Parks Canada and National Historic Sites and Monuments Board Plaque Unveiling Ceremony

On August 21, 2005, Parks Canada and the National Historic Sites and Monuments Board honoured our community by unveiling two National Historic Plaques at Christ Church, Her Majesty's Chapel Royal of the Mohawk. This was indeed a historic and memorable event with approximately 350 people in attendance. The first plaque which was unveiled was for Christ Church, Her Majesty's Chapel Royal in recognition of the Mohawk People's contribution to the Crown signified by the 1677 Silver Covenant Chain of Friendship. The other plaque unveiling was to recognize Dr. Oronhyatekha, a person of National Historic Significance who was the first accredited medical to graduate from a medical associated with the University of Toronto in 1866. Dr. Oronhyatekha and his family are buried at Christ Church Cemetery.

A highlight of the ceremony was an announcement by Mr. George Mohacsi, President and Chief Executive Officer of Foresters. Mr. Mohacsi formally announced the transfer of ownership of Forester's Island to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte. Forester's Island had been in Forester's possession since the beginning of the 20th century. Mr. Mohacsi presented Chief R. Donald Maracle with a ceremonial deed which reads, "In commemoration of the transfer of the ownership of Forester's Island from the Independent Order of Foresters (Foresters) to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte, August 21, 2005"

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who made this event possible and in particular; John Grenville, Sheryl Smith, Dr. Robert Bothwell and the various representatives from Parks Canada and the National Historic Sites and Monuments Board, Corporate donors, individual donors, Tyendinaga Native Women's Association, Mary Ann Sero, Glen Maracle, Mohawk Singers, Soggy Basement Boys Band - Prince Edward Island, Woodland Cultural Centre, National Archives of Canada, Canadian Royal Military

Institute, Hastings & Prince Edward Regiment, CFB Kingston Military Band, Chief David General - Six Nations Territory, Fr. Sid Horne - Honorary Chaplain to the Mohawks, Nathan Brinklow, Alan Brant, Dylan Brinklow, George Mohacsi - President and Chief Executive Officer, Foresters, Tyendinaga Mohawk Council, Mohawk Administration Staff and the Christ Church Restoration Committee.

In particular, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to Mohawk veterans; Elwood D. Brant, Austin Fuller, Murney Green, Morley Maracle and Donald Armitage for their contribution and participation as this marks the year of the veteran.

I am pleased to enclose a copy of the congratulatory letters from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and Adrienne Clarkson, Governor General of Canada which were read by Dr. Robert Bothwell, Master of Ceremonies. I also enclose a letter from John Grenville, National Historic Sites Program Manager - Parks Canada.

I thank all who attended this historic and memorable ceremony.

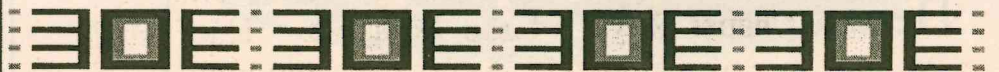



A special meeting of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council was held on Monday, July 11, 2005 at 10:00 a.m. in the Council Chambers for various issues.

Tobacco Quota Consultation:

A special meeting of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council was held to review the status of the Community Consultation for the Tobacco Quota. The third community consultation meeting will be held tonight at the Community Centre.

Industrial Park Plan at Shannonville:

Phase I will provide 20 additional lots (East side)
Phase II will provide 35 additional lots (West side)

Council questioned if the road proposed by G.D. Jewell Engineering would be an MTO standard road.

Peter Brant tried to contact Jewell Engineering and there was no answer to the telephone call to Gary Jewell. Peter Brant will confirm with Jewell Engineering later.

A detailed design will provide Council with detailed engineered drawings for lot layout, road design, storm water drainage, utility locates, grading issues and legal surveys at a cost of \$155,910.00. The boundary survey is completed.

Council suggested commercial signage that lots are for sale in the Industrial Park.


LaShelle Brant will investigate if any funding could be made available from the Aboriginal Community Capital Grant.

WHEREAS the Final Agreement related to the portion of the former King's Highway No. 2 passing through the Turton Penn Leasehold Area in Shannonville, Ontario between Her Majesty the Queen in right of Canada, Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte dated for reference November 3, 2004 (the "Final Agreement") and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Turton Penn Highway Trust Agreement (the "Trust Agreement") were considered by the members of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte and a ratification vote was held on June 25, 2005;
AND WHEREAS the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte and Canada entered into a Memorandum of Understanding on July 4, 1991, to facilitate the return of lands in the Turton Penn Leasehold Area free from any encumbrances or other outstanding liens, to the control of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte;

AND WHEREAS a majority of the members who voted in the ratification vote voted in favour of the Final Agreement, the confirmation of the Final Agreement as a Specific Agreement, the Trust Agreement;
AND WHEREAS the ratification and confirmation of the Final Agreement, Specific Agreement and Trust Agreement have taken place pursuant to the custom of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte;
AND WHEREAS the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council accepts the results of the ratification vote;
AND WHEREAS the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council is authorized the members of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte to execute the Final Agreement;
AND WHEREAS on June 29, 2005 the Attorney General for Ontario, Minister Responsible for Native Affairs and Minister Responsible for Democratic Renewal was replaced by a new Ontario Minister Responsible for Aboriginal Affairs;
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Chief Roderick Donald Maracle, Councillor Willard Amos Hill, Councillor Velma Jean Dracup, Councillor Blaine Franklin Loft and Councillor Roy C. Maracle

NOTICE PROCEDURE FOR CONTACTING PIERCE ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

Residents can call (613) 966-4483 leave your name and phone number so that they can contact you.

They are available 24 hours for emergencies. An emergency would be a dog that is injured and the owner is unknown, a dog that is harassing livestock, a dog endangering the public or an animal suspected of having rabies. If a resident would like to log a complaint or inform them of a dog running at large they can do so by calling Monday to Friday between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

They are not available to pick up strays running at large on weekends or statutory holidays. All animals that are picked up are taken to the **Quinte Humane Society** and their hours are 12:00 noon to 5:00 p.m. Monday to Saturday and 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Sunday. The Quinte Humane Society is also closed on statutory holidays.

