The RCMP is pushing to make all police records accessible to all police services.

There is a need for technological support for the Interpol system - need for high speed internet services.

Dave said some First Nations have high speed internet and it is paid for by the First Nation Police Bureau. There is a list of approved suppliers for this service. Dave asked for a business case for high speed internet service based on two or three estimates being obtained and contracted with an approved supplier. The invoice will be part of the monthly telephone bill. Tom Hummel is the designated person at O.P.P. to work with. Garry MacPherson will arrange for Chris Maracle (IT) and Tom Hummel on the high speed internet issue. Bearclaw will oversee the installation.

Dave Bracken has ordered a new boat for Tyendinaga Police Service.

Tyendinaga Police Service does not want to wear the OPP supplied uniforms which are ordered from Ottawa. All uniforms are paid for through the OPP Program and the only difference is the shoulder flash. OPP will pay up to the amount of the OPP uniform allowance.

A special meeting of the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council was held at the request of Chief R. Donald Maracle to consider a request from Nicholas Tibbolo, lawyer, for a supplementary affidavit on the lack of consultation by the Ontario Government regarding the Seaton Lands north of Pickering containing culturally significant archeological sites of Iroquoian Peoples. There are 38 confirmed and more than 40 unconfirmed archeological sites spanning the past 12,000 years, documented on the Seaton Lands. The Crown proposes to exchange 7000 hectares of Crown Lands (Seaton site) for other lands in Richmond Hill. The Seaton lands will be developed for a new town site by five developers.

The creation of private interests in the land will add to the complexity of any discussion between us about what is to be done about both its archeological and the biological

David Sanford has commenced an Application for Judicial Review and, as part of the Application, has brought a motion for an interlocutory injunction preventing the transfer of the Seaton Lands. The injunction application will be heard on August 22 and 23, 2006 in the Superior Court of Justice in Toronto.

Judge Then, on July 20, 2006, directed lawyer, Nicholas Tibbolo, to canvas First Nations with an interest in the issue to determine if they wanted to become an applicant to the Judicial Review litigation.

Chief Greg Cowie signed the Supplementary Affidavit and Chief Maracle placed the same supplementary affidavit request before the Tyendinaga Mohawk Council for consideration and direction.

The cross examination on the first affidavit signed by Chiefs regarding the lack of consultation will occur on August 10 and 11, 2006 at Court Reporters Office at Bay and King Street in Toronto, Ontario.

A number of Chiefs have filed affidavits regarding the lack of consultation.

The Public Hearings is to provide a forum for First Nations views on regulation of source water protection, training and certification of operators, drinking water quality, effluents, treatment, testing, wells, health protection, emergency plant and system design, and other aspects and what standards should be employed. The Public Hearings will examine what legal framework should be used and what role should various governments play in implementation. Indian Affairs will provide a contribution to offset travel expenses.

#### Waste

- · Buy in bulk. It's cheaper and it uses less packaging.
- · Buy vegetables loose, not in plastic bags.
- Avoid plastic containers, they are made of different types of plastic which are costly and difficult to separate and recycle.

- · Compost your food scraps.
- Look for products made from recycled materials.
- Use cloth instead of paper napkins and towels.

#### Water

- Keep a covered container of water in the fridge for drinking you won't have to run the tap until the water is cold every time you want a drink.
- Keep a bowl of water in the sink while preparing food for quickly rinsing your hands.
- If you must use a dishwasher, only do full loads and use the econo setting. To save energy, stop the machine after the rinse and open the door to let the dishes air dry.

It may be common practice, but backyard burning of garbage in open containers can release dangerous pollutants including dioxins, volatile organic compounds, and particle pollution.

Inhaling or ingesting even small amounts of these pollutants can cause many dangerous health problems. Older people, small children, and those with respiratory problems are especially vulnerable Dioxins can cause wide range of health problems, including cancer. The largest known source of dioxin emissions is backyard burning.

And ash created by backyard garbage burning often contains toxic metals such as mercury, lead, chromium and arsenic. Improper disposal of the ash, can cause soil contamination, and then eventually water contamination.

Take your health into consideration, and take your waste to the landfill site.





#### BREASTFEEDING CIRCLE

When is World Breastfeeding Week, and what is this year's theme?

