Dear Mr. Mulder:

The information you provided regarding the extraction of walleye from the Napanee, Moira and Trent River and comments from people viewing the spearing of walleye.

Is it possible for the Ministry of Natural Resources to provide all the names of non-natives from the United States who fish in the waters of Canada? Is it also possible for the Ministry of Natural Resources to list the industries and companies who constantly pollute the waters that destroy the population of fish? Where are the comments from native people regarding our side of the issue?

It appears to our Council the Ministry of Natural Resources has taken great lengths to ensure they monitor a population which consumes approximately 3% of the fish population. If "conservation" is really the objection of the Ministry of Natural Resources then perhaps the Ministry of Natural Resources should reduce United States licenses and licenses to anglers in Canada in an honest attempt to balance the scales. Perhaps the Ministry of Natural Resources should increase the monitoring of anglers and the number of fish they take per day/catch.

Albeit the information provided was to be utilized as such, it is frustrating to see how much concern and time is given to a 3% factor when in reality the component consuming the highest percentage of fish should be concentrated on.

The Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte has, since 1953, implemented a By-law to monitor and control spearing and it still receives "bad" coverage. Perhaps it is time we started to increase our percentage and assume the concept of non-natives which is to "take while the taking is good" and blame it on others.

TORONTO - Provincial policy requiring government employees to pay fines for traffic violations will not change now that photo radar has been introduced on provincial highways, a Ministry of Transportation official said today.

"In any given year we only have a handful of cases where we have had difficulty recovering money from an employee for a parking or speeding violation," said Bill MacDonald, manager of the ministry's corporate operations office. "That's pretty good odds when you have more than 12,500 provincial vehicles on the road."

Provincial policy, in accordance with the government's employee expenses manual, requires all employees to take "responsibility for all traffic and parking violations." That includes speeding tickets issued by photo radar. Employees who refuse to pay their speeding and parking tickets could face disciplinary action.

Employees using government vehicles are encouraged to be conscientious and responsible drivers, said MacDonald.

HEALTH CANADA WELCOMES OPENING OF SUMMER BEAVER NURSING STATION

SUMMER BEAVER, Ont. -- Summer Beaver, located four-hundred and eighty (480) air kilometres north of Sioux Lookout, Ontario will officially open a new Nursing Station on Monday, August 15.

Health Canada contributed \$2,005,000 to fund construction of the Nursing Station.

Richard Jock, Regional Director of Medical Services Branch, Health Canada, Ontario Region, said the Nursing Station is an important addition to the community. It will provide community members with services, information and the opportunity to improve their overall health. It is a close-at-hand resource which will offer community members support, counselling and education on a variety of health issues.

The Nursing Station includes: examination and treatment rooms; a community health room; office space for community health representatives, nurses and alcohol and drug abuse program officers; visiting professionals; a reception office; and a waiting room.

The Summer Beaver Nursing Station will serve approximately 350 people, both on and off the reserve. It compliments the existing and planned infrastructure for primary school as well as a planned community centre and administration complex.

Prior to the recent completion of the Summer Beaver Nursing Station, community members were required to utilize the nursing services provided by the satellite Webequie Nursing Station. In the event of serious medical problems, they were transported to either Sioux Lookout or Thunder Bay for treatment.

However, with the completion of their own nursing station, community members will no longer have to leave their home community for basic health care. The two nurses now stationed at the Summer Beaver Nursing Station will provide this care within their own locale.







ALL ONTARIO ABORIGINAL FASTBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Mohawk Recreation Committee would like to thank all of the volunteers who came out and made the 1994 All Ontario Aboriginal Fastball Championships a great success. Without the support of the community the tournament would not have run as smooth as it did!

The Tyendinaga Women's team ended the tournament with a 4 & 2 record (Both losses were to the Six Nation's Native Daughters). Tyendinaga's first loss came on Saturday with a score of 6 to 3 for the Native Daughters. With a 45 minute break between games, the Tyendinaga team came back to beat the Moravian Delawares 5 to 3. Not done yet, Tyendinaga played it's third game in a row and beat the Alderville team 7 to 1 to go on to the semi-finals. Sunday, Tyendinaga once again faced the Six Nation's Native Daughters. In extra innings, the Native Daughters took the lead and finally won with a score of 4 to 3.

The Tyendinaga Women's team won third place in the All Ontario Tournament with the Native Daughters taking second, and the Ohsweken Selects capturing the first place title.

Tyendinaga had two men's teams vying for the Championships.

The Tyendinaga Jem's won their first game when the Chippewa's of the Thames were a no-show. In the Jem's second game they out hit the Oneida Ace's but came up short as the Aces won 2 to 1. In their third game the Jem's defeated Sagamok by a score of 12 to 1. Against the Moravian Delaware's, the Tyendiaga Jem's went 8 innings to be beaten 5 to 4.

The Tyendinaga Eagles, went undefeated until the Championship Game, putting up scores such as 8-0 and 10-0. The Eagles only loss came at the hands of the Six Nation's Yogi's when they beat them 5 to 2 in the finals. However, being a Double knock-out tournament, another game was necessary.

In the Final Game, with a score of 3-2 going into the 7th inning, Jeff Vanhooser, pitcher for the Eagles doubled with 1 out. Next Ted Maracle got a hit which allowed a run to score tying the game 3-3. Next up was Matt Green who double and scored Ted Maracle to give the Tyendinaga Eagles a 4-3 lead going into the bottom of the 7th. Jeff Vanhooser was brought in to relieve Barry Vanhooser, and Jeff struck out the first batter. The second batter for the Yogi's received a base on balls. Then, with some heads up catching, by Joe Maracle, when the third batter struck out, Joe threw the runner out going to second and ended the game.

The Tyendinaga Eagles finished first with the Six Nation's Yogi's second and the Oneida Aces third.