The Quinte Humane Society is located on Avonlough Road which is at the west end of Belleville off of Dundas St. west (Hwy #2). Their number is (613) 968-4673.

It would be best if your pet has been picked up that you call ahead to the Humane Society to confirm the cost involved in redeeming your pet.

EXPIRY DATE ON STATUS CARDS

Our First Nation members have been inquiring why there is an **"expiry date"** on our status cards. I e-mailed Indian Affairs to inquire about the expiry dates. Here is their answer:

Our INAC policy is that the cards need to be renewed every 3 years for children under 18 yrs of age (because their appearances change quite a bit while growing up). For the adults the cards need to be renewed every 5 years as they also change, but not as quickly. These expiry dates are also implemented as they will be keeping in line with other government issued type of documents/cards such as health cards, drivers licenses, passports, etc. Plus once the new card comes into effect (we do not know when yet) these dates will be automatically system generated on the cards. This will help to ensure for INAC and First Nations that there are less fraudulent cards in circulation. My only advice would be to alert the First Nation members to renew their cards before the expiry date, so that they will not experience difficulties when travelling/shopping.

Thank you for voicing your concerns and I will certainly let our headquarters people know the dilemma the expiry date puts on First Nation members.

Culbertson Tract Land

HISTORY OF THE CULBERTSON TRACT

In 1837, John Culbertson, grandson and heir of Captain John Deserontyon, received a Crown Grant for approximately 827 acres on the eastern boundary of Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory. More precisely, John Culbertson was granted the west half of lot 38, lot 39 and lot 40, in Concessions 1, 2 and A. Subsequently, Culbertson and his family sold the land or lost it by defaulted mortgages.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have always argued that this was an illegal Crown grant of a portion of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory since the community did not surrender the lands to the Crown as required by the Simcoe Deed, Treaty 3 & 1/2.

In 1832, John Culbertson had obtained from the Chiefs of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte, a Quit Claim Deed, for the land that had been his grandfather's - Captain John Deserontyon's. However, this was a transaction internal to community members to settle an estate.

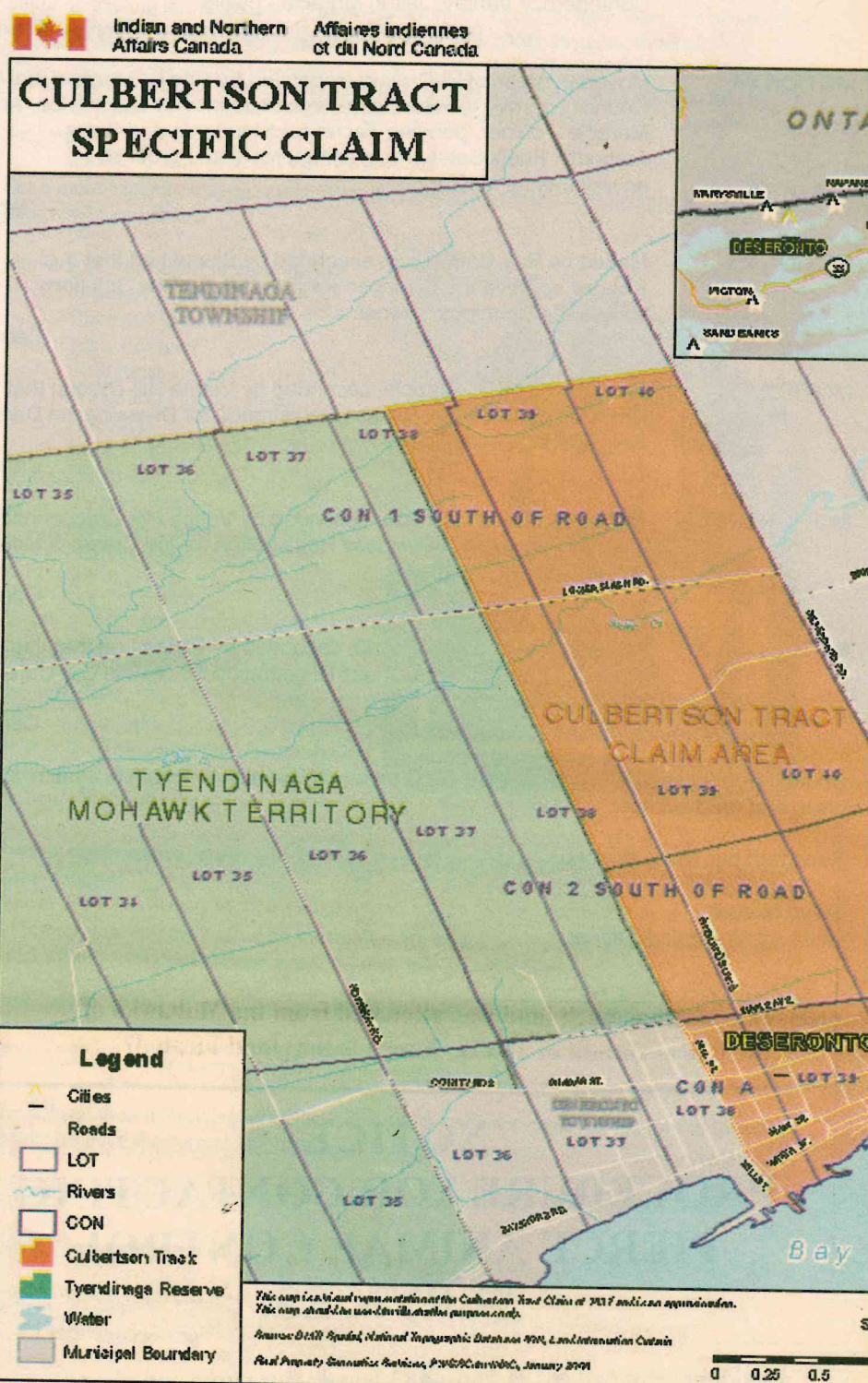
In 1836, Culbertson registered this Quit Claim at the Registry Office in Belleville as if it was a legal alienation of land. He also submitted a petition to the Government of Upper Canada. The petition included the Quit Claim Deed, Captain John's Will and other documentation to show how Culbertson was worthy of receiving a Crown Grant of the land bequeathed to him by his grandfather.