October 1st to 7th is World Breastfeeding Week in Canada. The first week of October, the 10th month of the year, is chosen to celebrate because it is the first week of life, after 9 months of gestation, that a baby starts to breastfeed. This year's theme is *The International Code:*Protecting Infant Health for 25 Years. The International Code (also referred to as The WHO Code and The Code) is a document created in 1981 by the World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF that regulates the advertising of infant formula and other breastmilk substitutes in a way that prevents the undermining of breastfeeding.

The key precepts of the International Code state that there should be no advertising of breastmilk substitutes to the public, no promotion of such products through the health care system, and infant formula must no be portrayed as equally healthy as breastmilk. Aggressive marketing of breastmilk substitutes has been shown to lead to drastic declines in breastfeeding rates.

Not only does the use of artificial baby milk lead to increased health risks, but the proper use of infant formula requires clean water, good sanitation, literacy, and an adequate family income. In many communities safe water may be scarce or unreliable, illiteracy rates and poverty are high, and yet formula companies persist in attempting to convince mothers in these regions to feed their babies artificial milk.

The International Code isn't only important in the poor communities however, as studies have shown that formula-fed babies everywhere are a increased risk of childhood cancer, asthma, ear and respiratory infections allergies, diabetes, gastrointestinal infections; score lower on IQ and vocabulary tests; and as adults are at increased risk for cardiovascular disease and obesity.

Although the International Code was ratified (endorsed) by all 182 member countries in the World Health Assembly, it has been passed into national law by only 60 nations. Canada and the United States are not among them. This is one main reason why we have such a low number of certified Baby Friendly hospitals in Canada, why formula is frequently pushed on new mothers in hospitals, and why there is so much formula advertising, samples, coupons, and special offers from formula and baby food companies. World Breastfeeding Week events will highlight the need to legislate the Code and promote the wellbeing of our most vulnerable members of society.



# **RED CEDARS**

#### **Date and Acquaintance Rape**

Acquaintance sexual assault is non-consensual sexual behavior between two people who know each other. This includes intercourse, touching behaviors, kissing or holding against a person's will. Sexual assault can be imposed through verbal coercion, intimidation, physical restraint or threats. It does not have to be violent or result in physical injury to qualify as sexual assault. If you are sexually assaulted it is not your fault. However, here are some things you can do to protect yourself:

- Know that it's your right to decide whether, when and with whom you will have sex with,
- Trust your instincts if you feel uneasy, uncomfortable or confused. You
  have the right to leave even if you fear you might hurt his feelings. It is
  more important to protect yourself.
- Be especially aware in social situations where a lot of alcohol and/or drugs are consumed. Many assaults on women happen in these contexts.
- It is your right to set limits on what happens sexually. It is your right to say "NO" even if you have been attracted to someone or previously had sex with him.
- Except respect and acceptance from all your friends, including men you
  may choose to date or have sexual relationships with.

#### Have you Ever:

- Had sex with someone when you were not sure if you wanted to?
- Forced to have sex with someone because you were not asked if you
  were willing, or because you were ignored when you said "NO"?
- Been in a situation where you felt you had to have sex with a man because he just would not stop?
- Had sex with someone because you felt pressured to or feared you would lose your relationship if you did not?
- Been told by your partner that there was something wrong with you if you
  did not agree to have sex?
- Had sex with someone because you were drunk or stoned?
- Had sex with someone because you felt afraid of him or what might happen if you didn't?
- Had sex because he forced or threatened you with harm?

If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, you have experienced sex through pressure, coercion, or force.

Sexual Assault is any unwanted sexual act imposed on one person by another.

Without consent, it is Sexual Assault.

#### Sexual Assault Myths

Myth: Rape is committed by crazed strangers.

Reality: Most women are raped by "normal" acquaintances.

Myth: A person who is raped deserves it, especially if she agreed to go to the man's house or ride in his car.

Reality: No one deserves to be raped. Being in a man's house or car does not mean you have agreed to have sex with him.

Myth: Women who do not fight back have not been raped.

Reality: You have been raped when you are forced to have sex against your will, whether you fight back or not.

Myth: If there is no gun or knife, you have not been raped.

Reality: It is rape whether the rapist uses a weapon or his fists, verbal threats, drugs or alcohol, physical isolation, your own diminished physical or mental state or simply the weight of his body to overcome you.

