped over the west bank only. We are trying to cover up the southern exposure so that it no longer extends toward the creek. Thank you for your co-operation in this matter.

ROADS

Invitations to tender for the re-construction of Lower Slash Road, from Wyman's Side Road up to and including the intersection at Homeland Drive, were sent to local companies to solicit bids for road construction. On July 16, 1998 tenders were opened and the successful contractor for the project was Don Hart Construction of R. R. # 1, Napanee. The re-construction and widening of approximately 2.45 kilometres will consist of earth and rock excavation, grading, draining, granular base and application of single and double surface treatments. The total tender for this job is \$345,650.40.

First Peoples Consultants of Huron Brant Drive were retained to design and oversee the construction supervision of the work. It is anticipated September 11, 1998 will see the project completed and at this point the project has been on schedule. We do not anticipate too much deviation from our intended completion date.

Thank you to all residents of the Lower Slash Road for your co-operation and patience as the MBQ complete this much needed project.

HOUSING

There has been a concern expressed by some of our band members that while many members are faithful in paying their mortgage payments, some are in arrears. I was asked that steps be taken to address this latter issue. As mentioned in a previous newsletter a motion was passed that those clients whose mortgages are in arrears be notified so that the arrears will be made current or if that wasn't possible that the client work with the staff to design a financial solution that is acceptable to Council. This motion also indicated that if the client ignored the notice that foreclosure action would be taken. This action has commenced.

The housing program is a worthwhile program but is not without faults as I have previously mentioned. It does need to be restructured. The intention of the motion was fair and shows a willingness on the part of the MBQ Council to work with clients.

I congratulate those clients who have honoured and are honouring these mortgage agreements made with our band Council. I strongly suggest that clients having difficulty keeping their mortgages current meet with the staff so that foreclosure will not be necessary

The only way to ensure a successful housing program for future generations is continued cooperation by all those who use it.

AIAI Chiefs

Dear Chiefs:

The number of calls have increased since the Supreme Court decision on the Tomah case from New Brunswick.

On July 22, 1998 Bonnie Pelletier and myself had the opportunity to meet directly with AFN Vice-Chief Len Tomah for approximately three hours and discussed the court decision and its impacts. Since then, Vice Chief Tomah has made a request to meet with the Chiefs of Ontario regarding the tax case (letter attached).

As a result of the calls from members and letters from Au Cton and GMAC (attached). I have contacted the Ministry of Finance and spoke to Jay Young, his response was that:

- They are aware of the Supreme Court decision.
- They are in the process of currently reviewing the decision
- That no changes are imminent
- That they are also receiving calls from the media and are being asked for the Ontario position
- The Ontario position is outlined in Retail Sales Tax Guide 808 for Status Indians, Indian Bands and Band Councils - revised - May 1997 (attached)
- That calls can be made to Mr. Murray Parks at (905) 433-6314
- That letters and inquiries coming form business tend to be national and/or international based and do not understand the tax exemption at point of purchase arrangement with status Indians, Indian Bands and Band Councils in Ontario.

Further to this, following the AIAI General Assembly at Tyendinaga correspondence was started with Mr. John Parker, Parliamentary Assistant to Charles Harnick, the response came from Mr. Yan Lazor, Assistant Deputy Attorney General. By way of his letter we are being asked to direct our inquires to Mr. Roy Lawrie, Assistant Deputy Minister, Tax Revenue Division of the Ministry of Finance. I would recommend that any inquiries you receive at your administration office that the names and telephone numbers of Murray Parks (905) 433-6314 and Ray Lawrie (905) 433-5614 be given to your members to call along with the AIAI number of (519) 434-2761 so we can make contact with the Ministry of Finance on their behalf.



Do You Know...

Cannabis is the name that covers marijuana, hashish, and hash oil – all of them come from Cannabis sativa, a plant that grows in many parts of the world. All three drugs contain THC, a chemical that changes the way you think, feel, and act. Cannabis is much more powerful today than it was twenty years ago because growers have developed strains that contain much more THC than before.

It is the most commonly used illegal mood-altering drug in North America. In 1989, an estimated 2.1 million Canadians (18 and older) used it at least once during the year.



*Street Names: pot, weed, dope, grass, Mary Jane, ganja (for marijuana); hash (for hashish); weed oil, honey oil (for hash oil)

How will cannabis affect me?

Cannabis affects different people in different ways, depending on the mood they are in, how they expect they are going to feel, the amount they take, how strong it is, and whether they eat it or smoke it.

Soon after smoking cannabis, most people feel "high" – more relaxed and talkative and less concerned about what they say or do. However, cannabis makes some people nervous, dizzy, and upset.

Later on, you may become reflective and sleepy.

Physically, you will probably notice that your eyes redden, your heart beats faster, and your appetite is enormous (often called "the munchies"). Cannabis can affect your balance, judgment, memory, reactions, and perceptions, especially if it is used together with alcohol. In fact, very large amounts can cause hallucinations – seeing and hearing things that don't really exist.

Is cannabis dangerous?

Twenty years ago, there was little scientific research on the effects of cannabis on the body and brain, and some people claimed it was less harmful than alcohol or cigarettes. Today, scientists know this is not true, and there is growing scientific evidence that cannabis carries these health risks:

- Long after the "high" has gone, the drug remains in the brain and affects memory and learning. You will be less able to speak, read, compute, or reason. It also slows down your reaction time, making it dangerous to perform complex tasks such as driving a car.
- Cannabis causes hormonal changes that could alter normal patterns of growth and sexual development.
 When cannabis is used by women during pregnancy, babies may be born prematurely, with low birth weights, or with other abnormalities.

- Cannabis smoke contains up to 50 percent more tar and cancer-causing chemicals than tobacco cigarettes, and can cause bronchitis and such major lung diseases as emphysema and cancer. It also harms the immune system, which fights off infections and disease in the body.
- If you have high blood pressure or heart problems, smoking cannabis is risky because it increases your heart rate by as much as 50 percent. Your heart has to work harder and your blood pressure goes up.
- For people with a history of emotional problems or mental illness, regular cannabis use can bring on their symptoms or make them worse.

Can you become dependent on cannabis?

With regular use, people can become psychologically dependent on cannabis. They crave the "high," and become edgy and anxious if they cannot get the drug.

People who use large doses on a daily basis can become *physically dependent* and suffer *withdrawal symptoms* when they stop using the drug. For a week or so they may have trouble sleeping, feel anxious and irritable, and lose their appetite.