Although the officials in Upper Canada should have been fully aware that this Quit Claim Deed and other documents did not amount to a legal surrender, the Lieutenant-Governor in 1837, Sir Francis Bond Head, granted the land to Culbertson as a Crown Grant. There was no public meeting called for the purpose of the surrender, no informed community consent to a surrender, no government official to act on behalf of the Crown, no compensation paid and no surrender document. The Crown grant was immediately protested by the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

This claim was researched primarily in the early 1990s. A claim was then submitted to the Specific Claims Branch of the federal Department of Indian and Northern Affairs in November 1995. The claim sought compensation for the wrongful alienation of the Culbertson Tract and restoration of lands to the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory.

In 1998, the Specific Claims Branch provided MBQ with supplementary research they had done. This research enhanced our argument. The claim was then reviewed by the federal Department of Justice from December 1998 to 2002.

In November 2003, MBQ received a letter from the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs which acknowledged that no legal surrender took place before the lands were granted to John Culbertson. The Department of Indian and Northern Affairs offered to negotiate a settlement for this claim. The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council by resolution dated June 30, 2004 agreed to negotiate towards a settlement.

A series of meetings have taken place regarding the Culbertson Tract land claim productive and have identified additional research and work needed for progress. Monthly meetings have been held over the last year to discuss technical details area. The most significant outcome of these meetings has been the drafting of studies; a mapping study and a land information study.

Over the years since the Culbertson Tract has been administered outside of the have been significant alterations to the land and its uses. In order to have meaningful claim, there are many considerations regarding the use and alteration of the land. Chief R. Donald Maracle is negotiating the Culbertson Tract on behalf of the MBQ by the Alan Pratt Law Office. Negotiating on behalf of the federal government Canada has also appointed Laura Nelson as its legal counsel.

It is important that our Aboriginal and treaty rights remain paramount to any Culbertson Tract claim negotiations. The Tyendinaga Mohawk Council has appointed a committee. Brant Barty is a former land claims researcher who worked on the C. Rae. His experience in research along with his knowledge of land management is a welcome addition to the negotiation table. Land Claim Information

Qs & As

Q. What issues will these negotiations attempt to resolve?

A. The parties will be working together through negotiations toward a final settlement to resolve a longstanding dispute between the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte and the Crown regarding the 1837 sale without a surrender of an area of Mohawk land known as the Culbertson Tract.

Q. Why is this claim being pursued now after so many years?

A. While the historical events that gave rise to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Claim took place in 1837, the claim against Canada and Ontario was formally submitted in 1995.

First Nations could not pursue claims under early federal legislation. The Government of Canada established its various claim policies in 1973, along with a process and funding for resolving Aboriginal land claims through negotiations. The Specific Claims Policy has evolved significantly over the last few decades and in 1991 the bar against pre-confederation claims was lifted.

Upon completion of historical and legal reviews the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte claim was accepted by Canada's Minister of Indian Affairs for negotiations and the parties have been actively negotiating since 2004. Both parties believe that negotiations represent the best possible way to constructively and co-operatively resolve this outstanding grievance.

Q. How much land was alienated from the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte in 1837? Where is that land located?

A. According to the Culbertson Patent issued in 1837, the Culbertson Tract contained approximately eight hundred and twenty-seven (827) acres within the eastern portion of the original Mohawk Tract. The parties are conducting mapping to determine the boundaries of the Culbertson Tract.

Q. Why did the parties agree to negotiate?

A. Canada accepted the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte claim for negotiation under the Specific Claims Policy. The Specific Claims Policy was established in 1973 as an alternative dispute resolution mechanism to allow First Nations to have their claims addressed by the government without having to go to court.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte and Canada firmly believe that the best way to resolve this outstanding claim is through constructive and co-operative negotiations in good faith, in a dispute resolution process, rather than through an adversarial court process.

Through negotiations, it is possible for the parties to achieve a mutually satisfactory result and to strengthen their overall relationship at the same time.

Q. What are the first steps in the negotiation process?

A. The first step in negotiations was to agree on a joint negotiation protocol, which establishes a general framework for negotiations and a process for information sharing during the negotiations. This was signed on December 6, 2004.

Q. How long will it take to reach a final agreement?

A. Reaching an agreement that is fair and reasonable and that resolves the issues of a claim can take time. The achievement of a final settlement agreement will require extensive discussion between the parties. As the negotiations have only just begun, it is difficult to predict how long the process will take.

Q. How will this claim affect private property owners in the area?

A. In keeping with the Specific Claims Policy, third party interests will be taken into account during the negotiations. Canada's policy states, as a general rule, the government will not accept any settlement which will lead to third parties being dispossessed. Any land purchased would be on a willing-seller/willing-buyer basis.

Canada and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have agreed to provide information to the members of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte, local governments and other interested parties through vehicles such as briefings, media releases and community information sessions as developments require.

Q. Will consultations be held during these negotiations? If so, how will those consultations take shape and who will be consulted?

A. An important part of settling claims is ensuring that fair consideration is given to issues of concern to local communities. Canada and the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte are committed to establishing an open process for information sharing with all interested parties. An open and inclusive process helps negotiators to determine the best way to address any local issues or concerns.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte Research Department will be coordinating the release of information. Lisa Maracle is the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte researcher. Please feel free to contact Lisa Maracle at 396-3424. As a first step in the negotiation process, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte have already begun to consult with their membership to ensure that issues of concern, such as Treaty rights, are considered. In addition, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte and Canada have met with local municipal officials of the Town of Deseronto and the Township of Tyendinaga to provide them with the opportunity to ask questions and to learn about the history of the claim as well as the negotiation process. The parties plan to continue this important dialogue in the near future and throughout the negotiations. Because of overlapping jurisdictional issues, the province of Ontario has also been invited to participate in the claim.