Myth: It is not really rape if the victim is not a virgin.

Reality: Rape is rape, even if you are not a virgin, even if you willingly had sex with the man before.

Myth: If a woman lets a man buy her dinner or pay for a movie or drinks, she owes him sex.

Reality: No one owes sex as a payment to anyone else, no matter how expensive the date.

Myth: Agreeing to kiss or neck with a man means that a woman has agreed to have intercourse with him.

Reality: Everyone has the right to say "NO" to sexual activity, regardless of what has preceded it, and to have that "NO" respect.

Myth: Once a man is sexually aroused he is unable to help himself from forcing sex on a woman.

Reality: Men do not physically need to have sex after becoming aroused any more than women do. Men are still able to control themselves even after becoming sexually excited.

Myth: Women lie about being raped, especially when they accuse men they date or other acquaintances.

Reality: Rape really happens to people you know, by people they know.

If you or someone you know is being Sexually Abused or has been Raped you should get help.







# **EDUCATION & HEAD START PROGRAM**

## Trustee Report for August, 2006.

The Board meets on August 28th to finalize the budget for the 2006/2007 school year. Although there are many areas of improvement in working with the Ontario Ministry of Education, funding continues to present some major challenges for Boards to over come.

Good things are happening in Aboriginal Education these days. We now have a Native person filling a Directors seat at the Ontario Public School Boards Association table, major issues will be brought to a higher level to be resolved with Ontario Public School Boards Associations lobbying different levels of government. The Ministry of Education is recognizing a greater responsibility to improve the quality of education for First Nations People across the province. To this end, the Ministry of Education has drafted a document entitled Aboriginal Education Policy Framework which outlines the responsibilities that the Ministry will take as well as School Boards and Schools. The document has been sent out to Aboriginal Organizations as well as School Boards and other governmental agencies. Individual First nations Communities will also have an opportunity to have input into the final draft which will hopefully become policy next year. Tyendinaga will have a committee of representatives from education review this document and will offer suggestions to improve the document. Regional meetings across the province will take place with feed back an important part for the Ministry of Education to incorporate into this document. Everyone seems to be very positive with how this can improve the quality of education for Aboriginal students by working together.

#### Secondary School Programs

#### Description

Ohahase Education Centre is operated by First Nations Technical Institute to provide programs for students seeking to achieve an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (O.S.S.D.). Ohahase means "new road" in the Mohawk Language and that is why we say it is "Your Future Path to Success"! Ohahase is a Private Secondary School that is inspected and licensed by the Ontario Ministry of Education. Each year our curriculum and guidelines are inspected and the Principal is granted a license to operate and grant credits. Ohahase currently offers two programs; a full-time day program for youth and an adult program of correspondence and night school.

#### **Program Mission**

#### Ohahase....

Is a centre for excellence, providing holistic and respectful learning rooted in Mohawk language and cultural practices; and

Will facilitate a multigenerational community that fosters belonging through encouragement, motivation and laughter - striving for the goals of self-sufficiency and biculturalism.

#### **Learning Programs**

#### Full-time Day Program for Youth

This program is a Private Secondary School program currently for grade nine and ten students. There is no tuition charge or fees for status Native students or community residents as the school is funded by Indian and Northern Affairs Canada. The program consists of regular semester periods in which students take a maximum of four classes per day in each semester. We offer a unique and challenging curriculum that meets Ontario guidelines and includes aspects of Mohawk language and culture. Students of all ages and levels of ability are welcomed as we are able to provide a small teacher-student ratio. We have been in operation three years and will expand to include grade eleven and twelve in the immediate future.

#### Courses/Program Requirements

Students are required to earn 30 credits to achieve an O.S.S.D. (18 compulsory and 12 optional credits). Our grade 9 and 10 programs in the past have included the following courses:

#### Program Schedule

This program is scheduled during two semesters, starting Semester 1 in September and Semester 2 in February. It is a requirement that students attend classes daily during regular scheduled time slots. Older students are welcome to attend on a part-time basis if they are able to attend the daily scheduled class.

#### **Adult Education Program**

This program is designed as a self-directed learning program with a support system. Adults are offered correspondence courses from the Independent Learning Centre that are approved by the Ministry of Education. Students may work at their own pace and staff at the school, are available to provide assistance when required. The length of the program varies depending on the number of credits required for graduation.