The Culbertson Tract Land Claim is the first land claim submitted on behalf of the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte. We sincerely hope that, as a community member, you will find the enclosed information interesting and useful. It is important and necessary that community members be involved in this claim to ensure the outcome will have lasting benefit for generations to come, just as our ancestors ensured the same for us today. There is a community meeting scheduled for Sept. 29th, at 7:00 p.m. at the Mohawk Community Centre where you will have an opportunity to learn more about the Culbertson Tract Land Claim and also provide your input into this very important issue. Stay tuned to the Tyendinaga Territory Newsletter for future updates and announcements regarding the Culbertson Tract Land Claim.

If you **do not** want to have a sample taken **please call** to have your name removed from the water sampling list. This ensures those who want testing can have their water tested more promptly.

Helpful Water Hints

(TO HELP MAINTAIN POTABLE WATER)

FAQ: Bacteria such as e.coli and total coliform can grow inside your screened taps. To prevent bacteria growth, soak your aerators in javex and remove all debris from the inside of the screen.

FAQ: Water storage tanks/cisterns can become contaminated. You should have your water tested to ensure its safety. Instructions can be provided to help you clean your tanks/cisterns if required.

FAQ: Used or soiled dish clothes can contain bacteria. You should never wrap a used dish cloth around your tap or have it near the aerator. This can cause the bacteria to spread into your tap.

FAQ: Animals that have access to drink the water directly from the taps can also cause bacteria growth in a faucet. Never allow an animal to drink directly from taps or sinks.

FAQ: If you are reusing drinking water containers, disinfection is essential. Bacteria could potentially build up if containers are not cleaned frequently.

FAQ: Water coolers should also be cleaned with javex at least twice a year to prevent bacteria growth. Instructions can be provided if requested.

Saving Energy in Your Home Before Winter

10% percent of energy can be saved in your home with the reduction of air leaks

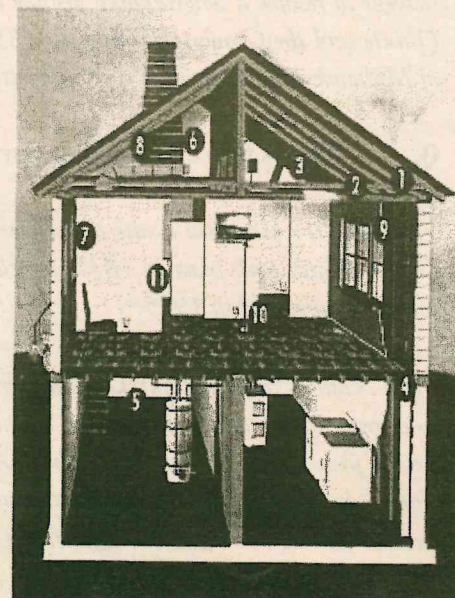
An easy way to test for air leaks in your home is to use an incense stick near places that could be leaking air. If the smoke travels horizontally than you have found a place where air is leaking. This may require caulking, sealing or weather-stripping to repair.

Places of high concern could be doors, windows, and places where plumbing, ducting, or electrical wiring penetrates through exterior walls, floors, ceilings, and soffits over cabinets.

For a more accurate measurement of air leakage, hire a technician to conduct a blower door test in your home.

Sources of Air Leaks in your Home:

1. Dropped Ceiling
2. Recessed Light
3. Attic Entrance
4. Still Plates
5. Water and Furnace Flues
6. All Ducts
7. Door Frames
8. Chimney Flashing
9. Window Frames
10. Electrical Outlets and Switches
11. Plumbing and Utilities



Energy can also be lost through the window.

Be sure to close your curtains and shades during the night and keep them open in the day.

If water condensation, drafts and frost are present, tape clear plastic sheeting to the inside of the window.

A long term saving plan could be to install storm windows over single-pane windows or replace them with double-pane windows with low-e coating.

Insulation can reduce you heating bill year round!

Insulate your hot water pipes and hot water heater.

Check insulation in crawlspaces, floors, basement walls, exterior, ceilings and the attic to insure you have the correct amount of insulation for your area.

Adding insulation to the attic is never a bad idea because it could always use more.

Temperature Control

You can save up to 10% on your heating bill by reducing your thermostat from 72° to 65° for eight hours a day

Be sure to not block and registers and clean or replace you furnace air filters regularly.

If you are in need of a new furnace, consider installing an energy efficient furnace to save money.

Check Your Duct Work

60% of you heated air can be lost through holes or un-insulated ducts.

The lost heat could be going to such places as the attic or the crawlspace.

Step One

Know who you're dealing with

Good contractors have satisfied customers. Ask contractors to provide customer references for projects similar to yours. Then take the time to call these homeowners and ask if the work was done properly, on time, and on budget. Find out if any follow-up work was needed and if this was done satisfactorily. Also ask if they would hire the contractor again.

If a contractor is unwilling to provide references, don't hire them.

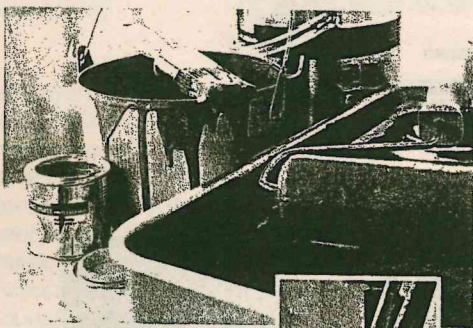
Step Two

Make sure you're protected from risks

When a contractor works on your home, you need to be protected from a number of risks. These risks exist whether you are hiring someone for a simple home repair, a large renovation project, the construction of a new home or cottage, or to work on a rental property you own.

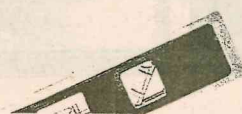
Here are some things you should know:

- A contractor's **business liability insurance** can protect you if your home is damaged through your contractor's fault, or if the contractor causes damage or injury to third parties, like your neighbours.
- Most contractors are required by law to have **Workers' Compensation** coverage. If you hire a contractor who does not have this coverage, you face an increased risk of claims or financial loss if a worker is injured on your project.
- A contractor's valid **Business Number** or **GST/HST number** tells you that they are registered with the Government of Canada.
- The **lien regulations** in your province specify how much money you must hold back from payments. This protects you if your contractor fails to pay suppliers or subcontractors.
- A contractor's **written warranty** specifies what is covered and for how long. When you hire a contractor to build a new home on land that you own, insist on coverage under a **new home warranty program** in your province.
- **Written receipts** for all deposits and payments you make to a contractor provides proof that you have paid.



It's also important that your project complies with local **building codes**. Any change to the structure of your home, even something very minor, requires a **building permit**. Homeowners are responsible for obtaining a building permit; however, your contractor can usually get the permit on your behalf.

Inform your **home insurance** company before any work begins. Some homeowner policies don't cover construction-related risks or theft of building materials from the work site. Call your home insurance representative to make sure that you have adequate coverage.

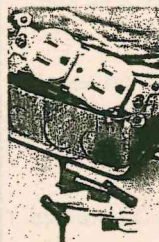


Step Three

Get it in Writing!

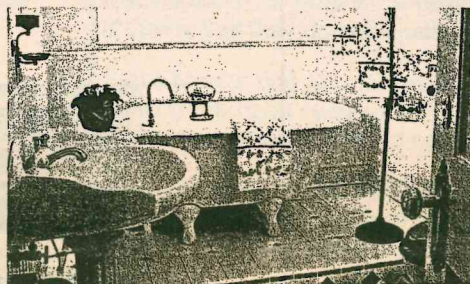
Having a written contract is essential. It helps protect you from the nightmare of lawsuits that can result from accidents, work-related injuries, or damages to third parties. Even for small projects, it's important to make sure you're protected. **The size of the job does not limit the liability you face if an accident occurs.** And accidents can happen even with the simplest home repairs.

A written contract also helps protect you from many other potential problems. Without a contract, you could lose any deposit or advance payment given to the contractor, or find yourself charged far more than you expected. Also, there is little you can do about poor quality or incomplete work. And you have little assurance that you will get warranty coverage and after-sales service.



A contract doesn't have to be complicated. For simple home repairs, it could be only a page long. For bigger projects, you'll need more information such as drawings and a specification list. Although the following list is not comprehensive, it provides examples of the information that should be in all contracts:

- The name, address and telephone number of the contractor



- A full description of the work and the material and products to be used
- When the work will start and be completed
- How much you will be charged for the work and when you will have to pay

- The amount of payment you will hold back as required by the lien legislation in your province
- The contractor's warranty detailing what is covered and for how long
- A certificate from an insurance company proving that the contractor carries business liability insurance
- A letter of clearance from your province's workers' compensation program confirming the contractor is registered
- The contractor's Business Number or GST/HST number and
- The contractor's business license number (where required by the municipality)

Most often, the contractor will draw up a contract for you to review. Don't sign it unless you are satisfied that it includes all the necessary information and accurately represents what you have agreed to.

Professional contractors always work with a proper, written contract. Their price includes protection you need in case something goes wrong or an accident occurs. This is a valuable part of the service you're paying for.

How to find a good contractor



- Ask friends, family and neighbours about contractors they have hired to work on their homes.
- Contact your local Home Builders' Association or other trade association for a list of professional contractors in your community.
- Ask your local building materials store if it has a list of recommended contractors.
- Ask your utility company if it has a list of recommended contractors.
- Check with your local Better Business Bureau to find out if a contractor is a member.

Many experienced and reliable contractors work in your community—highly skilled professionals who do business the right way.



Unfortunately not all contractors play by the same rules. Some cut corners to offer lower prices. They promise you a "good deal" as long as nothing is written down and you pay in cash.

These cash deals can mean a lot of risk for you. Contractors who don't do business properly don't protect you from accidents or their mistakes. If there is a work-related injury or damage to your home, you could face lawsuits and financial loss. You could be responsible for your contractor's unpaid bills. And you could be stuck with work that is incomplete or badly done.

While serious, these risks are easy to avoid. Before you agree to let anyone work on your home, take these three simple steps: know who you're dealing with, make sure you're protected from risks, and always **Get it in Writing!**

OFFICE OF THE FIRE MARSHAL WARNS OF HAZARDOUS REFRIGERATORS

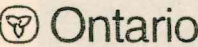
(External Distribution)

The Office of the Fire Marshal (OFM) is urging Ontario residents to check their refrigerator model and serial numbers. Certain models of LG and Kenmore refrigerators pose a fire hazard to consumers and must be repaired. A problem with a component in the condenser fan motor has been detected. This component can overheat, posing a potential fire hazard to consumers. Recent news releases issued by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), LG Electronics Canada and Sears Canada identify the two-door and three-door refrigerator models that are affected by the problem.

To date, four reports of fires originating in two-door LG refrigerators in Ontario have been received and confirmed by the OFM. The OFM has also been made aware of three incidents involving two-door LG models in Vancouver and one incident involving a three-door Kenmore model in Edmonton.