#### Courses/Program Requirements

O.S.S.D (Ontario Secondary School Diploma) requires students to earn 30 credits. Credits may be earned from high school subjects, maturity credits or equivalency credits. At least 4 credits must be senior credits (grade 11 or 12) and a senior English credit must

Maturity Credits - the Ministry of education grants up to 12 mature credits to adults returning to school. These credits apply to adult students who started high school in the Province of Ontario before September 1999.

Equivalency Credits - some non-post secondary courses that adult students have taken qualify for credits, i.e. apprenticeship training, community college upgrading, etc.

All courses are divided into 20 lessons. Each course is 1 credit unless otherwise stated. Courses are offered at various levels of learning to accommodate educational goals related to work, attending College or University. There is no fee for community members to take a course through correspondence, as the initial registration fees are subsidized by local community service organizations.

Night school is offered periodically and in the past we have offered courses in English, Presentations and Public Speaking Skills, Computers, Math and Mohawk language. Other non-credit workshop courses are available periodically such as leather crafts (moccasins).





# TYENDINAGA JUSTICE CIRCLE INFORMATION NEWSLETTER

#### INTRODUCTION

The TJC is currently being run through First Nations Technical Institute with a satellite office maintained at the Tyendinaga Police Station. The TJC is an alternative to the current justice system, with a focus on youth from 12-17 years of age. The circle consists of community members who have taken the initiative to become involved. Not to be confused with the "Sentencing circle", the forum brings together victims, offenders and their supporters in a safe, controlled environment "to discuss the offence and its effect and to jointly decide how to right the wrong that has been done. The Objective of the TJC is to return to a traditional form of justice. This process can be recognized as a pro-active strategy to empower the community to regain their perspective roles of respect.

## WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Restorative justice is a way of viewing justice that puts the emphasis on repairing harm caused by conflict and offence. In this approach, the term "offence" is understood as a violation of people and relationships and disruption of the peace of the community. It is not simply an offence against society. Restorative justice is collaborative and inclusive.

It usually involves the participation of the victim, offenders and the community affected by the crime in finding solutions that seek to repair harm and promote harmony.

VALUES ASSOCIATED WITH RESTORATIVE JUSTICE.

Equality, respect, honesty, trust, dignity, humility, balance, cultural diversity and sensitivity, empowerment, to encouraging accountability and provide an opportunity for healing in a safe environment.

CULTURAL PERSPECTIVE OF RESTORATIVE PRACTICE

The Tyendinaga Justice Circle will incorporate the traditional, spiritual and cultural practices that will best serve our community's needs. The TJC will embody traditional practices associated with aboriginal justice.

HOW WILL THIS PROCESS BENEFIT OUR YOUTH?

A restorative justice process for our youth encourages them to take responsibility for his or her harmful behaviour in a meaningful way, to gain insight into the causes of that behaviour and its effects on others. Our mandate is to help youth 12-17 years of age.

HOW WILL THIS PROCESS BENEFIT THE VICTIMS?

When victims choose to participate, the process gives them a forum to ask questions, receive answers and gain understanding. The victim explains the impact of the crime on them and contributes to the outcome of the process. The process may result in the victim receiving some sort of reparation such as an apology, restitution, and services in a safe environment. Participating in a restorative justice circle can assist the victim in seeking closure.

HOW DO YOU ACCESS THE TYENDINAGA JUSTICE CIRCLE? 

#### STEPS TO CONTACTING THE TJC.

- 1. Contact your police Service or the Justice Circle Coordinator to ensure that your case can be referred to TJC. A key component to the forum is that the offender(s) must first admit responsibility for théir behaviour.
- 2. The Justice Circle Coordinator will contact you to make arrangements. Participation is strictly voluntary.
- 3. The session will be held in a location suitable for such
- 4. A resolution must be agreed to by all parties. The facilitator(s) do not have a say in the decision itself. They maintain a focus for the forum.
- 5. Closure to the session will be enabled by all parties gathering at the end. An agreement will be prepared by the facilitator that must be signed by all parties.