The refrigerator models with the faulty component are the following:

- LG three-door refrigerators
Manufactured between May 2004 and October 2004 and sold in Canada between June 2004 and April 2005

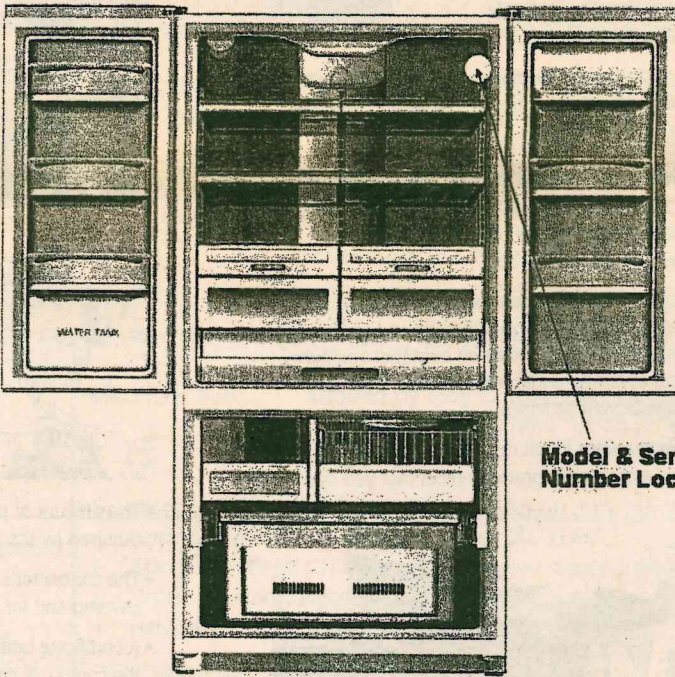
Both LG and Sears are taking steps to contact consumers that have purchased one of the refrigerators in question to schedule a free in-home repair. Sears Canada sold 281 of the affected Kenmore refrigerators in Canada; 132 of these were purchased in Ontario. Sears Canada is nearing completion of its repair program. As of August 10, 2005, there were only 21 units in Ontario and 20 units in the rest of Canada left to be repaired.

LG Canada has reportedly sold 9,009 of the affected refrigerators across Canada. As of August 11, 2005, 1366 (15%) of these had been repaired. Data for Ontario is not available.

Affected refrigerator owners, who have not yet been contacted by LG or Sears, are being asked to promptly contact LG or Sears to schedule a free in-home repair. Canadian consumers can call the LG toll-free hotline at 1-866-595-4387 or write by e-mail to retrofit@lge.com. Enquiries regarding Kenmore refrigerators should be directed to Sears Canada at 1-800-469-4663. In the meantime, these owners should unplug their refrigerators.

The OFM issued three news releases to notify the public of the problem and urge people to check their refrigerator model and serial numbers. The news releases were distributed by Canada News Wire to newspapers, radio stations and television stations across the province. Copies of the news release are attached for your information. News releases issued by LG Electronics Canada, Sears Canada, and CPSC provide additional information on the product and are also attached for your information.

The OFM is asking fire departments to report any fires involving one of the LG or Kenmore refrigerator models listed above to Bernie Silvestri at (416) 325-3239. Fire departments are also encouraged to inform members of their communities and their local media about the potential fire hazard described above.

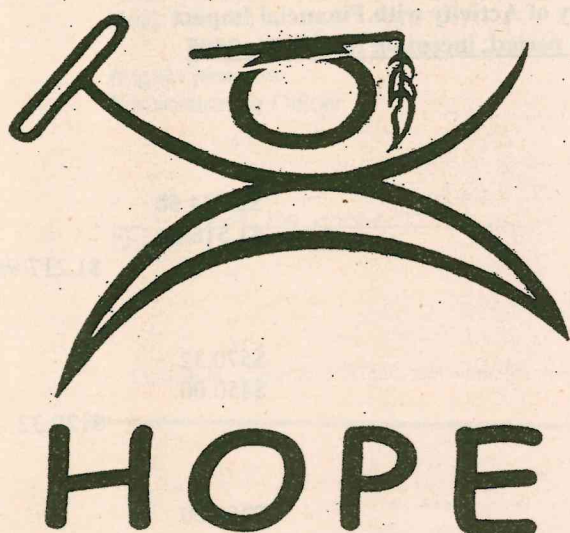

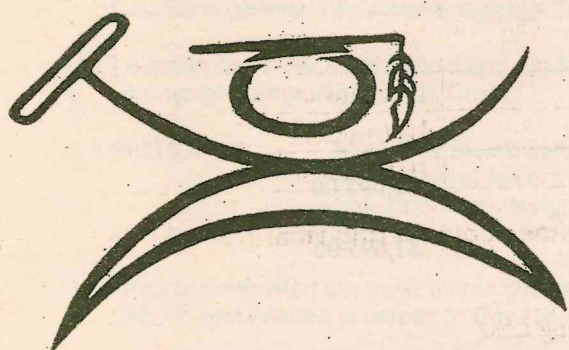


Haudenosaunee Opportunity for Personalized Education

How can you register for HOPE?

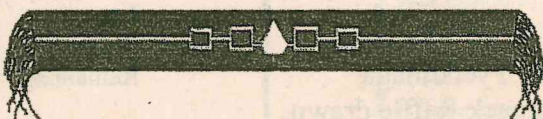

Where is HOPE?

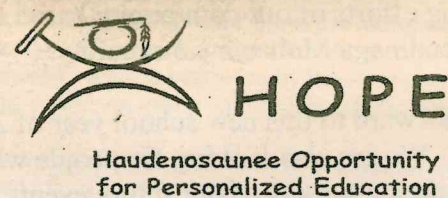
The HOPE program is located on the Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory at the First Nations Technical Institute.

What is Head Lice?

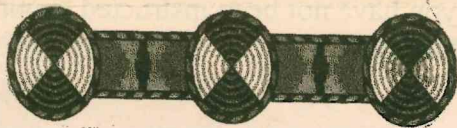
Head Lice are extremely tiny critters that can only live on the human head. An adult can lay up to ten eggs a day for up to ten days. Then after a week when the nits hatch the cycle will start all over again so within a month a person can be infested with hundreds of nits and lice if it is not caught and treated in the very beginning. Head lice will not go away on it's own, it needs to be treated with special shampoo that you can get from the drug store, and all the nits need to be picked out either with a comb or your fingernails.

If a child in the family has been sent home with nits or live lice then you can expect that someone else in the family will have it including the parents. It is very important that all family members get checked on the same day that the child has been identified. The reason being is that everyone can and should be treated at the same time so that it doesn't get passed around again.

Steps on treating head lice:

- Check all family members living in the house hold
- Go to your local drug store to purchase the shampoo
- Apply lice treatment exactly as instructed
- Remove all nits
- In very hot water wash combs, brushes, hats, towels, pillow cases, clothing, etc
- You can kill lice and nits on large items by heating them in a dryer for about 20 -30 minutes, dry cleaning the items, stuffed animals that cannot be washed can be placed in a large bag for up to two weeks, and or freezing the items for a couple days.
- Vacuum carpets, furniture, car seats, and car interior
- Inform parents of others in contact with your child. VERY IMPORTANT!!!
- Retreat the hair again 7 - 10 days after the first treatment was done
- It is very important not to use conditioner on the hair before and or after the child has been treated, the pharmacist also recommends that you should try to avoid washing the hair in between treatments and a few days after the second treatment
- Finally it is also important that after the child has been sent back to school he/she should still be checked every day in order to keep it under control.



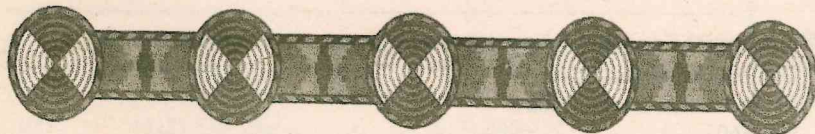
Fast Facts about Head Lice

- ✓ If your child has lice, chances are you probably do too.
- ✓ More girls get lice because their hair is thicker, not because it is longer.
- ✓ Lice can be found anywhere on the head.
- ✓ Nits can survive up to eight inches down the hair shaft.
- ✓ Head lice will also live in eyebrows and beards. These nits and lice must be picked out by hand.
- ✓ Almost all birds and animals have lice, but not the kind that live on humans.
- ✓ Head lice infestation is called pediculosis.
- ✓ No lice product is 100% effective; it has to be combined with nit removal.
- ✓ Lice treatment should always be applied by an adult.

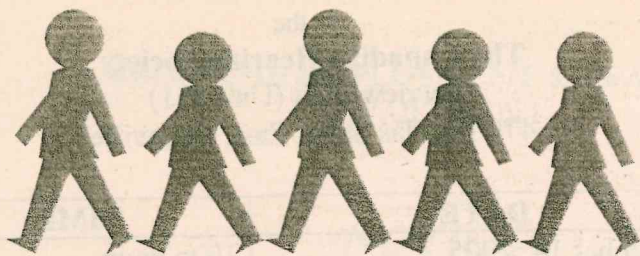

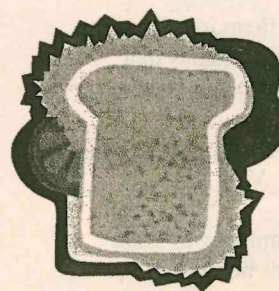

headaches, and mood changes**What You Need To Do: DON'T WAIT. ACT NOW!**For mild to moderate low sugar –Give 15 grams of carbohydrate
for example 3 B-D Glucose tablets or Glucose Gel which can be
bought at the drug store or ½ a can of regular pop or ½ cup of
juice. Check blood sugar in 15 minutes. If less than 4 mmol.
Retreat above instructions.If your usual meal is more than 1 hour away you need an EXTRA
SNACK.

- Carry supplies for treating low blood sugar with you *all the time*.

- Take the *right dose* of your insulin or pills at the *right time* every day.
- Take *extra food* for *extra activity*
- For every 1 hour of extra activity, take: 1 medium fruit or 2 plain cookies.



- Test your blood sugar **regularly** and keep records of results.
- Also record any reactions-when, why and what you did.
- Call doctor if – more than 2 mild reactions a day or 3-4 reactions a week or you have a severe reaction (where you need help)
- Wear your Medic Alert bracelet/necklace.

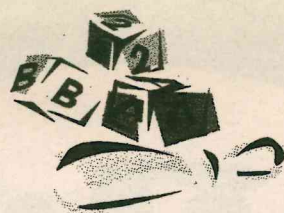

Complementary Foods for the Breastfeeding Baby

Exclusive breastfeeding is all your baby needs for the first six months of life. Complementary feeding is giving other foods in addition to breastmilk, after the first 6 months of life. It is a time of transition when your baby gradually becomes used to eating family foods.

In addition to breastmilk, after six months of age your baby needs energy and nutrient rich foods, especially foods that are rich in vitamin A, C, D, iron and other important minerals to meet their nutritional needs.

How do I know my baby is ready for solid foods?

- baby shows an interest in the foods you are preparing, reaches for food
- baby gets excited when he/she smells food
- baby accepts food and wants more
- after 6 months your baby's digestive system can handle a diversity of foods, he/she is strong enough to hold up his/her head on their own and he/she has developed the oral reflexes needed to swallow

Preparing nutrient rich foods for your baby:

- when introducing new foods, begin with cereal then vegetables, then fruit and finally meat
- introduce foods one at a time and give time to detect allergies (a few days) before introducing the next new food
- potatoes, rice, porridge are high in energy. These can be cooked and mashed to make them soft and easy for your baby to swallow
- you can also add cooked vegetable, for example mashed carrot, sweet potato, squash, peas
- unseasoned, well cooked chicken or other meats you are preparing for the family can be pureed with some water to make it soft and easy to swallow for baby
- most babies enjoy the sweet taste of fruit- try mashed bananas, simmered (to soften) apples, pears, etc

Violence in Schools

The issue of school violence is not a new phenomenon. "Discipline in the Public Schools: A Problem of Perception," traces school violence back to the 1950s when the problem was not discipline, but juvenile delinquency. In that decade, "there seemed to be a marked increase in both the serious and less serious antisocial behavior on the part of our youth..." (Williams, 1979)

Today the possibility that a disagreement among students will be settled with some type of weapon has increased significantly. A major difference between violence in the schools in the 1950s and the 1990s is the presence and use of weapons, especially guns. Also, students seem to hold a grudge much longer. Some students wait until the last day of school to settle an incident that may have occurred weeks or months earlier.