### TYENDINAGA JUSTICE CIRCLE

- It is an alternative to the current justice system. No "professional" individuals are involved in the process.
- It benefits the victim(s), the offender (s) their supporters, and the community in which they live.
- Certified Community Volunteers facilitate the forum.
- Types of circles: Pre charge forums, post charge forums, conflict resolution forums

# POSTCARDS FROM THE VISION QUEST by Joseph Brant

## Looking forward to life after 30

Here's the truth: by the time you read this I'll be 30.

I'm actually rather excited about it. I have plans to see Carlene Carter in concert later this weekend. I suppose "concert" is a strong word. It's actually at a club here in town. You'll likely remember her—she sang that song about ten years ago called "Every Little Thing" (and by ten years ago, I mean thirteen). It was my absolute favorite song that entire summer.

She also sang, "I Fell In Love" and "Come On Back" back in 1990 which, again, just doesn't seem all that long ago. Her last album, a greatest hits package that I love, came out in 1996 and since then she's been in jail on drugs charges and her partner and producer DIED of a drug overdose. Apparently she's entirely recovered, remarried and recording again, so I'm excited. I've never seen her perform before and, as tends to be the case, I get excited about the same stuff I got excited about before I moved here.

And I suppose I know why that is. I moved to Nashville because I loved country music and wanted to be part of the industry but, now that I've seen the wizard and told the emperor he ain't wearing nothing, and the mystery, the magic of music is gone, I'm free to now to move on.

Living in Nashville, everyone (if you want to) has access to the secret deals that get made, it's easier to connect the dots when you see something unusual happen, and you realize all those coincidences that made your biggest star back when I didn't live here was really well coordinated somewhere down here. Of course, I'm in denial when it comes to specifics. I'll always love Highway 101, for example—I know I couple of you will remember them—even though I know there must have been something they did to bring it all crashing down after only three albums.

The day after Carlene Carter is the Emmy Awards day, so I may be glued to the TV from about 3pm until midnight. That's a bit embarrassing so I'm grateful these award shows are so rare (at least at this time of year). Again, though, in an age of reality TV—where there's always a back story, and even those shows aren't really reality—it's sometimes more fun to guess at the "seeming coincidences" than to just watch the show.

And that, it seems, is just an example of what it's all about, as I broach 30. All these years, all these twenties appear now to have been filled with learning. I graduated from college quite a few years ago but it seems, all along, there has always been so much more that I needed to know. And I guess it true: I once read somewhere that the best college can do is teach you to want to learn more.

Because it can't provide everything we all need. I've realized these past few years how much I'm a fan of all forms of media. It may seem like I've been entirely honest here with these letters home but, again, there's always a back story.

I've been writing for a couple newspapers here in town for the past few years. (Part time; I'm still full time at the bookstore.) And I've been on TV a handful of times this past year, so in order to at least appear authoritative, I've had to put to test all that I've learned and, of course, continue to pick up a few pointers along the way as well.

I've learned a lot about community this past while, and the difficulties surrounding groups of people who are bonded but still inevitably feel friction every now and then. I've learned how to maneuver in those clusters—if even when pretending to be a disinterested outsider, "just writing about stuff"—when it becomes important for the right hand (of the community) to know what's going on with the left.

I've learned that my interests are not shared by everyone else. Seems kind of odd to say but hey, when you're passionate, you're passionate. It's become most clear in the bookstore where I work, and even in all that I've learned about the book business.

I've learned about authenticity. It seems regardless to who you are, there is a stereotype someone can attribute to you. It's become important in my writing to suss out those presumptions—even the ones we tend to believe about ourselves. Life became a lot more freeing when I took an interest in language, mostly because I realized there may not always be a "perfect" way to get the point across, but with some thought there's always a better way.

I've learned that there's too much to do and never enough time to do it. That's exciting to me; it's energizing, especially when you love what you do (which isn't always the case for any of us, I'm sure).

I've learned to appreciate what I have, if only because there was most likely a time when I didn't have it. To that end, I'm sure to not take for granted the stuff I want now because I know someday, when I get it, I'll appreciate it.

I'm probably rambling now but I suppose that's inevitable. Once you reach a certain age, there come fewer mile markers like this one that provide an opportunity for reflection.

So the really good news, of course, is that the insurance rates are going down again! (If only I had some kind of guarantee the car will hold out so I can celebrate it).