Violence in schools is not unique only to public schools, private and nonsectarian schools have all experienced an increase in school violence. Nine percent of public, seven percent of private and six percent of nonsectarian school students reported being victims of violent acts or property crimes.

The public's concern about discipline and violence in the schools is well warranted. Violence caused by school age children (in and out of school) is worse now than it has ever been; it is on the rise and permeates every segment of our society. This is not to say, however, that all of today's youths are discipline problems or perpetrators of acts of violence. To the contrary, the vast majority of our youth are not violent, nor have they committed acts of violence.

Generally speaking, there are three groups of students in a school, what is called the 80-15-5 rule. Eighty percent of the students rarely break the rules or violate principles. Fifteen percent break the rules on a somewhat regular basis by refusing to accept classroom principles and restrictions. If not clearly apprised of expectations and consequences of such their behavior, these students can disrupt learning for all the other students. The last five percent of the students are chronic rule breakers and are generally out of control most of the time. They may commit acts of violence in school and in the community

WARNING SIGNS

Q. What causes someone to punch, kick, stab or fire a gun at someone else or even him/herself?

A. There is never a simple answer to that question. But people often commit violence because of one or more of the following reasons:

- **Expression.** Some people use violence to release feelings of anger or frustration. They think there are no answers to their problems and turn to violence to express their out of control emotions
- **Manipulation.** Violence is used as a way to control others or get something they want. Retaliation. Violence is used to retaliate against those who have hurt them or someone they care about.
- **Violence is learned behavior.** Like all learned behaviors, it can be changed. This isn't easy, though. Since there is no single cause of violence, there is no one simple solution. The best you can do is learn to recognize the warning signs of violence and to get help when you see them in your friends or yourself.
- **Factors that contribute to violent behavior include:**
 - peer pressure
 - need for attention or respect
 - feelings of low self-worth
 - early childhood abuse or neglect
 - witnessing violence at home, in the community or in the media
 - easy access to weapons

Recognizing violence warning signs in others:

Often people who act violently have trouble controlling their feelings. They may have been hurt by others. Some think that making people fear them through violence or threats of violence will solve their problems or earn them respect. This isn't true. People who behave violently lose respect. They find themselves isolated or disliked, and they still feel angry and frustrated.

If you see these immediate warning signs, violence is a serious possibility:

- loss of temper on a daily basis
- frequent physical fighting
- significant vandalism or property damage
- increase in use of drugs or alcohol
- increase in risk-taking behavior
- detailed plans to commit acts of violence
- announcing threats or plans for hurting others
- enjoying hurting animals
- carrying a weapon

If you notice the following signs over a period of time, the potential for violence exists:

- a history of violent or aggressive behavior
- serious drug or alcohol use
- gang membership or strong desire to be in a gang
- access to or fascination with weapons, especially guns
- threatening others regularly
- trouble controlling feelings like anger
- withdrawal from friends and usual activities

- feeling rejected or alone
- having been a victim of bullying
- poor school performance
- history of discipline problems or frequent run-ins with authority
- feeling constantly disrespected
- failing to acknowledge the feelings or rights of others

What you can do if someone you know shows violence warning signs

When you recognize violence warning signs in someone else, there are things you can do. Tell someone you trust and respect about your concerns and ask for help. This could be a family member, guidance counsellor, teacher, school psychologist, coach or friend. If you are worried about being a victim of violence, get someone in authority to protect you. Do not resort to violence or use a weapon to protect yourself. The key to really preventing violent behavior is asking an experienced professional for help.

First Nations Technical Institute, located near Belleville, Ont., has appointed Janice C. Hill as its new Director of Education. Ms. Hill has been an icon in Aboriginal education and has having served as principal of FNTI's Ohahase Education Centre as well as a part-time professor for Queen's University faculty of education. Hill also assisted in the design and development of Queen's University's Aboriginal Teacher Education Program and is currently finishing a term as co-chair of the Aboriginal Education Council at Trent University.

"There are so many opportunities for aboriginal youth today that weren't available when I was younger. I am truly excited to be a part of an Aboriginal Institution that believes in the future of Aboriginal people educating their own," says Hill.

FNTI also welcomes former Centennial College president Richard Johnston as its interim president as part of a major restructuring plan to ensure the institution continues to meet its educational commitments to Aboriginal people into the 21st century.

"It's truly an honour to accept this position," says Johnston. "The news is often filled with disheartening stories regarding Aboriginal people. FNTI is a testament to educational success for Aboriginals. And the great thing about FNTI is that it is Aboriginal people themselves who have created this success." Johnston says he will accept the position until FNTI completes its search for a president.

First Nations Technical Institute is a leader in Aboriginal post-secondary education in Ontario. With over 2000 graduates from its programs, the Institute will celebrate its 20th year of operations this month.

FNTI is also a leader in its ability to forge academic partnerships with existing mainstream colleges and universities. Over its 20 year history, the Institute has forged articulation agreements with Ryerson University, St. Lawrence College, Canadore College and Humber College to assist in its program offerings. The Institute offers a diverse program complement including studies in public administration and governance, social work, journalism, aviation and health sciences.

"We will continue to move forward as a viable educational alternative for Aboriginal people," says FNTI board chair Mark Green. "It's good to see that Aboriginal post-secondary education is now on both the federal and provincial government agendas," says Green, referring to a recent two-day meeting between premiers and aboriginal leaders held recently in Calgary. Green says the board of directors is optimistic there will be actions put to government lip service at the fall First Ministers conference where it is expected that the details of a 10 year plan to address health, poverty and education for Aboriginals will be discussed.
